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PROCEEDINGS 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: The Senate will come to order. 3 4 I ask everyone to please rise and 5 join with me in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. 6 7 (Whereupon, the assemblage 8 recited the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.) 9 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Please 10 remain standing, as we have for an invocation today the Reverend Peter G. Young, of the 11 12 Mother Teresa Community Church in Albany. REVEREND YOUNG: 13 Thank you, 14 Senator. 15 Let us pray. 16 As we conclude the winter season in this beautiful day, may we again bring our 17 18 focus to the Senate chamber. And by being a Senator, you have been accepted into the 19 20 leadership position so that you can more fully serve the people of our Empire New York 21 22 State. 23 In this spirit of community, our prayer today will be to better achieve the 24 25 goal of dedicated representation in the power

that is entrusted to all of our legislators 1 and staff. In your leadership role, may you 2 attain your satisfaction in your services to 3 4 your constituents. 5 Amen. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 6 Thank 7 you, Father Young. 8 The reading of the Journal. 9 THE SECRETARY: In Senate, 10 Sunday, March 18th, the Senate met pursuant to The Journal of Saturday, 11 adjournment. 12 March 17th, was read and approved. On motion, Senate adjourned. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 14 15 Without objection, the Journal stands approved 16 as read. Presentation of petitions. 17 18 Messages from the Assembly. 19 The Secretary will read. 20 THE SECRETARY: On page 15, 21 Senator Grisanti moves to discharge, from the 22 Committee on Environmental Conservation, Assembly Bill Number 9272 and substitute it 23 for the identical Senate Bill Number 6401A, 24 25 Third Reading Calendar 298.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Substitution ordered. 2 3 Messages from the Governor. 4 Reports of standing committees. 5 Reports of select committees. Communications and reports from 6 7 state officers. 8 Motions and resolutions. 9 Senator Libous. 10 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President. 11 I move to amend Senate Print 12 2004A by striking out the amendments made on 13 6/13/2011 and restoring it to its original 14 15 print number, 2004. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: So ordered. 17 18 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 21 Senator Libous. 22 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, at this time there will be an immediate 23 meeting of the Finance Committee in Room 332, 24 25 an immediate meeting of the Finance Committee

in Room 332. 1 2 Pending the return of the 3 Finance Committee, the Senate will stand at ease. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 4 There 5 will be an immediate meeting of the Senate Finance Committee in Room 332. 6 7 The Senate will stand at ease. 8 (Whereupon, the Senate stood at ease 9 at 3:21 p.m.) 10 (Whereupon, the Senate reconvened at 3:35 p.m.) 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Senator Libous. 13 14 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 15 Mr. President. 16 May we please return to reports of standing committees. I believe there's a report 17 18 of the Finance Committee at the desk. I ask that it be read at this time. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Reports 20 21 of standing committees. 22 The Secretary will read. Senator 23 THE SECRETARY: DeFrancisco, from the Committee on Finance, 24 25 reports the following nomination.

As member and chair of the New York 1 2 State Housing Finance Agency and as director and chair of the State of New York Mortgage Agency, 3 4 William J. Mulrow, of Westchester. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Senator DeFrancisco. 6 7 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, I move 8 the nomination of William J. Mulrow to each of 9 the positions to which he was nominated as just 10 was referred to by the Clerk. I have said this repeatedly. 11 The 12 Governor has not only appointed people with the correct background that can do the job, but the 13 14 people who have been nominated, like Mr. Mulrow, 15 should be commended for being willing to come back to public service and perform more of that 16 service with their expertise for the citizens of 17 18 the State of New York. 19 So I'm very happy, again, to rise 20 and move the nomination of William J. Mulrow as both member and chair of the New York State 21 22 Housing Finance Agency and the director and chair of the State of New York Mortgage Agency as well. 23 Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank

1 you, Senator DeFrancisco. 2 Senator Breslin on the nomination. SENATOR BRESLIN: 3 Thank you, Mr. President. 4 5 I'm happy to stand and support the nomination of Bill Mulrow, from being a cum laude 6 7 graduate of Yale, a Rhodes Scholar finalist, 8 Harvard School of Government, and his 30 years in 9 finance, both private and public, and serving 10 under -- this will be the third governor he's served under, including the current Governor's 11 father. 12 And I can think of nobody who knows 13 more about finance, both private and public, than 14 15 Bill Mulrow. And almost as importantly, I don't think in my years in government I have ever, ever 16 heard anyone say a bad word about Bill Mulrow as 17 18 a person or Bill Mulrow as a true professional. 19 I applaud the Governor for the 20 nomination. 21 Thank you, Mr. President. I vote 22 in the affirmative. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank you, Senator Breslin. 24 25 Senator Smith.

1 SENATOR SMITH: Thank you very 2 much, Mr. President. I rise also to second the 3 nomination of Bill Mulrow and congratulate the 4 5 Governor on a fine choice. Bill, it's very good to see you. 6 7 Obviously we will be, as well as 8 the people of this state, the beneficiary of the 9 Governor's selection. You heard Senator Breslin, 10 who addressed his academic background as well as his business acumen. And it is very clear to me, 11 12 as someone who knows him personally and who has dealt with him, that the Governor could not have 13 picked a finer person. 14 15 And your sacrifice that you are prepared to make -- and it is a sacrifice that he 16 is making, coming from the private sector to the 17 18 public sector -- will be thanked, not only by the people of this state, but I'm sure God will bless 19 20 you and your family as well. So thank you very much for doing this, Bill. 21 Thank you, Mr. President. 22 I vote 23 aye. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 24 Thank 25 you, Senator.

1 Senator Krueger. SENATOR KRUEGER: 2 Thank you, 3 Mr. President. I also rise to congratulate the 4 Governor on this fine nomination of Bill Mulrow 5 to these two critical housing financing 6 7 authorities that we have here in New York State. 8 I do appreciate his fine 9 reputation, his great school record, and his 10 history with the state. What I think is particularly important for him as he takes on 11 these responsibilities is that he understands 12 finance and the importance of making sure that in 13 New York State we're focusing our efforts on 14 affordable housing. 15 16 It's not simply enough to say we're doing some housing work here in New York State. 17 18 We need to be smart and 21st-century about our 19 thinking about how we both preserve existing 20 affordable housing and expand the kind of housing 21 that is needed by so many New Yorkers who find 22 themselves priced out of the housing market. And also the fact that he comes out 23 of finance, and as some in finance have a lot of 24 25 responsibility for the housing disasters we're

finding ourselves in right now, I actually think 1 2 that his expertise, his background, and the companies he's with can actually be 3 4 extraordinarily helpful to the State of New York 5 in thinking through what we should appropriately be doing not only to get ourselves out of the 6 housing disaster we find ourselves in today, but 7 how to also avoid unintended consequences as we 8 9 move into a new financial market related to 10 housing. So I'm very appreciative of 11 12 Mr. Mulrow taking on what I see as these very weighty responsibilities. 13 Thank you, Mr. President. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank you, Senator Krueger. 16 Senator Young on the nomination. 17 18 SENATOR YOUNG: Thank you, Mr. President. 19 20 As chair of the Senate Committee on Housing, Construction and Community Development, 21 I enthusiastically second the nomination of 22 William Mulrow for these two very important 23 positions. 24 25 He has the ability, through his

1 financial services background. And I also want to thank him because he spent time in my office, 2 having one-on-one conversations, and did a 3 4 fantastic job today at the Housing Committee 5 meeting answering questions, talking about innovative and creative ways we can deal with 6 7 affordable housing in New York State. 8 So I sincerely congratulate him. I look forward to working closely with him, because 9 10 I think by working together we really can do some great things for the people of New York State. 11 12 Thank you. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank 14 you, Senator Young. 15 Senator Larkin on the nomination. SENATOR LARKIN: Thank you very 16 much, Mr. President. 17 18 A few years ago I had the opportunity, when we were interviewing Mr. Mulrow 19 20 for a position and I first asked him, "Are you sure your wife approves of you taking this pay 21 cut," and he didn't answer. 22 But I noticed on his resume that he 23 had something to do with an IDA, and so I asked 24 25 Orange County IDA, "Have you ever dealt with

him?" 1 2 And one of the board members said, "Oh, yes, we have a project in Westchester 3 4 County." And he said, "He sits on the board, he 5 asks the most questions. He was very sharp." I said, "What would you really describe him as?" 6 7 And our chairman said, "A man of honesty, integrity, and straightforward." 8 9 So what else could we ask for today 10 but for a gentleman with those credentials? 11 It's good to see you again. God 12 bless you. And the best of luck in a trusting, 13 hardworking agency. 14 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank 15 you, Senator Larkin. Senator Stewart-Cousins. 16 SENATOR STEWART-COUSINS: 17 Thank 18 you, Mr. President. I also rise to commend the 19 20 Governor's nomination. We know Bill Mulrow in Westchester County. It is his home county. 21 22 And as we look through his resume, and all of you who have spoken to eloquently 23 about his accomplishments, you know he is a 24 25 personality who is a global personality. And yet

he has always found the time within the county to 1 deal with whatever the issue is that affects 2 local home priorities. 3 4 So again, Mr. Mulrow, I wish you 5 the best. But I know that we have gotten the best in your nomination. And so we look forward 6 7 to working with you on the critical issues of housing that face New York State. 8 9 Congratulations. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 10 Senator Farley on the nomination. 11 12 SENATOR FARLEY: Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I rise to second this nomination. 13 You know, the Governor is to be 14 15 complimented into reaching out for somebody who really has served government in many capacities 16 in a long career. You know, this is an example 17 18 of somebody that really gives himself to the State of New York. 19 20 And this is a very challenging position and one that you're going to be hearing 21 from legislators I guess throughout your tenure. 22 But let me just wish you well. 23 Thank you for your service. And again, we're 24 25 very lucky to have you. And thank you, Bill.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank 2 you, Senator Farley. 3 Seeing no other Senators wishing to 4 be heard, the question is on the nomination of 5 William J. Mulrow, of Westchester, as member and chair of the New York State Housing Finance 6 7 Agency and as director and chair of the State of New York Mortgage Agency. All in favor signify 8 9 by saying aye. 10 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Opposed, 11 12 nay. 13 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: William 14 15 J. Mulrow is hereby confirmed as member and chair of the New York State Housing Finance Agency and 16 as director and chair of the State of New York 17 18 Mortgage Agency. 19 (Applause.) 20 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Senator 21 Libous. 22 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, at this time could we have the noncontroversial 23 reading of the calendar, please. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: The

ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: The bill 11 is passed. 12 13 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 330, by Senator Libous, Senate Print 2468, an act 14 15 to amend the State Finance Law. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Read the last section. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Section 4. This act shall take effect on the first of April. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Call the 21 roll. 22 (The Secretary called the roll.) ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Senator 23 Carlucci to explain your vote. 24 25 SENATOR CARLUCCI: Thank you,

Mr. President. 1 2 I just want to thank my colleagues 3 for supporting this important legislation. This 4 legislation is really smart. It's going to help 5 grow New York State's economy, help grow and support small businesses across the state, and 6 7 particularly the hardworking farmers from across 8 the state. 9 In addition to the financial gains 10 that I believe we'll see in this smart legislation, we're also ensuring that New Yorkers 11 have access to the most fresh and the greatest 12 produce available. 13 So for those reasons, I want to 14 15 thank my colleagues, thank Senator Libous for 16 sponsoring this important legislation, and I'll be voting in the affirmative. 17 18 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 19 Thank 20 you, Senator Carlucci. 21 Senator Ritchie to explain your 22 vote. 23 SENATOR RITCHIE: I would also like to commend Senator Libous on this bill. 24 As the chair of the Senate 25

Agriculture Committee, I've been trying to 1 encourage more locally produced and locally sold 2 It's really great to see this bill come 3 items. 4 up. There are so many farmers who have come in 5 and who worked so hard. The OGS commissioner, RoAnn 6 7 Destito, actually responded to a letter that I 8 wrote when we found out that New York milk was not being sold in the cafeteria that feeds 9 10 40,000 people here. Texas milk was actually being served, and I think we were all kind of 11 12 astonished when that happened. 13 So we wrote the letter to the commissioner, and she responded by making sure 14 15 New York milk was sold in all the cafeterias that are under her discretion. 16 So that is one way that we can help 17 18 promote agriculture throughout the state. We have many wonderful SUNY universities, 19 20 correctional facilities, and we should all be promoting that that happen across the state. 21 So once again, it's my pleasure to 22 vote aye on the bill. 23 Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank

you, Senator Ritchie. You will be recorded in 1 the affirmative. 2 Senator Libous to explain your 3 4 vote. 5 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President and my colleagues. And certainly 6 7 thank you to Senator Carlucci and Senator Ritchie for their support and their comments. 8 9 "Buy from the Backyard" is a 10 program that I actually started in my district a number of years ago, pulling together all of the 11 12 local agricultural community to get people in the 52nd Senate District to begin buying locally. 13 And it turned out to be a huge 14 15 success, and we started having dinners at various restaurants. And Lord knows I like to eat, so we 16 would have dinners -- these dinners would be with 17 all local food products that were produced in 18 New York State. 19 20 It picked up quite substantially, and we'd now like to take it to the entire State 21 22 of New York through this legislation, Mr. President. 23 And the point I want to make is 24 25 very simple. If every household in New York

1 State spent just \$15 per week on local food, that's every household just spent \$15 per week 2 New York State local food, it would pump 3 \$5.5 billion into the New York State economy. 4 5 That alone is great reason to continue to support all the great growers and 6 7 certainly those who raise cattle and provide the great agricultural services -- the number-one 8 9 industry by the way, that this state has had and 10 will continue to have if we support legislation like this. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank you, Senator Libous. You will be recorded in the 13 affirmative. 14 15 Announce the results. 16 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 60. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: The bill 17 18 is passed. This act shall take effect on the first of November. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Call the 21 roll. 22 (The Secretary called the roll.) THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 59. Nays, 23 1. Senator Duane recorded in the negative. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: The bill

1 is passed. 2 Senator Libous, that completes the noncontroversial reading of the calendar. 3 4 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. Before we go to the controversial 6 7 reading, could you please call on Senator Kennedy for the purposes of an announcement, please. 8 9 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Senator 10 Kennedy. SENATOR KENNEDY: Yes, thank you, 11 Mr. President. 12 13 I wanted to just recognize some 14 young men and women that are here with us today 15 in our Senate chambers all the way from Western New York. They made the trek up here from 16 West Seneca Christian, a school that is renowned 17 18 in Western New York, and they're here to watch democracy in action and watch the proceedings 19 20 here in the Senate. So a great welcome to all of you 21 22 here from West Seneca Christian. Thanks for joining us. 23 Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank

1 you, Senator Kennedy. 2 And thank you to all you students for being here joining us today. Welcome, and we 3 extend to you the courtesies of the house for the 4 5 day. And please come back and join us in the future. 6 7 Senator Libous. 8 SENATOR LIBOUS: Could we have the 9 reading of the controversial calendar. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 10 The Secretary will ring the bell. 11 The Secretary will read. 12 13 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 295, by Senator Marcellino, Senate Print 2887A, 14 15 an act to amend the Environmental Conservation 16 Law. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Read the 17 18 last section. THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 19 20 act shall take effect immediately. 21 SENATOR BRESLIN: Explanation. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Senator Marcellino, an explanation has been requested. 23 SENATOR MARCELLINO: 24 Thank you, 25 Mr. President.

We all know that pesticides are 1 2 necessary evils in our world, but they are in effect dangerous substances that should only be 3 4 applied when absolutely needed and in the doses 5 that are absolutely necessary for them to achieve their designed purpose. 6 7 This bill would give professional 8 applicators the flexibility to use only that 9 amount of pesticide that they have determined 10 would be required to do the job that is designed for their use. We don't want them necessarily 11 12 applying the full dosage when half would be satisfactory. That is the purpose of this bill. 13 14 Less exposure to pesticides is a 15 good thing. Less use of pesticides is a good thing. This bill permits professional 16 applicators, farmers, people who understand the 17 18 purpose, the function and the need for pesticides and how to use them safely to do their job with 19 20 their own expertise, without having to live by a label and assume a one-size-fits-all solution is 21 22 necessary or applicable in every case. 23 That is the purpose of this bill. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 24 Senator 25 Breslin.

1 SENATOR BRESLIN: Thank you, 2 Mr. President. Would the sponsor yield for a question or two. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Senator 5 Marcellino, will you yield for a question from Senator Breslin? 6 7 SENATOR MARCELLINO: I'll be 8 pleased to. 9 SENATOR BRESLIN: Senator 10 Marcellino, this is a bill that I voted for last 11 year when it passed 60 to zero. And since that time I use a lawn service and I've read a little 12 bit more about it. 13 Isn't it true that farmers are 14 15 already allowed to change the dosages they use? 16 SENATOR MARCELLINO: Yes. We've done that, yes. 17 18 SENATOR BRESLIN: So thinking of it in terms of those people who come to our 19 20 homes -- that it seems as though everyone uses 21 now in the past number of years -- an applicator 22 has been following directions from a producer of these chemicals, and now this bill would allow 23 them to vary. 24 25 Does the applicator need any

research or knowledge to determine why he should 1 go against the directions on the particular items 2 3 that are being applied to lawns? 4 SENATOR MARCELLINO: Yes, the 5 applicator must be certified and take a test that is provided by the DEC and certified by the DEC 6 7 to be a professional in that field. 8 SENATOR BRESLIN: Again, through you, Mr. President, if the sponsor would continue 9 10 to yield. SENATOR MARCELLINO: 11 Yes, Mr. President. 12 13 SENATOR BRESLIN: Beyond that, 14 though, has there been any research done to 15 determine why you should violate what the prescribed ingredients are to lessen the amounts 16 that are provided? 17 18 SENATOR MARCELLINO: We've got something. I'm just trying to find the right 19 20 line. 21 Yeah, we have Cornell University, 22 the chair of their Department of Entomology has basically done work in this field and on this 23 topic and basically says there are many benefits 24 25 to allowing less than label rates or

1 label-designed uses for pesticides. The more you use, the greater the potential for additional 2 3 exposure and potential harm. The less you use, 4 the better we are. 5 Those rates that are set on a label are designed -- those are optimum but not 6 7 necessarily the most effective for your particular purpose. It might not be needed in 8 your case. If a professional trained applicator 9 10 determines that less would be effective, why not let them. 11 12 SENATOR BRESLIN: Again, if the 13 sponsor would continue to yield. 14 SENATOR MARCELLINO: I would, 15 Mr. President. SENATOR BRESLIN: 16 Is there any 17 safeguard to preventing lawn service companies, 18 who obviously are in business to make a profit, from reducing the amounts they apply to lawns, 19 20 where it might not be effective, in order to make 21 more money? 22 SENATOR MARCELLINO: Well, the only reason I'm hesitating is because if -- it's 23 a very competitive business. And you would know 24 25 that if you were being charged more and more, I

think you might say, Look, could I get this job 1 done in a cheaper way, can I get it done in a 2 3 less expensive way. 4 You would probably go out, seek 5 bids on it, seek other pesticide applicators and what they could do the job for, and find out 6 7 where you could get the best price and get the best results at the lowest price for your work. 8 Nobody wants to spend more money than they 9 10 absolutely have to. That's why we would say that 11 12 allowing them to use less than the labeled rate 13 saves money, it saves exposure, and it protects 14 lives. 15 SENATOR BRESLIN: Again, through you, Mr. President, if the sponsor would continue 16 to yield. 17 18 SENATOR MARCELLINO: I would yield, sir. 19 20 SENATOR BRESLIN: Is there any guarantee that the money saved will be by the 21 22 person purchasing the service as opposed to the 23 service? SENATOR MARCELLINO: No, there's 24 25 no guarantee, sir.

1 SENATOR BRESLIN: Okay, on the bill. 2 3 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: On the bill, Senator Breslin. 4 5 SENATOR BRESLIN: I think the direction of the bill is terrific. It's to make 6 7 sure that we're not using pesticides in 8 situations where it isn't warranted. 9 However, those lawn service 10 companies are in business to make money. The 11 ingredients that are applied have specific directions, and you're varying from those 12 directions. And when you vary from those 13 directions, it would seem to me that the 14 manufacturer has done his own research to say 15 what's best for a lawn. 16 And so I'm concerned -- I'm voting 17 18 for this legislation, but I'm concerned that we 19 haven't done a sufficient analysis to allow that 20 applicator to deviate from what is the standard 21 norm and the directions on the particular 22 ingredients so that the consumer gets what they bargained for. 23 Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank

1 you, Senator Breslin. 2 Senator Marcellino on the bill. SENATOR MARCELLINO: 3 Thank you, Mr. President. 4 5 I hear my worthy colleague's concerns, and they're my concerns as well. Ι 6 7 agree with his idea. 8 But if you're looking for savings, it's the manufacturer that is going to make the 9 10 most money, and it's in the manufacturer's benefit to set the highest use and the highest 11 12 dosage per application because therefore he can sell or she can sell more of the product to the 13 14 consumer. 15 Professional applicators are in the business of making money, you're absolutely 16 correct. And pesticides by nature are, one, 17 18 dangerous to use, so dangerous to them for application purposes. They're also expensive. 19 20 Therefore, the less they get to use, the more money they can save. 21 22 What they charge you is a deal between you and them. That's your contract, 23 that's your work. But if they can save money by 24 25 using less pesticides getting the same results,

you're exposed less, your neighbors are exposed 1 less, and we get the desired result. 2 That's the purpose of this 3 particular bill. We want as little pesticide use 4 5 as possible under the most appropriate and correct conditions. 6 7 Thank you, Mr. President. I urge 8 everyone to vote aye on this bill. Thank you, 9 sir. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 10 Seeing no other Senator wishing to speak, debate is 11 closed. 12 13 The Secretary will ring the bell. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Senator 16 Libous. 17 SENATOR LIBOUS: While we're 18 ringing the bell, if members could get to the chamber. 19 20 We do know that at 4:00 o'clock there I believe are three committees: Mental 21 22 Health, Transportation, and Human Services. So the sooner members can get to the chamber, their 23 colleagues could then go to those meetings. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank

you, Senator Libous. 1 2 Will members please quickly come 3 back to the chamber so we can complete this final vote of the day. 4 Read the last section. 5 б THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 7 act shall take effect immediately. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Call the 9 roll. 10 (The Secretary called the roll.) ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Announce 11 the results. 12 13 THE SECRETARY: Absent from 14 voting: Senator Valesky. 15 Ayes, 59. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: The bill is passed. 17 18 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Senator 20 Libous. 21 SENATOR LIBOUS: Is there any further business at the desk? 22 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Nothing 23 further at the desk. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you,
