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1 PROCEEDINGS 2 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: The 3 Senate will come to order. 4 And I ask everyone present to 5 please rise and repeat with me the Pledge of Allegiance. 6 7 (Whereupon, the assemblage 8 recited the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.) 9 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: In 10 the absence of clergy, may we please bow our heads in a moment of silence. 11 12 (Whereupon, the assemblage respected a moment of silence.) 13 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: 14 The reading of the Journal. 15 16 THE SECRETARY: In Senate, Monday, March 5th, the Senate met pursuant to 17 18 adjournment. The Journal of Sunday, March 4th, was read and approved. On motion, 19 20 Senate adjourned. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: 22 Without objection, the Journal stands approved 23 as read. Presentation of petitions. 24 25 Messages from the Assembly.

1 The Secretary will read. 2 THE SECRETARY: On page 12, 3 Senator McDonald moves to discharge, from the 4 Committee on Local Government, Assembly Bill 5 Number 4326 and substitute it for the identical Senate Bill Number 2460, Third 6 7 Reading Calendar 210. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: The 9 substitution is ordered. Messages from the Governor. 10 Reports of standing committees. 11 The Secretary will read. 12 13 THE SECRETARY: Senator DeFrancisco, from the Committee on Finance, 14 15 reports the following nominations. 16 As Medicaid Inspector General, James C. Cox, of East Greenbush. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Senator DeFrancisco. 19 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: 20 Thank you, 21 Mr. President. 22 I proudly rise to move the nomination of James C. Cox, of East Greenbush, 23 as the Medicaid Inspector General. 24 25 You know, I've said this, it's

almost like a broken record maybe I'll tape it
before the next nomination day that the
Governor has continuously provided us with
topnotch people who know government, want to
serve in government, have the experience that is
needed to perform the position to which the
Governor has nominated the nominee and, in this
case, has already been on the job demonstrating
that he will be a phenomenal appointment.
One of the main issues last year
well, two main issues on this particular
nominee is that we all in this body want to
make sure that we very strongly go after Medicaid
fraud. Because the Medicaid dollar is limited,
and we've got to make sure those who truly need
that help get that help and it's not taken away
by people fraudulent milking the system.
Well, this nominee, James Cox, has
the experience with the federal government in
doing just that. He's already charged ahead in
that regard.
The second issue has been to make
sure that those who are investigated have due
process rights and are treated fairly during the

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1 We passed a bill here last year, 2 the Governor vetoed it and promised that he would get together with his Medicaid Inspector General, 3 4 with the providers, to make sure that there is a 5 good, solid due process behind the investigations. And that has already begun. 6 And 7 we questioned Mr. Cox about that in our Finance 8 meeting. 9 So the Governor has done what he 10 said he was going to do. He's appointed someone, 11 again, who is an outstanding candidate, and I am proud to move his nomination. 12 Thank you, Mr. President. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: 14 Thank 15 you, Senator DeFrancisco. 16 Senator Hannon. SENATOR HANNON: 17 Thank you, 18 Mr. President. I rise to back the advancement of Mr. Cox to be nominated to be the Medicaid 19 20 Inspector General. 21 As an original sponsor of the 22 office of the Medicaid Inspector General, and as someone who has dealt with both the positive and 23 negative aspects of the office over the past few 24 25 years, I've been delighted to, after meeting

several times with Mr. Cox, to find out that he 1 has vast experience in the field of oversight of 2 people providing health services. 3 He served in the Office of 4 5 Inspector General and was the Regional Inspector General for the U.S. Department of Health and 6 7 Human Services. In fact, at one point during his career he was teaching other auditors for the 8 nation in regard to this. 9 10 That being said, when he came before the Health Committee he talked about a 11 balance, a balance of making sure that we are 12 scrupulous about going after Medicaid fraud in 13 this state and, as Senator DeFrancisco said, 14 15 about being fair in regard to what is happening during the course of going after people who are 16 suspected of Medicaid fraud. 17 18 And of course the Office of Inspector General doesn't do the fraud 19 20 prosecution because the statute clearly says that 21 should be referred to the Medicaid Fraud Unit of 22 the Attorney General. 23 That being said, he is extraordinarily well qualified. He has a large 24 25 challenge ahead because the budget this year

1 proposes pretty much the same type of target recoveries as it did last year, which means that 2 there will be a little bit of angst in the course 3 4 of him doing a good job. And with that, I would like to 5 commend him to this body. Thank you. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Thank 8 you very much, Senator Hannon. 9 Anyone else wishing to be heard? 10 Seeing no one, the question is on the nomination of James C. Cox as Medicaid 11 Inspector General. All in favor signify by 12 saying aye. 13 (Response of "Aye.") 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: 16 Opposed, nay. 17 (No response.) 18 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: The ayes have it. James C. Cox is hereby confirmed 19 20 as Medicaid Inspector General. 21 Mr. Cox, congratulations. 22 (Applause.) 23 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Mr. Cox is joined here this afternoon by his wife, Dawn, 24 25 and his daughter Ashley.

1 Thank you very much for joining 2 Congratulations, Godspeed to all of you, and us. we're looking forward to great things from you as 3 well. Thank you, Mr. Cox. 4 5 The Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: As member of the 6 7 Battery Park City Authority, Martha J. Gallo, of 8 New York. 9 And as members of the New York State Council on the Arts, Amy Cappellazzo, of 10 11 New York City, and Robert Colacello, of 12 East Hampton. ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: 13 Senator DeFrancisco. 14 15 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: I move the 16 nominations. ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Thank 17 18 you. 19 Senator Squadron. 20 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you, 21 Mr. President. 22 I rise in support of Martha Gallo as an appointment to the Battery Park City 23 Authority. 24 25 Down in Battery Park City, which is

1	a state authority that oversees one of the great
2	thriving neighborhoods in our state, on the
3	southern tip of Manhattan, a neighborhood that
4	has been built literally from the river over the
5	last 40 years and has rebuilt itself in a way no
6	one thought imaginable 10 years ago after
7	September 11, 2001 it's a neighborhood that I
8	am proud to represent and a neighborhood in
9	which, though it is controlled by a state
10	authority, there has been a push for many years
11	to increase the local representation on the board
12	of the Battery Park City Authority.
13	Martha Gallo has been involved in
14	the civic affairs of Batter Park City. She has
15	been a community leader. She also has experience
16	in finance and municipal finance, which are
17	important qualities on the board of the Battery
18	Park City Authority. And her appointment by the
19	Governor is one that I want to really hail and
20	
20	thank the Governor for.
21	thank the Governor for. Along with Speaker Silver, who also

21 22	Along with Speaker Silver, who also represents Battery Park City, we have been

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1 Now, I'd like to see more. Just 2 one local activist on the Battery Park City Authority Board when you have this existing 3 vibrant neighborhood isn't sufficient, but it is 4 5 an important step in the right direction. Martha will be great. The Governor 6 7 deserves a great deal of credit for this 8 appointment, and I thank him. And in the 9 community we look forward to having her on the 10 board. Thank you, Mr. President. 11 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: 12 Thank you, Senator Squadron. 13 The question is on the nominations 14 15 of Martha J. Gallo as a member of the Battery 16 Park City Authority; Amy Cappellazzo, as a member of the New York State Council on the Arts; and 17 18 Robert Colacello, as a member of the New York 19 State Council on the Arts. All in favor please 20 signify by saying aye. 21 (Response of "Aye.") 22 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: 23 Opposed, nay. 24 (No response.) 25 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: The

1 ayes have it. The nominations are confirmed. 2 Congratulations to Martha Gallo, 3 Amy Cappellazzo, and Robert Colacello. 4 Reports of select committees. 5 Communications and reports from state officers. 6 7 Motions and resolutions. 8 Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, we 9 10 have an announcement, I believe, by Senator Farley at this time. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Senator 13 Farley. 14 SENATOR FARLEY: Thank you very 15 much, Mr. President. 16 This is quite a thrill for me to say that we have the people from WGNA and 17 18 Blue Friday, an operation that recognizes law enforcement officers that have been killed in 19 20 the line of duty, and their families, and also law enforcement officers that serve today. 21 Now, on Friday, March 9th -- that's 22 this Friday -- from 5:30 a.m. to 10:30, WGNA, 23 DeNooyer Chevrolet, and Blue Friday of New York 24 25 will be taking donations for a blue carnation for

1 Blue Friday and selling t-shirts at DeNooyer Chevrolet and Pizzeria Uno in Wilton. Over 25 2 agencies will be represented at the two 3 4 franchises, and all proceeds will go directly to 5 Blue Friday. It's a wonderful way to show 6 7 support for this wonderful organization, Blue Friday New York, which serves the families 8 of our dedicated police officers who were 9 10 tragically killed in the line of duty. And today we have in the gallery 11 12 some very important people: The operations manager of my favorite station, Tom Jacobsen, and 13 the WGNA morning hosts, the nationally recognized 14 15 Richie Phillips and Sean McMaster -- both are my buddies, incidentally. 16 And we also have with us 17 18 Blue Friday New York President Patrick Fox, a retired Albany police officer, and Vice President 19 20 Lou Somma, retired from the Saratoga County Sheriff's Department, and Director Tom McGraw, a 21 detective with the Albany Police Department. 22 And we're delighted to have them in 23 the gallery and to celebrate Blue Friday, which 24 25 is this Friday. And I ask, Mr. President, if you

would recognize them in the gallery up here. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Gentlemen, congratulations. Thank you very much 3 for being here. 4 5 (Applause.) ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: 6 We 7 extend to you the courtesies of the house. Thank 8 you. 9 Senator Libous. 10 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, could you call on Senator Young for the purposes 11 of an announcement. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: 13 Senator 14 Young. 15 SENATOR YOUNG: Thank you, 16 Mr. President. It's been an incredibly busy day 17 18 here at the Capitol. There's so many groups here from across the state who are visiting us to put 19 20 forward their very important issues. 21 But I do want to draw attention to two groups in particular, because they are 22 23 celebrating 35 years of success. And those two group are the Rural Preservation Program and the 24 25 Neighborhood Preservation Program, and they are

1 celebrating their anniversary. They provide, as 2 we know, critical services in our communities across the state. 3 4 So we're very, very happy to have 5 them with us today. And I wanted to let all of my colleagues know that we will be passing a 6 7 resolution in honor of their 35th anniversary, and I would invite all of my colleagues who want 8 9 to join in to join in on the resolution so that 10 we all can show our support from the New York State Senate. 11 12 Thank you, Mr. President. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Thank 14 you, Senator Young. 15 Senator Libous. 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, at this time Senator Perkins should be called on for 17 18 the purposes of an announcement. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Thank 20 you. 21 Senator Perkins. 22 SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 23 I just wanted to take a brief 24 25 moment to acknowledge some guests that we have

amongst us today. They call themselves DREAMers, 1 and they are here, 250 strong, to get the 2 opportunity to speak to our colleagues not only 3 4 on the Senate side but also in the Assembly. 5 They're young people who have these great aspirations to live up to the American 6 7 dream of a quality education and to advocate that the DREAM Act, that I'm sponsoring here and that 8 9 Guillermo Linares is sponsoring in the Assembly, 10 be passed and that they be given the opportunity 11 to get a quality university education. 12 They are, again, 250 strong, of approximately 5,000 that are part of our great 13 state. And I just wanted to acknowledge them and 14 15 praise them for their vision and for their diligence in fighting an uphill battle with a 16 faith that can only result in victory on their 17 18 behalf. 19 So thank you very much for the 20 opportunity to recognize them for being with us today, and we look forward to fulfilling their 21 22 dreams as we pursue the voting and recommending this legislation to the Governor for his 23 signature. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Thank

1 you, Senator Perkins. 2 And thank you all for coming today. It really is great to see you here, and 3 4 congratulations. Senator Perkins, thank you for 5 that statement. some risk for the process of bringing bonds to 1 2 the market. And that at least I have been advised that there are some ways for New York 3 State to deal with this issue rather than 4 5 dropping the requirement as we currently have it under law. 6 7 So while I would be certainly open 8 to changing my vote if in fact negotiations took 9 place that made some changes in the bill, at this 10 point in time I am voting no. 11 Thank you very much. ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: 12 Senator Krueger will be recorded in the negative. 13 Thank 14 you, Senator Krueger. 15 Announce the results. 16 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 56. Nays, 1. 1 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Senator 2 Larkin to explain his vote. 3 SENATOR LARKIN: Thank you, Mr. President. 4 5 Once again I rise to ask my colleagues on the other side and on this side, if 6 7 you know anybody on the other side that's concerned about honesty, decency, respect for 8 others -- we've passed this bill for General 9 10 Petraeus the last four years. The President of the United States 11 12 thought greatly of this gentleman to ask him to do the surge in Iraq and Afghanistan. 13 He just asked him to be the CIA director. 14 It would seem 15 to me if the President of the United States thinks he's a distinguished and competent 16 individual, we in the State of New York -- we, 17 18 the Senate, unanimously have passed this to designate this highway. Our villages, our towns, 19 20 and our county have all asked for it. And it gets blocked again in the 21 New York State Assembly. Rationale, I don't 22 know. The chairman of the committee won't return 23 my calls. His staff's answer is he's too busy. 24 25 General Petraeus has been busy for

37 years serving our country, and now he's got 1 one of the highest jobs in the cabinet of 2 President Obama. Designating this road for 3 4 General Petraeus, an area which he just didn't 5 invent -- he was born there, went to grammar school there, went to high school. And at the 6 7 end of this road is where he went to the United States Military Academy, becoming a distinguished 8 9 graduate. 10 Thirty-seven years of service to his country, four-star general, one of the most 11 decorated officers we've ever had in our 12 country. Lauded by foreign governments from A to 13 Z. And all we're asking for is a little 14 15 cooperation from the other house to name this road in honor of a distinguished American. 16 I thank you in this chamber for the 17 18 support you have given to this bill for the past four years, and I ask that it once again be a 19 20 unanimous vote. And would you mind, please, calling somebody you know in the other house and 21 saying, "Wake up. If he's good enough for the 22 president, he ought to be good enough for us." 23 24 Thank you. 25 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Thank

1 you, Senator Larkin. 2 Announce the results. 3 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 58. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: The 5 bill is passed. And for whatever 21 22 reason, someone in the Assembly doesn't like Ronald Reagan, and I'm very dismayed by that. 23 But this is changing the Ronald 24 25 Reagan Highway in Tioga County, which I

represent. My Assembly colleague who represents 1 2 the area can't get the bill out of committee. It's pretty pathetic. Actually, it's very 3 4 pathetic. 5 This is something in our district. I think if the Legislature -- and certainly I б 7 would think that everybody in this house would agree with me, if there's something as simple as 8 9 this that the people want and it can't get out of 10 the committee in the Assembly, it's pathetic. ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Thank 11 12 you, Senator Libous. 13 Announce the results. ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Call 6 7 the roll. 8 (The Secretary called the roll.) 9 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 58. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: The bill is passed. 11 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 12 258, by Senator Gallivan, Senate Print 5493A, an 13 act to amend the Social Services Law. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Read the last section. 16 17 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 18 act shall take effect immediately. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Call 20 the roll. 21 (The Secretary called the roll.) THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 56. Nays, 22 23 2. Senators Duane and Krueger recorded in the negative. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: The

1 bill is passed.

2 Senator Libous, that completes the reading of the noncontroversial calendar. 3 4 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, is 5 there any further business at this time at the desk? 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: No, 8 there is none. 9 SENATOR LIBOUS: If there's no 10 further business at the desk, I would ask that you call on Senator Breslin at this time. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Senator Breslin. 13 14 SENATOR BRESLIN: Thank you, 15 Mr. President. 16 This is a very important day in the State Senate. We've passed legislation in this 17 18 house for the General Petraeus Highway, passed legislation for the Ronald Reagan Highway. And 19 20 it also happens to be, thirdly, the birthday of Senator Kevin Parker. 21 22 (Laughter.) SENATOR BRESLIN: So I would like 23 to applaud his birthday on this day. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Senator

Parker, happy birthday. Many more. (Applause.) ACTING PRESIDENT MARTINS: Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President.
