It's not only a Long Island record, it's a New York State record, it's a U.S. record. Not a single ball was placed in play. All 21 batters were struck out. Two walks. For a sophomore in high school, an incredible achievement. And I thank him for being here to allow us to recognize him.

Also with us today are Danny's parents, Hector and Iris, who are with us here in the gallery. Thank you so much for joining with us today and allowing us the opportunity

to recognize this truly historic and singular event.

I don't believe that there's an achievement in sport that can rival 21 strike-outs. And the statistical probabilities of getting 21 strike-outs in a seven-inning game are so astronomical that it is that important that we take moment from our deliberations to recognize Danny and to wish you a wonderful, wonderful career ahead of us.

In addition to his athletic achievement, he is also a gifted academic, not only excelling academically in high school but also as a community leader and a leader in the high school. And for that, we salute you and we salute your parents. Thank you.

Coincidentally, and only coincidentally, the very next day after we had a no-hitter and 21 batters were struck out, Elmont High School Spartans, in their pitcher Enrique Sanchez, who's also with us today, pitched another no-hitter.

So we had back-to-back no-hitters.

And although we didn't strike out 21 batters
on that second night, we struck out 13

batters. But again, an incredible achievement.

And I want to take the opportunity to recognize both of these fine young men, both of these community leaders for that achievement, and recognize Elmont High School once again, its principal, John Capozzi, and the entire Elmont community for this wonderful achievement.

With us also today is our Team

Captain Tommy Caraballo, who joins us. He's

the spirit of the team. And for my

colleagues, I'd ask you to join me also in

recognizing, purely by coincidence, it's

Tommy's birthday today. Tommy, happy birthday

to you.

To the entire Elmont community, congratulations on a spectacular two days of baseball on Long Island. And to Danny's parents, thanks for being here with us today.

The ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 1 2 Secretary will read. 3 THE SECRETARY: Legislative 4 Resolution Number 1536, by Senator Perkins, 5 mourning the death of Grete Waitz, an outstanding athlete and marathon icon, and 6 7 recognizing the significance of her life 8 accomplishments. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 10 Perkins. 11 SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you very 12 much. I just want to briefly make some remarks. 13 14 Grete Waitz was an exceptional 15 athlete and marathon icon who distinguished herself through her outstanding achievements 16 in worldwide athletic competitions. Some of 17 18 you may know that I have occasionally run marathons myself, and she was someone that was 19 20 very influential with me in terms of the efforts that I've made to do that. 21 She continually excelled in her 22 23 sport throughout her career. At the age of 17, she won the national junior titles in 24 25 Norway for 400 and 800-meter races. She set

the European junior record for the 1500-meters race with a time of 4:17. She won a Bronze Medal at the European Championship in 1974. She set a new record in '75 in the 3000-meters race in Oslo, Norway, with a time of 8:46:6, eight hours, 46 minutes, 6 seconds. She won a Gold Medal in 1977 for the 3000-meters race at the IAAF World Cup in Dusseldorf, Germany. She began running in the New York City marathon in 1978, when she went on to win nine races. I started in 1979.

Grete is widely acknowledged for helping to promote marathon and long-distance running for women. In Norway, she is a sporting legend, having an annual race named in her honor. And the New York Road Runners Club annually sponsors "Grete's Great Gallop," a half-marathon dedicated in her honor.

After being diagnosed with cancer in 2005, Grete established the cancer care foundation called "Active Against Cancer" in 2007.

Grete Waitz leaves behind a legacy which will long endure the passage of time and will remain as a comforting memory to all who

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knew her or have been affected by her work.

Legislative 5 THE SECRETARY: Resolution Number 1537, by Senator Perkins, 6 7 commemorating the 112th birthday of Edward 8 Kennedy "Duke" Ellington and his tremendous 9 contributions to music of the 20th century, 10 specifically jazz, blues and gospel. "WHEREAS, It is the sense of this 11 12 Legislative Body to recognize and commend those musical geniuses who brought 13 entertainment and cultural enrichment to the 14 15 citizens of the great Empire State; and "WHEREAS, Edward Kennedy Ellington 16 was born on April 29, 1899, to James Edward 17 18 Ellington and Daisy Kennedy Ellington. Daisy and James Edward were both pianists; and 19 20 "WHEREAS, At the age of seven, 21 Edward Kennedy Ellington began taking piano 22 lessons. His mother surrounded him with 23 dignified women to reinforce his manners and 24 taught him to live elegantly; and 25 "WHEREAS, Edward Kennedy

Ellington's childhood friends noticed that
'his casual, offhand manner, easy grace, and
his dapper dress gave him the bearing of a
young nobleman.' They began calling him
'Duke.' Duke credited his 'chum' Edgar
McEntree for the nickname; and

"WHEREAS, Duke Ellington once stated, 'I think he felt that in order for me to be eligible for his constant companionship, I should have a title. So he called me Duke'; and

"WHEREAS, A prominent figure in the history of jazz, Duke Ellington's music stretched into various other genres, including blues, gospel, film scores, popular, and classical. His career spanned more than 50 years and included leading his orchestra, composing an inexhaustible songbook, attaining credits for movies, and composing stage musicals and world tours; and

"WHEREAS, Duke Ellington's work has come to be recognized as a cornerstone of American culture and heritage. He is widely regarded as the most important composer in jazz, and was also a galvanizing bandleader

who inspired many of his musicians to produce their best work, whilst himself being a significant exponent of jazz piano; and

"WHEREAS, When asked what inspired him to write, Duke Ellington had replied, 'My men and my race are the inspiration of my work. I try to catch the character and mood and feeling of my people'; and

"WHEREAS, Thanks to his inventive use of the orchestra, or big band, and thanks to his eloquence and extraordinary charisma, Duke Ellington is generally considered to have elevated the perception of jazz to an art form on a par with other traditional genres of music; and

"WHEREAS, Duke Ellington influenced millions of people both at home and around the world. He gave American music its own sound for the first time. Throughout his 50-year career, he played over 20,000 performances in Europe, Latin America, the Middle East as well as Asia; and

"WHEREAS, Duke Ellington was awarded the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award in 1966. He was later awarded several other

prizes, the U.S. Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1969, and the Legion of Honor by France in 1973, the highest civilian honors in each country; and

"WHEREAS, Duke Ellington died on May 24, 1974, a month after his 75th birthday, and is buried in the Bronx, New York City. At his funeral, attended by over 12,000 people at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, located in Harlem, New York, Ella Fitzgerald summed up the occasion by stating, It's a very sad day ... A genius has passed'; and

"WHEREAS, Formerly named 'Frawley
Circle,' the traffic circle located at
5th Avenue and 110th Street in Harlem,
New York, was renamed 'Duke Ellington Circle'
in 1995. In 1997, a 25-foot tall statue by
sculptor Robert Graham of Duke Ellington was
erected in the middle of the amphitheater
composing the circle; and

"WHEREAS, In 1986, a dramatic stamp-image portrayal of the beloved American composer and bandleader Duke Ellington was designed by Texas-born artist James Sharpe, and its April 1986 release not only

represented the first U.S. Postal Service 1 2 issue of a jazz-themed image, but the 3 introduction of its design also served as only 4 the second U.S. stamp-image to feature an 5 African-American from the field of musical 6 arts; and 7 "WHEREAS, In 2008, the honor was 8 bestowed on Duke Ellington once again with the 9 issuance of another U.S. postage stamp titled 10 'Black Cinema USA 42' for his film 'Black and Tan'; and 11 12 "WHEREAS, On February 24, 2009, the United States Mint launched a new coin 13 14 featuring Duke Ellington, making him the first 15 African-American to appear alone on a circulating United States coin; now, 16 therefore, be it 17 18 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative Body pause in its deliberations to commemorate 19 20 the 112th birthday of Edward Kennedy 'Duke' 21 Ellington, a legendary musician and one of the most influential African-Americans in the 22 23 history of this state, this country, and the world; and be it further 24

In January 2000 I asked about
25 people to join me at the Orange County
legislature, and our purpose was to discuss a
team to put together of how do we go about
getting a stamp to honor the American men and
women who have been wounded or killed in
combat.

In January 2000, ladies and gentlemen, we weren't at war. A lot of people wanted everything to settle down. I had a few people say, Forget it, you know, my father is dead and my brother is sick and this here.

But we decided that this was the appropriate time.

The Postal Department told us that we could wait for you-know-who to freeze over, Michael. And what happened? We started a campaign.

The United States Military

Academy -- we had the cadets up here last

week -- in the first month, January through

February, West Point produced 2500 letters in

support of it. The Postal Service doesn't

take petitions, so consequently you couldn't

have it done in a quick way of saying how many

people supported a Purple Heart stamp.

We worked feverishly to get this stamp approved. And before I go any further, I want to especially mention one person who worked harder than most people you'd ever imagine.

In February 2001, after being elected to the United States Senate, Senator Hillary Clinton came to Orange County to a meeting we had. She saw everybody wearing the badge that said "Purple Heart Stamp," "Purple Heart Stamp." She grabbed me and she said, "What is this all about?" I told her, and she said to her aide, "Find us a room." We briefed her on where we were at, what was our goal, how were we going to get it.

I'm gonna tell you, at 3 o'clock
that afternoon I had a call from the Postal
Department that said "Did you know that
Senator Clinton, former First Lady, is now a
member of your task force?" I said "Yes, and
I'm very proud."

She did a lot of work. She didn't like her name in the paper about it all the time, but she did it.

But this was something that you were thinking about if you've ever been in combat and you saw somebody killed or wounded. I've experienced that. And you experience it writing to the families to tell them about it.

As of the first of April, we have

1.9 million Americans since the start of

World War II that are recipients of the Purple

Heart for being wounded or killed in combat.

This is [noise from door] -- I'm going to shut that in a minute and make somebody really pissed off.

This is a serious matter. Eleven and a half years it took us to convince the Postal Department to honor men and women of our armed forces who shed blood for this great country of ours. And now, ten days ago, the Postal Department called, and it was like a quarter to 10 at night. And I said to my wife, "That's some joke somebody's playing." She said, "It's Mr. McDonald."

So I picked it up, and he said:
"Lark, I've got good news and bad news for
you. The good news is the vote today was
unanimous for the Purple Heart to be a Forever

Stamp. The bad news is you can't do it until after the fifth of May."

The fifth of May is two days from now. And on an aircraft carrier out in San Diego, they will open up the stamp in honor of Lieutenant Murphy, from Long Island, who just received last year the Congressional Medal of Honor.

So I thank everybody. There's a lot of people, I don't want to miss names, but there was a lot of people here that helped us, both sides of the aisle, because they knew it was the right thing to do. But in a couple of days you'll be able to go downstairs to the post office and get those stamps. There'll also be a special medal for you to wear.

But most important, by the purchase of this stamp or the medal, you will be saying to America and its armed services, dead and alive: Thank you for your commitment to our country.

May God bless America.

is not. Too many people are dying, too many people are being maimed or injured on our roads, nationwide and in our state.

Everyone can speak to an occasion where they know of someone who was either injured or hurt by someone who was texting while driving or talking on a cellphone while driving. These are dangerous things and should not be done.

This law will make it easier for law enforcement to enforce existing law and to save lives. That is the motivation of this bill, that is its primary function, to save lives.

The lives we save with this bill are primarily young people under the age of 20 who are engaging in the activity of texting, which has become a phenomenon of recent years and did not exist, frankly, when we did the cellphone ban. So we're bringing our laws up to meet with technology and hopefully we will, in so doing, save as many lives as possible, to bring the word forward.

We've got a same-as sponsor in the Assembly, Harvey Weisenberg. Assemblyman

Weisenberg is carrying it in the Assembly. He tells me he can pass it over there. We are looking forward to the Governor signing this bill into law and the saving of many, many lives of our constituents and our residents in this great State of New York.

Thank you and God bless, and I thank my colleagues for supporting this legislation.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Marcellino to be recorded in the affirmative.

Senator Fuschillo.

SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Thank you very much, Mr. President.

I want to compliment my colleague

Senator Marcellino for this, and for his

leadership in banning the use of cellphones in

cars. This is just another measure to protect

individuals.

Every single day when we drive on our roads, especially my colleagues here in the Senate, when we drive home, whether any particular part of the state, when we see a car in the left lane all of a sudden going down to 50 miles an hour or 45 miles an hour,

we know that they've picked up a cellphone or they're texting.

The federal government has ruled that texting is almost as dangerous as drunk driving. And what Senator Marcellino is doing here today in making the offense of texting a primary offense is critically important to aid law enforcement to properly punish the violators that are putting individuals' lives at risk.

I compliment my colleague on his leadership on this issue for many years, and I'll be voting in the affirmative.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Fuschillo to be recorded in the affirmative.

Senator Libous. Senator Alesi;
Senator Libous yields.

SENATOR ALESI: Thank you. Thank you, Senator Libous.

We learn by experience. And the experience that people in my community went through a couple of years ago when five beautiful young women were killed in a fiery crash that they speculate was caused by texting, should teach us, teach us as we look

around the country that over and over and over again we see the dangers of texting while driving and how they affect our families and motorists in New York State.

We have an obligation here as members of the Senate to do what we can to protect the public. And this is one of those times when we look back at the seat belt bill that most people were opposed to in the beginning. We realize now how important that legislation was in saving lives.

The bill that Senator Marcellino has taken such a strong leadership position on also includes a component for educating young people. In fact, it requires the DMV, in the application for license, to provide educational materials on the dangers of texting. It requires DMV to even include a question on the final licensing exam.

So that we're not only looking to deter people by giving law enforcement a primary objective when they pull people over, we're looking not only to deter people from texting by giving them a \$150 fine, but we're taking a positive, proactive measure by

educating young people who are now applying 1 2 for licenses to make it clear to them how 3 dangerous this is. This will now be an amendment to 4 5 the Vehicle and Traffic Law, just as the drinking and driving and just as seat belts, 6 7 all of those things that are meant to help 8 people. And I know that people will be 9 10 opposed to this, some of them will. But as I 11 said, we learn by our experience, and our 12 experience tells us that this is vitally necessary to pass this bill. 13 And I applaud Senator Marcellino 14 15 for his leadership. I encourage my colleagues to join in voting yes on this bill. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 17 Senator 18 Marcellino to be recorded in the affirmative. 19 Senator Little to explain her 20 vote -- Senator Little passes. 21 Senator Libous to explain his vote. 22 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 23 Mr. President. I too want to congratulate Senator Marcellino. 24 25 You know, when the original bill

was passed on this floor, I voted against it, the talking on the phone in the car. And I kind of regret that I've done that, because I have seen a number of traffic fatalities because of it. I have seen people, as Senator Fuschillo said, even now, traveling to Albany this week, as I'm moving along doing the speed limit, the car in front of me all of a sudden slows down and veers off to the right, comes back in. As I pass the car, the young lady was talking on her cellphone.

That's just talking on your cellphone. We're talking about texting. This is a good bill. People should not be doing other things while they're driving a car.

They should be paying attention to the road.

They should be paying attention to what they're doing inside of their vehicle. They should not be texting. They should not be holding a phone to their ear -- obviously, it's legal if it's hands-free. They should not be doing those things.

Senator Marcellino, you're on point, as Senator Alesi said. We have lost lives tragically because of those individuals

who feel that it's necessary to send a friend 1 2 a text message while they're driving in a car. 3 I support this bill wholeheartedly 4 and would urge my colleagues to think very 5 seriously and vote yes for this. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Senator Libous to be recorded in the affirmative. 7 8 Senator Kennedy to explain his 9 vote. 10 SENATOR KENNEDY: Thank you, Mr. President. 11 First of all, let me thank Senator 12 Marcellino for his leadership on this 13 14 extremely important issue. 15 I want to also thank Senator Fuschillo, the chair of the Transportation 16 Committee. It was actually on my first day 17 18 here at the Senate, I hadn't yet met Senator Fuschillo, and I approached him about this 19 20 issue. This issue is extraordinarily important for public safety in Western 21 New York and across New York State. 22 23 And Senator Fuschillo said to me, "We're going to pass a bill, and it's going to 24 25 be Senator Marcellino's bill." Because

there's so many different bills that are out there, we as a Senate, Democrat and Republican, need to come to a conclusion on what's the strongest bill that makes the most sense that is going to help to cure the epidemic that has become texting and driving.

And it has become an epidemic, across New York State and across the United States. The statistics are staggering.

Thousands of individuals have lost their lives due to texting and driving and distracted driving across the nation and across this state.

As Senator Alesi has already mentioned in his district, it hit home in his district. It hit home in my district. A young man, 21 years old, his name is A.J.

Larson, lost his life tragically texting and driving -- rolling a stop sign, hit by an oncoming vehicle. His mother, Kelly Cline, has made it her life's work since that moment to create an environment on the state level, on the national level, and unfortunately on a local level because in the past the state has failed to act.

And we cannot fail to act once again today. And it is our opportunity today to embrace this legislation, to embrace public safety, to create an environment that's going to be safer -- for individuals of all ages,

but especially the youth of this state.

If you look at the statistics, the statistics actually double when you change the age level to which you acquire the information. So the amount of injuries and accidents that are caused by texting while driving doubles when you change the age factor from 18 to 60 years old to 18 to 35 years old.

This is technology that has advanced. Today's legislation is catching up with technology, creating a safer environment for all individuals of all ages that are on the road every single day.

I want to thank Kelly Cline for her advocacy on this important issue. Recently she spearheaded a group called Families

Against Texting While Driving. I urge my fellow Senators and I urge the public to join Families Against Texting While Driving to further advance this important issue into the
