I'm sure it's a fine institution. I actually 1 expect to be voting aye on this great bill. 2 And I understand certainly that 3 4 this is a very important thing for the church, 5 and the tax-exempt status and those things are important not just for the church but also for 6 7 the congregation. 8 Churches are really important institutions in almost every district -- I'm sure 9 10 actually in literally every district in our state. The history of the church is critical. 11 12 Right? We actually know that the church actually begins, from the Christian perspective, from the 13 disciples. And with the disciples you had 14 15 Peter. Right? Peter, whose name literally means "the rock." And which Christ established his 16 church on, right? And it's Peter who actually 17 18 becomes one of the first disciples to go out and establish churches. 19 20 Similarly, although not called the church, in the Jewish tradition you have 21 synagogues, which are actually Greek-created, 22 after schools. 23 Now, and so there's a -- you know, 24

in almost every tradition that we find in our

25

community, these notions of worship, of education, of community and finding a way to build community is critical.

I stand with Senator Carlucci in trying to help this institution in the way we ought to be finding ways to help all of these institutions in every single community in our districts. I'd like to find ways in our budget that we can help churches, particularly because they not only have a function that is a spiritual function, but there's also a social function, there's an economic development function, right, many of them involved in health fairs and getting out information around health fairs. And so these institutions are really critical for us to help.

So let's talk about the social function of churches. Churches are places where people gather in good times and they gather in bad times. Sometimes, when they're all alone, many people have no other place to go but church.

I remember my grandmother, Fannie Gallaway Olds, who was gone way before her time -- and in fact, she died on March 1, 1984.

the Secretary of the Senate -- sorry, not 1 Secretary of the Senate. Sorry, the Secretary of 2 3 State. You have to apply for an application to 4 do business. Right? And then so you have to 5 apply for a certificate of incorporation through the Secretary of the Senate {sic}. 6 7 Once you get the certificate of 8 incorporation, sometimes you might need a lawyer to get the exemption, because it's not a lot of 9 10 paperwork but it frankly is a little bit more technical than it probably needs to be. 11 12 Actually, we should recommend that the SAGE Commission do a look at the documents and our 13 14 paperwork usage in the state in order to deal 15 with that, particularly as it relates to that, because we want people who are doing good work, 16 like churches, to get their exemptions. 17 18 And so first you have to apply for the certificate of incorporation. Once you get 19 20 the certificate of incorporation, you then have to fill out the certificate of incorporation and 21 kind of line by line. It's standard: 22 address, you know, the address that -- the 23 mailing address. You know, you need to have a 24

tax ID number. And kind of go through that whole

25

1 process.

Once you receive the certificate of incorporation back, you then have to apply to the federal government to get a 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) or something that is a tax-exempt status -- I'm told a 501(c)(6) for churches or religious organizations. Not just churches, but religious organizations. So even if you're doing a synagogue, right, which is not a church, it's a synagogue, you still have to have an exemption. Right?

If you're Muslim, right -- because some of you may know I represent the largest Pakistani community outside of Pakistan in the world, many of which are Muslims. And they have mosques. Right? And then the mosques, same thing, you have to apply for a 501(c)(6).

And so even if you have a mosque or a synagogue or a church, the first thing you have to do is go to the Secretary of State, get a certificate of incorporation. Then you have to apply to the federal government to get tax-exempt status, which is again, typically, for a religious institution, a 501(c)(6). You have to fill that out.

But it's not just filling out the 1 2 paperwork. You have to have a listing of your board members, you have to have, you know, 3 minutes from the board meetings, you have to show 5 your budget. Right? You have to establish that you are actually a real organization. 6 7 And so, again, you know, I'm sure 8 the St. James Mar Thoma Church of Rockland, Inc., has done all of those things. Right? And 9 10 apparently haven't done them in a fashion timely with the county, because the county was billing 11 12 their property taxes. Right? I mean -- and so, you know, they 13 14 have to go through these process after process 15 after process getting these exemptions so that they won't be charged taxes so that the money 16 that they're collecting can actually be used for 17 18 the good of the church and thus the good of the community. Right? 19 20 And so it's important that bills such as this one have an opportunity to come to 21 22 the floor of the Senate and that we vote on them in order to help these communities. 23 In the particular case of property 24 25 taxes, there's an interesting history,

I appreciate it. 11 Yes, I was really trying to connect this notion of the fact that taxes were 12 important. And although we were asking for a tax 13 exemption for this particular church -- that is 14 15 well-deserved, because churches do such great work in our communities and we certainly want to 16 support them. We particularly want to support 17 18 the St. James Mar Thoma Church in Rockland 19 County. 20 But we also want to make sure that 21 we pay our taxes. As we come quickly upon April 15th, you know, taxes are important. 22 exemptions are important, but taxes are important 23 as well. Right? And we want people to, you 24 25 know, pay their taxes. But we don't want this

church to have to have a burden that takes away 1 from serving the community that it serves. 2 3 Right? 4 And I'm not, you know, totally 5 familiar with that community. But I'm sure if it's very much like the working-class communities 6 7 that we find throughout New York State that those folks are dealing with a lot of issues, you know, 8 in the middle of this recession. 9 10 So finding a tax exemption for St. James Mar Thoma church of Rockland, Inc., is 11 critical because that tax exemption frees the 12 church up to have, you know, food, you know, in 13 14 it -- like sometimes many churches have, you 15 know, food banks. Right? And that's critical, again, when there's a recession. People don't 16 have jobs, you know, they're not going to work, 17 18 right, they don't have healthcare. And the church is filling the gap for each one of those 19 20 issues. Right? The church is doing the things that, frankly, government ought to be doing. 21 22 So that's why we're giving this tax exemption to this church today, because it's 23 critical that these tax exemptions are available 24 25 for each one of the churches that need them so

that they can do all of the things that need to be done in our communities.

And I want to really see -- I really want to see more of us make sure that our churches are being taken care of. Right? And I'm hoping that by supporting Senator Carlucci's bill today that we will find other churches that are in need and that we will make the churches partners in the kinds of things that we're doing.

And by helping them with their tax exemptions, that's a way that we can make sure that resources in that community are being used, you know, for that community, that we make sure that, you know, the tax exemptions are going towards, you know, doing some of the really marvelous work that I see churches doing.

You know, for instance, the money from a tax exemption can go towards the health ministry. The health ministry may use the tax-exemption money to do HIV and AIDS ministry in which they're reaching out to people in the community with that tax-exemption money, right, using that, right, to, you know, do needle exchanges, maybe hand out condoms, maybe talk

about abstinence, maybe counsel people who have

    HIV or AIDS. Right? A really serious pandemic
    that we have really stopped talking about to a

    large degree in this community.

Because I've had opportunities to work with New Hope Christian Fellowship in Brooklyn, and I have not unfortunately had a chance yet to work with the St. James Mar Thoma Church of Rockland County. But the day is early, and hopefully I will get that opportunity.

But I'm sure that, like the churches in Brooklyn, the churches in Rockland are doing great work not just in the pulpit but doing things around housing and health. Right? I'm sure many have a credit union. Right? You know, I know many of the churches in Brooklyn, we have credit unions in them. Right? Because banking is hard to get sometimes in our

communities.

about.

And so this exemption that we're giving today by voting on this bill, this exemption frees up money in the coffers of the St. James Mar Thoma Church of Rockland in order to have enough resources to do the great things that need to be done in our communities. Right?

And some of these great things, you know -- Senator Carlucci, you know, I didn't ask when I had him on the witness stand, I didn't ask him questions about this. But I'm sure that they do a number of great things with their tax exemption specifically. Right? And I know a church like this, you know, probably works in a lot of areas. And the use of their tax exemption is one of the things that we ought to be talking

In fact, I want to suggest to

Senator Skelos and Senator Libous that we do a

public hearing on tax exemptions for churches so

that we can hear all of the great work and get on

the Senate public record the issue of tax

exemptions and what we're using those tax

exemptions for.

Because we're giving out literally

hundreds of millions of dollars in tax exemptions each year in this state to churches and mosques and synagogues and temples; we ought to know what that work is being done for. It may also help us build a relationship with our churches so that when, in fact, an exemption does come up, we understand why we are voting for that exemption.

Because the exemption for the

St. James Mar Thoma Church of Rockland, Inc.,

right, is going to be an exemption that is used,

you know, in great ways, I'm sure, for that

constituency, right, and for that congregation.

Right?

I was hoping to be able to get a number of the congregation, know, you know, when the church was established, know a little bit about the church. But hopefully when we have the public hearing that I'm calling for, that the head pastor or the priest at the St. James Mar Thoma Church of Rockland, Inc., will be present, will talk about the church, will give us more information on this great thing that we voted on today so that we have a more informed dialogue as it relates to the issues of, you know, tax exemptions for churches.
