THE SECRETARY: Section 3. 11 This act shall take effect immediately. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Call the roll. 14 15 (The Secretary called the roll.) 16 THE SECRETARY: In relation to Calendar Number 1422, those recorded in the 17 18 negative are Senators Ball, Griffo, Maziarz, Nozzolio, O'Mara, Ritchie, Saland, Seward, 19 20 Stewart-Cousins and Young. 21 Ayes, 42. Nays, 10. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: The 23 bill is passed. THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 24 25 1423, by Senator Maziarz, Senate Print 7735A, an

act to amend the Public Health Law. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Read 3 the last section. 4 THE SECRETARY: Section 4. This 5 act shall take effect October 1, 2012. ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Call 6 7 the roll. 8 (The Secretary called the roll.) 9 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: 10 Senator Maziarz to explain his vote. SENATOR MAZIARZ: 11 Thank you very much, Mr. President. 12 13 Just very briefly, this legislation enacts the Safe Patient Handling 14 15 Act. This bill has been a long, long time being worked out and coming to fruition here. It's 16 going to result, I think, in better care for 17 18 patients and also going to result in better treatment of employees in nursing homes and 19 20 hospitals across this state. 21 I want to give a special shout-out to Roger Cook of WNYCOSH. His advocacy on behalf 22 of this legislation has been invaluable. 23 Also to Kaleida Health, a major 24

healthcare delivery system in Western New York.

25

1 Kaleida Health implemented the provisions of this legislation voluntarily several years ago, and it 2 has resulted in the savings of hundreds of 3 thousands of dollars in workers' compensation 4 5 costs. It has resulted in a steep reduction in the number of injuries to healthcare workers, and 6 7 it has resulted in an immeasurable amount of workdays that were not lost due to worker injury. 8 9 Mr. President, I vote in the 10 affirmative. Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: 11 Senator Maziarz to be recorded in the 12 affirmative. 13 14 Senator DeFrancisco to explain his 15 vote. 16 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Thank you. This bill has been a priority of 17 18 nurses for a long, long time, and the logic behind it is inescapable. If you have the 19 20 correct equipment, you're not only going to be more safely handle patients, but you're going to 21 eliminate some of the injuries that nurses 22 experience as a result of not having that 23 equipment to move patients from one place to the 24 25 other, from the bed to a chair or whatever it

1	might be.
2	And what was excellent about this
3	bill it was not an easy lift, because
4	obviously some hospitals, some of the most
5	powerful hospitals, the ones in the New York City
6	area, had fought it for years. And I want to
7	commend Senator Maziarz for listening not only to
8	the New York hospitals, other hospitals, nursing
9	homes, also to some suggestions that I had to
10	make the bill better, I thought to come to
11	this bill and actually get it to the point where
12	it's going to pass this house.
13	So it's an excellent joint effort.
14	It will save money in the long run, in reducing
15	workers' compensation claims. And most
16	importantly, it will help patients. So an
17	excellent bill, and I am proud to vote yes.
18	ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN:
19	Senator DeFrancisco's vote will be recorded in
20	the affirmative.
21	Senator Kennedy to explain his
22	vote.
23	SENATOR KENNEDY: Thank you very
24	much, Mr. President.
25	This is a major victory for

1 healthcare workers across New York State as well as those who rely on high-quality care in the 2 healthcare field. 3 4 The Safe Patient Handling bill is a 5 win/win for New Yorkers. I want to thank the sponsor, Senator Maziarz, for his leadership on 6 bringing this to the floor today. 7 8 This bill is going to improve care for patients, and it's going to improve working 9 10 conditions for nurses and other healthcare workers. 11 12 Prior to joining the Senate, I worked in the healthcare industry as an 13 occupational therapist for a number of years 14 15 ago. As I grew up in the healthcare industry, I also lived in the home where my mother is a nurse 16 and has worked for many years as a career in 17 18 nursing. 19 Nursing is one of the most 20 physically demanding jobs one can take up. The heavy lifting, the running, the patients in need, 21 the split-second decision-making -- we expect a 22 lot out of our nurses. Yet time and time again, 23 their work successfully leads to improved health 24 25 consequences and lives saved.

1 By empowering nurses with safe 2 patient handling tools such as engineering controls, lifting and transfer aids, as well as 3 assistive devices, we're going to help them 4 5 improve patient care and ensure better health for the patients as well as better health for the 6 7 workers. 8 Patient are going to enjoy safer, more comfortable healthcare experiences and see 9 10 dramatic reductions in the risk of falls, drops, cuts and bruises. 11 There's also great benefits for the 12 healthcare facilities: Improved quality of care, 13 higher worker retention rates, fewer on-the-job 14 15 injuries. That means even greater reputations for our healthcare institutions and reduced 16 17 costs. 18 Again, Mr. President, this is important legislation for New Yorkers who work in 19 20 the healthcare field as well as those who rely on high-quality healthcare. 21 22 I vote aye. Thank you. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Senator Kennedy's vote to be recorded in the 24 25 affirmative.

Senator Hannon to explain his vote. 1 2 SENATOR HANNON: Thank you, 3 Mr. President. 4 I rise to support this Safe Patient 5 Handling legislation. It's been a long time coming. For one thing, it marks a really 6 7 difficult chore of different unions who represent healthcare workers coming together and agreeing 8 upon a common cause. And for that we owe really 9 10 a debt of thanks to the AFL-CIO for bringing that 11 together. That being said, I must put a word 12 of caution in. Because while the patients will 13 be benefited, while the workers will be 14 15 benefited, and ultimately while the healthcare system will benefit because of lower costs, there 16 is a difficulty in implementing this that I've 17 18 heard from nursing homes, I've heard from hospitals. They are surprised, some are saying 19 20 "We're doing this already," some are saying "We'll never be able to do it." 21 We have a challenged healthcare 22 It's short of money, it's short of 23 system. personnel, it's short of cash, notwithstanding 24 25 the fact that people think there's a lot of

people going and using the healthcare system 1 2 right now. So this is a good step forward, but we're also going to make a commitment that we'll 3 4 have to support it as we go forward. 5 The Kaleida system has had spectacular numbers in improving things in its 6 7 system because of safe patient handling, but that 8 was because the Legislature appropriated money in HEAL grants to help the Kaleida system 9 10 reconstruct part of what they were doing. So we're going to have to remember that as we go 11 12 forward in our budget-making process in the next several years. 13 14 And I rise in support. Thank you, 15 Mr. President. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Senator Hannon's vote to be recorded in the 17 18 affirmative. Announce the results. 19 20 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 51. Nays, 1. Senator O'Mara recorded in the negative. 21 22 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: The bill is passed. 23 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 24 25 1425, by Senator Ranzenhofer, Senate Print 7769,

an act to amend the State Finance Law. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Read 3 the last section. THE SECRETARY: Section 21. 4 This 5 act shall take effect on the 120th day. ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Call 6 7 the roll. 8 (The Secretary called the roll.) 9 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 52. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: The bill is passed. 11 12 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 1426, substituted earlier by the Assembly 13 Committee on Rules, Assembly Bill Number 10784, 14 15 an act to amend the Insurance Law. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Read the last section. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Section 3. This act shall take effect on the 180th day. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Call 21 the roll. 22 (The Secretary called the roll.) ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: 23 Senator Young to explain her vote. 24 25 SENATOR YOUNG: Thank you,

Mr. President. 1 2 I've been working on a wage deduction bill for the past nearly three years, 3 4 and this piece of -- oh, sorry. Wrong bill. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Announce the results. 6 7 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 53. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: The bill is passed. 9 10 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 1427 --11 12 SENATOR LIBOUS: Lay it aside temporarily. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: 14 The 15 bill is laid aside temporarily. 16 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 1448, by Senator Hannon, Senate Print 7773, an 17 18 act to amend the Public Health Law. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Read 20 the last section. 21 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 22 act shall take effect immediately. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Call the roll. 24 25 (The Secretary called the roll.)

Ayes, 53. 1 THE SECRETARY: 2 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: The bill is passed. 3 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 4 5 1449, substituted earlier by Member of the Assembly DenDekker, Assembly Print 9380B, an act 6 7 to amend the Executive Law. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Read 9 the last section. 10 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This act shall take effect on the 180th day. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Call the roll. 13 (The Secretary called the roll.) 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Senator DeFrancisco to explain his vote. 16 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, I'm 17 18 going to vote no. I fully understand that this bill 19 20 establishes a voluntarily surveillance access database and that it's voluntary. I understand 21 22 that. But whenever we pass one of these bills, whether it's cameras for buses, whether it's 23 cameras for stoplights, whether it's cameras for 24 25 some other law enforcement purpose, I can't help

1 but remembering a book I read in the early '60s 2 that seemed so far in the future, called 1984. And we're getting closer and closer 3 4 to this George Orwellian state where we're going 5 to have so many video cameras, even though it's voluntary, people whose legitimate actions, 6 7 legitimate movements are going to be recorded by so many different people and so many different 8 agencies -- that's not a good thing, in my mind. 9 10 So whether this is voluntary or not, I vote nay. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Senator DeFrancisco's vote is recorded in the 13 14 negative. 15 Announce the results. 16 THE SECRETARY: In relation to Calendar 1449, those recorded in the negative are 17 18 Senators Avella, Breslin, DeFrancisco, Dilan, Gianaris, Griffo, Hannon, Kennedy, Krueger, 19 20 Larkin, LaValle, Nozzolio, Oppenheimer, Parker, Peralta, Perkins, Ranzenhofer, Rivera, Saland, 21 Serrano, Squadron, Stavisky and Stewart-Cousins. 22 23 Ayes, 34. Nays, 23. ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: 24 The 25 bill is passed.

1 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 2 1450, by Senator Ritchie, Senate Print 7778, an act to amend the Public Health Law. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Read 5 the last section. THE SECRETARY: Section 2. 6 This 7 act shall take effect immediately. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Call 9 the roll. 10 (The Secretary called the roll.) 11 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 57. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: The bill is passed. 13 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 14 15 1451, by Senator Flanagan, Senate Print 7783, an 16 act to amend the Education Law. ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: 17 Read 18 the last section. THE SECRETARY: Section 22. This 19 20 act shall take effect July 1, 2012. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: Call the roll. 22 (The Secretary called the roll.) 23 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 57. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: The

1 bill is passed. 2 Senator Krueger, why do you rise? SENATOR KRUEGER: Please excuse 3 4 me; I don't need to speak. I can fill out a form 5 for Rule 9. Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT STOROBIN: 6 7 Senator Libous, that completes the reading of the noncontroversial calendar. Thank you. 8 9 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you. 10 At this time, Mr. President, we will take up the controversial calendar. No, no, 11 12 no, noncontroversial. Hang on a second. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Can we 13 have some order in the chamber, please. 14 15 SENATOR LIBOUS: Yeah, that would be helpful. 16 Mr. President, earlier we laid 17 aside, temporarily, Calendar Number 594. So 18 could we have the noncontroversial reading of 19 20 that. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The Secretary will read. 22 23 THE SECRETARY: On page 14, Senator Grisanti moves to discharge, from the 24 25 Committee on Rules, Assembly Bill Number 10585A

and substitute it for the identical Senate Bill 1 Number 6268D, Third Reading Calendar 594. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 The substitution is so ordered. 4 5 The Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 6 7 594, by the Assembly Committee on Rules, Assembly 8 Print 10585A, an act to amend the Environmental 9 Conservation Law. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Read the last section. 11 12 THE SECRETARY: Section 3. This act shall take effect May 1, 2013. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 14 15 roll. 16 (The Secretary called the roll.) 17 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 18 Grisanti to explain his vote. 19 SENATOR GRISANTI: Yes, thank you, 20 Mr. President. 21 My fellow colleagues, this is an important piece of legislation that's passed the 22 Assembly. And the premise is quite simple. Our 23 constituents across the state need to know how 24 25 safe it is to use the water.

In this day and age, it's almost 1 2 unthinkable that New Yorkers would be allowed to swim, fish, kayak without receiving any warning 3 4 of any recent discharge of sewage into the water, 5 yet this happens all too frequently. This bill creates a mechanism to 6 7 alert the people of any sewage spills into the 8 water that people use for recreational or commercial activities. This will be achieved 9 10 without, and I stress without imposing any burden, financial burden on municipalities. 11 While the purpose of this bill is 12 notification, the larger issue is the discharge 13 in municipalities, the overflow in the sewer 14 15 infrastructures. Combined sewer overflow discharge, tens of billions of gallons of dirty 16 water each year. Municipalities across the state 17 18 are making substantial improvements and managing the stormwater runoff and reducing these 19 20 discharges in compliance with their permits with 21 the DEC. But this legislation will serve to 22 educate the public on the need for continued 23 investment to improve our sewage delivery system 24 25 and ultimately prevent pollutage of our public

1 waters. I want to thank Senate counsel, I 2 want to thank my staff for their time and effort 3 4 from this legislation. 5 We have no opposition from the New York Conference of Mayors, New York State б 7 Association of Counties, New York State 8 Association of Towns, NYWEA, New York Water 9 Associates. 10 We have support from the DEP, DEC, Riverkeeper, New York League of Conservation 11 Voters, Adirondack Council, Citizens Campaign for 12 the Environment, and Long Island Lobby 13 Coalition. 14 15 This is an important step to protect our public about sewer discharges. I 16 vote aye, Mr. President. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Grisanti to be recorded in the affirmative. 19 20 Senator LaValle to explain his 21 vote. 22 SENATOR LaVALLE: Thank you, 23 Mr. President. I want to compliment Senator 24 25 Grisanti for this legislation and the hard work

by the staff to put this together. 1 2 Every year I host an environmental roundtable in my district, and it's quite an 3 event. As a matter of fact, it has grown each 4 5 year. The discussion each year is usually about 6 open space. This year it was about water, sewage 7 discharge, and what this bill is all about. 8 So I vote in the affirmative, 9 Mr. President. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator LaValle to be recorded in the affirmative. 11 Announce the results. 12 13 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 53. Nays, Senators Farley, Griffo, Little and Seward 14 4. 15 recorded in the negative. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill is passed. 17 18 Senator Libous. 19 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, 20 there was another bill laid aside earlier today 21 on the noncontroversial reading, temporarily. It would be Calendar Number 1427, by Senator Young. 22 If we could take that up right now. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 24 The 25 Secretary will read.

1 THE SECRETARY: On page 38, 2 Senator Young moves to discharge, from the Committee on Rules, Assembly Bill Number 10785 3 and substitute it for the identical Senate Bill 4 5 Number 7790, Third Reading Calendar 1427. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 The 7 substitution is ordered. 8 The Secretary will read. 9 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 10 1427, by the Assembly Committee on Rules, Assembly Print Number 10785, an act to amend the 11 Labor Law. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Read the last section. 14 Section 3. 15 THE SECRETARY: This 16 act shall take effect on the 60th day. 17 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 18 roll. (The Secretary called the roll.) 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 21 Young to explain her vote. 22 I'm going to ask for order in the 23 chamber so we can hear the Senator explain her 24 vote. 25 Senator Young.

1 Thank you, SENATOR YOUNG: 2 Mr. President. This is an issue that I've been 3 4 working on for nearly three years. It's great 5 for employers and great for employees. And we've been working very hard in 6 7 the Senate to change the direction of the state, 8 to grow the economy and make our state even more 9 competitive from a business sense. We've made 10 great progress by working closely with Governor Cuomo. And through our partnership, we are 11 12 sending a clear message that New York State indeed is open for business. 13 It's my belief that this bill will 14 15 give the Commissioner of Labor the ability to exercise regulatory action to encourage a more 16 business-friendly environment in our state. 17 18 So I'd like to thank everyone for their support on this measure. It will be passed 19 20 by the Assembly, it's my belief. So I 21 enthusiastically vote yes and urge all of my 22 colleagues to do the same. 23 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 24 Senator 25 Young will be recorded in the affirmative.

Announce the results. 1 2 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 57. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill 3 4 is passed. 5 Senator Libous, that's the end of the noncontroversial temporary lay-asides. б 7 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 8 Mr. President. Could we go back to reports of 9 10 standing committees. I believe there's a report of the Judiciary Committee at the desk. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Reports of standing committees. 13 There is a report of the Judiciary 14 15 Committee at the desk. The Secretary will read. 16 THE SECRETARY: Senator Bonacic, from the Committee on Judiciary, reports the 17 18 following nominations. 19 As a judge of the Court of Claims, April A. Newbauer, of Brooklyn. 20 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Bonacic. 22 23 SENATOR BONACIC: Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 The Judiciary Committee met

earlier, and we reviewed --1 2 SENATOR LIBOUS: Excuse me, 3 Senator Bonacic, if I may. 4 SENATOR BONACIC: Sure. 5 SENATOR LIBOUS: If I could. This is very important, these 6 7 nominations. If I could ask staff to leave the 8 chamber if you're not discussing something with a 9 member. If members need to discuss business, 10 we've got tables outside of the chamber. These nominations are extremely 11 important to this house. We need to have order 12 and move forward. 13 Thank you, Mr. President. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank 16 you, Senator Libous. Senator Bonacic. 17 18 SENATOR BONACIC: Thank you, Mr. President. 19 20 We've had six excellent people come 21 before us this morning in the Judiciary Committee 22 with exemplary qualifications. The Governor has nominated all six of them. And I want to thank 23 the Governor for putting these excellent people 24 25 before this house.

I'd like to now briefly speak on 1 2 April Newbauer. She's here with her husband, Nicholas, and also her children, Rachel, Justin 3 4 and Simon. And we welcome them all today. 5 I move the nomination for Ms. Newbauer for the Court of Claims. 6 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 7 Thank 8 you, Senator Bonacic. 9 Senator Adams. 10 SENATOR ADAMS: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. President. 11 12 I just want to second and join my colleague on his comments on comments about Judge 13 Newbauer. She lives in my district, and I 14 15 interact with her frequently. And I really appreciate what she was done around being a 16 member of Legal Services, and we look forward to 17 18 having her on the bench. 19 And I appreciate and commend the 20 Governor on this appointment. 21 Thank you, Mr. President. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank you, Senator Adams. 23 24 Senator Krueger. 25 SENATOR KRUEGER: Thank you.

I would also like to second the 1 2 nomination of April Newbauer. I have known April for many years in her work on behalf of the Legal 3 Aid Society in a number of different functions. 4 5 She is an extraordinary attorney. She has enormous compassion for people in need of 6 7 appropriate response from our judicial system. I 8 can't think of a better person to be joining the 9 court. 10 And I know that she will give everyone who comes before her in her courtroom 11 her full attention and ensure that the laws of 12 the State of New York are administered correctly, 13 14 fairly, and with heart. I'm very pleased to see 15 her becoming a judge in the Court of Claims. Thank you, Mr. President. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 17 Thank 18 you, Senator Krueger. 19 Senator Smith. 20 SENATOR SMITH: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 21 22 And I also rise to second the nomination of April Newbauer. Just as some of my 23 colleagues before me have indicated, her work 24 with Legal Aid, what she has done, she provides 25

the kind of temperament that is necessary to 1 2 dispense justice from the bench. I congratulate our chairman, 3 4 Senator Bonacic, for reviewing her background 5 through the committee, and also the Governor on her selection. 6 7 And to April Newbauer, I say good luck to you. And if you continue to do the work 8 as you've done for many people throughout the 9 10 City of New York -- and we've had firsthand experience with you -- I'm quite sure you will do 11 12 a great job. So congratulations to you. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 14 question is on the nomination of April A. 15 Newbauer, of Brooklyn, to serve as a judge of the 16 Court of Claims. All in favor signify by saying 17 aye. 18 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 19 Opposed? 20 (No response.) 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: April A. 22 Newbauer has been confirmed as a judge of the Court of Claims. 23 Congratulations. We welcome you to 24 25 the chamber.

(Applause.) 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The Secretary will read. 3 4 THE SECRETARY: As a judge of the 5 Court of Claims, Stephen J. Lynch, of Speonk. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Senator 7 Bonacic. 8 SENATOR BONACIC: Thank you, 9 Mr. President. 10 Mr. Lynch is up for the Court of Claims for a term that would expire March 22nd in 11 12 2021. Again, he was unanimously approved by the members of the Judiciary Committee, and I would 13 move the nomination to the floor. 14 15 And I'd like you, Mr. President, to recognize Senator LaValle. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 17 Senator 18 LaValle. 19 SENATOR LaVALLE: Thank you very 20 much, Senator Bonacic. 21 It is with great pleasure that I 22 rise to second the nomination of Stephen J. Lynch, for Court of Claims, who lives in the town 23 of Southampton. He is well-qualified by 24 25 education, experience -- 17½ years as the

principal law clerk to two Supreme Court justices 1 2 in the 10th Judicial District -- and he is also qualified by temperament. 3 I second his nomination. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The question is on the nomination of Stephen J. Lynch has been confirmed as a judge of the 13 Court of Claims. 14 15 Congratulations, and we wish you 16 the best of luck. (Applause.) 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 19 Secretary will read. 20 THE SECRETARY: As interim justice 21 of the Supreme Court, Ninth Judicial District, 22 Martin I. Efman, of Huntington. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Bonacic. 24 25 SENATOR BONACIC: Thank you,

Mr. President. 1 2 Again, I know I'm repeating myself, but this gentleman was unanimously approved by 3 the Judiciary Committee. Exemplary 4 5 qualifications. And I'd like to move the nomination for confirmation to the floor. 6 7 And I'd like to refer it to Senator 8 Marcellino for comments. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 10 Marcellino. SENATOR MARCELLINO: 11 Thank you, Mr. President. 12 I rise to second the nomination of 13 Martin I. Efman for a term at the Supreme Court 14 15 in the Ninth Judicial District. While I must admit that Judge Efman 16 is a resident of Huntington, and I represent 17 18 Huntington -- for many years -- he and I have never met. However, I have heard of him, and I 19 20 have heard about him through reputation and through the legal community, in which he is 21 well-respected. He's also well-qualified to do 22 this very job in a very important court in our 23 24 state. 25 So it's with pleasure that I second

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 The 4 question is on the nomination, as interim justice 5 of the Supreme Court, of Martin I. Efman. All in favor signify by saying aye. 6 7 (Response of "Aye.") 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 9 (No response.) 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Martin I. Efman has been confirmed as an interim justice 11 of the Supreme Court, Ninth Judicial District. 12 13 (Applause.) ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 14 Senator 15 Bonacic. 16 SENATOR BONACIC: Mr. President, I was remiss, I did not introduce the judge's 17 18 bride, Allison, that's with him today. Welcome. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 19 we 20 welcome you to the chamber. 21 (Applause.) 22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The Secretary will read. 23 As judge of the 24 THE SECRETARY: 25 Court of Claims, Jeffrey A. Goodstein, of

Rockville Centre. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 3 Bonacic. 4 SENATOR BONACIC: Thank you. 5 Judge Goodstein is up for the Court of Claims. He's from Rockville Centre. He's a 6 7 constituent of Senator Skelos. His term is going to expire on July 31, 2014. 8 9 And again, we move his nomination to the floor for confirmation. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 11 12 Skelos. 13 SENATOR SKELOS: Mr. President, I rise to second the nomination of Jeff Goodstein 14 15 for a position on the Court of Claims. I've had the opportunity to know 16 Jeff and his family -- I know Alyce and Alex and 17 18 Max -- for many years. And he is not just a good citizen within the community of Rockville Centre, 19 20 president of his temple, he's also worked within the court system for years, really has 21 distinguished himself. And I know with certainty 22 that he will be an excellent judge of the Court 23 of Claims. 24 25 So it's my pleasure to second the

1 nomination. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank 3 you, Senator Skelos. 4 The question is on the nomination 5 of Jeffrey A. Goodstein as a judge of the Court of Claims. All in favor signify by saying aye. 6 7 (Response of "Aye.") 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 9 (No response.) 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Jeffrey A. Goodstein has been confirmed as a judge of the 11 Court of Claims. 12 Congratulations, Judge. 13 14 (Applause.) 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The Secretary will read. 16 THE SECRETARY: As a judge of the 17 Court of Claims, Joseph A. Zayas, of Little Neck. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 19 Senator 20 Bonacic. SENATOR BONACIC: 21 Thank you, 22 Mr. President. I want to talk a little bit about 23 Judge Zayas. He's with his bride, Catherine, 24 25 today, and their kids, Nicole and Zachary. He

also brought some friends, Appellate Judge 1 2 Rolando Acosta and a guest, Rosalie Vasquez. We welcome you all to Albany. 3 4 Judge Zayas is from Little Neck. 5 His term will expire on May 6, 2019, if confirmed, which we expect. 6 7 And I move the nomination at this 8 time. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank 10 you, Senator Bonacic. Senator Smith. 11 12 SENATOR SMITH: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 13 I rise to second the nomination of 14 15 Judge Zayas. Again, someone who has represented the temperament of judicial excellence. I think 16 he will do a fine job in the State of New York 17 18 and we'll be very proud of his record. 19 His wife, Catherine, is with him. 20 And I would say congratulations to Judge Zayas. I look forward to you doing some 21 22 great work as you have done in the past. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank you, Senator Smith. 24 25 Senator Perkins.

Zayas has been confirmed as a judge of the 13 Court of Claims. 14 15 Congratulations, Judge. 16 (Applause.) 17 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 18 Secretary will read. 19 THE SECRETARY: As interim justice 20 of the Supreme Court, Tenth Judicial District, 21 George R. Peck, of Williston Park. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 23 Bonacic. 24 SENATOR BONACIC: Thank you, 25 Mr. President.

1 And our last nominee is Judge 2 Peck. He's here with his bride, Patricia. 3 And let me explain, I've been using the word "bride" -- I don't want you to think 4 5 that all of these nominees just got married. They didn't. It's a term I use. They've 6 7 probably been married a long time. 8 Judge Peck comes with extensive 9 experience, having extended himself in public 10 service for many, many years. And we move the nomination to the floor to be confirmed. 11 I'd like Senator Martins to 12 13 comment. 14 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 15 Martins. 16 SENATOR MARTINS: Thank you, Mr. President. 17 18 I rise to second the nomination of George Peck. I have had the pleasure of knowing 19 20 Judge Peck for, gosh, probably close to 30 years, which is a long time. 21 22 I am pleased to second his nomination. Judge Peck graduated from Hofstra 23 University, went on to St. John's University 24 25 School of Law and also New York University School

1 of Law. He's a great community member. 2 He's here with his wife, Patricia. I know him as also not only a wonderful husband, 3 4 father, but also a great grandfather, a person 5 who gives back to the community. But he is the jurist's jurist. 6 7 He's a person who's committed his life to public 8 service. He has tried more homicide cases in Nassau County than any other assistant district 9 10 attorney in the history of Nassau County. He's been an exemplary judge on the bench, not only as 11 12 a District Court judge but as an acting Supreme Court judge for the past 10 years. 13 I am proud and privileged to second 14 15 his nomination and looking forward to our colleagues' support and a quick confirmation. 16 Congratulations. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank you, Senator Martins. 19 20 The question is on the nomination of George R. Peck as an interim justice of the 21 Supreme Court, Tenth Judicial District. All in 22 favor signify by saying aye. 23 (Response of "Aye.") 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed?

1 (No response.) 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Judge 3 George R. Peck has been confirmed as an interim 4 justice of the Supreme Court. 5 Congratulations. б (Applause.) 7 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 8 Libous, that completes the Judiciary report. 9 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 10 Mr. President. Could you call on Senator Breslin 11 at this time. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Breslin. 14 15 SENATOR BRESLIN: Thank you, 16 Mr. President. 17 There will be an immediate meeting 18 of the Democratic Conference in Room 315, 19 immediate and important. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: There 21 will be an immediate meeting of the Democrat 22 Conference in Room 315. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 13 14 (No response.) 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 16 Committee on Rules report is accepted. Senator Libous. 17 18 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, give me about 60 seconds. (Pause.) 19 20 Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 21 22 Libous. 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: We're going to do the noncontroversial reading of the supplemental 24 25 calendar, Calendar Number 61A, but we're going to

do it in a different order. I'm going to ask if 1 we could please take up Number 1502 first. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 We can. 4 Senator Libous. And the Secretary will read. 5 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 1502, by the Senate Committee on Rules, Senate 6 7 Print 7792, an act to amend the Education Law. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Read the 9 last section. 10 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2012. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the roll. 13 (The Secretary called the roll.) 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Flanagan to explain his vote. 16 SENATOR FLANAGAN: Thank you, 17 18 Mr. President. 19 This is a very significant, very 20 important, critical bill for the State of New York, for education, for students, teachers, 21 parents. And I'm glad that we are moving on this 22 bill, I'm glad we're passing this bill. But I 23 want to briefly put this in context. 24 25 I think every one of us recognizes

that we have very significant challenges in the 1 area of education in the State of New York. 2 As we move ahead, we have to look at some of the 3 4 things we've done well and places where we can 5 improve. When you look at teacher 6 7 evaluations, you look at student outcomes, you look at test scores, when you look at the status 8 of education in the State of New York, it's kind 9 10 of like moving a hitting target. There's a lot of things going on at once, and there's a lot of 11 12 very significant changes coming from the federal government that affect how we operate here in the 13 State of New York. 14 So I don't think that we should be 15 looking at this in isolation in any way, shape or 16 form. If you look at the law that we passed 17 18 regarding evaluations, the idea is to improve teacher performance to ultimately enhance student 19 20 outcomes in a variety of different ways -- test scores, college readiness, many things that 21 22 anyone can think of. 23 I believe this bill strikes a good balance, but we have to be very careful and 24 25 judicious in two ways. Number one, we have to be

prepared that this is fluid and that some of 1 2 these things are going to change over the next six months to a year and thereafter. And 3 4 everyone has acknowledged that, including the 5 Executive. This is a work in progress, which 6 7 is frustrating to a lot of us as well as to the people who are affected by it. But we got 8 9 talking about student outcomes; it is very, very 10 important that we continue to focus on this. Second, perhaps more important 11 12 thing, many of our colleagues have shared concerns about how do you find and strike that 13 appropriate balance: How do you advocate for 14 15 disclosure to give information to the public and parents, and how do you protect the privacy 16 interests and the rights of teachers who we're 17 18 asking to stand in front of a classroom and do a very good job for our kids? 19 20 In this legislation we often talk about legislative intent. I believe the intent 21 22 regarding this is to strike that balance. And I want to focus on one area. 23 This isn't so much for the City of 24 25 New York and bigger school districts, but when we

1 talk about disclosing information to the public and looking about not releasing personally 2 identifying information, I would like to state 3 for the record that the State Education 4 5 Department has to work very hard to make sure that in our rural schools, when you're talking 6 7 about class, subject, grade and things of that nature, that we don't have people's names out 8 there floating out in the public. 9 10 That is a potential issue. And I am very hopeful, having spoken with the Executive 11 12 and working closely with the State Education Department, that they will interpret that 13 properly so we do achieve that balance. 14 15 Again, teacher performance, ultimately what do we do about student outcomes. 16 And this is a step in the right direction. 17 I am 18 voting in the affirmative. 19 Thank you, Mr. President. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Flanagan to be recorded in the affirmative. 21 22 Senator Smith to explain his vote. SENATOR SMITH: Thank you very 23 much, Mr. President. 24 25 Let me first rise to congratulate

the Governor on a bill that I believe will be 1 quite transformational for the school system in 2 this state. I think it's also important that we 3 4 recognize the information that will be gathered 5 by this law. I do hope that it will be used for the right purposes. 6 7 As we all know, the most important 8 thing, as Senator Flanagan indicated earlier, is how best this is utilized for the purpose of 9 educating our children. Our children today compete on a world stage. They are competing

8 thing, as Senator Flanagan indicated earlier, is

10 educating our children. Our children today
11 compete on a world stage. They are competing
12 with everyone around the world. In order for us
13 to be competitive with other students around the
14 world as we look for the future of this state and
15 this country, our students have to be
16 well-educated.

Our teachers, who do a great job, 17 18 and from time to time are not thanked for the job they do, also need to know that we are here for 19 20 the benefit of what they do and to help them. They should not look at this as a challenge to 21 22 their performance, but one in which we all are coming together to find that appropriate mix. 23 As Senator Flanagan did say 24 25 earlier, there are a number of pieces, a number

1 of moving parts to this particular legislation. It clearly will go through some morphing over the 2 3 next six months to a year. As you know, there 4 was a lawsuit last year where UFT had lost, and 5 it became a full disclosure of information. And now that particular decision that was rendered by 6 7 the court system is now being superseded by this 8 bill. 9 I'm not sure if that will 10 withstand. I do hope it does. But at the end of the day I would hope, as we move through this 11 12 particular law and it does go through some morphing over the next six to seven months, that 13 we are all very open-minded. The goal here is to 14 15 have a first-class educational system where the teachers perform well, where the students receive 16 the academic instruction very well so they can go 17 18 on and perform their particular duties in life, whether they're going to be senators, doctors and 19 20 lawyers. But again, for the benefit of our 21 society, I'll be voting aye, Mr. President. 22 Thank you very much. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 24 Senator 25 Smith to be recorded in the affirmative.

1 Senator Squadron to explain his 2 vote. 3 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you, 4 Mr. President. 5 This bill is obviously one of the most talked about here at the end of this year's 6 7 session that is actually seeing the light of day. And I'm glad it is. And I think it's 8 another reminder that we need to really invest in 9 10 an evaluation and testing system in this state more than we have. And we need a better one than 11 12 we have, frankly, as its importance increases due to the issues Senator Flanagan and Senator Smith 13 have talked about. 14 15 So let's take this as a reminder, as we go into next year's budget, as we continue 16 to think about education policy in this state, 17 18 that we don't have tests or an evaluation system that live up to our goals for our education 19 20 system. 21 In addition, it's a real shame that 22 such an important bill is sponsored by the Rules Committee. It is being voted on on the 23 floor, which is an improvement over some other 24 25 important issues here at the end of session. But

I wish we had a sponsor on it who actually had 1 voters and existed. 2 3 So I will vote aye today, disappointed that it is Rules bill. Thank you. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Squadron to be recorded in the affirmative. 6 7 Announce the results. 8 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 58. Nays, 9 1. Senator Lanza recorded in the negative. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill 10 is passed. 11 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Libous. 14 15 SENATOR LIBOUS: I will call an 16 immediate meeting of the Higher Education Committee in Room 332, an immediate meeting of 17 18 the Higher Education Committee in 332. And we will continue with the supplemental list in a 19 20 second. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: There 22 will be an immediate meeting of the Higher Education Committee in Room 332. 23 Session will continue. attending the committee meetings? 1 2 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President. We will invoke Rule 9 for the 3 4 committee meeting members if there are any 5 controversial votes or any no votes that need to take place. 6 7 Mr. President, can I have some 8 order in the chamber. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Some 10 order in the chamber, please {gaveling}. Senator Libous. 11 12 SENATOR LIBOUS: Earlier today, Mr. President, there were some bills laid aside, 13 and we'd like to take those bills up at this 14 15 time. 16 And we are on the active list from earlier this morning. And we are calling up 17 18 Calendar Number 374, by Senator Flanagan. The bill was laid aside earlier today. We are on the 19 controversial reading. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 21 The Secretary will ring the bell. 22 23 The Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 24 25 374, by Senator Flanagan, Senate Print 4690A, an

act to amend the Public Authorities Law. 1 2 SENATOR BRESLIN: Explanation. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 Senator 4 Flanagan, Senator Breslin has requested an 5 explanation on Calendar 374. SENATOR FLANAGAN: 6 Senator 7 Breslin, very simply, this bill requires that if a public authority is going to form a subsidiary, 8 that they have to come back to the Legislature to 9 10 get approval before doing so. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 Seeing 12 and hearing no other Senator wishing to be heard, the debate is closed and the Secretary will ring 13 the bell. 14 15 Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 16 Mr. President. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Can I have some order in the chamber, please 19 20 {gaveling}. 21 SENATOR LIBOUS: Are we ringing 22 the bell, Mr. President? 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bell 24 has been rung. We are on a controversial 25 calendar vote. We urge members to stay in the

1 chamber. 2 And we've also invoked Rule 9 for 3 those who are attending the Higher Education Committee meeting. 4 5 The Secretary will read the last section. 6 7 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 8 act shall take effect immediately. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 10 roll. (The Secretary called the roll.) 11 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Announce 12 the results. 13 14 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 60. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill 16 is passed. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Libous. 19 20 SENATOR LIBOUS: We are now going 21 to take up Calendar Number 615, controversial, by Senator Zeldin. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 23 The Secretary will read. 24 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 25

615, by Senator Zeldin, Senate Print 6872B, an 1 2 act to amend the General Business Law. SENATOR BRESLIN: 3 Explanation. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 4 An 5 explanation has been requested by Senator Breslin, Senator Zeldin. 6 7 SENATOR ZELDIN: This bill is in 8 relation to the refunds to a consumer of money 9 from a used-car dealership for failing to correct 10 a malfunction or defect. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 Senator 12 Squadron. 13 SENATOR SQUADRON: Would the 14 sponsor yield to a couple of questions. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 16 Zeldin, do you yield to couple of questions? SENATOR ZELDIN: 17 Yes. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The sponsor yields. 19 20 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you. 21 Through you, Mr. President. 22 So thank you for that exhaustive explanation of the bill. But just for somewhat 23 further explanation -- sorry, through you -- if 24 the sponsor would describe the way in which the 25

1 so-called Lemon Law would be applied for a consumer's refund if this bill became law. 2 SENATOR ZELDIN: 3 Once you are --4 through you, Mr. President, once you are outside 5 the warranty period, you have a statute of limitations to bring an action. There will be a 6 7 depreciation based on the federal limits. Right now, it's about 22, 23 cents. It was 22 cents in 8 9 2011. 10 So that if you deliberately wait and you're driving the car for a long period of 11 12 time to get the use out of the car, you're not getting a full refund. So that it's a fairer 13 reimbursement if you choose to wait to bring your 14 15 action. 16 SENATOR SQUADRON: If the sponsor would continue to yield. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The sponsor yields. 19 20 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you. How is "lemon" defined in the current law? Meaning 21 22 under what circumstance can a consumer return their car and get a refund under the Lemon Law? 23 SENATOR ZELDIN: Well, the 24 25 warranty, right now it's based on -- through you,

Mr. President, the warranty is based on the 1 amount of mileage when you purchase the vehicle. 2 So if the vehicle is between 18,000 miles and 3 4 36,000 miles, you have a warranty for 90 days or 5 4,000 miles. If the vehicle was purchased between 36,001 to 79,999, you have a warranty of 6 7 60 days or 3,000 miles. If it's 80,000 to 100,000 miles, it's 30 days or 1,000 miles. 8 9 SENATOR SQUADRON: If the sponsor 10 would continue to yield. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 The 12 sponsor yields. 13 SENATOR SQUADRON: And within that 14 period of time, under the Lemon Law you need to 15 either have the car out of service for 15 days or have the problem not fixed on three separate 16 service calls. 17 18 So in other words, if this bill passed and you were to have a car for any one of 19 20 those periods and you were trying to use the car for that period in order to take your kids to 21 childcare or to school, in order to go to the 22 supermarket, go to a doctor's appointment, do any 23 of the things that folks depend on their cars 24 25 for, and you went over the mileage standard that

1 you laid out, and then you tried to return your car, you would not get back the full purchase 2 price of that car even though you had been sold a 3 4 lemon? 5 SENATOR ZELDIN: Through you, Mr. President, there would be a recommendation 6 7 that you would just return your car. If you choose to continue driving it and not return your 8 car, that's your own choice as a consumer. 9 But 10 the recommendation, if you're not happy with your 11 car and you're entitled to a refund, then just return it. 12 This applies to those people that 13 choose to continue to drive their car for a long 14 15 time. 16 SENATOR SQUADRON: If the sponsor would continue to yield. 17 18 SENATOR ZELDIN: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 19 The 20 sponsor yields. 21 SENATOR SQUADRON: So in other 22 words, under the Lemon Law you can just go ahead -- if the car is in the service station for 23 15 days or three separate incidents, you can just 24 25 go return your car and get a new car. You don't

have to go through any other additional process 1 before you're able to return that car, during 2 which time you depend or your car in order to do 3 some of the basic things that folks do in order 4 to live their lives. 5 SENATOR ZELDIN: 6 Through you, 7 Mr. President, I thought you were referring to 8 once you're entitled to get a refund for the 9 car. You're talking about the process before 10 then. 11 SENATOR SQUADRON: If the sponsor would continue to yield. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 14 sponsor yields. 15 SENATOR SQUADRON: But under this legislation, even in the period before you 16 actually return the car, if you go over these 17 18 warranty numbers, that will be reduced from what you get back when you return the lemon? 19 20 SENATOR ZELDIN: Yes. 21 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you. Ιf 22 the sponsor would continue to yield. 23 SENATOR ZELDIN: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 24 The 25 sponsor yields.

1	SENATOR SQUADRON: And in addition
2	to the standards we've talked about 15 days,
3	three calls there's also an arbitration or
4	court proceeding provision that I think is
5	75 days. So you're talking about a pretty
6	significant period of time before you can prove
7	that the car you bought was a lemon and you can
8	go back to the car dealership and try to get that
9	refund; is that correct?
10	SENATOR ZELDIN: Through you,
11	Mr. President, once you go to the arbitrator, you
12	would not be responsible for any further
13	depreciation.
14	SENATOR SQUADRON: If the sponsor
15	would continue to yield.
16	ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Sponsor,
17	do you yield?
18	SENATOR ZELDIN: Yes.
19	SENATOR SQUADRON: I believe
20	it's and, actually, let's get into this. I
21	believe it's after the arbitrator's decision and
22	then you go to the car dealership itself and you
23	actually ask the car dealer who sold you the
24	lemon and is required to now take the car back
25	and give you a refund, they actually need to sign

1 off subsequent to the arbitrator's decision on 2 the number of miles that will be reduced; isn't 3 that correct? 4 SENATOR ZELDIN: Through you, 5 Mr. President, regardless of whether or not the dealership signs off on it, the consumer would 6 7 not be responsible for any further depreciation. 8 SENATOR SQUADRON: If the sponsor 9 would continue to yield. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Sponsor, do you continue to yield? 11 12 SENATOR ZELDIN: Yes. 13 SENATOR SQUADRON: Doesn't the 14 bill require the consumer to go back to the 15 dealer who they were just in an adversarial proceeding with and, outside of that adversarial 16 proceeding, get the dealer to sign off on the 17 18 mileage for the reduction? 19 SENATOR ZELDIN: Yes. Regardless, 20 the consumer will not be responsible for any 21 further depreciation. 22 And if the SENATOR SOUADRON: sponsor would yield for a final question. 23 24 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Final 25 question?

SENATOR ZELDIN: 1 Yes. 2 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you. So under current law, if you're sold a lemon and you 3 4 want to return the lemon and get your money back, 5 there's a process for that. Under this law, if you're sold a 6 7 lemon and then you have to depend on that for the period of time before you can get your refund, 8 you lose some of the money that you put out on 9 10 that lemon that you were sold that you have a 11 right to a refund on; is that correct? 12 SENATOR ZELDIN: Through you, Mr. President. Only if you are outside of your 13 14 warranty. You're not responsible for any 15 depreciation when you're within your warranty. SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you. On 16 the bill, Mr. President. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Squadron on the bill. 19 20 SENATOR SQUADRON: So under the 21 new-car Lemon Law, a purchaser has 12,000 miles 22 to drive that lemon during the period of time that they are discovering it's a lemon, they're 23 trying to get it fixed, they're in a proceeding 24 25 in order to get their refund. Twelve thousand

if you look at leases, is about a year's worth of potential usage. Under this law, folks could have as little as 30 days and a thousand miles in a process that requires 15 days out of service and then like a 75-day arbitration proceeding. So the odds of being out of warranty while you're just proving that you were sold a lemon are incredibly high. Unless we're asking people who went out and purchased a car that was a lemon to also not use that car in the period of time they're trying to get their refund. Which means we're asking people who go out and are sold a lemon to not go to the hospital, not take their kids to daycare or school, not go to the supermarket, not they're actually losing money on the purchase of their lemon. That doesn't make sense.	
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20 their lemon. That doesn't make sense.	
21 Now, Senator Zeldin did talk about	
22 the need to make sure that folks aren't abusing	
23 the Lemon Law, that folks aren't driving around	
24 after a decision has been rendered, they get a	
25 refund on the car and they spend 30 days, which	

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1	the law allows, driving around or taking a road
2	trip down to New Orleans or Chicago or wherever
3	they want to go.
4	That is a problem, and I would
5	actually agree with Senator Zeldin that's a
6	problem in the existing law that we do need to
7	deal with. The Lemon Law is not "a free car for
8	a couple of months" law, it is a law to protect
9	consumers from being sold lemons.
10	Unfortunately, this law makes it
11	impossible for the consumer who is sold a lemon
12	to then go get the replacement car. Because
13	what's all too likely to happen we're talking
14	about a used-car purchaser, someone who is likely
15	on a budget, someone who is choosing to buy a
16	used car because they can't afford a more
17	expensive option or a new option we're asking
18	them to lose some of the cost of that car when
19	they get their refund.
20	Which means not only were you sold
21	a lemon, not only do you have to suffer with that
22	lemon through the process defined in current law,
23	not only do you then have to go to the dealer and
24	get the dealer to agree and validate the number
25	of miles you drove but at the end of all of

1 this, you return your car and you get less money 2 back than you paid in the first place, so then 3 you have to go buy a worse car.

4 So in other words, you have someone 5 buying a used car in the first place, someone getting sold a lemon, someone eventually getting 6 7 some of the money back on their lemon, and then that poor consumer who's had to suffer through 8 this for the whole time, the only option they 9 have is a worse car? That doesn't make sense. 10 11 Again, I agree with the sponsor 12 that there is a fix needed in the Lemon Law. I would be happy to work with him and others on 13 I think that the idea that folks would abuse 14 it. 15 the system, that folks would abuse what is really a great consumer protection we have in this state 16 for both new and used cars needs to be dealt 17 18 with. The amount that you drive that lemon outside of sort of these core needs -- going to 19 the hospital, going to daycare, going to your 20 job, going to the supermarket -- should be a 21 factor, I agree with that. 22 But unfortunately, because of the 23 way warranties work on used cars and because of 24

the way this bill is written, it doesn't solve

25

1 that problem. What it really does is it says to a consumer: If you get sold a lemon, the 2 likelihood is you'll have to buy an even worse 3 4 car next time around. 5 I vote no and urge others to vote no, Mr. President. Thank you. 6 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 7 Seeing and hearing no other Senator wishing to speak, 8 9 the debate is closed. 10 The Secretary will ring the bell. Read the last section. 11 Section 7. This 12 THE SECRETARY: act shall take effect on the 90th day. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 14 15 roll. 16 (The Secretary called the roll.) ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 17 Senator 18 Martins to explain his vote. 19 SENATOR MARTINS: Mr. President, I 20 rise to support this bill. 21 This bill stems directly from a 22 tragedy that happened on Long Island, off of Long 23 Island, where a New York City police officer, off duty, was out on a kayak, the kayak capsized. He 24 25 wasn't wearing his vest, his child was. The

child survived, the father did not. It's a 1 2 tragedy. And when we talk about wearing a 3 flotation device under these circumstances, we 4 5 all immediately envision some bulky piece of equipment. And the reality is today they have 6 7 all kinds of flotation devices that are less 8 intrusive. 9 But the fact remains, if we can 10 require them to wear them under these circumstances, we can save a life. Very simply. 11 Unobtrusive, not these enormous flotation 12 devices, but specifically those that are now 13 developed and will allow for people under 14 15 difficult circumstances to simply be able to 16 survive. The child did survive. 17 18 Unfortunately, the father did not. And now we have a family, an extended family and a community 19 20 that has to deal with that. 21 This is a small, small measure to protect life. So I'll be voting aye, 22 Mr. President. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 24 Senator 25 Martins to be recorded in the affirmative.

There are several bills that have been 1 relief?" passed this week and throughout this session that 2 will help our counties, our local municipalities, 3 and our school districts with mandate relief. 4 5 This particular bill is kind of a new idea for helping with mandate relief, in that 6 it will eliminate some of the reporting 7 requirements that are imposed on school districts 8 and local governments. 9 10 This bill requires all agencies to 11 look at the reports that they require from a school district or a local municipality, to make 12 a list of those reports and to justify the need 13 for those reports and the value and are they 14 15 still necessary, to make a recommendation whether this report should be continued because it is 16 valuable, or to eliminate that report because it 17 18 is no longer necessary and it is burdensome. Ιt also allows for the electronic transmission of 19 20 those reports that it deems to be necessary, which would be continued past April 1st of next 21 22 year. It does not eliminate the need for 23 the activity that is being reported on, it only 24 25 eliminates -- it may eliminate in some instances

the requirement for an actual report to be 1 2 submitted to that agency. So I think that this is a good bill 3 4 that will help with some mandate relief. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 The substitution is so ordered. 12 13 The Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 14 15 1501, by the Assembly Committee on Rules, 16 Assembly Bill Number 10609, an act to amend the Election Law. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Read the last section. 19 20 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This act shall take effect on the 120th day. 21 22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the roll. 23 (The Secretary called the roll.) 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Can I

have some order in the chamber, please. 1 Senator Storobin to explain his 2 3 vote. 4 SENATOR STOROBIN: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. I would just like to thank everyone 6 7 who make this possible. This is a very important bill. There are a lot of people in the community 8 that I come from, the Russian community, who came 9 10 to the United States at the age of 60, 70, 80, 11 who want to participate in American democracy who 12 came from a place without opportunities to participate and to vote and to make a 13 14 difference. And unfortunately, a lot of them are 15 not able to do so because they don't speak enough English. 16 17 And this is very exciting, you know, to have all these people who lived through 18 communism, through Stalinism, to finally be able 19 20 to participate in full and to understand exactly what they are doing. 21 22 So I'm going to vote in the affirmative. Thank you very much. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 24 Senator 25 Storobin to be recorded in the affirmative.

1 Senator Stavisky to explain her 2 vote. 3 SENATOR STAVISKY: Yes, thank you, 4 Mr. President. I too applaud this legislation. 5 I represent a considerable number of Russian immigrants from the former Soviet 6 7 Union -- not just from Russia, but from other parts of Central Asia, such as Uzbekistan, and 8 9 they have to be given the same opportunity to 10 vote as any other citizen. And for that reason, I vote aye. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Stavisky to be recorded in the affirmative. 13 Announce the results. 14 15 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 59. Nays, 1. Senator Ball recorded in the negative. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill 17 18 is passed. SENATOR SKELOS: Mr. President. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Can I have some order in the chamber, please. 21 22 Senator Skelos. SENATOR SKELOS: I just want to 23 take a moment and congratulate Senator Storobin 24 25 for the first bill that he's passed as a State

1 Senator. 2 (Applause.) 3 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 4 Libous, that completes the noncontroversial 5 reading of Supplemental Senate Calendar 61A. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, 6 7 we're going to take up the controversial reading 8 in a second. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 10 Secretary will ring the bell. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, at 11 this time could we take up the controversial 12 reading of the calendar that we're on. And it 13 would be 1499, by Senator Robach. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 16 Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 17 18 1499, by Senator Robach, Senate Print 7782, an act to amend the State Finance Law. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 21 Breslin. 22 SENATOR BRESLIN: Thank you, Mr. President. 23 24 I believe there's an amendment at 25 the desk. And I ask that the reading of the

1 amendment be waived and Senator Kennedy be 2 allowed to be heard on the amendment. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 Senator 4 Breslin, we have reviewed the amendment here and 5 find the amendment, in accordance with Senate rules, to be nongermane. 6 7 SENATOR BRESLIN: Mr. President, I appeal the ruling of the chair and ask that 8 9 Senator Kennedy be allowed to speak on that 10 appeal. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 there 12 has been an appeal of the ruling of the chair requested. Senator Kennedy, you may be heard on 13 14 the appeal. 15 SENATOR KENNEDY: Thank you very 16 much, Mr. President. First of all, I want to thank the 17 18 bill's sponsor, Senator Robach, for bringing this important legislation to the floor. 19 20 My amendment to Senator Robach's bill is germane for the following reasons. 21 22 Senator Robach's bill requires state agencies to do a cost/benefit analysis before it enters into 23 a contract for consultant services which are 24 25 anticipated to cost more than \$500,000 in a

1 single year, to ensure that the services it is contracting to do cannot be done at the same or 2 lesser cost in-house. 3 4 It in effect seeks to safeguard 5 taxpayers' money by making that procurement process as efficient as possible and ensuring 6 7 that taxpayers get the greatest bang for their 8 dollars. 9 My amendment also deals with state 10 procurement; specifically, with the agency procurement of call-center services. It ensures 11 that all state business-related call centers and 12 customer service work be performed by state 13 14 contractors or other agents or subcontractors 15 entirely within the State of New York. My amendment enhances Senator 16 Robach's bill by ensuring that taxpayer money 17 18 goes to employers who create jobs here in New York. It also provides that contractors who 19 20 currently perform such work outside the State of New York have two years to comply with this 21 22 provision by hiring New York workers. 23 Over the past four years, the United States has lost at least 500,000 24 25 call-center jobs as businesses have opted to

relocate offshore. In addition to limiting the 1 employment opportunities for struggling families, 2 the use of foreign call centers presents a number 3 4 of security concerns with respect to protecting 5 New Yorkers' personal confidential information. This amendment holds companies that 6 7 outsource jobs accountable. It directs the 8 Commissioner of Labor to compile a semiannual 9 list of all call-center employers in New York 10 that relocate jobs overseas and publicly discloses this information to all state 11 agencies. 12 13 In light of the current economic 14 climate, it is fiscally irresponsible to continue 15 to reward, with taxpayer dollars and state subsidies, businesses that relocate jobs. 16 Mr. President, it is for those 17 18 reasons that I call this amendment to the floor 19 as germane. Thank you. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank you for your explanation, Senator Kennedy. 21 The question is on the appeal of 22 23 the ruling of the chair. All those in favor of overruling the ruling of the chair signify by 24 25 saying aye.

(Response of "Aye.") 1 Opposed? 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 (Response of "Nay.") ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 4 Senator 5 Breslin, why do you rise? SENATOR BRESLIN: Mr. President, 6 7 can we have a show on hands on the vote, please. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: A show of hands has been requested and so ordered. 9 Announce the results. 10 Ayes, 22. THE SECRETARY: 11 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 12 The ruling of the chair is sustained. 13 Is there any Senator wishing to be 14 15 heard? 16 (No response.) 17 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Seeing 18 none, hearing none, the debate is closed and the 19 Secretary will ring the bell. Read the last section. 20 21 THE SECRETARY: Section 3. This 22 act shall take effect on the 90th day. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 23 roll. 24 25 (The Secretary called the roll.)

Ayes, 60. THE SECRETARY: 1 2 The bill ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 is passed. Senator Libous, that completes the 4 5 controversial reading of Supplemental Senate Calendar 61A. We have two remaining that were 6 7 laid aside. 8 SENATOR LIBOUS: We can't go back 9 to them right now; we're going to do some other 10 business so that we can move the process along. I'm going to call Senator Robach; 11 12 there's going to be an immediate meeting of the Labor Committee in Room 332. 13 And then, Mr. President, since 14 15 Senator Robach is going to move that meeting along quickly with the members of the Labor 16 Committee, then there will be an immediate 17 18 meeting of the Finance Committee in Room 332. And then we will come back into the 19 20 chamber and take up all of the nominations that 21 will have gone through the various committees and 22 Finance. So at this time there will be an 23 immediate meeting of the Labor Committee, 24 25 followed by an immediate meeting of the

Finance Committee, and we will then come back in 1 2 and reconvene. So we will stand at ease for a little bit. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: There's 5 an immediate meeting of the Labor Committee in Room 332. That will be followed by a meeting of 6 7 the Finance Committee in Room 332. 8 Until such time as the Finance 9 Committee returns, the Senate stands at ease. 10 (Whereupon, the Senate stood at ease at 2:39 p.m.) 11 12 (Whereupon, the Senate reconvened at 3:31 p.m.) 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 14 The 15 Senate will come to order. 16 Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, 17 18 can we ask members to come into the chamber and have others sit down so -- Senator DeFrancisco, I 19 20 believe there will be a report of the Finance Committee. We have a number of nominees we're 21 22 taking up, and we certainly want to give Senator DeFrancisco and other members the attention that 23 these nominations deserve. 24 25 And at this time I believe,

Mr. President, there's a report of the Finance 1 2 Committee at the desk. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 There is a report of the Finance Committee at the desk. 4 5 The Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: б Senator 7 DeFrancisco, from the Committee on Finance, 8 reports the following nominations. 9 As a member of New York State 10 Workers' Compensation Board, Ellen O. Paprocki, 11 of Baldwinsville. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator DeFrancisco. 13 14 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, I 15 proudly move the nomination for the reappointment 16 of Ellen O. Paprocki for this position. I've known her for some time, and 17 18 all of you know at least one member of her 19 family. And I can say unequivocally that of her 20 siblings, she was clearly the most likely to 21 succeed and has obviously reached a higher 22 calling than someone who we know very well, her brother, Senator O'Mara. 23 24 (Laughter.) 25 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: In any

1 event, she's a great person, a very hardworking 2 individual, greatly qualified, and she's a terrific member of the board. And we're very 3 4 happy to move this nomination and confirm her 5 today. Thank you, Mr. President. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank 8 you, Senator DeFrancisco. 9 Senator O'Mara. 10 SENATOR O'MARA: Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I would love to have a few nice 11 12 things to say about my sister up there. However, I do seek permission to abstain from this vote 13 14 given the special interest that I have in this 15 nomination. 16 Thank you. 17 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: In 18 accordance with Senate rules and your request, permission is hereby granted. 19 20 The question is on the 21 reappointment of Ellen O. Paprocki, of 22 Baldwinsville, as a member of the New York State Workers' Compensation Board. All in favor 23 signify by saying aye. 24 25 (Response of "Aye.")

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 1 2 (No response.) 3 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Ellen O. Paprocki, of Baldwinsville, is hereby confirmed. 4 5 Thank you. Congratulations. 6 (Applause.) 7 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 8 Secretary will read. 9 THE SECRETARY: As a commissioner of the Public Service Commission, Gregg C. Sayre, 10 of Fairport. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator DeFrancisco. 13 14 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, I move 15 the nomination of Gregg C. Sayre, of Fairport, as a commissioner of the Public Service Commission. 16 Those of you who were at any of the 17 18 committee meetings, either Energy or Finance, or 19 have had the chance to review his resume, I can 20 only say that it's outstanding. He's got an incredible background for this particular 21 position, and he will be a great addition to this 22 23 commission. So I proudly move his nomination. 24 (Pause.) 25 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Do you want

me to say some more or --1 2 (Laughter.) ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 No, no, 4 I was just trying to determine if there was any 5 other member that wishes to speak. The question is on the nomination б 7 of Gregg C. Sayre, of Fairport, as a commissioner 8 of the Public Safety Commission. All in favor 9 signify by saying aye. 10 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 11 12 (No response.) 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Gregg Sayre is hereby confirmed as commissioner of the 14 15 Public Service Commission. 16 Congratulations. 17 (Applause.) 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The Secretary will read. 19 20 THE SECRETARY: As members of the 21 Board of Trustees of the State University of 22 New York: Richard Socarides, of New York City; Henrik N. Dullea, Ph.D., of Ithaca; Angelo Fatta, 23 Ph.D., of Lake View; and Marshall A. Lichtman, of 24 25 Rochester.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 2 DeFrancisco. SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, I move 3 each of these nominations. 4 5 And I just want to say, like I've said many times this year, is the nominations 6 7 that the Governor has made on all of these positions are truly outstanding. And we are very 8 9 fortunate to have the individuals who are willing 10 to serve at the SUNY board, willing to take these nominations, and willing to serve in this 11 12 capacity. 13 They all have outstanding backgrounds, a great breadth of experience, from 14 15 the highest levels of government in Washington 16 and the White House to the prior administrations in this State of New York for a couple of 17 18 different governors. So we've got experience, we've got qualifications, and we've got strong 19 20 people to lead the State University of the State 21 of New York, and I would move each of the 22 nominations. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank you, Senator DeFrancisco. 24 25 Senator Grisanti.

1 SENATOR GRISANTI: Yes, thank you, 2 Mr. President, just briefly. I too want to commend the Governor 3 4 for the four appointments to the State University 5 of New York Board of Trustees; in particular, Angelo Fatta, who is from Lake View, which is in 6 my neck of the woods. 7 8 And something that a lot of people 9 may not know, but he was a pioneer of 10 bio-informatics for the University of Buffalo, and that is something that became the second 11 12 phase of the UB 2020 program with that school. 13 So with that expense and the 14 experience that he's had with start-up companies 15 and knowledge and how that school is moving forward to be a leader and a pioneer in these 16 types of technologies and studies for the 17 18 students, I think it's a tremendous appointment, and I move the nomination as well. 19 20 Thank you, Mr. President. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 22 Marcellino. 23 SENATOR MARCELLINO: Yes, Mr. President, thank you. 24 25 I'd also, as my colleague Senator

1	DeFrancisco did, like to thank the nominees for
2	their willingness to serve. These are not easy
3	times, and especially going into the public
4	sector and working in the public sector. And if
5	you're going into either the especially in the
6	educational field, because as a former teacher
7	myself, I have a feel for that and I know that
8	education is at a crossroads. There's a lot to
9	do and a lot of changes to be made.
10	And our State University system is
11	a great university system, but it is also in need
12	of, in my mind, a breath of fresh air. And I'm
13	hoping that this group of nominees will do just
14	that and not be afraid to innovate, not be afraid
15	to make change and not just to leave it because
16	it seems to be working.
17	And the system is a good system,
18	but I think it could be a lot better. And I
19	think we could challenge our students a lot more
20	and we could bring in new programs and new ideas
21	and new ways of doing things. We just don't have
22	to continue the way we've been going.
23	So I urge you to strike out, look
24	for new things, look for new ideas, and don't be
25	afraid to innovate. It's not a curse, it's a

qood idea. 1 2 So again, I wish you the best, and 3 again I thank you for your willingness to serve. 4 I know it's not easy. God bless you. And I vote 5 aye on these nominations. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Senator 7 Ranzenhofer. 8 SENATOR RANZENHOFER: I'd also 9 like to commend the Governor on all four 10 nominations, and in particular just mention that I've known Angelo Fatta for over 20 years. 11 He has excellent experience in 12 terms of the educational field, the business 13 field, the technology and scientific field. I 14 15 think he'll be a great addition to the Board of Trustees, and I'd like to add my good wishes to 16 his service as well as the others. 17 18 Thank you, Mr. President. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 20 Squadron. 21 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you very 22 much. 23 I want to add my voice to a particularly well-qualified group of nominees who 24 25 will do an incredibly important job for the

future of the state and opportunity in the 1 2 state. I want to particularly acknowledge 3 that Richard Socarides, who I've known since well 4 5 before adulthood, is among those nominees and is one who brings particular judgment, commitment to 6 7 public service, and intellectual heft. And so 8 I'm very glad that he's agreed to do this and honored to vote yes on all the nominees, 9 10 Mr. Socarides and the rest. 11 Thank you. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Stavisky. 13 14 SENATOR STAVISKY: Thank you. 15 I too congratulate the Governor on four outstanding appointments. Each individual 16 brings a different perspective to service as a 17 18 SUNY trustee. 19 I particularly congratulate 20 Dr. Hank Dullea, who has known many of the people 21 here for many, many years. And he brings a combination of academic excellence, government 22 service, and a commitment to higher education. 23 That passion for public service is still there, 24 25 and we thank our friend Hank Dullea and wish him

continued service, as he started with the other 1 house, he worked for the Governor, he worked for 2 SUNY, and he understands each perspective. 3 4 And we congratulate all of them. 5 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Senator 7 Farley. 8 SENATOR FARLEY: Yes, thank you, 9 Mr. President. 10 I rise as somebody that has been a professor at the state university for 35 years 11 12 and somebody who's been very interested in SUNY. 13 I think that these candidates are outstanding, but I do have to call attention 14 15 again to Hank Dullea, somewhat of a relative of mine, but somebody that has served this state in 16 17 every capacity that you can imagine. And we're 18 so fortunate to have him be willing to serve as a 19 trustee. 20 And I'm very excited about these appointments, and I applaud the Governor for 21 22 being able to reach out to get New York's finest to represent us on the finest university system 23 in the nation. 24 25 Thank you, Mr. President.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 1 Senator 2 Seward. 3 SENATOR SEWARD: Yes, thank you, Mr. President. 4 5 I want to add my voice to the chorus and congratulate the Governor on this 6 7 outstanding group of new trustees that have been 8 nominated. 9 The State University, in my 10 estimation, is one of New York State's greatest assets. And with the appointment of these three 11 12 new trustees and the reappointment of Marshall Lichtman, I believe that our State University of 13 New York will be even more of an asset for us in 14 15 New York State. 16 And I see we've been joined by our great Chancellor here today with us as well. 17 18 And I want to single out Hank Dullea, who had a distinguished career, as has 19 20 been pointed out, with the State University and as director of state operations under both 21 Governors Carey and the first Governor Cuomo, and 22 then went down to Cornell, part of which is a 23 part of our State University system, as a vice 24 25 president.

1 In those days I was representing the campus itself -- I still have four towns in 2 Tompkins County in my district -- and worked 3 4 very, very closely with Hank Dullea in those 5 years he was at Cornell, and we did some good things together on behalf of that university and 6 7 the people of the region and people of the State 8 of New York. 9 So congratulations to all of these 10 nominees. We look forward to even greater things from a great university. 11 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 12 The question is on the nominees -- Richard Socarides, 13 Henrik Dullea, Angelo Fatta, and Marshall 14 15 Lichtman -- as members of the Board of Trustees for the State University of New York. All in 16 favor signify by saying aye. 17 18 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 19 Opposed? 20 (No response.) 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 22 nominees as read have been confirmed. 23 Congratulations. Please rise and be acknowledged. 24 25 (Applause.)

1 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 2 Secretary will read. 3 THE SECRETARY: As a member of the 4 Board of Trustees of the City University of 5 New York, Brian D. Obergfell, of Brooklyn. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: б Senator 7 DeFrancisco. 8 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, I'd 9 proudly move the nomination. 10 And without repeating myself, this individual is well-qualified for this high-level 11 position at CUNY, and I proudly move his 12 nomination. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 14 The 15 question is on the nomination of Brian D. 16 Obergfell, of Brooklyn, as a member of the Board of Trustees of the City University of New York. 17 18 All in favor signify by saying aye. 19 (Response of "Aye.") 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 21 (No response.) 22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The nominee is hereby confirmed. 23 Congratulations, Brian. 24 25 (Applause.)

1 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 2 Secretary will read. 3 THE SECRETARY: As a member of the 4 Lake George Park Commission, Bruce E. Young, of 5 Huletts Landing. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: б Senator 7 DeFrancisco. 8 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Move the 9 nomination. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 10 The question is on the nomination of Bruce E. Young 11 as a member of the Lake George Park Commission. 12 All in favor signify by saying aye. 13 (Response of "Aye.") 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 16 (No response.) 17 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Bruce E. 18 Young is hereby confirmed as a member of the Lake 19 George Park Commission. 20 Congratulations. 21 (Applause.) 22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Libous, that completes the confirmation of the 23 nominations before the house. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you,

Mr. President. 1 2 I have a little housekeeping at 3 this time. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Sure. 5 SENATOR LIBOUS: At this time Senator Skelos hands up the following committee 6 7 assignments to be filed in the Journal. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: So 9 ordered. They will be filed in the Journal. 10 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President. 11 Mr. President, I would call on 12 Senator Ruth Hassell-Thompson at this time. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 14 15 Ruth Hassell-Thompson. 16 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Mr. President, thank you. 17 18 There will be an immediate meeting of the Democratic Conference in Room 315. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: There will be an immediate meeting of the Democrat 21 22 Conference in Room 315. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, 23 there will be a prompt meeting of the Rules 24 25 Committee at 4:30 in Room 332.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: There 2 will be a prompt meeting of the Rules Committee in Room 332 at 4:30 sharp. 3 4 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Point 5 of order. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Senator 7 Hassell-Thompson, what is your point of order? 8 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Senator 9 Libous, I appreciate the fact that you'd like to 10 set a time, but I would like to hope that we have received the materials in time so that we will 11 12 not be late keeping your deadline. 13 SENATOR LIBOUS: The Rules Committee will meet after the materials have been 14 15 received. 16 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank you. Thank you. That's been one of the issues. 17 18 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 19 The 20 Senate stands at ease. 21 (Whereupon, the Senate stood at ease 22 at 3:46 p.m.) 23 ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: Senator Libous. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you,

1 Mr. President. I just want to make an amendment on the Rules Committee meeting. It will now be 2 held promptly at 5:00 p.m. in Room 332. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: The 5 Rules Committee meeting time has been changed to 5:00 p.m. We request that all members on the б 7 Rules Committee be in Room 332 promptly at 8 5:00 p.m. 9 The Senate continues to stand at 10 ease. It's going to be less fiscal impact 11 to the state. 12 And just to answer Senator 13 14 Krueger's question, because a mere preponderance 15 of the evidence is required to apportion liability, 30 days is more than adequate for the 16 DEC to examine the evidence given to them and 17 18 make a determination, even in complicated situations where it may be difficult to find the 19 20 responsible party. 21 So from an amendment last year, an endorsement from the New York State Association 22 23 of Service Stations and Repair Shops and from the New York State Bar Association that were not on 24 25 this bill last year, we made the amendments

This act shall take effect immediately. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 21 roll. 22 (The Secretary called the roll.) 23 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 60. 24 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill 25 is passed.

1 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 2 1521, by Senator Young, Senate Print 7767, an act to require the Power Authority. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Read the 5 last section. THE SECRETARY: Section 3. This 6 7 act shall take effect immediately. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the 9 roll. 10 (The Secretary called the roll.) ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 Senator Krueger to explain her vote. 12 13 SENATOR KRUEGER: Very simply, the State of New York should not be subsidizing 14 15 polluting, coal-burning energy generation. 16 I vote no. Thank you, Mr. President. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Krueger to be recorded in the negative. 19 20 Senator Maziarz to explain his 21 vote. 22 SENATOR MAZIARZ: Thank you very 23 much. Just briefly to explain my vote. I want to thank Senator Young for 24 25 bringing forth this legislation. This is

excellent legislation. It's going to save 1 hundreds of IBEW jobs in upstate New York, 2 particularly in the western part of the state. 3 4 It's going to help communities who have been 5 devastated by power plants that are either idle or going offline with property taxes. 6 7 The potentials of this bill are all positive, and they're all good. And thank you, 8 9 Senator Young. 10 I vote aye. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 Senator Maziarz to be recorded in the affirmative. 12 Senator Young to explain her vote. 13 14 SENATOR YOUNG: Thank you, 15 Mr. President. 16 This bill is an excellent piece of legislation. Because what it does, it helps 17 18 provide for a transition plan in New York State so that we can keep the power that we need to 19 20 supply our homes and our businesses. At the same time, we can focus on innovation, technology, 21 green energy, repowering plants. 22 23 And also the purchase power agreements that could be established with the 24 25 New York Power Authority would have energy go to

1 supply the Recharge New York program. There are about a thousand companies across New York State 2 that were interested in getting Recharge New York 3 benefits. This would solve that issue. It would 4 5 grow jobs. It would preserve jobs in facilities such as the one that's in my district. 6 7 So I thank the people who are 8 voting yes on this. This really is a crucial piece of legislation. It's all about jobs, the 9 10 economy, and a cleaner environment. And so I 11 proudly vote yes. 12 Thank you. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Young to be recorded in the affirmative. 14 15 Senator Nozzolio to explain his 16 vote. 17 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Thank you, 18 Mr. President. 19 I rise to thank my colleagues 20 Senator Young and Senator Maziarz for their leadership in putting forth this legislation, 21 legislation that's absolutely necessary as we 22 begin a very important transition process. 23 And this transition process, as 24 25 required by the legislation, will ensure the

1 focus be placed on the upstate economy, the development of that economy, the creation of 2 jobs, and the continuation of our tax base. 3 4 Those issues are all extremely 5 important to the taxpayers of this state, especially the property taxpayers of this state, 6 7 and this analysis is absolutely essential. And I 8 thank the sponsors for their support. I was pleased to support the measure as a sponsor and 9 10 look forward to its enactment. Thank you, Mr. President. 11 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 12 Senator Nozzolio to be recorded in the affirmative. 13 Announce the results. 14 15 THE SECRETARY: In relation to 16 Calendar 1521, those recorded in the negative are Senators Addabbo, Avella, Ball, Dilan, Gianaris, 17 18 Hassell-Thompson, Krueger, Montgomery, Oppenheimer, Peralta, Perkins, Rivera, Serrano, 19 20 Squadron, Stavisky and Stewart-Cousins. 21 Ayes, 44. Nays, 16. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill 22 is passed. 23 THE SECRETARY: In relation to 24 25 Calendar Number 1522, Senator Skelos moves to

discharge, from the Committee on Rules, Assembly 1 Bill Number 10593 and substitute it for the 2 identical Senate Bill Number 7788, Third Reading 3 Calendar 1522. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The substitution is so ordered. 6 7 The Secretary will read. 8 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 9 1522, by the Assembly Committee on Rules, 10 Assembly Print 10593, an act to amend Part H of Chapter 1 of the Laws of 2003. 11 12 SENATOR LIBOUS: Lay that bill aside temporarily. 13 14 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Lav it 15 aside temporarily. 16 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 1523, by Senator Maziarz, Senate Print 7789, an 17 18 act directing the Power Authority. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Read the 19 20 last section. 21 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 22 act shall take effect immediately. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the roll. 24 25 (The Secretary called the roll.)

1 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 2 Gianaris to explain his vote. 3 SENATOR GIANARIS: Thank you, Mr. President. 4 5 I'm going to be voting against this bill. What this legislation does is purport to 6 7 have the Power Authority sell generators that were placed throughout New York City over a 8 decade ago under the administration of 9 10 Governor Pataki. At the time, I was serving in the 11 12 Assembly, and I remember that the communities in which these facilities are located were promised 13 14 that they would be temporary. Obviously that's 15 not been the case for the last decade. But to now suggest that we should 16 sell them to private entities, meaning they would 17 18 be permanently ensconced in our communities, that's something that would be a complete 19 20 betrayal of what these neighborhoods were promised, and it would continue to contribute to 21 22 the poor air quality and increased lung ailments that many of our communities experience. 23 Without any safeguards that certain 24 25 of these facilities would be moved, as promised,

or closed, as promised, I cannot support this 1 2 legislation. I'll be voting in the negative and urge my colleagues to do the same. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 5 Gianaris to be recorded in the negative. Announce the results. б 7 THE SECRETARY: In relation to 8 Calendar 1523, those recorded in the negative are 9 Senators Addabbo, Avella, Ball, Gianaris, 10 Hassell-Thompson, Krueger, Lanza, Perkins, Rivera, Serrano, Squadron, Stavisky and 11 Stewart-Cousins. 12 Ayes, 47. Nays, 13. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The bill 14 15 is passed. 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President. 17 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 18 Libous. 19 SENATOR LIBOUS: Can we go back to 20 motions and resolutions, please. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: We most 22 certainly can. On motions and resolutions, Senator Libous. 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 24 25 Mr. President.

At this time I would like to move 1 2 to adopt the Resolution Calendar that's before us, with the exception of Resolution Number 5556. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 4 All in 5 favor of adopting the Resolution Calendar, with the exception of Resolution 5556, signify by 6 7 saying aye. 8 (Response of "Aye.") 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 10 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 The Resolution Calendar is adopted. 12 13 Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: 14 Thank you. 15 I believe that Senator Maziarz has a resolution at the desk. It is Number 5556. He 16 would like just the title read, and then could 17 18 you please call on Senator Maziarz. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 19 The 20 Secretary will read. 21 THE SECRETARY: Legislative Resolution Number 5556, by Senator Maziarz, 22 23 honoring Nikolas Wallenda for his accomplishments as an American high-wire artist, acrobat and 24 25 daredevil.

(Loud reaction from Senators.) 1 2 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, can we have some order on behalf of Nik Wallenda. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 5 {Gaveling.} It's a tightrope. 6 (Laughter.) 7 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 8 Maziarz. 9 SENATOR MAZIARZ: Thank you very 10 much, Mr. President. I know there are very few 11 resolutions that we could do at 6 o'clock on the 12 last day of session, but this is certainly one. 13 If you were watching last Friday 14 15 night on ABC, or if you had the privilege of being in Niagara Falls, you saw an event that 16 hadn't taken place in over 100 years. 17 18 And I had the privilege of walking to the lift with Nik Wallenda, the lift that 19 20 lifted him up to the wire when he stepped out on it. And he said to me, as we walked out there, 21 he said, "I fully understand that there are going 22 to be two careers on this wire tonight." And I 23 said, "No, there were 61 other votes in the 24 25 Senate, so there are a lot of careers on that

wire." 1 2 (Laughter.) 3 SENATOR MAZIARZ: But this event 4 that all of you voted for, every one of you voted 5 for -- and my colleagues Senator Grisanti was there, Senator Gallivan was there in person --6 7 really brought a new life to the city of Niagara Falls, a city that has gone through some 8 9 very, very difficult times. Over 120,000 people 10 were there in person. Over 13 million people watched on ABC. It was the highest-rated 11 12 non-sports programming on ABC in over six years. 13 It made the people of Niagara Falls feel good about themselves and good about their 14 15 city. And we are going to work together and carry that momentum on. Nik Wallenda and 16 Niagara Falls are inextricably tied together now, 17 18 forever. And he is going to come back every season -- and not do a wire walk across the 19 20 gorge, that can only be done once every century. But he's going to establish a presence there in 21 22 Niagara Falls that's going to be good for all of 23 us. And not any of it would have 24 25 happened, and I said this in interview after

interview, not any of it would have happened 1 without the unanimous support of the Senators in 2 this room. Because we kicked it off, we did it. 3 When we did it, the Assembly said, "Well, we're 4 5 going to do it because, you know, the Governor will never approve it." And then the Governor 6 7 did approve it. 8 And the Governor approved it, he 9 took a leap of faith in the fact that this would 10 help Niagara Falls. And when we did it, the Canadian government didn't want to be left 11 12 behind, so they did it. And they thought certainly there will be bad weather or something 13 They didn't realize that where he was 14 like that. 15 going to walk, the weather is always bad. But thank each and every one of 16 you. And, Mr. President, I ask all of you to 17 18 join me in supporting and signing onto this 19 resolution. Which Nik is going to visit here, 20 this chamber, and thank us all personally. Obviously we won't be able to do that until 21 22 sometime next year. But thank you all very much. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Little. 24 25 SENATOR LITTLE: Thank you.

As chair of the Tourism Committee, 1 2 I do want to commend Senator Maziarz and everyone who voted for this and put this together. 3 4 One of the things that happens, I 5 think, when you watch a program -- and I did watch it. I think he made it look a lot easier 6 7 than I'm sure it was. But you could see what an enormous event it was for Niagara Falls. 8 9 And a thought went through my head, 10 I haven't been to Niagara Falls in many, many 11 years, I'd like to go again. And hopefully 12 people throughout the country had the same thought. 13 And it will improve tourism in 14 15 Niagara Falls and in all of New York State. So thank you to everyone for their efforts. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 17 Senator 18 Serrano. 19 SENATOR SERRANO: Thank you very 20 much, Mr. President. 21 I also want to add my voice to the 22 congratulations of Senator Maziarz for putting this together and making sure that it passed here 23 in the Senate. 24 25 I watched, as 13 million others did

on television, and with my son and my wife and my 1 daughter. And we were just riveted. And I think 2 it was a very innovative program, because it was 3 4 the first time you're watching someone walk a 5 tightrope while giving an interview and explaining what's going through his head. And I 6 7 thought it was very innovative. 8 But I think most importantly, as 9 the Democratic ranking member on the Tourism 10 Committee, as Senator Little said, this is a major boost to the Niagara Falls area. And those 11 of us who care about tourism, we care it about 12 throughout the entire State of New York. 13 And I think many people's 14 15 recollections of what they thought Niagara Falls was, it's so much -- I think it's a new way of 16 looking at it after that evening's programming, 17 18 the way that it looked at night, all lit up and everything. And I think people should rediscover 19 20 Niagara Falls and go visit. And I think it's a great boon for the economy in Western New York. 21 22 Thank you. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 24 Kennedy. 25 SENATOR KENNEDY: Thank you,

Mr. President. 1 2 I too just want to, first and foremost, reiterate everything that's already 3 been said. 4 5 You know, when Nik Wallenda walked that wire, it was not just a feat of humankind, 6 7 it was a reminder of the beauty of humankind and 8 the beauty of the state that we live in, our 9 proximity to Canada, the beauty of Western 10 New York. And quite frankly, as Senator 11 Serrano and others have mentioned, a reminder of 12 how beautiful Niagara Falls is and, quite 13 frankly, that we have such an incredible, 14 15 wonderful place to visit right here in the State 16 of New York out in Western New York. While Senator Maziarz carried the 17 18 bill in the Senate, we all voted on it, I know it was with great relief that Senator Maziarz saw 19 20 that Nik Wallenda had that tether on him. Because we all knew that if he in fact fell, so 21 22 in fact would have fallen the wonderful political career of Senator Maziarz. 23 24 (Laughter.) 25 SENATOR KENNEDY: So with that, we

want to congratulate Nik Wallenda, and look 1 forward to working with him in the future as he 2 continues to bring that feat and his greatness to 3 4 Western New York. 5 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Senator 7 Grisanti. 8 SENATOR GRISANTI: Yes, just briefly, Mr. President. 9 10 You know, I had the pleasure of witnessing this firsthand with my family. And I 11 12 would say the most touching moment is when, with my family and Nik's family, we all got together 13 with some of his staff and they said a prayer. 14 15 They had a pastor there, they said a prayer. His son was very nervous. His son actually said, 16 "Dad, don't do it" -- when his son, who's 5 years 17 18 old, actually does these walks himself. Not at that great length, it's just from one sandbox to 19 20 another. 21 But I'll tell you something. He is such a humble individual that, you know, not only 22 was it perfect for New York State, but it 23 solidified the peace and the relationship we have 24 25 between the United States and Canada. Which is a

1 perfect timing, because as you know, the War of 1812, it's 200 years of peace between New York 2 State, the United States, and Canada, and that 3 just solidified it. 4 5 So, appreciate it, Mr. President, and it was an excellent time. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank 8 you, Senator Grisanti. 9 The question is on the resolution. 10 All in favor signify by saying aye. (Response of "Aye.") 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 13 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 14 The 15 resolution is adopted. 16 Senator Libous. 17 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, 18 before, at Senator Maziarz's request, we open 19 this up, Senator Maziarz, I would just ask --20 through you, Mr. President -- when Nik Wallenda comes, Senator Maziarz, will you be walking the 21 22 tightrope from one end of the gallery to the 23 other? (Laughter.) 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Without

objection? 1 2 (Laughter.) 3 SENATOR LIBOUS: I didn't think 4 so. 5 (Laughter.) б SENATOR LIBOUS: Senator Maziarz, 7 Mr. President, would like to open this up to all 8 the members. And certainly if someone for 9 whatever reason doesn't want to be on it, they 10 could let the desk know. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 11 12 resolution is open for cosponsorship. If you choose not to be a cosponsor, please notify the 13 desk. 14 15 Senator Libous. 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, there are three privileged resolutions at the 17 18 desk by Senator Skelos. Could we take them up at this time. 19 20 And I believe that Senator Flanagan 21 will address the first one if there are any 22 questions. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 23 The Secretary will read. 24 25 THE SECRETARY: Senate Resolution,

by Senator Skelos, establishing a plan setting 1 2 forth an itemized list of grantees for certain appropriations in the 2012-2013 state fiscal 3 4 year. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The question is on the resolution. All in favor 6 7 signify by saying aye. 8 (Response of "Aye.") 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 10 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 11 12 resolution is adopted. 13 The Secretary will continue to 14 read. 15 THE SECRETARY: Senate Resolution, 16 by Senator Skelos, establishing a plan setting forth an itemized list of grantees for a certain 17 18 appropriation for the 2012-2013 state fiscal year for grants in aid for drug violence and crime 19 20 control and prevention programs. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: All in 22 favor signify by saying aye. 23 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Opposed? 24 25 (No response.)

1 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 2 resolution is adopted. 3 The Secretary will continue to 4 read. 5 THE SECRETARY: Senate Resolution, by Senator Skelos, amending Senate Resolutions 6 7 2697, 2698, 2699, 2700, 2701 and 2702 of 2011, 8 establishing a plan setting forth an itemized 9 list of grantees for the New York State Economic 10 Development Assistance Program established pursuant to an appropriation in the 2008-2009 11 12 state fiscal year and in Part QQ of Chapter 57 of the Laws of 2008 relating to such itemized list 13 14 of grantees. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 16 question is on the resolution before the house. All in favor say aye. 17 18 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 19 Opposed? 20 (No response.) 21 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 22 resolution is adopted. 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 24 Senator 25 Libous.

As I said earlier 1 SENATOR LIBOUS: 2 today, there are times that the Senate will have to stand at pause. And "pause" would mean that 3 4 we don't want to leave the chamber for a few 5 minutes. Just give us a couple of seconds. Procedurally here, there's some things that we're 6 7 waiting on. 8 So the Senate will be at pause. That is different than being at ease, 9 Mr. President. When you're at ease, that means 10 11 that members can go and do what they need to do in their offices or whatever. But when we're at 12 pause, it means I'm stalling until we find out 13 14 what's going on next. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Libous, we will pause for a few minutes in order 16 to accommodate your request. 17 18 SENATOR LIBOUS: Counsel advises me it could be suspended animation. 19 20 We do have more work to do this evening, and we want to get it done. 21 But 22 unfortunately, procedurally it takes time to put 23 some of these things together. And it's very important that we get the hand-downs from the 24 25 Assembly and do what we need to do.

1 So give us a minute, please. 2 (Pause.) 3 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 5 Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: I said earlier 6 7 the Senate was at pause. that would change the brownfields law. 1 It is tonight a one-house bill, although I suppose 2 since technically the Assembly left already, it's 3 4 a one-house bill for the year. 5 There might be some good things in it; there might be some terrible things in it. б 7 We have no idea how much it would cost the 8 state. 9 And so even if I believe there were 10 some changes that ought to be made to the Brownfields Tax Credit Program, this could not 11 12 possibly be the right way to handle the situation or the right bill to pass at this late date, this 13 14 late hour. I am voting no. 15 Thank you, Mr. President. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Krueger to be recorded in the negative. 17 18 Senator Grisanti to explain his vote. 19 20 SENATOR GRISANTI: Yes, briefly, Mr. President, thank you. 21 22 As my colleagues are aware, there was an extender that was passed earlier that 23 matched in the Assembly of nine months. 24 25 However, this bill -- and I want to

Local economies 5 suffer contamination. It's also a public health threat. 6 7 So the brownfields law has worked 8 to an extent but needs improvement. This is what 9 this does. 1 Senator LaValle to explain his 2 vote. 3 SENATOR LaVALLE: Thank you, 4 Mr. President. Very briefly. 5 This bill is in response to the security breakdown during SAT exams where there 6 was cheating by individuals hiring imposters to 7 8 take exams for them. 9 This bill probably, in terms of a 10 committee process, was very, very thorough. Two 11 hearings, an open discussion that had almost 12 every single member of the committee scoping out the kind of bill that they wanted to bring before 13 this house, bringing the SAT and ACT people, 14 15 College Board, before the committee for discussion, and then again a very thorough 16 vetting by the committee. 17 18 And the committee made decisions on whether they wanted penalties or not penalties. 19 20 This is a bill that does not have penalties but 21 addresses the major issues. 22 And I would tell you, I'm very proud of the committee members and their 23 participation, because this bill has the 24 25 committee's imprint before it.

1 I vote yes. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator LaValle to be recorded in the affirmative. 3 4 Senator Stavisky to explain her 5 vote. I'm going to ask for some quiet in 6 7 the chamber, please. 8 SENATOR STAVISKY: Very briefly, 9 Mr. President, I participated in each of the 10 hearings of the Higher Education Committee. And I am happy to vote for this bill. 11 I was not too pleased with the 12 previous version, because I don't think making it 13 a felony is a good way for someone -- I don't 14 15 think this merits a felony record. 16 But on the other hand, this is all left out. This is a good bill. It really 17 18 codifies what the SAT and ACT people agreed to verbally at the committee meetings. 19 20 And I thank Senator LaValle for the work that he and his staff did on this bill. It 21 22 was an extensive job, and tonight it will bear 23 fruit. Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator

Stavisky to be recorded in the affirmative. 1 2 Senator Martins to explain his 3 vote. 4 SENATOR MARTINS: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. You know, as we close out this 6 7 session, I think it's only appropriate that we 8 take a bill like this, which for all intents and 9 purposes is as close to a no-brainer as they come 10 in this house. I want to commend Senator LaValle for his hard work in putting this bill together. 11 It makes sense. If we want to 12 protect the integrity of our SATs and how 13 important these tests are for the best interests 14 15 of our young adults going on to college, it makes sense to at least ensure that we have proper 16 identification, we provide the proper framework 17 18 within which we can protect the integrity of this 19 test. 20 Senator LaValle took the lead on this not only for New York State but nationwide, 21 22 and I think that should be recognized. He's been a wonderful leader when it comes to higher 23 education. This bill is his brainchild, and it 24 25 took into consideration not only the input from

1 our teachers, our principals and administrators, 2 but from SAT officials and the College Boards. I'll be voting aye, but I want to 3 4 take the opportunity to commend Senator LaValle 5 on a great bill. 6 Thank you. 7 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 8 Martins to be recorded in the affirmative. 9 Announce the results. 10 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 60. It was vetoed by the Governor

because of some technical concerns. 1 2 And I'd like to thank both Assemblymember Aubry, who is my sponsor in the 3 4 Assembly, as well as the Governor and the 5 Governor's staff for working diligently with us over the last couple of months to address the 6 7 concerns. 8 But the intent of the bill is still the same, and I'm very happy that we're voting on 9 10 it today. What this bill does is that it 11 12 authorizes and regulates charitable bail organizations across the State of New York, like 13 the one in the Bronx that called the Bronx 14 15 Freedom Fund. This is a private revolving fund that is there to provide bail for the indigent 16 and for first-time offenders. 17 18 Just to give you an example of the type of situation that this type of bill can help 19 20 us to assist in, there was a gentleman by the name of Oscar who was in the Bronx. He visited 21 his cousin in a NYCHA project, was arrested, went 22 through a process, was put before a judge because 23 the cops did not hear him when he was saying that 24 25 he was visiting his cousin.

The judge gave him \$1,000 worth of 1 2 bail. He could not afford that. The Bronx Freedom Fund posted the bail on his behalf. A 3 couple of weeks later, he came back, the charges 4 5 were dropped. In the three years that the pilot 6 7 program was working in the Bronx, 95 percent of 8 the individuals came back for every single court 9 date, and 54 percent of them got their charges 10 dropped. 11 I believe that this a good, commonsensical bill. It has been made better by 12 the involvement of the Governor in making sure 13 that we have a bill that can have this type of 14 15 organization exist all over the State of New 16 York. And I'm extremely happy to be 17 18 voting for it today, and I thank my colleagues 19 for voting for this bill as well. And it's very important. Because to 17 18 get these bills through and to get negotiations started, it's important, because these are 19 20 protections for the environment. 21 This one, dealing with mercury, for those who don't know, we lag far behind other 22 There are over 300,000 mercury states. 23 thermostats discarded each year, and we only 24 25 collect 1.3 percent. The rest of that is in

1 landfills, it's getting into our water system, and it's just destructive. And it's dangerous --2 harmful to pregnant women, developing infants and 3 children. 4 5 So we need to take these things seriously. We need to have a program set up; 6 7 that's what this bill does, a statewide 8 collection goal. To meet those goals, it 9 provides a system of shared responsibility among 10 manufacturers, wholesalers and others which will they are properly disposed of after they're taken 11 off the walls. 12 13 So think about it. These are 14 important environment bills. Senator Oppenheimer 15 I know was on many of these bills. And I appreciate the support and am looking forward to 16 moving more of these in the future. 17 18 I vote aye, Mr. President. I now move to recommit the calendar. 23 24 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: So 25 ordered, Senator Libous. The calendar is

1 recommitted. 2 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President. 3 4 At this time would you please call 5 on Senator Tom Duane. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Senator 7 Duane. 8 SENATOR DUANE: Thank you, 9 Mr. President, and Senators Libous and Skelos. 10 And Senators Sampson, Breslin, maybe you had a hand in this. 11 12 I think by now most of you know that I am a person of strong convictions. And I 13 believe I have made them known to all of you. 14 Ι 15 am proud to say that whether or not a bill had my name on it or didn't have my name on it, whether 16 I was the sponsor or someone else sponsored it on 17 18 my behalf, that there was never a bill that I cared about that was not passed without 19 20 bipartisan support and without buy-in from people on both sides of the aisle. 21 And what that meant was that 22 working together, agreeing to compromise, I was 23 able to convince people of the righteousness of 24 25 some of the things that I believed in, and many

of you were able to convince me of the 1 righteousness of what you believed. 2 And I always tried to think about 3 4 what it felt like to sit in your seat, to see how 5 the world looked from where you sit, and I encourage you to do that. Because the world does 6 7 in fact look different whether it's in Senator Montgomery's district or my district or Senator 8 Maziarz's district. The world looks different to 9 10 us from where we sit, and we bring our own world experience to the table. 11 12 And when I first came here, the New York State Senate was the only agency in the 13 state that didn't offer domestic partner 14 15 benefits. And I was able to change that. And look how far we've come now. And that's in a 16 mere 14 years, just a blink in the infinity of 17 18 time. 19 When I first came here, I spent so 20 much time stopping horrible HIV bills. Some of you veterans may remember that I was probably the 21 22 first Senator to say "unprotected anal, oral and vaginal sex" on this very floor. And sometimes I 23 think those bills just didn't appear anymore 24 25 because you didn't want me to say it anymore.

1 (Laughter.) 2 SENATOR DUANE: But whatever it 3 was, things have changed. And working with many 4 members here, we did an amazing HIV Testing 5 Modernization Act and we got the New York State Department of Health to go into correctional 6 7 facilities to make sure that incarcerated people had access to the best possible protocols for 8 HIV/AIDS and hepatitis C. And that's real 9 10 progress. And that's -- I'm very happy about that. 11 12 And by the way, again, the vast majority of people in this body, my colleagues, 13 voted for those bills. And thank you. Thank you 14 15 for that. I did get to fit it in one last 16 time, though, did you notice? 17 18 (Laughter.) 19 SENATOR DUANE: It was not really 20 planned that way. 21 You know, the big-ticket item, I guess it will be part of what -- you know, my --22 listen, I know it's a very D-list legacy. 23 But, you know, I know marriage is going to be the big 24 25 thing. But I am equally proud of the day when I

1	was invited into the press conference of
2	Timothy's Law. Because that really helps
3	people. And the Second Chance for Victims of
4	Human and Sex Trafficking. Just a very few
5	people, but it really helps them. And the vast
6	majority of you voted for that one too.
7	And I've invited you to come to my
8	district, and many of you have. And there was
9	Mr. President, your predecessor came to my
10	district, and I showed him how a work-study
11	internship worked in my district. And he
12	realized that I was able to help him to
13	understand that we weren't doing anything
14	special, we just weren't holding people back by
15	not allowing them to get an education and real
16	work experience for jobs that really exist. And
17	he liked it so much, he started one in his own
18	county.
19	And I visited healthcare facilities
20	around the state. I'll never forget when I went
21	to Syracuse. And I saw Syracuse urban hospitals,
22	and I saw Madison County rural hospitals and
23	realized I kind of already knew it, but it was
24	proof positive that rural New York State has the
25	same issues as urban New York State and pockets

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1 of suburban New York State.

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2	And so I encourage you all to do
3	that. I think I have visited I would bet I
4	visited as many farms as any Senator here, dairy
5	farms and flower farms F-L-O-U-R and
6	F-L-O-W-E-R. And so please enjoy not just
7	Duanesburg, but enjoy what all of our districts
8	have to offer, because it is an amazing and a
9	beautiful, wonderful state.
10	And I think what I the most
11	personal legacies for those here are please treat
12	your staffs and each other's staffs and central
13	staffs and each individual Senator's staffs with
14	dignity and respect, because they work incredibly
15	hard and they do amazing work.
16	And you know, they even I
17	shouldn't say it this way. Let me think how to
18	say it. Because I was going to say they make
19	even me look good, but I don't want to say it
20	that way. They help us to be better Senators.
21	They make us better Senators. So they're
22	amazing. And they are overworked and underpaid.
23	And my staff especially, here and
24	in New York City, just amazing people that were
25	willing to make enormous sacrifice to be a part

of my strong convictions and help me in my own 1 small way to try to make New York State a better 2 3 place. 4 And the most important idea I want 5 to convey to you is, please, treat each other with the dignity and respect with which you would 6 7 like to be treated. That would be the greatest gift of all you could give to this not retiring 8 9 Senator, just moving on to another chapter 10 Senator. And to the great times and the 11 12 trials and the tribulations, you know, for this kid from Queens, with stuff, I got to serve as a 13 New York State Senator. Not everyone gets to 14 15 achieve a dream like that. And I am thankful on so many 16 levels. And there are lots of people -- everyone 17 18 in this room now has been a part of it, and there are many people who have been in this room over 19 20 the past 14 years that have been a part of it. And from the deepest, most sincere possible 21 place, thank you. Thank you. 22 (Extended standing ovation.) 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 24 Senator 25 Libous.

1 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, 2 would you please at this time call on Senator Jim Alesi. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 5 Alesi. SENATOR ALESI: 6 Thank you, 7 Mr. President, my friends. 8 Earlier, maybe about an hour or so ago, I was in my car. I had left, and I thought 9 10 probably that's the way I wanted to go, just quietly. And then the real me emerged, I drove 11 12 right around, parked my car out in front, and came back in. 13 I hadn't thought, really, about 14 15 speaking at what feels like it's my own wake 16 here. You know? (Laughter.) 17 18 SENATOR ALESI: But in a way it 19 is. It is. 20 You don't get to do that, obviously, when you're really gone. But I 21 22 thought, I've been to two funerals in the last couple of days and a third one when I get home, 23 so you start to put things in perspective, how 24 25 much things mean to you in real life and what

seeps out of our political life, what goes 1 through the sieve of politics in the Senate. 2 And the real-life part actually 3 4 does, once in a while, tap us on the shoulder and 5 you see the value not only of the things that we've done at home politically, here politically, 6 7 but how we have touched the lives of people that we'll never meet, the lives of people that we 8 would never expect to have touched. 9 10 Last year for me was probably the biggest year I could have had personally, 11 12 politically. This year I knew I was on the glide path. And I hadn't thought about this as a 13 political wake, but in a way, as I said, it's the 14 15 only time you get to say the things you wish you could say if you were really laid out. 16 And I thought about it: If I 17 could, what would I say from the grave, you 18 know? What could I do if I were going to send a 19 20 postcard? I know what I'd say in a postcard: "Wish you were here." 21 22 (Laughter.) SENATOR ALESI: Why not? Or "Wish 23 I weren't." But either way. 24 25 You know, it was -- it's been, as a

county legislator, an Assemblymember and a member 1 of the Senate, having been in the minority and 2 the majority, I can tell you we survived some 3 4 really rough times a couple of years ago. And it 5 tested us not only as members of the Senate, it tested us as human beings. It tested us and it 6 7 will continue to test you and those that come after all of us. 8 9 At the end of the day, how we 10 relate to each other and, as Senator Duane said, how we treat each other is critically important 11 to the survival of this fantastic institution 12 that we've had the honor and privilege of serving 13 14 in. 15 And think about 62 of us having such influence over the lives of almost 16 20 million people in our state. And personally, 17 18 I've seen now, in my career, Governor Pataki, Governor Spitzer, Governor Paterson, Governor 19 20 Cuomo. 21 I remember when Pataki came in and 22 the Business Council called New York "the comeback state." And then we all remember what 23 happened in the meantime: a roller-coaster 24 25 ride.

1 And now Andrew Cuomo is the 2 Governor, and we feel as though things have turned around. We're working well together. 3 4 We're showing mutual respect and friendship. 5 And yes, when it's time to throw the grenades, you throw the grenades, if you're 6 7 on the other side, just as we did when we were on 8 the other side. But when we're in the lounge 9 over here, the minute we walk through the door we 10 become who we really are. We become friends and, in some cases, admirers of each other. 11 12 I am so awestruck by so many of 13 you. Democrats, Republicans, doesn't matter. 14 And the things I've seen that people don't know 15 about politicians, the human things that I have 16 seen. I'll go across the whole room 17 18 today, looking at all my friends. The kids that 19 sit behind us. No more candy here; I'm all out. 20 The sergeants. For 17 years I've walked through those doors, that somebody holds the door for me, 21 for you, for the staff members. 22 People up at the front desk, the 23 people in our offices, my staff -- they have all 24 25 made us the successes that we are. And they're

the ones that hold us up when we fail. 1 They stand with us. They're our families. 2 I think about the job and who could 3 want a job like this in their own minds and 4 5 imagine that someday you'd have the honor of being a member of the Senate. It really is kind 6 7 of hard to believe. 8 I operated a business most of my 9 life, and I was pretty good at it. I think for 10 the most part I've been pretty good at being a Senator. Not perfect. We all have moments in 11 12 our careers or personal lives when we wish we could go back, but we don't get that chance. 13 So 14 what we do is, as we're moving forward, we do a better job. 15 And right now as I look at this 16 Senate and I look at the way that this 17 18 institution has recovered, we are doing a better Individually, it's up to each one of us to 19 job. 20 do a better job. And as I leave here, that's what I'll be striving to do. 21 But I don't know if my dream ever 22 came true or if this is just something that 23 happened. I know when I was younger, in my early 24 25 twenties, right after college, there was a job I

1 desperately wanted. I found it in a magazine. It was international travel, with all the 2 glamorous parts about international travel that 3 4 appeared to a young man that was 23 years old. 5 And so I filled out an application, and it asked some basic questions. And it said 6 7 "Are you fluent in Spanish?" And I checked the box that said "yes." And I wish Senator Diaz 8 9 were here tonight. All those years he would 10 speak Spanish in front of me, never knew I understood every word. 11 12 (Laughter; applause.) 13 SENATOR ALESI: And I wish Ray would come out with the apple that I had ready, 14 15 because, Senator Parker, I know you're big and strong -- and you'd see me take that apple in my 16 hand, and I'd squeeze it and break it in half. 17 18 And I know you can't do it. 19 (Laughter.) 20 SENATOR ALESI: And I know nobody else in this room can do it. Unless they cut it 21 into the core before I bring it out and break it 22 open. Now you know. 23 24 (Laughter.) 25 SENATOR ALESI: But I went after

1	this job, and I got the response to my
2	application. And it asked some questions about
3	my health and some other things, and it said,
4	again, this is international travel and you must
5	be fluent in Spanish. And I checked the box
6	"yes" again. And I got an interview.
7	And when I arrived, the person that
8	interviewed me was very congenial. We sat in an
9	office, and he started rattling off, and he's
10	nodding at me and smiling. And I nodded back at
11	him, and I said "Sí." And he was very pleased.
12	And he said a few more things, and he nodded his
13	head and smiled, and I said "Sí." And he asked
14	me something, and I looked at him and I got
15	pensive, and I went "Sí."
16	And he looked at me and he said in
17	English, "You know that you have to speak Spanish
18	to have this job." Well, what else could I do?
19	I said "Sí."
20	He continued in English, and he
21	said, "If you can speak Spanish fluently, then
22	say something to me in Spanish, or else you can't
23	have this job." So I said it to him: "Adiós."
24	(Laughter; applause.)
25	SENATOR ALESI: There just comes a

1 time when you know, when you know, you have to 2 leave. 3 For me, it's here, it's now. And 4 the right way to say it, as I know from my 5 studies, "adiós," is "a Dios," to God. A Dios. A Dios. 6 7 (Extended standing ovation.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Our sincere best wishes for good health and happiness 9 10 to Senators Alesi, Duane, and Oppenheimer. For closing comments for the 2012 11 12 session, I'll first call upon Democrat Leader John Sampson. 13 14 Senator Sampson. 15 SENATOR SAMPSON: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 16 17 I just really want to again say 18 thank you to our esteemed colleagues, Senator Alesi, Senator Oppenheimer, and 19 20 Senator Duane, for the phenomenal job that they have shown as true leaders here in the State of 21 22 New York. 23 You talk about being an elected official, but these individuals are true 24 25 statespersons. And I want to commend you for

your commitment, your dedication, but most of all 1 your love for the people here in the State of 2 New York. And once again, congratulations to all 3 three of you. 4 5 (Applause.) SENATOR SAMPSON: Also, before I 6 7 even get into remarks, I want to also -- and we 8 all need to extend congratulations to our 9 phenomenal staff, who have done a fantastic job 10 during trying times. And, you know, they are overworked and underpaid, but we truly do 11 appreciate all the work that you have done on our 12 behalf and also on behalf of the citizens of the 13 State of New York. 14 15 And I want to congratulate all staff members here this evening. They deserve a 16 round of applause. 17 18 (Applause.) 19 SENATOR SAMPSON: Thank you very 20 much, Mr. President. And thank you to all my 21 colleagues. And when I think about this 22 legislative term, I think about a tale of two 23 sessions. And what I mean by that is, in 2011, 24 25 we accomplished some amazing things. We had some

1 amazing progressive accomplishments such as marriage equality, a property tax cap, renewed 2 and reformed rent regulations, a new tax code for 3 4 the State of New York, and an economic recovery 5 plan which helped create jobs, strengthen our economy, and reduce unemployment in our most 6 7 vulnerable communities. These are accomplishments that were supported, long 8 supported by us, but most of all supported by 9 10 everyone. But while I sit here today, at the 11 end of this session, we see a different tale. 12 And what I mean is yes, we passed an on-time 13 14 budget. Yes, we passed some important 15 legislation like The Justice Center -- again, looking out for the most vulnerable. Yes, we 16 passed cyberbullying, helping to protect our 17 18 children, because they deserve to be protected. Yes, we passed teacher evaluations, bringing 19 20 accountability to our school systems and telling our parents that we have heard their cries. 21 Yes, the trains seem to be running 22 on time. But, my colleagues, sometimes 23 appearances are deceiving. Left at the station 24 25 are the hardworking people of New York.

And what do I mean by that?
New York is a progressive state that looks out
for every single New Yorker. Yes, this body in
one year has dramatically moved away from the
great progressive agenda that we passed last
year. And what I'm talking about is when I look
at the way we failed to help over 1 million
hardworking New Yorkers to rise out of
bone-crushing poverty because of political
posturing. And what I mean is not raising the
minimum wage.
This is not a political issue, this
is a moral issue. Raising the minimum wage will
put money in the pockets of low-income workers,
provide a much-needed boost to local economies,
and restore New York's standing as a leader on
economic fairness.
Yet this chamber voted against
hardworking people and refused to raise the
minimum wage despite the overwhelming statewide
support. But what is most disheartening to me is
when I read an article in the paper this week
that talked about giving legislators raises. And
do we deserve raises? We do deserve raises, but
we need to be talking about raising the minimum

1	wage before we talk about legislative raises.
2	My colleagues, this is not the only
3	failure. Another failure is the ongoing attack
4	in the war we have seen against women throughout
5	this country. And unfortunately, we have our
6	issues here, not only in New York State but here
7	in this chamber, by not really pushing
8	legislation that can crucially help women in
9	New York State. Women are facing increased
10	pressure and continued assault on their
11	hard-fought rights for equality and reproductive
12	health. These actions have been spearheaded by a
13	radical agenda that has no place here in New York
14	State.
15	My colleagues, we also have failed
16	to protect the air we breathe and the water we
17	drink. We have turned our backs on common-sense
18	legislation to protect our environment. I find
19	it hard to believe that anyone in this chamber
20	disagrees with the idea that before we allow
21	companies to start drilling for gas and pumping
22	chemicals near our watersheds we should conduct a
23	study to understood the possible consequences.
24	While there is no doubt we need to
25	find new energy resources, we cannot afford to

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extract them while destroying our health. 1 We don't want to wake up one morning saying we could 2 have, we should have, but we didn't, to avoid a 3 natural disaster. We don't want a repeat of 4 Love Canal II. 5 My colleagues, we have also failed 6 7 to bring government back to the people. And what I mean is that we have pushed for campaign 8 9 finance reform. And the reason we push it is 10 because we see the way big money, big donors play in pushing forth legislation not only here but 11 12 throughout this country. Our constituents deserve better. 13 We have also failed when we talk 14 15 about providing equal access to educational opportunities to all New Yorkers regardless of 16 immigration status. What we fail to realize is 17 18 this country has been built on the backs of 19 immigrants. Every New Yorker deserves the same 20 access to financial aid as they pursue a higher education. It is not just the right thing to do, 21 22 it is a smart way to ensure New York has a better-educated workforce in the future so we can 23 compete in the global economy and allow our 24 25 children to realize their dreams.

We have witnessed a failure with 1 2 respect to public safety when we talk about gun violence. We need to pass common-sense gun 3 4 control measures like microstamping. 5 My colleagues, what it's come to and what we have realized is the difference 6 7 between the privileged versus the people, the haves versus the have-nots. And this is how 8 everyday New Yorkers are feeling. If they don't 9 10 have enough money, if they can't hire the best lobbyists, they feel they're left out of 11 12 government. We have to do more to assure them that their voices are truly heard. 13 This is about what we talk about a 14 15 progressive agenda. Because people are not concerned about party affiliations. They're not 16 concerned about a Democrat or Republican. 17 What 18 they're concerned about is the ability to have hope, the ability to provide a future for their 19 20 children. 21 We have had an opportunity, we have 22 done phenomenal work, and we must continue to do 23 phenomenal work as long as we're working together. I want to thank the Governor, I want 24 25 to thank Speaker Silver, and also I want to thank

1 you, Senator Skelos. You have provided an opportunity for all of us to be all we can, and I 2 want to thank you for your commitment and 3 4 dedication, not only to your colleagues here but 5 also to the people of the State of New York. So, my colleagues, our work is far 6 7 from done. We have a lot of work ahead of us. But tonight is a night that we say thank you to 8 our staff, thank you to our colleagues, and thank 9 10 you to our colleagues who are leaving the New York State Senate. 11 12 This is a phenomenal chamber. We have done great work. But, my colleagues, people 13 14 out there are watching us, because there is a lot 15 of work left undone. Thank you very much, everyone. 16 17 Godspeed, and everyone have a great and wonderful 18 summer. Thank you very much, Mr. President. 19 (Applause.) 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: We now 21 recognize our Majority Leader, Senator Dean 22 Skelos. 23 SENATOR SKELOS: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 24 25 Let me start off by wishing the

1 best for our colleagues that are departing the 2 State Senate. Senator Oppenheimer, you and I were 3 4 elected together, and I can't believe that we 5 just found out that you were living with George Maziarz after all these years. 6 7 (Laughter.) 8 SENATOR SKELOS: Tom Duane. Α good friend, we've traveled together. 9 I think 10 you've opened our minds a little bit. And 11 certainly you've served this chamber with great distinction. 12 And I'll always consider you my 13 Tom, thank you for your service. 14 friend. 15 And to my buddy, Jim Alesi. It's very hard to say goodbye from the chamber to 16 somebody you love and care so much about. 17 Jim 18 has not only been my political ally, but he's also been my friend. 19 20 Jimmy, I can't top the comments you But if we lived by those words, if we 21 made. 22 reproduce them and read them every so often, this 23 chamber truly will be a better place and, as individuals, we will be better people. 24 25 So, Jimmy, I salute you for your

1 great service also. 2 (Applause.) SENATOR SKELOS: Today we conclude 3 4 one of the most productive and orderly 5 legislative sessions that I've been part of. Working with Governor Cuomo, we have built on the 6 7 record of accomplishment we started last year and have continued to move New York forward. 8 9 New York State residents can be 10 proud of a functioning state government. We passed an early budget for the second year in a 11 12 row, a budget that did not include any taxes, taxes of the past that hurt middle-income 13 families to the tune of \$14 billion and the 14 15 elimination of the STAR rebate checks that so many people depended upon. 16 We closed a deficit of nearly 17 18 \$3 billion, and we enacted new programs to create jobs in every part of the state. 19 20 We enacted pension reform to ease 21 the crunch on local governments and school 22 districts. We approved the takeover of the local share of Medicaid growth that will save our 23 counties billions of dollars. We set an example 24 25 for spending restraint by reducing the Senate

budget by millions of dollars. 1 2 After three years of Senator Lanza's and Senator Hannon's efforts, we passed 3 I-STOP and found a solution to help prevent 4 5 prescription drug abuse. Senator Saland led the charge to 6 7 approve legislation to protect the victims of 8 domestic violence. 9 With Senator McDonald's leadership, 10 we acted boldly and urgently to create The Justice Center for people with special 11 12 needs. 13 It was Senator Golden in this house 14 who provided the push to reach an agreement on 15 legislation to prohibit the viewing of child pornography. 16 We won passage of legislation to 17 18 grow and expand the craft brewing industry in New York State, thanks to the efforts of 19 20 Senators Zeldin, Ritchie and Griffo. 21 And all of our members supported a 22 measure to combat cyberbullying, a serious and 23 growing problem. All of these good things happened 24 25 because Republicans in the Senate worked together

with Governor Cuomo and the Assembly to make
 Albany function again for the benefit of the
 people.

4 The Senate also approved our 5 New Jobs New York plan to help create thousands of new private-sector jobs. Even though we did 6 7 not have a partner in the Assembly to enact the plan, we have a partner in the residents of 8 9 New York who understand the need to help 10 businesses create jobs and to have public policy decisions that are made to create jobs and not to 11 kill jobs. 12

That's why Senate Republicans will continue to fight to cut taxes as well as to provide property tax relief for homeowners, and why we will continue to work to help people afford the cost of college education and to relieve mandates that drive up costs for local governments and school districts.

20 Over the last two years our 21 priorities have been the people's priorities, and 22 I'm proud to say that we have accomplished the 23 vast majority of them. That would not have been 24 possible without the hard work of our members and 25 all of the people who make the Senate operate so

efficiently. 1 2 I want to start off by thanking the Deputy Majority Leader, Senator Tom Libous, who 3 4 ran the floor operation and always made sure that 5 there was plenty of time for Senator Krueger to ask questions. 6 7 (Laughter.) 8 SENATOR SKELOS: I want to thank Rebecca Wood, floor counsel, who had so many 9 10 challenges in her own life. And we see how, with the grace of God, her health is being restored. 11 12 A young woman of strength, of character. And, Rebecca, we thank you very 13 14 much. 15 (Applause.) 16 SENATOR SKELOS: Senator John DeFrancisco, who has done such an outstanding job 17 18 as chairman of our Finance Committee, who had to endure so many hearings. 19 20 But he has really represented us so well on the floor, John, and I thank you for your 21 22 hard work. We appreciate it. 23 Senate Minority Leader John Sampson, for your cooperation. You know, we all 24 take credit for things that happen, but so many 25

1 of our accomplishments this year were done on a bipartisan basis. And I thank you for your 2 friendship this year and for so many years. 3 John, I thank you. 4 5 And to Senator Jeff Klein, Independent Democrat Conference leader, for your 6 7 friendship and support. Jeff, I thank you. 8 Robert Mujica. I don't know where any of us would be, Republicans or Democrats, 9 10 without the intellect, the focus, delivering our message, negotiating day and night, 24/7. 11 12 Robert, I personally thank you. I could not function as Majority Leader of this 13 14 Senate chamber. And I know you make all of our 15 lives so much easier. And I thank you, Robert Mujica. 16 (Applause.) 17 18 SENATOR SKELOS: Our counsel, Diane Burman. Now, what many of you may not 19 20 know, when my son Adam was a little boy, Diane babysat for him back in Rockville Centre. And 21 she certainly has, and I say this in a most 22 respectful way, has matured into an incredibly 23 fine chief counsel. 24 25 And, Diane, we all thank you for

your good work. Thank you, Diane. 1 2 (Applause.) SENATOR SKELOS: 3 Now, Frank 4 Patience, our Secretary of the Senate. Besides 5 saving the Senate and the taxpayers of the state millions and millions of dollars, he's also made 6 7 sure that we've been well-fed. 8 (Laughter.) 9 SENATOR SKELOS: So, Frank, I 10 thank you for that. (Applause.) 11 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 12 Tom Dunham, Director of Majority Operations, who has 13 been at my side so for so many years, came to me 14 15 as a young man. He's worked so hard to make this a successful session. 16 And, Tom, I thank you very much for 17 18 your hard work. 19 (Applause.) 20 SENATOR SKELOS: Kelli Cummings, 21 Director of Communications, who so often says to 22 me, "Why the heck did you say that?" 23 (Laughter.) SENATOR SKELOS: But she has made 24 25 me look good. She communicates our message in

1 such a great way. 2 And, Kelli, I thank you very much 3 for your hard work. 4 (Applause.) 5 SENATOR SKELOS: To all the members of our Finance, Counsel, and 6 7 Communications staff, to everyone in Bill Drafting, Senate Revision, the Document Room, and 8 to everyone in this chamber who works tirelessly 9 10 to help us do our jobs, we say thank you to you. On behalf of myself and all of the 11 members here, I know that we have had a historic 12 year, and we thank you for making that possible. 13 And as we conclude this session, we 14 15 move from building our record to running on it. I wish all of my colleagues a great summer. 16 To my Republican members, work hard 17 18 in your district, meeting with your constituents. And to my Democrat colleagues, if 19 20 there's a convention you would like to go to, we will make sure that the Senate will take care of 21 22 that. 23 (Laughter.) Will you pay for 24 SENATOR SAMPSON: 25 it too? If you want to pay for it, we'll go.

Only in the 1 SENATOR SKELOS: 2 state. 3 (Laughter.) 4 SENATOR SKELOS: But again, thank 5 you to everybody, both Republicans, Democrats. You have made this, I know personally for me, an 6 7 outstanding year. You've made it an outstanding two years for me as Majority Leader. But even 8 9 more important, you've made it an outstanding, 10 successful two years for the people of the State of New York. 11 12 I look forward to joining with all of us again in 2013, if not sooner, as we 13 continue to work so hard for the people of the 14 15 State of New York. 16 Thank you, and God bless you all. (Standing ovation.) 17 18 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, at this time I move that the Senate adjourn to the 19 call of the Majority Leader and Temporary 20 President, intervening days being legislative 21 22 days. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 23 On motion, the Senate stands adjourned until the 24 25 call of the Temporary President of the Senate,

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intervening days being legislative days.
