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1 PROCEEDINGS 2 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The 3 Senate will come to order. 4 I ask everyone present to please 5 rise and repeat the Pledge of Allegiance. (Whereupon, the assemblage recited б 7 the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: In the 9 absence of clergy, I ask all to bow their heads 10 for a moment of silence. (Whereupon, the assemblage respected 11 a moment of silence.) 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The reading of the Journal. 14 15 THE SECRETARY: In Senate, Friday, 16 January 25th, the Senate met pursuant to adjournment. The Journal of Thursday, 17 18 January 24th, was read and approved. On motion, Senate adjourned. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Without 21 objection, the Journal stands approved as read. 22 Presentation of petitions. 23 Messages from the Assembly. Messages from the Governor. 24 25 Reports of standing committees.

Reports of select committees. 1 2 Communications and reports from 3 state officers. Motions and resolutions. 4 5 Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, б 7 Madam President. Madam President, I move that the 8 9 following bill be discharged from its respective 10 committee and be recommitted with instructions to strike the enacting clause. And that would be 11 12 Senate Print 2307, by Senator Ball. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: So ordered. 14 15 Senator Libous. 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, at this time I will call an immediate meeting of 17 18 the Rules Committee in Room 332. Immediate meeting of the Rules Committee in Room 332. 19 20 The Senate should stand at ease. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: There 22 will be an immediate meeting of the Rules Committee in Room 332. 23 The Senate will stand at ease. 24 25 (Whereupon, the Senate stood at ease

at 3:16 p.m.) 1 2 (Whereupon, the Senate reconvened at 3 3:50 p.m.) SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Libous. 6 7 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 8 Madam President. May we please return to reports of 9 10 standing committees. I believe there's a report of the Rules Committee at the desk. I ask that 11 it be read at this time. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Reports 13 of standing committees. 14 15 There is a report of the 16 Rules Committee at the desk. The Secretary will read. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Senator Skelos, from the Committee on Rules, reports the 19 20 following resolution: 21 Number 314, by Senators Skelos and 22 Klein, Senate Resolution amending Section 1 of Rule 8 of the Senate Rules, in relation to 23 establishing a Standing Committee on 24 25 Infrastructure and Capital Investment.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 2 Libous. 3 SENATOR LIBOUS: I move to accept the report of the Rules Committee. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: All in favor of accepting the report of the 6 7 Rules Committee signify by saying aye. 8 (Response of "Aye.") 9 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Opposed, 10 nay. 11 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 12 The report is accepted. 13 Senator Libous. 14 15 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, 16 there's a privileged resolution at the desk. May we please have the title read and move for its 17 18 immediate adoption. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 19 The 20 Secretary will read. 21 THE SECRETARY: Senate Resolution 22 Number 314, by Senators Skelos and Klein, amending Section 1 of Rule 8 of the Senate Rules, 23 in relation to establishing a Standing Committee 24 25 on Infrastructure and Capital Investment.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The 2 question is on the resolution. All in favor 3 signify by saying aye. 4 (Response of "Aye.") 5 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Opposed, б nay. 7 (No response.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The 9 resolution is adopted. 10 Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 11 Madam President. 12 13 There's another privileged resolution at the desk. May we have the title 14 15 read and move for its immediate adoption. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The Secretary will read. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Senate Resolution by Senators Skelos and Klein, providing for a 19 20 Senate Select Committee on Libraries. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The question is on the resolution. All in favor 22 signify by saying aye. 23 24 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 25 Opposed,

1 nay. 2 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 3 4 Senator Farley. SENATOR FARLEY: Thank you, 5 Madam President. 6 7 I rise to speak to this resolution because, you know, we're a very partisan group in 8 here, and if there's anything that is nonpartisan 9 10 in this Senate, it is libraries. When I first came into the Senate 11 12 37 years ago -- I think before you were even born, Madam President -- but anyway, when I first 13 came into the Senate, they said, "Professor, 14 15 you've got libraries." 16 And I've had it ever since, and it's been a labor of love. There were 17 18 subcommittees and so forth, and in the last session they created a Select Committee on 19 20 Libraries. 21 Frankly, it's one of the largest committees in the New York State Senate. And 22 when it was proposed, practically every member 23 from both sides wanted to get on it. 24 25 And it does meet, and we had a very

fine meeting last year, informative -- it's 1 called a roundtable -- where we discussed the 2 needs of the libraries and heard from the leaders 3 of this area. And this house was successful in 4 5 getting in the budget a \$3.9 million increase in the aid to libraries. 6 7 Of course I think if there's anything we want to go forward with, that 8 9 libraries should be considered just like 10 education. If education gets a raise, so should libraries, because they are the cathedrals of 11 12 learning for the general public. Additionally, we were able to pass 13 almost the entire agenda for the New York State 14 15 Library Association. You know, New York State is far and 16 away the leader in the nation in libraries. 17 18 There's no state that even compares to us. We have 750 public libraries, there are 2,000 school 19 20 libraries and 265 academic libraries and 450 special and institution libraries that are 21 chartered in this state. 22 As I said, in New York State 23 libraries are the cathedrals of learning for the 24 25 general public. And they help the public access

1 information, and particularly the poor and the elderly and so forth. And they are moving into 2 the high-tech area. And many people use the 3 libraries to further their education, to find 4 5 jobs, and further their careers. Libraries are an incredible service 6 7 to the public, and I commend the leadership of 8 this house for recognizing that. And we look 9 forward to a good year for libraries. And I 10 thank my colleagues on both sides of this aisle for their tremendous support of libraries. 11 12 Thank you, Madam President. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 13 Thank 14 you, Senator Farley. 15 Senator Serrano on the resolution. SENATOR SERRANO: Thank you very 16 much, Madam President. 17 18 I just wanted to thank Senator Farley for this resolution and the work 19 20 that he's done on libraries. 21 I had the good fortune of serving on the select committee last year. And I think 22 it's so important. Oftentimes libraries are 23 forgotten. We sort of take them for granted, we 24 25 think they're always going to be there, we always

1 they're going to be well-stocked and up-to-date and have all of the things that they need to 2 operate, but they oftentimes don't. They get 3 4 forgotten. 5 And it's important that we as elected officials fortify them, make sure that 6 7 they have the tools that they need to continue 8 being the cathedrals to education, as the Senator very aptly put it. 9 10 So I commend the Senator for his great work on libraries. I want to work with you 11 12 on this, and I hope that all of us in both houses really do a lot of work to make sure that they 13 are fortified throughout the state. 14 15 Thank you. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Are there any other members wishing to speak on the 17 18 resolution? 19 Seeing none, the question had been 20 put before Senator Farley got up. It was clear 21 the ayes have it. The resolution is adopted. 22 Senator Libous. 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Madam President. 24 25 There's another privileged

resolution at the desk. Could we have the title 1 2 read and move for its immediate adoption, and I believe you could call on Senator Maziarz. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The 5 Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Senate Resolution 6 7 by Senators Skelos and Klein, providing for a 8 Senate Select Committee on State-Native American 9 Relations. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Maziarz. 11 12 SENATOR MAZIARZ: Thank you very much, Madam President. 13 I want to begin by thanking 14 15 Senators Skelos and Klein for reappointing this committee for another two years ago. The Select 16 Committee on State-Native American Relations is 17 18 the only official legislative entity aimed at promoting cooperation between the State of 19 20 New York and our various Native American nations. 21 Over the last two years, I and 22 members of the committee have visited with the 23 Seneca Nation, the Tuscarora Nation, the St. Regis Mohawk Nation, and the Oneida Nation. 24 25 During the next two years we plan

on completing visits to all the other 1 Native American nations. 2 And all too often I think that news 3 reports tend to pigeonhole, if you will, the 4 5 interests of Native Americans in maybe one or two specific areas. But really what we have found is 6 7 that there are a diversity of issues involving 8 the state in areas where we can work 9 cooperatively with our neighbors and friends in 10 the various Native American communities. Certainly when it comes to economic 11 12 development, I can tell you within my district alone, the Seneca Nation is one of the largest 13 employers, not just in my district but in all of 14 Western New York. They're a great economic 15 development engine up in the North Country in 16 Senator Little's district and certainly in 17 18 Central New York and the Syracuse area. The members of this committee look 19 20 forward to holding additional hearings. We held 21 two hearings already on economic development 22 issues, energy-related issues. I know that we've worked with the Seneca Nation on the Kinzua Dam 23 project in Western New York, where the Senecas 24 25 have taken a leading role in providing and

getting hydropower that's produced here in the 1 2 State of New York, or with assets of the State of New York, to be brought back here to benefit both 3 the state and the Seneca Nation. 4 5 So it is with gratitude, Madam President, that I rise in support of the 6 7 continuation of the good work that we've been 8 doing for two years with the start, and I think 9 we will see more successes this year. 10 Thank you very much, Madam President. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Thank you, Senator Maziarz. 13 Are there any other Senators 14 15 wishing to be heard on the resolution? 16 Seeing none, the question is on the resolution. All in favor signify by saying aye. 17 18 (Response of "Aye.") 19 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Opposed, 20 nay. 21 (No response.) 22 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The 23 resolution is adopted. Senator Libous. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President,

1 can we return to messages from the Assembly, 2 please. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Messages 4 from the Assembly. 5 The Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: The Assembly sent 6 7 for concurrence the following bill. 8 On motion by Senator Skelos and 9 Senator Klein, the rules were suspended and said 10 bill ordered to third reading: Assembly Bill Number 2296. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The bill is ordered direct to third reading. 13 The Secretary will read. 14 15 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 8, by Member of the Assembly Abbate, Assembly Print 16 2296, an act to amend the Administrative Code of 17 18 the City of New York. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Read the 19 20 last section. 21 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 22 act shall take effect immediately. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Call the roll. 24 25 (The Secretary called the roll.)

1 Ayes, 58. THE SECRETARY: 2 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The bill 3 is passed. Senator Libous. 4 5 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, at this time Senator Skelos hands up the б 7 following Republican conference membership, in 8 accordance with the rules. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: So 10 ordered. Senator Libous. 11 12 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, at this time Senator Klein hands up the following 13 IDC conference membership. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: So 16 ordered. 17 Senator Libous. 18 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, 19 Senator Klein and Senator Skelos hand up the 20 following committee assignments and ask that such 21 assignments be filed in the Journal. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: So 23 ordered. SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, 24 25 if we could just not even stand at ease, just

take a deep breath for a moment. We have some 1 2 administrative work that is taking place here at the chair. And as soon as that is completed, 3 we'll take the next step. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: We will take a deep breath, Senator Libous. 6 7 (Pause.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 9 Libous, I've been holding my breath. 10 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, you no longer have to hold your breath. That was 11 12 pretty good, about 25 minutes. 13 In consultation with Senator Stewart-Cousins, Senator Klein, Senator Skelos, I 14 15 hand up the following committee minority assignments and ask that said assignments be 16 filed in the Journal, please. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: So ordered. 19 20 Senator Libous. 21 SENATOR LIBOUS: Is there any 22 further business at the desk? ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 23 There is no further business at the desk. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you,

Madam President. There being no further business, I move that we adjourn until Tuesday, January 29th, at 11:00 a.m. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: There being no further business, on motion, the Senate б stands adjourned until Tuesday, January 29th, at 11:00 a.m. (Whereupon, at 4:19 p.m., the Senate adjourned.)
