brothers and sisters, to lead their exodus? 1 But You, Almighty God, knew what qualified him, that 2 as a young man he left the palace to see the 3 4 servitude and feel the hard work of his people. 5 You were telling Moses that a leader does not have to just feel the pain of his 6 7 people so long as he is sensitive to it. You were reminding him that despite his background he 8 had always been with his people in spirit, and so 9 10 too would You always be with him. It does not necessarily matter who 11 we are, where we come from, or what we believe. 12 What matters in Your eyes, God, is our 13 sensitivity to the suffering of our neighbors, 14 15 our brothers and sisters, and our friends. Life shoulders us with 16 responsibilities, and the most divine thing we 17 18 can do is to take them on. The lowest, ignore 19 them. 20 A wise member of our New York State Assembly, President Theodore Roosevelt, shared 21 22 the same sentiment: "Far better it is to dare mighty things, to win glorious triumphs, even 23 though checkered by failure, than to rank with 24 25 those poor spirits who neither enjoy nor suffer

1 much because they live in a gray twilight that knows not victory nor defeat." 2 Almighty God, bless the leaders 3 4 of our Senate with the courage to continue to 5 understand the great responsibility they have, the foresight to make policies and statements 6 that will enable all New Yorkers to live lives 7 8 of fruitfulness and fulfillment, and the strength to stand by their convictions even in 9 10 the shadow of great doubt. 11 And let us say amen. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: The reading of the Journal. 13 14 THE SECRETARY: In Senate, 15 Saturday, April 28th, the Senate met pursuant to adjournment. 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stranger who, when growing up, we're taught to be 1 aware of: Don't get into a car with a stranger, 2 3 don't talk to a stranger. These were family 4 members. These were people who were supposed to 5 be friendly to her, people who were friends of her family. 6 7 So Erin has taken on a very important mission and a very important cause. 8 9 She wants to pass Erin Merryn's Law in all 10 50 states, which would simply mandate that the curriculum in our schools, starting at 11 12 kindergarten, actually teach what to do to make sure you're not sexually abused by someone you 13 14 know, someone who you don't know. 15 Right now in the State of New York, thanks to Senator Skelos, a law was passed in 16 1994 which presently mandates in our school 17 18 curricula around the state the teaching to students as early as kindergarten to prevent 19 20 being abducted. So this is not going to be an added 21 mandate or an added cost, this is merely adding 22 the part about making sure to be wary or learn to 23 deal or understand, making sure you're not abused 24 25 by someone you know or you don't know.

1 So this is something that I think 2 is very, very important. When you look at the statistics, they're rather devastating. 3 Ninety-four percent of young people who were the 4 5 victims of sexual abuse, the actual abuser is someone they know. 6 7 So it's no longer that individual 8 in some dark alley, there's no longer that 9 individual trying to lure you into a car. In 10 many cases it's people we see and we know and we see every day and trust. 11 So today this is something 12 important to me and I know it's important to 13 Erin. And I would like to recognize her today in 14 15 the chamber. 16 She's someone who has had this legislation passed in Illinois, in Missouri, in 17 18 Indiana. It's awaiting the signature of the governor in Maine. And hopefully we can make 19 20 New York State one of those states that passes Erin Merryn's Law. 21 22 So thank you, Erin, for being here 23 today. And, Mr. President, I vote yes. 24 25 And I'd like to recognize -- I hope the chamber

can welcome and give Ms. Merryn a hand for all of 1 her hard work and dedication. 2 (Standing ovation.) 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: Erin, we 5 extend the full courtesies of the chamber to you today. 6 7 Senator Klein will be recorded in 8 the affirmative. 9 Senator Adams to explain his vote. 10 SENATOR ADAMS: Thank you, Mr. President, just to explain my vote and really 11 commend Senator Klein on this bill. 12 And just to commend young Erin, you 13 14 know, it's difficult to turn pain into purpose. 15 And often people go internally when they feel a level of pain instead of reaching out and trying 16 to prevent other people from experiencing that 17 18 pain. 19 And, you know, stories like this 20 are so profound. And I think it's important that we use our classrooms for more than just teaching 21 one and one equals two; it must teach some of the 22 challenges, the socialization problems that young 23 people will experience. 24 25 So this is commendable. And I

truly thank you, not only for myself as a Senator 1 but as someone who has a son. 2 And it's heroes like you that make 3 4 it possible for legislators not to get so far 5 removed in this comfortable environment that we're in. There are real problems out there, and 6 7 real people like you are giving us some great 8 solutions. 9 So I thank my colleague for this 10 bill, and I thank you for doing this. We must make all states in this America also have this 11 bill on the books. 12 13 Thank you very much. ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: 14 Senator 15 Adams recorded in the affirmative. 16 Senator Montgomery to explain her 17 vote. 18 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Yes, Mr. President, I join my colleagues in 19 20 complimenting Ms. Merryn. I think that her work is admirable, and hopefully we can spread this 21 success more nationwide. 22 I'm voting no on this, not because 23 I am not absolutely supportive of the legislation 24 25 or the intent of this legislation, but I do want

1 to make a statement about I too have legislation that would require sex education in every school, 2 3 in every grade, appropriate to every grade from 4 first through twelfth. We do not have that. 5 I also am a huge advocate of school-based health clinics, where we would have 6 7 health professionals to speak to young people about all of the aspects of their health, their 8 mental health needs, their nutritional education 9 10 needs, as well as their sexuality and the sex education. 11 12 We do not approach young people in a comprehensive way. Everything is piecemeal for 13 14 them. And therefore some people, some youngsters 15 will get it, others will never get it, and we never do a thorough and complete job of making 16 sure our young people have all that they need 17 18 comprehensively. 19 So I object to this process. 20 That's what I am voting no about. 21 However, I am all in favor of young 22 people having sex education and all the 23 information available about their sexuality and to protect them and their health. 24 25 But I vote no on this bill.

ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: 1 Senator 2 Montgomery will be recorded in the negative. 3 Senator Savino to explain her vote. 4 SENATOR SAVINO: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. I rise in support of this piece of legislation. 6 7 And I just want to say to 8 Erin Merryn, you're a remarkable young woman who has shown tremendous courage. Where most people 9 10 would run away and hide, you've chosen to make 11 this your own personal mission. 12 As I said to you earlier today at the press conference, when I was a caseworker in 13 the city's child welfare administration, the most 14 15 difficult cases that I dealt with were children who were victims of sexual abuse. Their scars 16 were internal, not external. You couldn't look 17 18 at them and see the bruises, you couldn't see their broken bones, you couldn't see the evidence 19 20 of the abuse that they suffered. But it is a very real suffering 21 22 that millions of children go through. And the really sad reality is the majority of those 23 children are victimized by people they know and 24 25 trust -- family members, people who they look up

1 to, people they would not question.

2	And when we think about the very
3	small children who are most at risk, they have no
4	other frame of reference. They don't know what
5	sexual abuse is because they don't know what sex
6	is. They don't know what appropriate touching
7	is. They don't know what's inappropriate.
8	So we need to educate our children,
9	we need to educate our educators. Because as we
10	begin to talk about these things publicly, we're
11	going to have children who begin to self-report
12	about what's happening in their home or when they
13	visit their uncle or when they see their
14	next-door neighbor.
15	So this has to be a collaborative
16	effort about educating children, educating our
17	communities and trying to cut back on the risks
18	that young children face every day at the hands
19	of people they know and love the most.
20	So I want to thank you, Erin. I
21	want to thank Senator Klein for bringing this
22	legislation forward, and Assemblyman Dinowitz in
23	the Assembly. And hopefully this will be the
24	next state that adopts Erin Merryn's Law.
25	Thank you, Mr. President.

ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: 1 Senator 2 Savino will be recorded in the affirmative. Senator Smith to explain his vote. 3 4 SENATOR SMITH: Thank you very 5 much, Mr. President. Let me rise just to thank my 6 7 colleague Senator Klein for bringing forth this significant piece of legislation. 8 9 To Erin, thank you. That's all I 10 can say to you, just thank you. You are very brave. I don't know how you muster up the 11 12 strength, given what you have been through, to do But to be so magnanimous in your effort 13 this. for other people, I know God will continue to 14 15 bless you and your family. And know that we are going to do 16 the right thing by you. And we know how hard 17 18 this is for you. You probably remember it night after night. I have a daughter myself, and I 19 20 don't know if I could even stand to have her sit here and hear this. 21 This is serious. And I hope people 22 understand how serious this is. This is not a 23 matter of you being here for anything other than 24 25 the fact that you feel it's the right thing to

1 do. 2 So I'm going to vote yes, and know that I will ask all my colleagues as well as 3 others to do so. God bless you. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: Senator Smith will be recorded in the affirmative. 6 7 Announce the results. 8 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 55. Nays, 9 1. Senator Montgomery recorded in the negative. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: The bill is passed. 11 12 (Applause.) 13 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 562, by Senator Flanagan, Senate Print 6694A, an 14 15 act to establish. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: Read the last section. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Section 12. This act shall take effect on the 90th day. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: Call the 21 roll. 22 (The Secretary called the roll.) THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 55. Nays, 23 1. Senator Duane recorded in the negative. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: The bill

1 is passed. 2 Excuse me. The Secretary will 3 again announce the results. THE SECRETARY: In relation to 4 5 Calendar Number 562, those recorded in the negative are Senators Duane and Montgomery. 6 7 Ayes, 54. Nays, 2. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: The bill 9 is passed. 10 Senator Libous, that completes the reading of the noncontroversial calendar. 11 12 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, is there any further business at the desk? 13 ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: There is 14 15 no further business. 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, you've done such a good job, I'm sure that our 17 18 colleagues will want you to preside more frequently. 19 Because if there's no further 20 21 business at the desk, Mr. President, I move that we adjourn at this time until Tuesday, May 1st, 22 at 3:00 p.m. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT ZELDIN: 24 On 25 motion, the Senate stands adjourned until
