throughout his four years of high school. 1 He 2 served as team co-captain and five year Most Valuable Player on the Oswego High School Boys 3 Swimming and Diving Team. He has also earned 4 5 numerous state swimming and diving awards. Drake will go on to use his 6 7 academic and athletic talents at Virginia 8 Polytechnic Institute. 9 Please join me in congratulating 10 Drake Becksted for his wondrous career both academically and athletically. 11 12 (Applause.) 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank 14 you, Senator Ritchie. Congratulations, and we extend the 15 16 courtesies of the house to you, Drake. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Senator 7 DeFrancisco. 8 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Thank you, 9 Mr. President. 10 Chris Collins is in the chambers today, and he's truly a remarkable young man. 11 He 12 actually won the 2011 World Karate Championships -- "World," I said. You hear 13 14 that? World. World -- at age 17. At age 17. 15 He's a native of Syracuse. Started studying karate at the age of 8, mastering tips 16 from both his father, Terrence Collins, a 17 18 six-degree black belt -- so don't monkey around with Mr. Collins -- and Carlos Tearney, a martial 19 20 arts champion and instructor in Syracuse. Christopher Collins grew to be a 21 fierce competitor in karate, winning numerous 22 local championships before entering the Northeast 23 regional competition in April of 2011. 24 He 25 obviously won that on his way to the world

We want to congratulate Christopher 6 7 and welcome him and his dad here to the chamber 8 today. Congratulations. 9 (Applause.) 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator DeFrancisco. 11 12 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, Mr. President, would you turn to the 13 noncontroversial calendar and read that calendar, 14 15 please. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The Secretary will read. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 537, by Senator Young, Senate Print 6202, an act 19 20 to amend the Public Officers Law. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Read the last section. 22 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. Number 1122, Senate Print 6917, and ask that said 1 2 bill retain its place on the Third Reading Calendar. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 5 amendments are received, and the bill shall retain its place on third reading. 6 7 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Also, Mr. President, can you recognize Senator Klein, 8 who has a guest. 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Klein. 11 12 SENATOR KLEIN: Thank you very, very much, Mr. President. 13 We have a very special guest here 14 15 today, someone who I've had the privilege of working with over the last year on the important 16 issue of cyberbullying, and her name is Kaitlin 17 18 Monte, who is presently Miss New York State. 19 Kaitlin is originally from 20 Rochester. She now lives in Astoria, Oueens. 21 She's someone who has dedicated her life to mentoring young people. She has her own 22 foundation now which helps young people get ready 23 for a new career in business in the private 24 25 sector.

But the work she did for me over 1 2 the last year on cyberbullying was tremendously Today we released the results of the 3 helpful. 4 first ever New York cyberbullying census, where 5 we had over 10,000 young people from throughout the state answer a survey which will help us 6 7 gauge how serious this problem is in New York. 8 This really couldn't have been 9 possible without the work of Kaitlin Monte. 10 Kaitlin traveled all over the state, I know she was in schools in many of our districts, talking 11 to young people. You know, because she has a 12 story to tell as well. 13 Besides being Miss New York State, 14 15 Kaitlin was second runner-up in the Miss America Pageant. I think she was robbed; I think we need 16 to look into that. Because to me, she'll not 17 18 only always be Miss New York, but also our Miss America. 19 20 So I hope we can extend the 21 courtesies of the house today and recognize and 22 give Kaitlin Monte, Miss New York State, a tremendous round of applause for all her fine 23 work. 24 25 (Standing ovation.)

1 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: We 2 welcome Kaitlin and appreciate you being here and appreciate your efforts. And I know it's the 3 4 consensus of the Senate that you should be 5 Miss America. 6 (Laughter.) 7 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 8 Gianaris. 9 SENATOR GIANARIS: Thank you, 10 Mr. President. I would like to add my words of 11 welcome as well to a constituent, Kaitlin Monte, 12 for the tremendous work she has done not only in 13 her personal achievement but also the work she's 14 15 done with Senator Klein and his colleagues on the cyberbullying issue. 16 We take a great pride in the 17 18 residents of Western Queens who achieve such great heights. And we know that as her tenure as 19 20 Miss New York is coming to an end, it's just the beginning of the great things she's going to 21 22 accomplish in her life. So for my part as well, I'd like to 23 welcome Ms. Monte to the Senate chamber and ask 24 25 again that you extend all courtesies to her.

This 10 act shall take effect immediately. 11 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the roll. 12 13 (The Secretary called the roll.) 14 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 57. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill 16 is passed. 17 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 18 646, by Senator Nozzolio, Senate Print 6171A, an act to amend the Criminal Procedure Law. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Read the 21 last section. THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 22 23 act shall take effect immediately. 24 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 25 roll.

(The Secretary called the roll.) 1 2 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 54. Nays, Senators Montgomery, Perkins and Rivera 3 3. 4 recorded in the negative. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill б is passed. 7 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 8 712, by Senator Kennedy, Senate Print 6508, an act to amend the Penal Law. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Read the 10 last section. 11 THE SECRETARY: Section 4. This 12 act shall take effect immediately. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 14 15 roll. 16 (The Secretary called the roll.) 17 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 18 Kennedy to explain his vote. 19 SENATOR KENNEDY: Thank you very 20 much, Mr. President. 21 First of all, let me start by 22 thanking my colleagues on both sides of the aisle for bringing this legislation to the floor of the 23 Senate for a vote today. 24 As an infant, JJ Bolvin suffered 25

severe physical abuse at the hands of his own 1 father. During the violent attacks, 11 of JJ's 2 bones were fractured. When we first heard the 3 4 little boy's story last summer, he wasn't even 5 2 years old yet, but he had already lived through so much pain. JJ is now forced to endure the 6 7 traumatic consequences of the abuse. Every day he fights to overcome a severe seizure disorder 8 and developmental delays which are the result of 9 10 his father's brutal beatings. Matters were made even worse when 11 12 the state law served JJ an injustice. In 2007, JJ's father was convicted of beating another one 13 of his sons and breaking his arm. But despite 14 15 his history of violence against children and the severity of the attacks against JJ, his father 16 was handed a light sentence of one and a third to 17 18 four years in prison -- a light sentence for this violent offender while his innocent victim, his 19 20 own son, fights through a life sentence of health 21 challenges. 22 This injustice was entirely the fault of a gap in state law. By passing this 23 bill into law today, we will help to close that 24

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repeat abusers can only be given if a previous 1 conviction happened within the preceding three 2 years. Four years had passed between the 3 convictions of JJ's father. We introduced JJ's 4 5 Law to fix this gap in the law and put repeat child abusers behind bars for far longer. 6 7 JJ's Law extends the previous conviction lookback period, and it strengthens 8 penalties for aggravated assault upon a child. 9 10 Also, in extremely severe cases of repeat abuse, similar to the one JJ endured, this legislation 11 will allow law enforcement to charge the abuser 12 with first-degree assault, which comes with a 13 maximum sentence of 25 years in prison. 14 15 Fortunately, JJ survived the abuse he suffered, but many children, sadly, do not 16 survive. Between 2001 and 2008, child abuse and 17 18 neglect took the lives of 630 children in New York State alone. JJ's Law will send the 19 20 message that New York State won't tolerate child This legislation is named for little JJ, 21 abuse. 22 but it will help protect children all across New 23 York State. I want to thank the Western 24 25 New York delegation for their strong support for

1 this measure, and I want to thank all of my colleagues who cosponsored JJ's Law and helped JJ 2 and his family pass this bill through the 3 4 Senate. 5 Also, the Retzer family, JJ's guardians, deserve a tremendous amount of credit 6 and gratitude for their advocacy and 7 determination to get this passed today. 8 9 I urge our colleagues in the 10 Assembly to move this bill through expeditiously and finally bring justice to JJ. 11 12 Thank you, Mr. President. I vote 13 aye. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 14 Senator 15 Kennedy to be recorded in the affirmative. I know there's a lot that we have 16 to do before the house today, and there's a lot 17 18 of activity in the house. So I would ask that you please try to be as quiet as possible so that 19 20 we can hear the members discuss the legislation and undertake the business of the day. 21 Senator Grisanti to explain his 22 23 vote. SENATOR GRISANTI: Yes, thank you, 24 25 Mr. President.

I rise in support of this 1 2 legislation, and I want to thank Senator Tim Kennedy for being the sponsor and for bringing 3 this forward. And I want to also thank the 4 5 Western New York delegation. In particular, I want to thank 6 7 Leader Dean Skelos for not only meeting with the 8 family, the guardian, the aunt and uncle of this young boy, but for getting this on the floor and 9 10 getting this pushed. And I too strongly urge the 11 12 Assembly to get this done. Because what happened to poor JJ should never happen to any child, 13 especially, especially when there was abuse of 14 15 another child that had occurred. 16 So when you have somebody that does something like this to children, that person to 17 18 me is a heinous person, that person deserves the strictest-most penalty that could possibly be 19 20 given. This will ensure that somebody like that will not do it again. 21 And again, I just urge the 22 Assembly -- and everybody in this conference, if 23 you could tell Assemblymembers to get this 24 25 pushed, it's important to make sure that it

doesn't happen to another child. 1 2 I vote aye. Thank you, 3 Mr. President. This act shall take effect on the 120th day. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: call the roll. 19 20 (The Secretary called the roll.) 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 22 Ball to explain his vote. 23 SENATOR BALL: Thank you, Mr. President. Just briefly on this piece of 24 25 legislation.

1 You know, we have certainly a 2 number of issues to deal with in this chamber. Today is Animal Advocacy Day. We've had great 3 turnout from animal advocates and folks who are 4 5 animal lovers, like myself, all throughout this state. There are several pieces of legislation 6 7 that are moving forward. 8 And as we all know, one of the problems that we're dealing with and that we see 9 10 amongst the community of animal advocates is a 11 plague of puppy mills. And I'm actually joined 12 here today by Deb and Lori Pagano. I met them several years back. The piece of legislation 13 that's passing today is known as Charlemagne's 14 15 Law. It's the newest version of a law that's now taken about four or five years to get done. 16 And unfortunately, Lori had a dog 17 18 named Charlemagne who had a bunch of problems associated with being raised in that puppy mill. 19 20 And the animals are that are raised in these pet mills are raised in absolutely horrific 21 conditions that would break the hearts of 22 everybody in this chamber and beyond. 23 So I want to thank everybody for 24 25 their support today. This is one solid step

The bill is supported by 19 20 the Humane Society of the United States, the Humane Society of New York State, the ASPCA, as 21 well as the New York City Bar Association. 22 And I think, more importantly, it 23 24 will go a long way towards keeping our pets safe 25 and secure when they're brought to a grooming

three-time All-American football player, 1966
EACC Player of the Year, holds Syracuse
University's career record for touchdowns at 46
and punt returns for touchdowns at six. Floyd
finished fifth in the Heisman Trophy voting as a
junior and senior. His legendary number, 44, was
also retired at Syracuse. In 1983, Floyd was
elected into the College Football Hall of Fame.
In 1967, Floyd was the sixth
selection of the first AFL-NFL draft. He was the
first-ever first-round draft pick to sign with
the American Football League's Denver Broncos.
Floyd led the American Football
League in rushing for a six-year period from 1968
to 1973. He was a five-time Pro Bowl selection
and twice named All AFL-NFL. Floyd was the first
Denver Bronco to have his jersey, Number 44,
retired.
In 2010 Floyd was finally honored
by being inducted into the Professional Football
Hall of Fame.
And along with Mr. Little is his

wife DeBorah, former City Council member. 1 Also Pastor Darrel Hyme and his son Chris. And I want 2 to thank Assemblyman Sam Roberts for bringing 3 Mr. Little. 4 5 Mr. Little, we congratulate you on your accomplishments. You are truly the epitome 6 7 of a citizen of the State of New York. Congratulations, Mr. Little. 8 9 (Sustained applause.) 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator DeFrancisco. 11 12 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, before Senator Nozzolio grabs onto Floyd Little, I want 13 14 to say a few words too. 15 Floyd Little probably was one of the greatest football players -- not probably, 16 was one of the greatest football players ever to 17 18 play the game, whether high school, college, or professional. But more than that, he's an 19 20 incredible citizen. And he's always maintained his loyalty to the City of Syracuse. 21 22 And he's here with his wife, DeBorah, who I've known for many, many years, a 23 wonderful, wonderful woman. They each married 24 25 great people, and it's a wonderful partnership.

1 Also, Floyd, you don't know this, 2 but just about every day I am honoring some great athletes and great people because Central 3 New York is where all the outstanding athletes 4 5 come from. (Laughter; catcalls.) 6 7 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: And I want you to know, I want the chamber to know I didn't 8 9 bring Floyd here. Others did. And so it's not 10 even me recognizing this. The only thing that I have against 11 12 Floyd is that when he was doing great things on the football field, I was playing baseball for 13 14 Syracuse. And the only thing I could say bad 15 about him, he didn't have enough guts to play 16 baseball. (Laughter, jeers.) 17 18 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: No, in all seriousness, this is a great day. Floyd is a 19 20 great person, great human being, great athlete. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill 14 15 is passed. 16 Senator Libous, that completes the noncontroversial reading of the supplemental 17 18 Rules calendar. 19 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 20 Mr. President. Could we now go to the 21 controversial reading of the supplemental 22 calendar. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 23 The Secretary will ring the bell. 24 25 The Secretary will read.

1 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 2 1217, by Member of the Assembly Magnarelli, Assembly Print 9691, Concurrent Resolution of the 3 4 Senate and Assembly. 5 SENATOR SQUADRON: Explanation. б ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: An 7 explanation has been requested, Senator Martins, 8 by Senator Squadron. 9 SENATOR MARTINS: Thank you, 10 Mr. President. This is a concurrent resolution at 11 the request of the Comptroller. 12 13 Since 1963, the state has authorized in 10-year increments, and has been 14 15 extended each 10-year interval after that, a 16 provision that would allow for local municipalities to bond or incur debt as a result 17 18 or for the purpose of sewage treatment. 19 It was originally proposed to be a 20 10-year period that would encourage local 21 municipalities to invest in sewage treatment 22 facilities. But again, as I stated, it has been extended every 10-year period since then. 23 This is a further extension, simply 24 25 because there is a continuing need. And the same

reasons that were in place that required this in 1 1963 and then 1973 and '83, '93, and 2003 2 continue to exist today. 3 4 There are new technologies, there 5 are increased expenses in modernizing and modifying sewage treatment plants, and to require 6 7 our local municipalities to absorb those expenses just seems unfair. And so consistent with public 8 policy as it has been developed and determined by 9 10 the Legislature over the course of literally the last 50 years, this merely seeks another 10-year 11 12 extender to allow for sewage treatment plants to be financed through our local municipalities. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 14 Senator 15 Squadron. SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you very 16 Thank you for that description. 17 much. 18 If the sponsor would yield. Mr. President, 19 SENATOR MARTINS: 20 I'd be happy to. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 21 The 22 sponsor yields. 23 SENATOR SQUADRON: Since this is a Concurrent Resolution and it has passed the other 24 25 house already this year, is there yet an opinion

from the Attorney General? 1 2 SENATOR MARTINS: Mr. President 3 through you, I have not seen an opinion from the Attorney General. It was presented at the 4 5 request of the Comptroller's office. And so I have not seen it. 6 SENATOR SQUADRON: If the sponsor 7 8 would continue to yield. 9 SENATOR MARTINS: Mr. President, 10 I'd be happy to. 11 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 12 sponsor yields. 13 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you very much. 14 15 And if the sponsor wouldn't mind 16 telling me when this bill was introduced in the Legislature. 17 18 SENATOR MARTINS: Mr. President, through you, I believe the bill was introduced 19 20 sometime within the last month. 21 SENATOR SQUADRON: If the sponsor 22 would continue to yield. 23 SENATOR MARTINS: Mr. President, to be more specific, it was introduced on 24 25 June 4th.

1 And I will be glad to continue to 2 yield. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 4 sponsor yields. 5 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you very much. 6 7 And obviously we're here at the end 8 of session, and this is something that has 9 occurred, and it's a Comptroller bill. Let me 10 just ask the sponsor, it's been in the Legislature about a week now. We don't yet have 11 12 an opinion from the Attorney General. Why is it so critical that this bill passes today rather 13 than having a little more time? 14 15 This is a 10-year extension. We'd like to have the opportunity to look a little 16 more fully at the effect. According to the memo, 17 18 you know, this is something that's been granted 178 times. 19 20 SENATOR MARTINS: Thank you, Mr. President. As a constitutional amendment, 21 22 and I'm sure the Senator is aware of this, it requires that it be passed by the Legislature in 23 two consecutive years and then be voted upon by 24 25 the public. As it has over the course of the

1 last 50 years, each 10 years.

2	So by passing this Concurrent
3	Resolution this year, that is only the first
4	step. It would require a second step next year,
5	which would also require another resolution from
6	this body as well as the Assembly, and then would
7	be placed on a vote.
8	And so, frankly, we do have time to
9	get an Attorney General opinion on this. This is
10	merely the first step. And so if there really
11	are concerns that were not there in 1963 or '73
12	or '83 or '93 or 2003, certainly we have the
13	opportunity over the next year to review those
14	and have the opportunity, should it be necessary
15	next year, simply not to pass the same
16	resolution.
17	SENATOR SQUADRON: If the sponsor
18	would continue to yield.
19	SENATOR MARTINS: Be happy to.
20	ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The
21	sponsor yields.
22	SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you very
23	much.
24	Just since it is before us today in
25	its initial stage, can you just take us through

the potential impact if it were not approved, if 1 the constitutional amendment were not approved 2 through the process that you just described? 3 The 4 impact on the ground for localities. 5 SENATOR MARTINS: The impact on localities, Mr. President, if this were not to be 6 7 approved is simply that local municipalities, in many instances towns or villages or cities, in 8 many instances also very small municipalities, 9 10 would have to incur literally tens if not hundreds of millions of dollars in modifications 11 12 to sewer treatment plants within their debt limit that would prohibit them then from having to 13 14 perhaps do infrastructure improvements elsewhere, 15 that those resources would be eliminated. I call to mind a hearing we held 16 where the supervisor of the Town of Riverhead 17 18 spoke about potentially having to spend literally \$200 million modernizing their sewer treatment 19 20 plant. Frankly, for a town of that size to spend \$200 million at the expense of perhaps using that 21 bonding authority to make infrastructure 22 improvements, I think is frankly unfair. 23 And so consistent with public 24 25 policy as it has been held in this state over the

last 50 years, they shouldn't have to make that 1 2 choice. 3 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you. Ιf 4 the sponsor would continue to yield. 5 SENATOR MARTINS: I would be happy to. Thank you, Mr. President. 6 7 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you. 8 Through you, Mr. President. So why not extend it beyond this 10 years? As you point 9 10 out, it's been done in '63, '73, '83, '93, 2003. It seems to be an exemption that tends to be 11 granted -- I'm sure there are exemptions to this, 12 but tends to be granted when it should be. It's 13 14 quite important to these localities. 15 Why sort of have an extender-type situation within the State Constitution? That 16 17 seems strange. 18 SENATOR MARTINS: Mr. President, through you. That's a valid point. Certainly if 19 20 it were to be extended perpetually rather than incrementally every 10 years, that would 21 certainly seem to make sense. 22 The resolution that we have before 23 us extends it for a further 10 years. It mirrors 24 25 a resolution that was passed in the Assembly

earlier. 1 2 And frankly, I would hope that in the future that if it is a long-term public 3 4 policy goal that we have stability in this vote 5 and we don't require that this issue be resolved every 10 years, certainly I would support that as 6 7 well. 8 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you, Mr. President. On the bill. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 10 Senator Squadron on the bill. 11 12 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you. 13 First of all, I really thank the sponsor for his very full explanation of the bill 14 15 and the purpose of the bill. 16 I do have a feeling, and this is true on this piece of legislation and a number of 17 18 others, that a piece of legislation being 19 introduced June 4th, being passed June 13th, not 20 yet in the case of a Concurrent Resolution to amend the Constitution having the Attorney 21 General's decision, is not really how we should 22 be legislating. And that is a concern I have. 23 I really appreciate the sponsor's 24 25 commitment that before this comes up in again in

1	the next term and I'll share that commitment
2	on this side of the aisle we should have a
3	fuller conversation about this, we should have
4	the Attorney General's opinion. Because that
5	really, when we're talking about amending the
6	Constitution, is how we should do things.
7	Certainly the purpose here is one
8	that has served well. It's one that the State
9	Comptroller believes we need to do. So I'm going
10	to not try to block it or to vote against it
11	today, certainly. But I do feel that just the
12	conversation we had today about whether this
13	should be a 10-year extender or a permanent
14	extender, that sort of actual real deep
15	consideration of bills, and especially of
16	constitutional amendments, is one that we must do
17	even here at the end of session when I know the
18	list is long and the time is short.
19	So I will vote yes on this bill.
20	Again, I really appreciate the sponsor's
21	explanation of it. I would urge the sponsor to
22	work with the State Comptroller on the
23	possibility of perhaps a longer extension or, if
24	there's a reason not to have that, perhaps that
25	calls the entire mechanism into question.

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So I'll vote yes today. I'll look 1 2 forward to further discussion and thought about it this before it comes up again in the next 3 4 calendar year. And I thank the sponsor. 5 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Seeing 7 and hearing no other Senator wishing to be heard, 8 the Secretary will ring the bell and the debate 9 is closed. 10 The Secretary will call the roll on the resolution. 11 (The Secretary called the roll.) 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Announce 14 the results. 15 THE SECRETARY: In relation to 16 Calendar 1217, Senator Maziarz recorded in the negative. 17 18 Ayes, 59. Nays, 1. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 19 The 20 resolution is adopted. 21 Senator Libous, that completes the 22 reading of the controversial Rules calendar. 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 Could you call on Senator Ruth

1 Hassell-Thompson at this point. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 3 Hassell-Thompson. 4 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank 5 you, Mr. President. There will be an immediate meeting 6 7 of the Democratic Conference in Room 315. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: There 9 will be an immediate meeting of the Democrat 10 Conference in Room 315. Senator Libous. 11 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, 12 there will be a meeting of the Rules Committee at 13 1:30 promptly, a meeting of the Rules Committee 14 15 at 1:30 promptly. I know that's a new word for the members of this house, but we're going to try 16 to teach them the definition. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: There will be a Rules Committee meeting at 1:30 19 20 promptly in Room 332. Until such time, the Senate stands 21 22 at ease. 23 (Whereupon, the Senate stood at ease at 12:49 p.m.) 24 25 (Whereupon, the Senate reconvened at

2:00 p.m.) 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The Senate will come to order. 3 4 Senator Libous. 5 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, I believe there's a report of the Rules Committee 6 7 at the desk. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 24 The 25 Rules report is accepted.

Senator Libous. 1 2 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, if 3 we can jump back to motions while we're passing 4 out the supplemental calendar. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: We will return to motions and resolutions. 6 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you. 7 8 On behalf of Senator Hannon, I wish 9 to call up his bill, Senate Print 7031, recalled 10 from the Assembly, which is now at the desk. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 The 12 Secretary will read. 13 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 819, by Senator Hannon, Senate Print 7031, an act 14 15 to amend the Public Health Law. 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: I now move to reconsider the vote by which this bill was 17 18 passed. List Number 1. 1 2 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 Senator Libous. 4 5 SENATOR LIBOUS: We're going to call up the controversial reading of the 6 7 calendar, please. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 9 Secretary will ring the bell. 10 The Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 11 12 1044, by Senator Gallivan, Senate Print 6747A, an act to amend the Environmental Conservation Law. 13 14 SENATOR BRESLIN: Explanation. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 16 Gallivan, Senator Breslin has requested an explanation. 17 18 SENATOR GALLIVAN: Thank you, Mr. President. 19 This bill would allow the 20 21 Department of Environmental Conservation to 22 promulgate standards to allow for a legalized crossbow-hunting season. It will also require 23 the DEC to adopt regulations for training and the 24 25 safe use of hunting with a crossbow.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 2 Oppenheimer. 3 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Well, I understand what Senator Gallivan is interested in 4 5 this bill, but we come from very different parts --6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 8 Oppenheimer, are you on the bill or are you --9 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: I'm sorry. 10 I guess I'm on the bill, yes. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 Senator 12 Oppenheimer on the bill. 13 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: I was saying that I understand why Senator Gallivan wants this 14 15 bill, but we do come from very different parts of the state. And in my area of the state, the 16 lower part of our state, we have pretty fair 17 18 restrictions on what can be done in the bow hunting season. 19 20 As some people may not understand, we have a bow hunting season in our state and we 21 22 have a gun hunting season in our state. What is happening here is the crossbow is being sought to 23 be utilized in that longbow period. It's a 24 25 shorter period in our state, much shorter than

1 our gun period for hunting.

2	And we understand that hunting is
3	very essential to our state, because we would
4	have a deer population that would simply starve
5	during the winter if we did not have a hunting
6	season. And the DEC looks very closely at how
7	many days are needed to reduce the population of
8	the deer to a certain level where they can
9	sustain themselves. So it's something we are
10	very supportive of.
11	But it should not be bow hunting,
12	it should not be crossbow hunting in a bow
13	hunting season. Because if you have ever seen a
14	crossbow, you would think it is a gun. You would
15	not think it is a normal longbow.
16	And it doesn't have the accuracy of
17	a gun. And it is potentially kind of lethal. It
18	certainly looks a whole lot more like a gun,
19	probably belongs in the gun hunting season, but
20	certainly doesn't belong in an area in the south
21	of our state. Because we have very large
22	populations, very dense populations, and this
23	kind of hunting has always been prohibited in
24	what we call longbow hunting season. Which is a
25	short period and usually utilized by the

1 youngsters of our state to start to hunt with the 2 longbow. And this is I think a very bad 3 bill. It is not the firearm season, it is the 4 5 longbow hunting season. They're very different and this certainly does not belong, the crossbow 6 7 does not belong in a densely populated area and 8 certainly not during the particular season that I 9 mentioned. So that's the other side of this 10 issue. I'll be voting no. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Gallivan. 13 14 SENATOR GALLIVAN: Thank you, 15 Mr. President. 16 And I apologize in advance if I do not address everything that Senator Oppenheimer 17 18 brought up; I wasn't able to hear everything. But just a couple of comments. 19 20 The IRS, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife 21 Service, the Archery Trade Association all 22 consider a crossbow archery equipment. I would 23 submit that the crossbows are more comparable to archery equipment than they are to firearms. 24 And 25 I would just -- I would bring up a couple of

1 points. Crossbows and other bows I believe 2 differ only in that once an arrow is cocked in a 3 4 crossbow, the string does not need to be 5 continuously held or pulled back until released. Modern compound bows and crossbows 6 7 share similar ballistic characteristics, the majority shooting the arrow between 300 and 8 9 350 feet per second. Firearms shoot a projectile 10 through the barrel at speeds of 2,000 to 3,000 feet per second. 11 We very often, when we're 12 discussing many different areas, look to the 13 experts, in this case the DEC. Senator 14 15 Oppenheimer raises very valid points that 16 downstate and upstate are different. Our populations are somewhat different, the density 17 18 of the populations, and the DEC takes that into account through different zones. So certain 19 20 things are allowed in some parts of the state and not in other parts of the state. 21 22 The bill that I am putting forward does not compel the DEC to allow this in every 23 single part of the state, it simply allows for it 24 25 if they as the experts deem it appropriate.

Finally, the DEC, in its management 1 2 plan for white-tail deer in New York State from 3 2012 through 2016, supports the use of crossbows 4 and points to the law that was enacted in 2010, 5 stating that it does not address deer management needs of our state. 6 7 Thank you, Mr. President. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank 9 you, Senator Gallivan. 10 Senator Oppenheimer. SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: 11 Thank you, Mr. President. 12 13 Perhaps we should have done a 14 question and answer, Senator Gallivan. 15 But I can assure you that downstate, most of the counties only permit 16 longbow hunting. We don't permit hunting with 17 18 guns. We are just too densely populated. And that is one reason that we feel very strongly 19 20 that the crossbow, which as I said, it has a siting, it has a trigger, it works a whole lot 21 like a gun. I have pictures which you will think 22 it is a gun. 23 Downstate it's just too dangerous 24 25 to have, where we limit so severely just to

longbow hunting for very good reasons, to protect 1 2 our population. 3 What is our purpose? Our purpose 4 is safety. That's why we're all here. One of 5 our main reasons for being in this chamber is to make sure our residents, the citizens of this 6 7 state, are safe. 8 There may be different rules that 9 can apply upstate, but I can assure you downstate 10 this is not a welcomed addition. Thank you. 11 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Is there 12 any other Senator wishing to be heard? 13 Seeing none, hearing none, the 14 15 debate is closed. 16 The Secretary will ring the bell. Read the last section. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Section 4. This act shall take effect immediately. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 21 roll. 22 (The Secretary called the roll.) 23 THE SECRETARY: In relation to Calendar Number 1044, those recorded in the 24 25 negative are Senators Adams, Diaz, Duane,

Gianaris, Hassell-Thompson, Johnson, Marcellino, 1 Montgomery, Oppenheimer, Peralta, Perkins, 2 3 Rivera, Sampson, Serrano, Smith, Squadron, 4 Stavisky and Stewart-Cousins. 5 Absent from voting: Senators Ball, Espaillat, Golden, Hannon and LaValle. б 7 Ayes, 37. Nays, 18. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill 9 is passed. 10 The Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 11 12 1188, by Senator Nozzolio, Senate Print 3747, an act to amend the Correction Law. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 14 15 Rivera. SENATOR RIVERA: 16 Thank you, Mr. President. If the sponsor would yield for a 17 18 few questions. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 20 Nozzolio, do you yield? SENATOR NOZZOLIO: 21 Yes, Mr. President. Before I yield, though, I'd like 22 to explain the legislation. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 24 Can we 25 have some order in the house, please {gaveling}.

1 SENATOR RIVERA: Mr. President, 2 there certainly will be an opportunity through the questions that I ask. Through you, 3 4 Mr. President, if the sponsor would yield --5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Rivera, the bill was laid aside, so I will allow 6 7 an explanation and then I will call upon you. 8 Senator Nozzolio. SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Thank you, 9 10 Mr. President. Simply stated, Mr. President, this 11 12 measure requires the State Department of Correctional Services to end a program known as 13 14 the conjugal visit program or, euphemistically, 15 as the family reunion program. That it's a way to save \$4 million, and this measure would do 16 just that on an annual operating basis. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank you, Senator Nozzolio. 19 20 Senator Rivera. SENATOR RIVERA: 21 Thank you, 22 Mr. President. If the sponsor would yield for a few questions. 23 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Mr. President, 24 25 I'd be happy to yield.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 2 sponsor yields. 3 SENATOR RIVERA: Thank you, Mr. President. 4 5 Senator Nozzolio, through you, Mr. President, are you familiar -б ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 7 8 Rivera, excuse me. 9 Again, in order to allow to 10 expedite the conversation, can I please have some order in the house. I'm going to ask all members 11 and staff to take conversations outside the 12 13 chamber. Senator Rivera. 14 15 SENATOR RIVERA: Thank you, 16 Mr. President. Again, through you. Senator 17 18 Nozzolio, are you familiar with the work of the Urban Institute? 19 20 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Mr. President, 21 is that the Urban Institute? Mr. Rivera? 22 SENATOR RIVERA: Yes, sir. 23 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: No, I am not, Mr. President. 24 25 SENATOR RIVERA: Through you,

1 Mr. President, if the sponsor would continue to 2 yield. 3 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Yes, Mr. President. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The sponsor yields. 6 7 SENATOR RIVERA: Through you, 8 Mr. President, the Urban Institute is a 9 nonpartisan economic and social policy research 10 outfit based out of D.C. And the reason I'm asking is because they do a lot of work as it 11 12 related to formerly incarcerated individuals and recidivism in particular. 13 So are you familiar with the --14 15 there's a series of studies that the Urban 16 Institute has done called "Returning Home." Are you familiar with those -- through you, 17 18 Mr. President, are you familiar with those studies? 19 20 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Mr. President, I'd like to know more about the Urban Institute. 21 Can Senator Rivera indicate who funds this 22 institute, where does their money come from, and 23 what other studies have they accomplished? 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator

Rivera, do you yield for that question? 1 2 SENATOR RIVERA: I would certainly yield for questions after I finish my set of 3 4 questions. 5 So again through you, Mr. President, is the sponsor aware of the 6 7 "Returning Home" set of studies that the Urban Institute has done over the years? 8 9 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Mr. President, 10 I don't know a thing about this institute. Ι don't know where they get their money, I don't 11 know what they do, how they're funded, who 12 supports them, who sponsors them. I must admit I 13 don't know anything about this institution. 14 15 Possibly Senator Rivera could enlighten us and provide some background about this institution. 16 SENATOR RIVERA: 17 Through you, 18 Mr. President, if the sponsor would continue to 19 vield. 20 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Yes, Mr. President, I'd be happy to yield. 21 22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The sponsor yields. 23 SENATOR RIVERA: While I would 24 25 love to on the record regale you with the story

of 40 years of studies of this particular 1 nonpartisan organization, for today I wanted to 2 see if -- through you, Mr. President -- we could 3 talk a little bit about a set of studies. And 4 5 the reason I asked you about them is because of the work that they've done as it refers to 6 7 recidivism and finding out what the impact -- or ways in which we can keep people from returning 8 9 to prison. 10 So there's a series of studies that they did particularly in Illinois and Maryland 11 there's a series of studies called "Returning 12 Home" that they have done. And as you admitted, 13 you're not familiar with these studies. 14 But in 15 your estimation -- I mean, you're not familiar with these studies, but in your estimation is 16 there an impact that family cohesion, let's say, 17 18 is there an impact on whether somebody -- does that impact, family cohesion, the idea of whether 19 20 people are -- that have a family, have connections with them through the time that they 21 are imprisoned, once they exit prison, does this 22 connection between them and their family through 23 the time that they were incarcerated, does that, 24 25 in your estimation, have an impact on whether

1 that person returns to prison or not? 2 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Mr. President, 3 I'd be happy to engage in this dialogue. But 4 with all due respect, there still are a number of 5 conversations going on in the chamber and it is difficult for me to hear all of the commentary of 6 7 Senator Rivera, which I very much want to hear and add to the strength of this debate. Could 8 you please demand order in the chamber. 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Again, I'm going to ask all the members, before I begin 11 12 to cite members specifically, if you would take your conversations outside the chamber. Please, 13 14 members who are engaging in conversations in the 15 chamber, please take your conversations outside 16 the chamber. SENATOR RIVERA: I think we're 17 good now, Mr. President. 18 19 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: You may 20 continue. 21 SENATOR RIVERA: Very well. Ι 22 will ask again, now that all the conversations are outside -- oh, you did --23 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: I don't think 24 25 that's necessary, Senator. Let me try, if I may

1 through the chair, to answer Senator Rivera's 2 question. Certainly I believe that there 3 4 should be family responsibility, family 5 connection. And in many cases the reason why an individual is incarcerated in the first place is 6 because there has been a breakdown of the 7 family -- the family structure, the family 8 discipline. A lot of issues of course are 9 10 involved with every individual who's incarcerated. But I believe that a common theme 11 12 throughout those who have committed crime is the fact that family responsibility and cohesiveness 13 14 and discipline and other issues were not 15 established. 16 Having said that, I also believe very strongly, Mr. President, that there should 17 18 be some connection between the family and those who are incarcerated. As a matter of fact, 19 20 members of this house encouraged and really established, through legislation, through direct 21 22 contact with prior governors, to eliminate a very costly prohibitive system where inmates' families 23 who were making long-distance phone calls into 24 25 their correctional facility to discuss issues

with their loved ones who are incarcerated, they 1 were paying exorbitant, exorbitant fees, far 2 beyond the market value of the phone call. 3 4 And those fees the Department of 5 Corrections said were funding programs. Frankly, though, I believe they were a significant 6 7 impediment to be able to contact individual 8 family connection. 9 So yes, Mr. President, I am aware 10 of the need to have a family connection. But this legislation strongly says that, although we 11 12 encourage family visiting and family phone calling, that the conjugal visit issue is one 13 that should be revisited and in effect eliminated 14 15 by this legislation. SENATOR RIVERA: Through you, 16 Mr. President, if the sponsor would continue to 17 18 yield. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 19 The 20 sponsor yields. 21 SENATOR RIVERA: Thank you, 22 Mr. President. So if I understand this correctly, 23 Senator Nozzolio, you are equating a phone call 24 25 to an in-person visit? Is that a correct

1 assumption? 2 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Mr. President, absolutely not. And maybe the chamber was still 3 too loud and Senator Rivera did not hear me. Let 4 5 me repeat it. That I strongly said that connection with family is important. And there 6 7 is no way in the world I was equating a family visit with a phone call. That certainly a visit 8 would be appropriate. 9 10 This legislation before us, Mr. President, does not eliminate visits. 11 There's no way it discourages visitation to 12 correctional facilities to visit inmates who are 13 14 incarcerated. What it says, though, is the state 15 is not going to pay for the design, production, and management of conjugal visits, which we 16 certainly know are visits of a different nature. 17 18 SENATOR RIVERA: Through you, Mr. President, if the sponsor would continue to 19 20 yield. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 21 The 22 sponsor yields. 23 SENATOR RIVERA: Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 So, Senator Nozzolio, again to

1 clarify, there are -- the program that we're talking about, either known as conjugal visits or 2 family reunion programs, do they -- right now do 3 4 they happen between incarcerated individuals and 5 their families, including their children? Is that correct? 6 7 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Yes, 8 Mr. President. 9 SENATOR RIVERA: Through you, 10 Mr. President, if the sponsor would continue to 11 vield. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 13 sponsor yields. 14 SENATOR RIVERA: So through you, 15 Mr. President, if then, as you admitted, you do not equate a phone call to an in-person visit --16 which I agree with you a hundred percent. 17 I talk 18 to my parents every week, call them once a week. And if I don't, my dad calls me and reminds me 19 20 that I have to do it. But I love seeing my folks in the same way that everyone in this chamber 21 likes to see their family. 22 So since you, as you admitted, do 23 not equate one with the other, and this is a 24 25 program which exists right now which facilitates

visits between incarcerated individuals and their 1 families, including their children, wouldn't the 2 elimination of this program actually make this 3 4 much more difficult and indeed, in some cases, 5 impossible? SENATOR NOZZOLIO: 6 Mr. President, 7 this legislation, to clarify does in no way 8 eliminate the opportunity for a family to visit 9 their loved ones in prison. Visitation is not 10 eliminated by this legislation. 11 We're simply saying that the normal 12 visiting hours are sufficient to do that type of visitation. That the expense, the management, 13 the maintenance of additional exclusive visiting 14 15 time should not be maintained by our taxpayers. I should also add that the 16 Department of Corrections is engaging in policies 17 18 that are upside down, in that those who are incarcerated in many ways for life, in many 19 20 instances for life, have the opportunity to have visitors every day at our maximum-security 21 22 facilities. In the medium-security facilities, visiting is much less frequently allowed. As a 23 matter of fact, it's allowed -- those who have 24 25 committed lesser crimes who have shorter

sentences are, by the Corrections Department's 1 own policies, having fewer visitors. And that 2 that, to me, doesn't make sense. We have at the 3 4 extreme, at the maximum-security inmate level, 5 where some who have been convicted of the most heinous crimes imaginable are allowed these types 6 7 of visitations. 8 And that this was brought to a 9 head, Senator, when a former governor one or two 10 governors ago established a major appropriation, close to a million dollars, to retrofit in one of 11 our maximum security facilities of this state, a 12 trailer system for conjugal private visits. At a 13 14 time when we were seeing school education 15 slashed, when we were seeing teachers losing their jobs, when we were seeing correction 16 officers lose their jobs, when we were seeing 17 18 prisons closed -- when all aspects of state government have to do more with less, at the same 19 20 time we were seeing a expenditure that I believe 21 and many believe, my constituents -- and frankly, there were 40,000 who visited my website and 22 demanded that this type of expenditure be cut. 23 And those weren't 40,000 just from 24 25 my district, it was from all across the state

asking for this type of expenditure to be cut, to 1 be not engaged in. And I respect those opinions 2 of the over 40,000 who emailed me, from all 3 4 New Yorkers, who indicated they believe this 5 expenditure was inappropriate in these tremendously difficult economic times. 6 7 So we're saying this is a choice. It's a choice that we're trying to make on behalf 8 9 of our taxpayers. That it's an expenditure well 10 over \$4 million a year that needs to be cut. And that's what the proposal is, to cut this specific 11 12 expenditure. It does not, to clarify Senator 13 14 Rivera's very telling questions, it does not cut 15 any visitation of inmates in the regular course of visitation hours established already by our 16 correctional facilities. It simply eliminates 17 18 the expense of this particular specific conjugal-visit program. 19 20 SENATOR RIVERA: Mr. President, on 21 the bill. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Rivera on the bill. 23 SENATOR RIVERA: Thank you, 24 25 Mr. President.

1	And again, thank you, Senator
2	Nozzolio. As we did last year, we will debate it
3	again in years to come, I am sure.
4	A few things. The studies that I
5	mentioned at the beginning from this
6	organization, which again the Urban Institute
7	and I would encourage the I will actually
8	bring some of the history over to Senator
9	Nozzolio. I would not bore everyone with the
10	history of this organization. But it is a
11	40-year organization that has produced
12	nonpartisan work on social issues and economic
13	issues.
14	And in this particular case it
15	has presented a series of studies that outline
16	the way in which family cohesion, connections
17	with family, impacts whether had a person goes
18	back to prison or not. And particularly when
19	we're talking about Illinois or Maryland, which
20	is where a lot of these numbers exist, the
21	connection is clear. When there is an individual
22	that has connection with their family while they
23	are incarcerated, they do not want to come back
24	and be incarcerated because they believe that
25	they have something to go back to.

An in-person visit, which is what 1 2 this family reunification program facilitates -it certainly does not guarantee it, but it 3 facilitates it. And that is really the 4 distinction here. 5 Senator Nozzolio spoke about 6 7 choices, and I certainly think that we've had many conversations on this floor about choices 8 9 that we have to make. 10 Now, most of those folks that are 11 incarcerated upstate are going to return home. 12 And when they return home, they're going to come to my district. They're going to come to 13 14 Yonkers, they're going to come to Brooklyn, 15 they're going to come to the South Bronx, they're going to come to Harlem. They're going to come 16 back. We don't want them to go back upstate. 17 We 18 want them to stay home. And to have -- this family program, this family reunion program 19 20 facilitates that. 21 I believe that it is a choice that 22 is a good choice. Four million dollars is an 23 expenditure, yes. But this expenditure actually facilitates thousands of these individuals not 24 25 wanting to commit more crimes.

1	I believe that when you have a
2	family member that has connection with their
3	children, that knows that they have committed a
4	mistake I had the opportunity just a few
5	months ago to go to a Parole Board hearing and
6	sit in the back while there was a lady who was
7	being interviewed by the Parole Board
8	commissioners. And they showed her a picture.
9	They said, "Do you know who this?" Immediately
10	when she saw the picture she started to weep.
11	She said, That's my daughter. And she's about
12	3, and I barely have seen her. I want to go back
13	to her."
14	What we're saying here is this is a
15	program that facilitates connections between
16	people incarcerated and people that are back
17	home. To eliminate this is not really, again,
18	about saving money.
19	Four million dollars, yes, it is a
20	chunk of change. But ultimately when we're
21	talking about whether these people return back to
22	prison, when all the studies have demonstrated
23	that family cohesion and family unity are one of
24	the things that most determine whether someone is
25	going to return to prison or not, to make the

1 choice to eliminate this program seems to me to continue what a lot of other bills that we've 2 considered both on this floor and in the 3 committee do. Just like the one that we talked 4 5 about yesterday, they are overly punitive and overly vindictive and ultimately are not good 6 7 policy. 8 If we want to make sure that these people go back to their homes -- I should say 9 10 come back to their homes. Come back to the Bronx, come back to Brooklyn, come back to Harlem 11 12 and stay there and become productive members of society, they need to have a reason to do so. 13 This is a program that facilitates that family 14 15 cohesion, facilitates that family unity, gives them a reason to stay back home and not go back 16 17 to prison. 18 Now, you're certainly right that if this bill were to become law it would not 19 20 prohibit family visitation. But it would certainly make it harder for the situation in 21 which children visiting their parents can happen. 22 And if this happens, then you're 23 going to have folks that are upstate that might 24 25 not be able to get on the phone to their

1 children. Their children might be too young to even get on the phone with them. And that 2 person-to-person interaction is eliminated. 3 4 I believe ultimately that this is a 5 bill that does not try to resolve a real policy issue but instead comes from a perspective of 6 7 saying if they are incarcerated, they not only deserve to be incarcerated but they deserve 8 9 everything that we do to be ultimately a 10 punishment. They are being punished already by being in prison. Let's not punish them further 11 by cutting off connections to their family and 12 therefore giving them no reason to want to come 13 back to my neighborhood and be productive members 14 15 of society. 16 I vote in the negative on this bill. Thank you. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Any other Senator wishing to be heard? 19 20 Seeing none, hearing none, the 21 debate is closed. 22 The Secretary will ring the bell. 23 The Secretary will read the last section. 24 25 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This

act shall take effect immediately. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 3 roll. (The Secretary called the roll.) 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Nozzolio to explain his vote. 6 7 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Thank you, 8 Mr. President. 9 Mr. President, I wish to thank my 10 colleagues and especially Senator Rivera for a very respectful and open discussion on an 11 important issue. That what we're trying to do 12 with this measure is save taxpayers dollars. In 13 tough economic times it becomes more and more 14 15 imperative. 16 And the over 40,000 citizens of this state who asked us to cut this particular 17 18 expenditure out of the budget makes all the dollars and sense in the world in terms of moving 19 20 New York forward. Spending less, creating more 21 effective and efficient state government is all 22 our objective, and it's the objective of the legislation before us. 23 Thank you, Mr. President, for a 24 25 very thoughtful debate to date, and that I very

much hope that we will enact this measure. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Nozzolio to be recorded in the affirmative. 3 4 Senator Diaz to explain his vote. 5 SENATOR DIAZ: Thank you, Mr. President. 6 7 Just to congratulate Gustavo Rivera, Senator Rivera for his explanation, and 8 to call to the attention of Senator Nozzolio that 9 10 when you say that you're doing it to protect and to save people's money, when you break the 11 12 family, when you break the family, you don't save 13 money. In the long run, you are going to spend 14 more money. 15 So I'm very impressed with what Senator Gustavo said about keeping families 16 together. And you on that side, you are the 17 18 Republican side. You are the side -- you are the pro-family side. You are the traditional family, 19 20 you are the protector of the family. You're supposed to be the protector of the family, the 21 pro-family, the unity. 22 And, you know, you're surprising me 23 now with this kind of breaking the family to save 24 25 \$4 million. At the end, at the end, ladies and

1 gentlemen, you're going to pay more. 2 So I'm voting no. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Diaz to be recorded in the negative. 4 5 Announce the results. б THE SECRETARY: In relation to 7 Calendar Number 1188, those recorded in the 8 negative are Senators Adams, Addabbo, Avella, 9 Breslin, Diaz, Dilan, Duane, Hassell-Thompson, 10 Montgomery, Oppenheimer, Parker, Peralta, Perkins, Rivera, Sampson, Savino, Smith, 11 12 Squadron, Stavisky, and Stewart-Cousins. colleagues for their support on this bill and 1 bring it to the floor of the Senate for a vote. 2 This bill takes a stand against the 3 4 financial exploitation of seniors and people with 5 disabilities. Whether we're talking about physical abuse, emotional abuse, or financial 6 exploitation, elder abuse is an increasingly 7 predominant concern as our aged population 8 9 increases. 10 To put it simply, elder abuse is a growing crisis. Between 2008 and 2009, 11 approximately 260,000 New Yorkers were victims of 12 elder abuse. What's worse is that a recent 13 statewide study estimated that the number of 14 15 elder abuse incidents in New York is nearly 24 times greater than the number of cases 16 referred to authorities. 17 18 That's absolutely appalling. There are people out there hurting and exploiting 19 20 senior citizens and getting away with it, and 21 this needs to change. This bill takes an important step 22 forward in strengthening laws against elder 23 Specifically, this legislation will enact 24 abuse. 25 tougher penalties for people who financially

exploit seniors and people with disabilities. 1 Ιt 2 gives law enforcement the tools they need to crack down on elder abuse by including the 3 financial exploitation of seniors within the 4 5 crime of larceny. Presently our state has no legal 6 7 provision that specifically addresses financial 8 abuse of seniors. This has led to instances 9 where prosecutors have not been able to bring 10 sufficient charges against people who have exploited vulnerable senior citizens or people 11 with disabilities. 12 13 This new section of the law will attack and prevent this crime while giving 14 authorities the authority they need to stop scam 15 artists from defrauding seniors. 16 With New York's population aging, 17 18 this problem will continue to get worse unless we 19 We need to step up our efforts to act now. 20 protect the most vulnerable New Yorkers. I thank my colleagues for supporting this important 21 22 measure to keep seniors safe and individuals with disabilities safe. 23 Mr. President, I vote aye. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator
