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1 PROCEEDINGS 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: The Senate will come to order. 3 4 I ask everyone present to please 5 rise and repeat with me the Pledge of Allegiance. 6 7 (Whereupon, the assemblage 8 recited the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.) ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 9 Today 10 we're going to have two clergy. First we're going to start with Rabbi Steven Graber, of 11 Temple Hillel in North Woodmere. 12 13 Rabbi? RABBI GRABER: Ladies and 14 15 gentlemen of the Senate, know that it is a 16 great honor for me to be here today to pray with you and for you as you work for the 17 18 betterment of this state and its citizens. 19 And thus I pray {in Hebrew}. 20 Sovereign of the universe, we thank You for 21 the blessings which You have bestowed upon 22 Thank You for giving us life and us. 23 sustaining us. As citizens of the United States, 24 25 we live in the greatest democracy history has

On motion, Senate adjourned. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Without objection, the Journal stands approved as read. 6 7 Presentation of petitions. 8 Messages from the Assembly. 9 Messages from the Governor. 10 Reports of standing committees. Reports of select committees. 11 12 Communications and reports from state officers. 13 Motions and resolutions. 14 15 Senator Libous. 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President. 17 18 On behalf of Senator Gallivan, on page 12 I offer the following amendments to 19 Calendar Number 259, Print Number 5868, and ask 20 that said bill retain its place on the Third 21 22 Reading Calendar. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: The amendments are received, and the bill will retain 24 25 its place on the Third Reading Calendar.

1 Senator Libous. 2 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 3 Mr. President. I have one more, on behalf of 4 5 Senator Griffo. I move that the following bill be discharged from its respective committee and б 7 be recommitted with instructions to strike the enacting clause: Senate Print 5686. 8 9 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: So 10 ordered. Senator Libous. 11 12 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, at this time may we adopt the Resolution Calendar, 13 with the exception of Resolution Numbers 3559, 14 15 3570, and 3593. 16 SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President. 17 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Senator 18 Squadron, why do you rise? 19 SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President, 20 before we adopt the Resolution Calendar, I'd like 21 to be heard on Senate Legislative Resolution 22 3582, which is on the calendar and is being 23 offered by Senator Skelos, recognizing and celebrating the week of March 11th through 17th 24 25 as Sunshine Week.

Thank you, Mr. President. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Senator Squadron, we're going to adopt it as a group. Do 3 you want to take that off and have it debated 4 5 separately? SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President, 6 7 I'm happy to discuss it and debate it ahead of 8 the Resolution Calendar, which I believe is in 9 order. 10 If we'd like to pull it and discuss it separately, I'm happy to work with the 11 12 Majority on that solution as well. 13 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 14 Yes. 15 Senator Libous. 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, I'm glad you gave Senator Squadron a chance to 17 18 speak. 19 Although I did have the floor, 20 Senator, and didn't relinquish it, but it was 21 good to hear from you. We have no problem if you want 22 23 to -- I'll add that resolution to the ones -- we haven't adopted the calendar yet, so we'll add 24 25 that resolution number. If the desk could repeat

the resolution number. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: It was 3 Resolution Number 3582. 4 SENATOR LIBOUS: So if we may, 5 Senator Squadron, at this time I'd like to move the adoption of the Resolution Calendar, with the б 7 exception of Resolutions 3582, 3559, 3570, and 8 3593. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: All in 10 favor of adopting the Resolution Calendar with the exception of those four resolutions -- 3559, 11 12 3570, 3582, and 3593 -- signify by saying aye. (Response of "Aye.") 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 14 15 Opposed, nay. 16 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 17 The 18 Resolution Calendar is adopted. Senator Libous. 19 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 20 21 Mr. President. 22 At this time Senator Seward, I believe, has Resolution Number 3593 at the desk. 23 We would like to have it read in its entirety, 24 25 and then Senator Seward would like to be called

on and then we move for its immediate adoption. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: The Secretary will read. 3 4 THE SECRETARY: Legislative 5 Resolution Number 3593, by Senator Seward, memorializing Governor M. Andrew Cuomo to 6 7 proclaim March 12-17, 2012, as Flood Safety 8 Awareness Week in the State of New York. 9 "WHEREAS, It is the sense of this 10 Legislative Body to memorialize Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to proclaim March 12-17, 2012, as Flood 11 12 Safety Awareness Week in the State of New York, in conjunction with National Flood Safety 13 14 Awareness Week; and 15 "WHEREAS, The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration has named March 12-17, 16 2012, as National Flood Safety Awareness Week; 17 18 and 19 "WHEREAS, Floods can happen anytime, anywhere, and without warning; and 20 21 "WHEREAS, Flooding creates 22 emergencies of great concern to New York State, 23 with imminent threat to life and property, and causes hundreds of millions of dollars in damage 24 25 to homes, businesses, and local government

infrastructure; and 1 2 "WHEREAS, A large number of communities across New York State suffered major 3 4 flooding in 2011 as a result of Hurricane Irene 5 and Tropical Storm Lee, causing millions of dollars in damages and leading to the loss of 6 7 homes, properties, public infrastructure, businesses, and income; and 8 9 "WHEREAS, Individuals and families 10 are still, to this day, struggling to recover after having lost everything in the floods; and 11 12 "WHEREAS, Damage from a flood is not normally covered under a standard homeowner's 13 policy, and residents need to review their 14 15 homeowner's policies and consider their risks for flooding and the need for flood insurance; and 16 "WHEREAS, This Legislative Body 17 18 concurs that a public that is well-informed of 19 the dangers associated with flooding can improve 20 its preparedness and reduce the occurrence of death, injury, and property damage as a result of 21 severe flooding; now, therefore, be it 22 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 23 Body pause in its deliberations to memorialize 24 25 Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to proclaim March 12-17,

1 2012, as Flood Safety Awareness Week in the State of New York; and be it further 2 3 "RESOLVED, That a copy of this 4 resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted to 5 The Honorable Andrew M. Cuomo, Governor of the State of New York." 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Senator 8 Seward. 9 SENATOR SEWARD: Thank you, 10 Mr. President. We all became very painfully aware 11 on August 28th of 2011, and then a few days later 12 in early September of 2011, when both Hurricane 13 14 Irene and then Tropical Storm Lee came through 15 New York State. And in its wake in both of those 16 storms, we saw millions and millions of dollars 17 18 of damages to so many communities in my Senate district, in yours, Mr. President, 19 20 Senator Libous's, and several other members throughout the state. Millions and millions of 21 22 dollars of damages in property, and in some cases, tragically, a few New Yorkers were lost in 23 terms of their lives that day. 24 25 And many of our communities, so

1 many of them are still recovering from those tragic floods of last year. As impressed as we 2 are with the resiliency of the people of those 3 4 communities, they still have a long way to go 5 because of the severe damage. Now, March 12th through the 17th, 6 7 this week, is National Flood Awareness Week, and 8 it is a week set aside to help individuals, homeowners, business owners, and communities 9 10 focus on better preparing themselves for floods and the potential damage that can occur from 11 12 flooding. 13 And one thing that homeowners and 14 property owners can do is to review their 15 insurance coverage as it relates to floods. Regular homeowner's insurance policies do not 16 cover flood damage, and a property owner must get 17 18 separate coverage through the National Flood Insurance Program in order to receive that 19 20 coverage. And in conjunction with this 21 22 National Flood Safety Awareness Week, Mr. President, Senator Bonacic and I jointly 23 sponsored a public roundtable yesterday to 24 25 discuss some of the issues surrounding the flood

1 insurance and to come up with suggestions to improve the National Flood Insurance Program 2 claims process, which is in great need of 3 4 improvement. 5 And we had a very good discussion, we had a number of stakeholders at the table. We 6 7 identified a number of improvements that can be made to the systems that will ensure that 8 homeowners have adequate flood coverage and that 9 10 that insurance coverage and their claims will be paid when they are needed. And we're going to 11 work with our federal colleagues to see that some 12 of those changes are made. 13 Now, we at the state level, we can 14 15 start by reviewing the notice that's included in the standard homeowner's insurance policy 16 informing individuals that flooding is not 17 18 covered. Is the notice clear enough, can it be reworded in a way that will make it easier for 19 20 people to understand that they need to get a separate flood insurance policy through the 21 National Flood Insurance Program in order to 22 receive that coverage? 23 And so I would urge, through this 24 25 resolution, the Governor to join the federal

1 government and also proclaim March 12 through the 17th, this week, as Flood Safety Awareness Week 2 in the State of New York, so that we can better 3 4 raise awareness among our citizenry that flooding 5 can cause severe damage and we must do more to be better prepared. 6 7 Thank you, Mr. President. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Any other Senator wish to speak on the resolution? 9 10 Seeing none, the question is on the resolution. All in favor signify by saying aye. 11 12 (Response of "Aye.") 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 14 Opposed, nay. 15 (No response.) 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: The resolution is adopted. 17 18 Senator Seward has indicated that this is open for sponsorship. 19 20 Senator Libous. 21 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 22 Mr. President. I believe there's a resolution, 23 Number 3570, at the desk by Senator Diaz. Could 24 25 you please have it read in its entirety and call

on Senator Diaz. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Thank 3 you, Senator Libous. 4 We're going to put everyone on 5 Senator Seward's resolution. Those that don't want to be on, please come to the front desk and 6 7 let them know. Thank you. 8 The Secretary will read. 9 THE SECRETARY: Legislative Resolution Number 3570, by Senator Diaz, 10 memorializing Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to declare 11 March 11, 2012, to April 12, 2012, as 12 Garifuna-American Heritage Month in the State of 13 14 New York. "WHEREAS, It is the sense of this 15 Legislative Body to recognize and pay just 16 tribute to the cultural heritage of the ethnic 17 18 groups which comprise and contribute to the richness and diversity of the community of the 19 20 State of New York; and 21 "WHEREAS, Attendant to such 22 concern, and in keeping with its time-honored 23 traditions, it is the intent of this Legislative Body to applaud and commemorate events which 24 25 foster ethnic pride and exemplify the cultural

1 diversity that represents and strengthens the spirit of the people and the State of New York; 2 3 and 4 "WHEREAS, This Legislative Body is 5 justly proud to memorialize Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to declare March 11, 2012, to April 12, 6 7 2012, as Garifuna-American Heritage Month in the 8 State of New York; and 9 "WHEREAS, Garifuna-American 10 Heritage Month celebrates the great contributions of Garifuna-Americans to the fabric of New York 11 City, and pays tribute to the common culture and 12 bonds of friendship that united the United States 13 and the Garifuna countries; and 14 15 "WHEREAS, Garifuna-American Heritage Month affirms the culture, identity and 16 self-esteem of a people. It celebrates a rich 17 18 heritage and illuminates Garifuna history and tradition, as well as the spirit of an 19 20 indomitable people; and "WHEREAS, In 1665, two Spanish 21 22 ships wrecked off the coast of St. Vincent; and "WHEREAS, The West African slaves 23 that escaped to the island eventually 24 25 intermarried with the Venezuelan Caribs and the

1 Arawaks; and 2 "WHEREAS, The new race of people, known as the Garifuna, grew strong and prosperous 3 on the island; and 4 "WHEREAS, In 1795, the Garifuna 5 began the Second Carib War against the British. 6 7 Battles raged throughout St. Vincent over the 8 next year, with both sides enduring heavy losses; 9 and 10 "WHEREAS, On June 10, 1796, the final battle commenced with the Garifuna and 11 12 British, resulting in the Garifuna's surrender; 13 and "WHEREAS, The surviving Caribs were 14 15 exiled to the neighboring island of Balliceaux; 16 and 17 "WHEREAS, On March 11, 1797, the 18 defeated Garifuna were loaded onto a convoy of eight vessels and transported to Roatan, 19 20 Honduras, which arrived on April 12th of that 21 year; and 22 "WHEREAS, The Garifuna began to 23 migrate to the United States during the 1930s. Today, New York City is home to the largest 24 25 Garifuna community outside of Central America;

1 and 2 "WHEREAS, The nurturing and promotion of Garifuna pride is at the center of 3 4 the Garifuna coalition's community organizing 5 initiative, to create awareness and appreciation of the Garifuna culture and its contribution to 6 7 the culture and society of New York; and 8 "WHEREAS, On May 18, 2001, the 9 United Nations Educational, Scientific and 10 Cultural Organization (UNESCO) proclaimed the Garifuna language, dance and music as a 11 12 'masterpiece of the oral and intangible heritage of humanity"; and 13 "WHEREAS, Garifuna-American 14 15 Heritage Month provides an opportunity to recognize the significance of their contributions 16 to the quality and character of life, and, 17 18 through many events and activities throughout the 19 month, for all people to gain a greater 20 appreciation of Garifuna history and traditions, and of the role Garifuna-Americans have played 21 22 and will continue to play in our society; and "WHEREAS, On September 17, 1821, 23 nearly a decade before slavery was completely 24 25 phased out in New York City, William Henry

1 Brown's African Theater presented its first performance in Greenwich Village. Mr. Brown was 2 the first American playwright of African descent 3 4 and wrote 'The Drama of King Shotaway,' 5 recognized as the first black drama of the American theatre, which has as its subject the 6 1795 Black Caribs (Garifunas) defense of the 7 Island of Saint Vincent against colonization by 8 9 the British; and 10 "WHEREAS, Today, New Yorkers of Garifuna heritage such as Sara Logan, Lino Solis, 11 Rosemary Ordonez Jenkins, Eleanor Cecelia 12 Castillo-Bullock, Mirtha Colon, Jose Francisco 13 Avila, and Aurelio Martinez continue to recognize 14 15 and honor the cultural practices of their ancestors; now, therefore, be it 16 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 17 18 Body pause in its deliberations to memorialize Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to declare March 11, 19 20 2012, to April 12, 2012, as Garifuna-American Heritage Month in the State of New York; and be 21 22 it further "RESOLVED, That a copy of this 23 resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted 24 to The Honorable Andrew M. Cuomo, Governor of the 25

State of New York." 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Senator 3 Diaz. 4 SENATOR DIAZ: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. And thank you, Senator Skelos, 6 7 Senator Libous, and members of this prestigious 8 chamber for allowing me to introduce this resolution today. 9 10 Today, Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen, is a very special and very honored day 11 for me because today I have the privilege to 12 present and introduce a resolution for the second 13 year recognizing the Garifuna community, 14 15 especially those that reside in Bronx County. 16 Today I'm honored to have the opportunity and privilege granted to me by this 17 18 distinguished body and its president, Honorable Dean Skelos, and the members of this body, to be 19 20 able to introduce this resolution, as I said before, and to have many members of the Garifuna 21 22 community present today to witness this historic 23 event. Ladies and gentlemen, the Garifuna 24 25 community has been an integral part of New York

1 City, and especially the county of the Bronx, for more than 70 years. The Garifuna have been 2 migrating to the United States of America in 3 search of a better life since 1930. 4 Their 5 vitality, their talents, and their commitment constitute tremendous resources for our state and 6 7 our city. 8 But, Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen, it took a tragic incident or accident, 9 10 a fire that took the life of 87 people, for the government and institutions to start paying 11 12 attention to this great community. On March 25, 1980, a social club known as the Happy Land was 13 14 set on fire, causing the loss of many people and 15 inflicting pain and suffering to the rest of the Garifuna community. 16 Today, as the State Senator 17 18 representing the 32nd Senatorial District in Bronx County, it is an honor and privilege for me 19 20 to have a delegation of Garifuna joining us today in the Senate gallery. This delegation, presided 21 by Mr. Jose Francisco Avila, who is here, has 22 arrived and are joining us today. 23 In closing, Mr. President and 24 25 ladies and gentlemen, I would like to thank one

more time Senator Skelos and the Secretary of the 1 Senate, Mr. Frank Patience, for allowing me this 2 great honor of celebrating this historic event in 3 New York State. 4 5 At 5 p.m., after the session is over, we will have a reception in the Sign of the б 7 Tree, to which you all are invited. 8 To the Garifuna community that are 9 up there --10 (Applause from the galleries.) SENATOR DIAZ: To the Garifuna 11 12 community {in Garifuna}. 13 (Laughter and applause from the 14 galleries.) 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Thank you, Senator Diaz. And I agree with your last 16 two sentences. 17 18 (Laughter.) ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 19 Does 20 anyone else like to speak on the resolution? 21 Senator Rivera. Senator Rivera, 22 then Senator Serrano. 23 SENATOR RIVERA: I know we can -we're very much alike, him and me, Mr. President, 24 25 so I understand.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: No, 2 you're very different. But go ahead. SENATOR RIVERA: 3 It's the hair. Just look at the hair. 4 5 Ladies and gentlemen, I am certainly not going to try to imitate either 6 7 Senator Diaz's style and certainly not try to quote a particular Garifuna phrase. But 8 I did want to stand up and say hello to my 9 10 friends, to my colleagues, to my neighbors. The Garifuna community is a proud, 11 12 vibrant part of the Bronx community. There is a large presence of them in my district. 13 Jose Francisco Avila, who's here 14 15 sitting in the chamber, is actually someone who is a great community leader and has been a great 16 ally to me in the Bronx in my year and a half in 17 18 office. 19 They are, again, a vibrant part of 20 the Bronx, a vibrant part of my district. I recognize how important they are to the growing 21 diversity of the city and the state. And I 22 welcome them to the Senate chamber. 23 I hope that this is not the first 24 25 time, this is not the last time that you visit

I do hope that at some point in the near 1 us. future maybe one of your members could actually 2 join us sitting in one of these seats right 3 4 here. 5 (Applause from the galleries.) SENATOR RIVERA: 6 Thank you so 7 much. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Thank 9 you, Senator Rivera. 10 Senator Serrano. 11 SENATOR SERRANO: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 12 13 I want to echo the words of my colleagues Gustavo and Senator Diaz and thank 14 15 Senator Diaz for this resolution and also the events that he holds in the Bronx to celebrate 16 this wonderful community. 17 18 And all of the things that have been said about the growth of this community in 19 20 the Bronx and throughout the city are so important. But also equally important is the 21 history lesson that is taught here. 22 23 Learning about the Garifuna community, it is like a history lesson of the 24 25 Americas, a history lesson of Latin America and

how we came to be as Latin Americans, the 1 2 influences from Latin America, from Africa, and the wonderful meshing of these wonderful cultures 3 in a wonderful community both here and abroad. 4 5 So I want to thank once again Senator Diaz for putting this all together and 6 thank all of the wonderful guests for being here 7 8 today. Thank you. 9 (Applause from the galleries.) 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Thank you, Senator Serrano. 11 Does any other Senator wish to 12 speak on the resolution? 13 Hearing none, the question is on 14 15 the resolution. All in favor signify by saying 16 aye. (Response of "Aye.") 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 19 Opposed, nay. 20 (No response.) 21 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: The 22 resolution is adopted. 23 Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 24 25 Mr. President.

1 I believe that a resolution by 2 Senator Smith, Number 3559, is at the desk. Could we have the title read, and I believe 3 4 Senator Smith would like to speak on it. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: The Secretary will read. 6 THE SECRETARY: Legislative 7 8 Resolution Number 3559, by Senator Smith, 9 recognizing Yunnan Province and Chongqing 10 Municipality of the People's Republic of China as a "Sister City" with New York City. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Senator Smith on the resolution. 13 14 SENATOR SMITH: Thank you very 15 much, Mr. President. 16 Let me also thank my colleagues Senator Farley, Senator Griffo, Senator Maziarz, 17 as well as other colleagues who have gone on 18 trips to China with me: Senator Duane, 19 20 Senator Parker as well. 21 Obviously New York and China have 22 some of the largest economies in the world. We 23 believe that a cooperation between Yunnan Province, Chongqing Province as well as New York 24 25 will only bode well for the economy of both those

provinces, municipalities, as well as New York. 1 2 Tomorrow we will be visited by a delegation from the People's Republic of China. 3 4 At that point in time we will be presenting this 5 resolution to them. But I do want to acknowledge my 6 colleague Senator Farley, who was the dean of our 7 8 delegation that went over to China and represented this state very well. 9 10 So I stand here today, Mr. President, just to acknowledge my colleagues, 11 their presence and involvement in this 12 relationship between China and New York, and also 13 to thank you for allowing us to bring this 14 15 resolution to the floor. ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 16 Senator Smith, you've been doing this for quite a while. 17 18 We thank you for your efforts. 19 Senator Stavisky on the resolution. 20 SENATOR STAVISKY: Thank you, Mr. President. And on the resolution. 21 22 I thank Senator Smith for introducing this resolution. I am a proud 23 cosponsor, because sister-city relationships are 24 25 important, whether it be culturally or socially

1 or especially economically.

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2	It's interesting because the
3	Province of Yunnan is as diverse as the City of
4	New York, and particularly the county which both
5	Senator Smith and I represent, and that's
6	Queens County. Yunnan is one of the most diverse
7	counties, provinces, in the People's Republic of
8	China. And I understand that 38 percent of the
9	population in that province is made up of ethnic
10	minorities.
11	And the City of Chongqing, if I'm
12	pronouncing it correctly, is one of the largest
13	cities in the world. There are 28 million people
14	in that city alone. So for New York City and
15	New York State to have a relationship I think is
16	significant.
17	This is an area where we have great
18	economic diversity, where they have industrial
19	development. And that is something that we
20	strive for in New York. This relationship
21	between the economy and the individuals is
22	extremely important.
23	I have visited the People's
24	Republic of China many years ago, but I celebrate
25	the cultural diversity, particularly in a section

of my district known as Flushing, where the 1 economy is really doing very well compared to the 2 rest of the state. So many people from all parts 3 of the world come to Queens looking for a better 4 5 life; we're able to provide it. And I look forward to welcoming the 6 7 ambassador and the delegation from the People's 8 Republic of China. 9 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 10 Thank you, Senator Stavisky. 11 12 Senator Farley. SENATOR FARLEY: 13 Thank you, Mr. President. 14 15 I do rise as a cosponsor of this with Senator Smith and part of the delegation 16 that did visit there. 17 18 I think it's rather significant, what you're talking about, the largest city in 19 20 the world, Chongqing, which used to be Chungking -- 32 million, I think I was told, 21 22 which is four times the largest city in our nation, New York, great city. 23 And you know, it was very 24 25 interesting on this delegation. Senator Maziarz,

who almost didn't eat anything all the time he 1 was there, and Senator Griffo, who ate everything 2 that didn't bite first. 3 4 (Laughter.) 5 SENATOR FARLEY: But by and large, it was a great trip and one that we learned a б 7 lot. 8 And if we can get into that Chinese market, boy, I'll tell you, you're talking 9 10 populations which would just blow your mind. Beijing, 22 million. Shanghai, 25 million. If 11 we could just get a piece of that market, the 12 economy of New York State will really blossom. 13 And consequently we're very pleased that 14 15 Chongqing and this province can become a sister city with New York City. 16 And thank you, Senator Smith, who 17 18 really made New York State look good at this 19 trip. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Thank 21 you, Senator Farley. 22 I just note that you wish that we could get a piece of the China economy. China 23 has already a piece of our economy, that's for 24 25 sure.

1 Any other member like to speak to the resolution? 2 3 Hearing none, the question is on the resolution. All in favor signify by saying 4 5 aye. (Response of "Aye.") б ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 7 Those 8 opposed, nay. 9 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 10 The resolution is adopted. 11 Senator Libous. 12 13 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President. 14 15 I believe that Senator Skelos has a 16 resolution at the desk, Number 3582. Could you have the title read and we'll move for its 17 18 adoption. ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 19 The 20 Secretary will read. 21 THE SECRETARY: Legislative 22 Resolution Number 3582, by Senator Skelos, recognizing and celebrating the week of 23 March 11-17, 2012, as Sunshine Week. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Senator

1 Squadron on the resolution. 2 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you, Mr. President. 3 This resolution certainly raises 4 5 some important issues, and they are issues that I think really do deserve discussion on the Senate 6 7 floor today. 8 And the resolution reads in part --9 I know we did not read it in its entirety --10 "Whereas, the pillars of democracy include 11 government transparency, accessibility, and 12 accountability, resulting in an informed citizenry." 13 I think those words express an 14 15 excellent goal and an excellent set of values. Unfortunately, they're values that I think too 16 often in the State Senate today we are not able 17 18 to live. 19 You know, it's a beautiful day out 20 in Albany today. Unfortunately, that sunlight doesn't seem to be making its way into this 21 22 Senate chamber. 23 Just this past week, late and dark in the night of Sunday night, from the caves of 24 25 LATFOR emerged a 200-page bill explaining

legislative lines that didn't have maps 1 attached. The process was completely opaque. 2 And I think it's a real shame that 3 4 this house is participating in that way in a 5 process that does exactly the opposite of what it is this resolution talks about and professes to 6 7 support. And it's the opposite of sunshine when you look at that redistricting process, as I say, 8 deep in the caves of LATFOR. 9 10 Just today we had 311 bills that were taken from their committees of subject 11 12 matter and taken by the long tentacles of the Rules Committee and put in that vault there so 13 14 that we can't have open hearings and debate on 15 those 311 bills. Exactly the sort of open debate 16 that would result in an informed citizenry that 17 18 would be an example of government transparency, accessibility, and accountability -- and even 19 20 though the Senate rules in fact allow for a process by which those bills can get called up, 21 22 can get debated, may pass, may not pass, but can see the light of day, can get the great warming 23 disinfectant of sunlight that folks always talk 24 25 about when they talk about Sunshine Week and how

1 important it is.

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2	So I think it's a real shame. You
3	know, in New York City we have a 311, you call
4	them for information. Today we have 311 bills
5	that have just we're not going to get any
6	information on where the members of those
7	committees stand on those bills, we won't have a
8	substantive conversation.
9	So it is ironic for sure that we
10	have this "Sunshine" resolution this week when
11	there is so little sunshine shining through the
12	windows into this chamber and into the halls of
13	the State Senate, and I think it's a shame.
14	I am going to support the
15	resolution, because the principles in it are ones
16	I certainly support. And I just wish that as a
17	chamber, as a body, we could be living them more
18	fully.
19	Thank you, Mr. President.
20	ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Thank

(The Secretary called the roll.) 19 20 THE SECRETARY: In relation to 21 Calendar Number 297, those recorded in the 22 negative are Senators Duane, Perkins and Serrano. 23 Ayes, 55. Nays, 3. ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 24 The 25 bill is passed.

1 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 2 299 --3 SENATOR LIBOUS: Lay it aside for 4 the day. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Bill Number 299 is laid aside for the day. 6 7 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 8 301, by Senator Larkin, Senate Print 1727, an act 9 to amend the Executive Law. ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Read 10 the last section. 11 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 12 act shall take effect immediately. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Call 14 15 the roll. 16 (The Secretary called the roll.) THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 58. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: The bill is passed. 19 20 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 302, by Senator Libous, Senate Print 2461, an act 21 22 to amend the Executive Law. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Read the last section. 24 25 THE SECRETARY: Section 3. This

act shall take effect on the first of April. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Call 3 the roll. (The Secretary called the roll.) 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Senator Libous to explain his vote. 6 7 Senator Krueger to explain her 8 vote. 9 SENATOR KRUEGER: Thank you very 10 much. I appreciate Senator Libous deferring to 11 me. 12 If this bill dealt with permitting through many agencies other than the Department 13 of Environmental Conservation, I think I could 14 vote for this bill. But in fact the dilemmas the 15 state faces when approving permits in complicated 16 environmental land-use questions are different 17 18 than when you're talking about an SED delay in a 19 permit or an SLA delay in a permit or some other 20 business type of permit, where I share his view and frustration that our agencies can't get their 21 22 work done on time. But I believe that there needs to 23 be an exception or an amendment to this bill that 24 25 would remove the DEC timeline requirement,

1 because our environment and making mistakes in approvals to things that could give risk to our 2 land, air, or water is too great to simply put an 3 artificial date timeline of 134 percent of the 4 5 average for permits. So I'll be voting no, 6 7 Mr. President. Thank you. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Thank 9 you, Senator Krueger. 10 Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: 11 Thank you, 12 Mr. President. I rise to explain my vote; I obviously am in favor of it. 13 And I certainly respect what 14 15 Senator Krueger is saying. And, Senator, we'll look at that, because you're right, not all 16 permitting can be done -- and certainly as the 17 18 DEC goes through sometimes a scientific analysis or what have you, that it may take a little bit 19 20 more time. However, for the most part, 21 22 98 percent of state agencies are not responsive to our constituents. It takes forever to get a 23 permit or a license. 24 25 One of the biggest complaints I get

1	in my office, and I'm sure you do too, is that
2	a typical one that really prompted this, a
3	restaurant applied for a liquor license. They
4	sent the check in. They cashed the check and got
5	the license nine months later. They took their
6	money. That's what got me going on this.
7	So I think it's a good start.
8	Certainly Senator Krueger brings up a good point,
9	and I think we can look at that, Senator. But
10	for the most part we need to get this in place
11	honesty in permitting, being responsible to the
12	people that are trying to start businesses and
13	are trying to function in this state.
14	So obviously, Mr. President, I vote
15	aye.
16	ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Thank
17	you, Senator Libous.
18	Senator Hassell-Thompson to explain
19	her vote.
20	SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank
21	you, Mr. President. To explain my vote.
22	I had voted, in the past, aye on
23	this bill. But in, you know, very good
24	discussion today it occurred to me that DEC being
25	in this bill was a major concern to all of us

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1 environmentally. 2 And I listened -- and it's very interesting, Senator Libous, the very example you 3 4 use was the example I used, which had been the 5 reason in the past that I had voted in the affirmative, because the Liquor Authority was one 6 7 of the most difficult and --8 SENATOR PERKINS: Egregious. 9 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: -- and 10 egregious, thank you, most egregious in terms of this issue. And even though they've resolved 11 some of their issues, there's still work that 12 needs to be done. 13 And if we could do something about 14 15 DEC, then I think that all of us would be more 16 than willing to agree that this bill's intent is right on. 17 18 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 19 How do 20 you vote, Senator Hassell-Thompson? 21 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: I will 22 be voting no. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Thank you, Senator Hassell-Thompson. 24 25 Anyone else wish to speak?

Senator Stavisky. 1 2 SENATOR STAVISKY: Thank you, 3 Mr. President. 4 I agree with everything that 5 Senator Libous said except the part where he didn't say "We're going to take out DEC." 6 7 At the budget hearing I asked the 8 Commissioner of Education and his deputy about that very issue, the question of licensure and 9 10 people who apply for licenses. We increased the license fee in 2009 or 2010, and the purpose was 11 12 to speed up the licensure process. It's still as slow as ever. 13 I'm very reluctant to vote no, but 14 15 if they -- once -- if DEC comes out of the legislation, I will enthusiastically support it. 16 But until that time, I vote no. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Senator Stavisky in the negative. 19 20 Senator Perkins. 21 SENATOR PERKINS: I'm going to be 22 voting no on this for the reasons that some of my 23 colleagues have already mentioned, as it particularly relates to DEC. 24 25 But I just want to also at the same

1 time recognize that I share the concerns of the sponsor. And hopefully as we work with this, 2 we'll be able to get the DEC issues resolved and 3 move forward in the spirit that the legislation I 4 5 think is being offered in, which I agree with. But in any case, I'm going to be б 7 voting against it. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: Senator 9 Perkins in the negative. 10 Anyone else? Announce the results. 11 In relation to 12 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 302, those recorded in the 13 negative are Senators Ball, Duane, 14 15 Hassell-Thompson, Krueger, LaValle, Marcellino, 16 Montgomery, Perkins, Rivera, Squadron, Stavisky and Stewart-Cousins. 17 18 Ayes, 46. Nays, 12. ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 19 The 20 bill is passed. 21 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 304, by Senator Young, Senate Print 2838, an act 22 to amend the Executive Law. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 24 Read 25 the last section.

1 THE SECRETARY: Section 6. This 2 act shall take effect immediately. ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: 3 Call the roll. 4 5 (The Secretary called the roll.) THE SECRETARY: 6 Aves, 58. 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BONACIC: The 8 bill is passed. 9 That completes the noncontroversial 10 reading of the calendar, Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, if 11 12 we could go back to motions and resolutions, just an announcement. 13 Senator Diaz's resolution, 3570, he 14 15 wants to open that up to all members of the chamber.
