ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 19 20 Senator Hassell-Thompson to explain her vote. 21 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Yeah, I 22 voted incorrectly on one of the bills. And with unanimous consent, I would like to change my 23 vote. I made an error. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO:

Senator, if we can just complete this roll call. 1 2 Then we can --SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: 3 That's what I said, complete this roll call. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: б Thank you. 7 Announce the results. 8 THE SECRETARY: Those recorded in 9 the negative: Senators Montgomery and Parker. 10 Ayes, 57. Nays, 2. ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 11 The bill is passed. 12 13 Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, I 14 15 believe Senator Hassell-Thompson wanted to clarify her vote, because she was here and I 16 think there was maybe some misunderstanding. 17 18 So if we could have unanimous concept for her to clarify her vote, I think that 19 would be fine at this time. 20 21 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: With 22 unanimous consent. 23 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. President. On Bill Number S6676, 24 25 Senator Saland, I am voting in the affirmative.

19	THE SECRETARY: In relation to

23	Ayes, 54. Nays, 5.
24	ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: The
25	bill is passed.

1 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 2 438, by Senator Lanza, Senate Print 3744A, an act to amend the Executive Law. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: Read 5 the last section. THE SECRETARY: Section 3. This 6 7 act shall take effect immediately. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: Call 9 the roll. 10 (The Secretary called the roll.) THE SECRETARY: In relation to 11 Calendar Number 438, those recorded in the 12 negative are Senators Adams, Duane, 13 Hassell-Thompson, Montgomery, Parker and Perkins. 14 15 Ayes, 53. Nays, 6. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: The bill is passed. 17 18 Senator LaValle, that completes the noncontroversial reading of the calendar. 19 20 SENATOR LaVALLE: Mr. President, 21 could we go back to motions, please. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 23 Returning to the order of motions and resolutions. 24 25 SENATOR LaVALLE: On behalf of

1 Senator Martins, I move that the following bill be discharged from its respective committee and 2 be recommitted with instructions to strike the 3 4 enacting clause. That's Senate Bill Number 6783. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: So ordered. 6 7 SENATOR LaVALLE: Mr. President, 8 can we now go to the controversial reading of the 9 calendar. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: The Secretary will read the controversial calendar, 11 12 and we will ring the bells, please. 13 The Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 14 15 418, by Senator Griffo, Senate Print 2322, an act 16 to amend the Penal Law. ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 17 18 Senator Gianaris. SENATOR GIANARIS: Would the 19 20 sponsor yield for a question, Mr. President. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 22 Senator Griffo, do you yield to a question? 23 SENATOR GRIFFO: I do. ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 24 He yields, Senator. 25

1 SENATOR GIANARIS: Thank you. 2 Mr. President, would the sponsor 3 clarify if this bill would apply in the situation where merely --4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: Excuse me, Senator. б 7 If we could just have some order. We can get through this a lot quicker if we have 8 9 quiet. Thank you. 10 I'm sorry, Senator. SENATOR GIANARIS: 11 Thank you, Mr. President. 12 It appears to me, in reading this 13 14 bill, that it would apply in a circumstance where 15 merely making any physical contact with a peace officer with the intent to annoy that person 16 would subject someone to a felony. Is that 17 18 correct? 19 SENATOR GRIFFO: Mr. President, 20 through you. Senator Gianaris, the intent of the bill would be to couple nefarious intent along 21 22 with physical contact. So pure harassment in itself, despite the fact that I think that is 23 provocative, would not under this proposed bill 24 25 do that. You would have to require -- it would

be a combination of both nefarious intent, which 1 would include the annoyance, the harassment, 2 3 along with the physical contact. 4 SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. President, 5 would the sponsor continue to yield. SENATOR GRIFFO: 6 Yes. 7 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: The sponsor yields, Senator. 8 9 SENATOR GIANARIS: Yes, I 10 understand there are two elements, both the intent and the contact. My concern is that the 11 12 intent can simply be to annoy the person, and the contact could be any contact whatsoever. 13 14 So for example, would the sponsor 15 agree that this legislation would make it a felony if someone were simply to tap a peace 16 officer on the shoulder, say at a rally of some 17 18 kind? If the intent is to annoy that person, is it the sponsor's intent that that person should 19 20 be subject to a felony conviction? SENATOR GRIFFO: Mr. President, 21 through you. Senator Gianaris, the intent is 22 to -- we're witnessing shocking incidents of 23 disrespect and confrontation. So the intent is 24 25 to try to protect those who are given the

1 responsibility and authority to keep the peace and safeguard our community. 2 So in that particular instance, if 3 4 it's just an obnoxious behavior, that in itself 5 would not be enough. But if you again were physically confronting the officer as well as 6 7 harassing and annoying that officer, yes, you would be subjected to a felony. 8 9 SENATOR GIANARIS: And if the 10 sponsor would continue to yield, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 11 Do 12 you continue to yield, Senator? SENATOR GRIFFO: 13 Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 14 The 15 sponsor continues to yield. 16 SENATOR GIANARIS: Is it correct that this bill does not require any physical 17 18 injury whatsoever suffered by the peace officer before it would subject the person making 19 20 physical contact to a felony? 21 SENATOR GRIFFO: Mr. President, through you. Senator Gianaris, essentially the 22 reason for this bill was because, as I indicated, 23 we are having a number of incidents in our 24 25 community and trying to crack down on this total

1 disregard for the law.

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2	And there are already statutes, as
3	you're probably aware, that cover right now if
4	there was a physical injury to the officer, then
5	they could get a more severe charge. But right
6	now just shoving, pushing, kicking, head-butting,
7	and if there's no injury, then there is no
8	charge.
9	So the answer to your question is
10	yes, the intent of this is to ensure that that
11	officer in the line of duty who's trying to keep
12	the peace and is being in any way physically
13	confronted, this, even without injury, would
14	allow them to charge with a felony.
15	SENATOR GIANARIS: If the sponsor
16	would yield for one final question,
17	Mr. President.
18	SENATOR GRIFFO: Yes.
19	ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: The
20	sponsor yields for a final question.
21	SENATOR GIANARIS: Just for
22	consistency's sake, this bill would also apply to
23	protect dog control officers in certain
24	instances, wouldn't it?
25	SENATOR GRIFFO: It would peace

officers. Not all dog control officers are peace 1 2 officers. SENATOR GIANARIS: But in certain 3 4 instances. 5 SENATOR GRIFFO: If you are considered a peace officer. It would also 6 7 protect correctional officers. 8 SENATOR GIANARIS: Thank you. 9 Thank you to the sponsor. 10 On the bill, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 11 Senator Gianaris on the bill. 12 SENATOR GIANARIS: This bill seems 13 14 like yet another in a pattern we've seen from the 15 majority which is driven by good intent, is intended to respond to situations for which peace 16 officers need protection, but goes way beyond 17 18 what is necessary in order to achieve its goal and would subject people who should not be 19 20 subjected to felony convictions to just that. The hypotheticals one can come up 21 22 with are many. I raised a couple during the debate. The idea that someone at a rally who 23 would be literally just tapping an officer on the 24 25 shoulder, if it's proven that the intent of that

1	person was to annoy the officer, could end them
2	up in jail for several years.
3	And it seems to me that's not what
4	the sponsor actually intends to do, but yet as
5	written that's what the legislation does.
6	So until bills like this are more
7	tightly worded to achieve the goal they actually
8	seek and would not create overbroad consequences
9	subjecting people to felonies where clearly they
10	shouldn't be in some cases we have direct
11	experience in New York with political protests
12	and rallies where police have been accused of
13	being overly aggressive and charging protesters
14	who are exercising their First Amendment rights
15	with crimes that they should not have been
16	charged with.
17	If this bill were to become law, we
18	would open a can of worms in terms of allowing
19	people who are exercising their First Amendment
20	rights to engage in relatively peaceable
21	political protests to wind up in jail for years
22	at a time.
23	And so I think the bill as written
24	is way too overbroad. I will be voting in the
25	negative, and I encourage my colleagues to do the

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1 same. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: Are 3 there any other Senators who wish to be heard on this bill? 4 5 Seeing none, hearing none, the debate is closed. The Secretary will ring the 6 7 bells. 8 Read the last section. 9 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 10 act shall take effect on the first of November. ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: Call 11 the roll. 12 13 (The Secretary called the roll.) ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 14 15 Senator Montgomery to explain her vote. 16 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Yes, Mr. President, to explain my vote. 17 18 I know that we've debated this legislation or some version of it for many, many 19 20 years and many times. I just want to reiterate that this is the same type of legislation which 21 is so loosely written and can be misused or 22 abused by law enforcement and others -- i.e., 23 peace officers, a number of different categories 24 25 of peace officers that we have in this very room

1 given license to. So it leaves them open to be able to arrest someone, charge them with a felony 2 because they felt harassed. 3 4 So I think that goes just a little 5 bit too far. And we just had very recently an incident that has wracked our nation; the issue 6 7 in Florida is just exactly what could happen and what this kind of legislation allows for. And 8 9 that is for unfettered license to charge someone -- this doesn't allow them to shoot 10 someone, but it allows a person to be arrested 11 12 and charged with a felony because a peace officer or a police officer feels harassed. 13 14 So I adamantly oppose this concept, 15 and I vote no. ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 16 Senator Montgomery will be recorded in the 17 18 negative. 19 Announce the results, please. 20 THE SECRETARY: In relation to 21 Calendar Number 418, those recorded in the 22 negative are Senators Duane, Gianaris, Hassell-Thompson, Krueger, Montgomery, Parker, 23 Perkins, Rivera, Serrano, Stavisky, 24 25 Stewart-Cousins. Also Senator Squadron. Also

1 Senator Huntley. Also Senator Adams. Also 2 Senator Espaillat. ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: 3 4 Ladies and gentlemen, before the clerk announces 5 the results, we have three more bills on the calendar. So anybody who's thinking of leaving 6 7 shouldn't. 8 Announce the results, please. 9 We're going read the negatives again to be 10 assured that we're correct. THE SECRETARY: In relation to 11 12 Calendar Number 418, those recorded in the negative are Senators Adams, Duane, Espaillat, 13 14 Gianaris, Hassell-Thompson, Huntley, Krueger, 15 Montgomery, Parker, Perkins, Rivera, Serrano, Squadron, Stavisky, Stewart-Cousins. Also 16 Senator Dilan. 17 18 Absent from voting are Senators Peralta, Robach and Smith. 19 20 Ayes, 41. Nays, 16. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT MARCELLINO: The 22 bill is passed. Senator Libous, completes the 23 reading of the controversial calendar. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, we

have a supplemental calendar before us, 1 2 Supplemental Calendar 30A.
