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strenuous practice, team play and team spirit, 1 2 nurtured by dedicated coaching and strategic 3 planning; and "WHEREAS, Athletic competition 4 5 enhances the moral and physical development of the young people of this state, preparing them 6 7 for the future by instilling in them the value of teamwork, encouraging a standard of healthy 8 living, imparting a desire for success, and 9 10 developing a sense of fair play and competition; 11 and 12 "WHEREAS, On Saturday, March 19, 2011, the Marauders of New York Mills High School 13 14 captured the New York State Public High School 15 Athletic Association Class D Boys' Basketball Championship by defeating Coleman Catholic of 16 Section IX 47-42 at the Glens Falls Civic Center 17 18 to win their second state championship in school history; and 19 20 "WHEREAS, The New York Mills Marauders advanced to the finals of the New York 21 22 State Basketball Championship with a 59-55 win over Chateaugay of Section X in the state 23 semifinals; and 24 25 "WHEREAS, One of the most successful

basketball programs in Central New York, the 1 2 New York Mills Marauders compiled an outstanding 24-0 record during the 2010-2011 season. 3 4 addition to winning the New York State title, the 5 Marauders won their third consecutive Center State Conference Championship and third 6 7 consecutive Section III Class D championship; and "WHEREAS, Leading into the 8 9 championship game, the Marauders had won 55 of 10 their last 57 games. Their only losses during this amazing streak were to the 2009 and 2010 11 12 state champions; and "WHEREAS, During the season, Senior 13 14 Co-Captain Fred Russ scored his 1,000th point and 15 Coach Adey recorded his 450th career coaching victory. In his 13 seasons as New York Mills' 16 head coach, his record is an outstanding 238-59, 17 18 and over his 30-year coaching career his record is 462-156; and 19 20 "WHEREAS, The athletic talent 21 displayed by this team is due in great part to 22 the efforts of Head Coach Mike Adey and his talented assistant coaches, Brian Adey, Charlie 23 24 Ferguson, Mike Keating and John Stevener, skilled 25 and inspirational mentors respected for their

ability to develop potential into excellence; and 1 2 "WHEREAS, The 2010-2011 New York 3 Mills High School Boys' Basketball Team's overall 4 record is outstanding, and the team members were 5 loyally and enthusiastically supported by family, fans, friends and the community at large; and 6 7 "WHEREAS, The hallmarks of the 8 2010-2011 New York Mills High School Boys' Basketball Team, from the opening game of the 9 10 season to its participation in league play and in 11 the New York State Public High School Athletic 12 Association championship tournaments, were a brotherhood of athletic ability, of good 13 14 sportsmanship, of honor and of scholarship, 15 demonstrating that these team players are second to none; and 16 "WHEREAS, Athletically and 17 18 academically, the team members have proven 19 themselves to be an unbeatable combination of 20 talents reflecting favorably on their school and 21 community; and "WHEREAS, Sports competition 22 instills the values of teamwork, pride and 23 accomplishment, Head Coach Mike Adey, his 24 25 coaching staff, and the 2010-2011 New York Mills

So the lessons they have learned -- the character, the determination, the competitive spirit, the resolve to do good things -- will stay with them throughout their lives.

Coach Adey, Coach Mike Adey, who I've known for a long time. In fact, he had black hair when I first met him, I think. And he is such an extraordinary individual. And you heard some of the things in the resolution today also talk about his history. This is a Hall of Fame coach.

But he is just a remarkable influence on these young men. He is an individual of integrity and character, a great instructor, also an educator. And he has really done so much to mold this team, to bring them together to be a team. And I think a lot of the success is attributed to him.

And as proud as he is of all of you,

I know he's equally as proud of all his coaches,
but particularly one coach who is his son, Brian

Adey, who is also my director of operations, a

fellow Senate employee of all of ours. And he

does a great job each and every day for me, and I

Malcolm X was well-known for his ability to move an audience with a passion and veracity. He would often say "If you don't stand for something, you will fall for anything." He embodied this doctrine, he lived true to this doctrine. It was his progressive and forthright advocacy for civil rights and human rights that unfortunately led to his assassination.

As a society we were taught many lessons from Malcolm X, lessons that will endure long after his words were spoken. One particular message echoes in my mind every time I enter this chamber or I stand ready and willing to defend the rights of my constituents: "Power in defense of freedom is greater than power on behalf of tyranny and oppression, because real power comes from our conviction, which produces action, uncompromising action." And I want to thank all my 2 colleagues for supporting this piece of legislation today. 3 4 I'm joined in the chamber by 5 Assemblyman Dean Murray, who is carrying this legislation over in the State Assembly with 6 7 Assemblyman Al Graf. And it was Assemblyman Murray that came to me and told me about Grace's 8 9 story. 10 Two years ago today, on May 17, 2009, 7-year-old Grace Catherine Peshkur passed 11 12 away from an illness called epidermolysis bullosa, or EB for short. 13 EB is sometimes known as the 14 15 butterfly disease, due to the fragility of the skin. Any abrasion or friction causes the skin 16 to blister and slough off. Sufferers resemble 17 burn victims with bodies wrapped in bandages. 18 19 The disease also affects internal organs and 20 makes sufferers more liable to sepsis and other 21 infections. EB is one of the so-called orphan 22 23 diseases. When Grace was born, there were no standards of care for newborns with this 24 25 illness. Now, due to the awareness that she
