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PROCEEDINGS 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The Senate will please come to order. 3 4 I ask everyone present to rise and 5 repeat with me the Pledge of Allegiance. (Whereupon, the assemblage recited б 7 the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Today's invocation will be delivered by Rabbi Michael 9 10 Miller, the executive vice president and CEO of the Jewish Community Relations Council of 11 12 New York. RABBI MILLER: On the six Sabbaths 13 14 between Passover and Shavuot/Pentecost, it is 15 customary in traditional Jewish homes to study the six chapters of Ethics of the Fathers, 16 written by our Rabbinic sages 2,000 years ago. 17 18 This past Sabbath we read in the third chapter the Rabbi Chanina, the deputy high 19 20 priest, said: "Pray for the welfare of the 21 government, for absent our awe of those setting and maintaining social order, the fabric of 22 society would unravel and anarchy would 23 prevail." 24 25 Indeed, Rabbi Shimon, the son of

Gamliel, said in the first chapter, "The world 1 endures on three things: Justice, truth and 2 3 peace. Without those three cardinal values, 4 society would crumble." 5 As I pray today for the welfare of the government, it is clearly evident that it is б 7 this Senate, in this chamber, which ensures for the citizens of this state that the rule of 8 law -- justice -- based on self-evident 9 10 realities -- truth -- will provide for a safe, 11 just and harmonious social climate -- peace --12 so as to guarantee a bright today and even brighter tomorrow for all New Yorkers. 13 14 We pray that the Lord of the 15 Universe bestow His abundant blessings upon you, the men and women of the New York State Senate, 16 as you labor to attain that indispensable and 17 18 sacred mission. May your deliberations be sound and your decisions be wise, and may all your 19 20 actions be dedicated to the advancement of the 21 welfare of humankind. 22 Amen. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 23 The reading of the Journal. 24 25 THE SECRETARY: In Senate, Friday,

1 April 19th, the Senate met pursuant to 2 adjournment. The Journal of Thursday, April 18th, was read and approved. On motion, 3 Senate adjourned. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Without objection, the Journal stands approved as read. б 7 Presentation of petitions. 8 Messages from the Assembly. 9 Messages from the Governor. 10 Reports of standing committees. Reports of select committees. 11 12 Communications and reports from state officers. 13 Motions and resolutions. 14 15 Senator Libous. 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Madam President. I have a couple of motions. 17 18 On behalf of Senator Nozzolio, on 19 page 22 I offer the following amendments to 20 Calendar Number 235, Senate Print Number 3593A, 21 and ask that said bill retain its place on the 22 Third Reading Calendar. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The amendments are accepted, and the bill will 24 retain its place on the Third Reading Calendar. 25

Thank you, 1 SENATOR LIBOUS: 2 Madam President. On behalf of Senator Little, on 3 4 page 23 I offer the following amendments to 5 Calendar Number 245, Senate Print 1013, and ask that said bill retain its place on the Third 6 7 Reading Calendar. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The amendments are accepted, and the bill will retain 9 10 its place on the Third Reading Calendar. SENATOR LIBOUS: And, Madam 11 President, at this time if I could call an 12 immediate meeting of the Rules Committee -- oh, 13 14 I'm sorry, we're not going to call an immediate 15 meeting of the Rules Committee. 16 We are going to pull up a resolution by Senator DeFrancisco. It's Resolution 17 18 Number 634. I believe it has been previously adopted. I would ask at this time that you read 19 20 its title and call on the good Senator. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The Secretary will read. 22 23 THE SECRETARY: Legislative Resolution Number 634, by Senator DeFrancisco, 24 25 honoring Mari DeTota upon the occasion of

capturing First Place in the Elks Area 1 National 1 2 Soccer Shoot-Out. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 4 DeFrancisco. Thank you, 5 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Madam President. 6 7 This was previously adopted, and we wanted to make sure that Mari was able to be here 8 to see the recognition that she's receiving from 9 10 the State Senate. And sometimes people kind of groan 11 12 when I stand up, because we have all the athletes in Central New York. And we feel sorry for the 13 14 rest of the areas, but we want to keep showcasing 15 those athletes. 16 Mari won the Elks Area 1 National Soccer Shoot-Out in October of last year in 17 18 Poughkeepsie, New York. She got her ticket to the nationals by beating Maine, New Hampshire, 19 20 Vermont, Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island, almost all of the original 13 21 states. But she went further than that and won 22 the National Shoot-Out, an 11-year-old girl who I 23 understand is a good student. 24 25 And she's going to get to be a

better student, correct, as she goes through the 1 2 rest of her schoolwork. And I just wanted to honor Mari for 3 4 her accomplishment. It's an incredible 5 accomplishment when anyone at any age, let alone 11, wins a national competition. 6 So 7 congratulations. 8 And she's here with her parents, Ron and Michelle; her sister, Veronica -- who didn't 9 10 win a shoot-out yet, but maybe later; 11 grandparents Joe and Marianne Granteed, Ron and Kathy DeTota. The whole family's here. And 12 cousin Megan skipped school today too. 13 14 (Laughter.) 15 CHAIRMAN DeFRANCISCO: So congratulations to this fine work. 16 And I'd ask you to recognize 17 18 Senator Valesky. Mari was in my district when 19 she won the championship. With redistricting, we 20 thought it would be fair for Senator Valesky to 21 have some athletes as well, so she's in 22 Senator Valesky's current district. 23 Thank you, Madam President. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 24 25 Valesky on the resolution.

SENATOR VALESKY: 1 Thank you, 2 Madam President. 3 And thank you, Senator DeFrancisco, 4 for being so kind and sharing your champions with 5 me and the rest of the state. I want to certainly offer my 6 7 personal congratulations to Mari and her entire family. It's a very special thing that you've 8 done for yourself, for your family, for the 9 10 community. 11 And it gives us great honor as members of this New York State Senate to 12 recognize you and your efforts. You are already 13 14 a role model at a very young age. And certainly 15 with status as a role model comes responsibility, and I know you know that. And you're certainly 16 well-prepared and well-suited to show your 17 18 classmates what it means to be a champion. 19 So congratulations. Thank you for 20 joining us today. And we certainly look forward to hearing more great things about you in a very 21 22 bright future that you have ahead, I'm sure of that. Thank you. 23 Thank you, Madam President. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Thank

1 you, Senator Valesky. 2 This resolution has been previously 3 adopted on March 7th. But we welcome Mari DeTota and her 4 5 family here to the New York State Senate and congratulate you on your first place in the Elks 6 7 Area 1 National Soccer Shoot-Out. 8 Congratulations. 9 (Applause.) 10 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 11 Libous. 12 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, there will be an immediate meeting of the 13 Rules Committee in Room 332, an immediate meeting 14 15 of the Rules Committee in Room 323. 16 In the interim, the Senate will stand at ease. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: There 19 will be an immediate meeting of the Rules 20 Committee in Room 332. 21 The Senate will stand at ease 22 pending the return of the Rules Committee. 23 (Whereupon, the Senate stood at ease at 3:36 p.m.) 24 (Whereupon, the Senate reconvened at 25

3:49 p.m.) 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 3 Libous. 4 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 5 Madam President. I believe there's a report of the б 7 Rules Committee at the desk. Could we have the 8 report read at this time. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: There is 10 a report of the Rules Committee at the desk. The Secretary will read. 11 12 SENATOR GIANARIS: Madam President. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator DeGianaris, why do you rise? 14 15 (Laughter.) 16 SENATOR GIANARIS: We meet again, Madam President. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Oh, I just made you an Italian. Senator Gianaris, why 19 20 do you rise? 21 SENATOR GIANARIS: Thank you, Madam President. 22 23 Can the appropriate member yield for questions about the Rules report? 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President,

1 could we have the report read first before any 2 questions are asked on it, so it's before the 3 house. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The 5 Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Senator Skelos, 6 7 from the Committee on Rules, reports the 8 following bills: 9 Senate Print 1456, by Senator 10 Flanagan, an act to amend the Penal Law; Senate 1721A, by Senator Grisanti, 11 12 an act to amend the Penal Law; 13 Senate 2135A, by Senator Lanza, an act to amend the Penal Law; 14 15 Senate 2180, by Senator Golden, an 16 act to amend the Penal Law; Senate 2237A, by Senator Golden, an 17 18 act to amend the Penal Law; 19 Senate 2431, by Senator Klein, an 20 act to amend the Penal Law; Senate 2458, by Senator Lanza, an 21 act to amend the Penal Law; 22 Senate 3639, by Senator O'Mara, an 23 act to amend the Penal Law; 24 25 Senate 3710A, by Senator Young, an

1 act to amend the Penal Law; 2 Senate 4342, by Senator Gallivan, an act to amend the Corrections Law; 3 4 Senate 4444, by Senator Golden, an 5 act to amend the Penal Law; Senate 4445A, by Senator Golden, an 6 7 act to amend the Penal Law; 8 And Senate 4600, by Senator Golden, 9 an act to amend the Real Property Tax Law. 10 All bills reported direct to third reading. 11 12 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, could I move to accept the Rules report. 13 14 SENATOR GIANARIS: Madam President, 15 again, I would ask if the appropriate member 16 would yield for questions on the adoption of the 17 report. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 19 Gianaris, first we have to accept the Rules 20 report so that you can debate the Rules report. 21 SENATOR GIANARIS: I believe we're 22 debating its acceptance. He's right. 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 24 Senator 25 Libous.

1 SENATOR LIBOUS: We'll debate its 2 acceptance. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Gianaris. 4 5 SENATOR GIANARIS: Thank you. I assume Senator Libous is yielding. б 7 SENATOR LIBOUS: I assume. 8 SENATOR GIANARIS: I ask, Madam 9 President, if the Senator can answer the question 10 whether or not the makeup of the Rules Committee in terms of its membership has changed in any way 11 from last week. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Are you asking Senator Libous to yield? 14 15 SENATOR GIANARIS: I believe I 16 already asked him to yield. 17 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 18 Libous. 19 (Pause.) 20 SENATOR LIBOUS: I want to get 21 Senator Gianaris an exact answer to his question 22 in one second. 23 Madam President, through you, the makeup of the Rules Committee hasn't changed. 24 25 SENATOR GIANARIS: If Senator

Libous would continue to yield, Madam President. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 3 Libous, do you continue to yield? 4 SENATOR LIBOUS: I will. I will, 5 Madam President. SENATOR GIANARIS: Is Senator 6 7 Libous aware that the makeup of the Majority 8 Coalition has in fact changed from last week? 9 SENATOR LIBOUS: I am. 10 SENATOR GIANARIS: If the Senator would continue to yield. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Libous, do you continue to yield? 13 SENATOR LIBOUS: 14 Through you, 15 Madam President, I will. 16 SENATOR GIANARIS: Is the Senator further aware that Rule 8 requires the makeup of 17 18 committees to match the percentage as closely as 19 possible that each conference has within this 20 body? 21 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, through you. And in answer to Senator Gianaris's 22 23 question, it's not a match, it's a minimum. SENATOR GIANARIS: Would Senator 24 25 Libous continue to yield.

1 SENATOR LIBOUS: Through you, 2 Madam President, I will. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 4 Libous continues to yield. 5 SENATOR GIANARIS: I would ask Senator Libous if he could point me to the rule б 7 that indicates that the membership is a minimum and not a match. And I believe the quote from 8 the rules is "as nearly as may be." 9 10 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, through you, what I would share with 11 Senator Gianaris is the custom of the house is 12 that when Rule 8 was put into place in 2009, that 13 the committee allocations under Rule 8 are 14 15 designed to give conferences a guaranteed number of spots, acting as a minimum requirement. 16 The Senate rules have ordered that, 17 18 at a minimum, the Democratic Conference and the Majority Coalition shall be represented in 19 20 committees in the same proportion as the members of the Majority Coalition or the Democratic 21 Conference. The rule was put into place in 2009 22 and stands before us today. 23 SENATOR GIANARIS: If the Senator 24 25 would continue to yield, I would appreciate it if

he could cite precisely from which rule he just 1 2 quoted from, because I cannot find that language. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 4 Libous, do you continue to yield? 5 SENATOR LIBOUS: I would. I would tell you that would be Senate Rule 8. Madam б 7 President, through you. SENATOR GIANARIS: If the Senator 8 would continue to yield, I would request some 9 10 more specificity. Is there a paragraph, a subdivision? 11 12 Because the rule I'm looking at, 8(c), says that "The membership of all committees 13 14 shall be composed as nearly as may be of Majority 15 Coalition and Democratic Conference members in the same proportion as the number of Majority 16 Coalition and Democratic Conference members in 17 18 the Senate bears to the total membership of the 19 Senate." The word "at a minimum" does not appear 20 anywhere that in that rule. 21 SENATOR LIBOUS: Through you, 22 Madam President, it was set up that way -because I was involved in setting the rule up at 23 that time in 2009 -- to give each conference a 24 25 minimum. And it is doing that.

And, Senator Gianaris, I guess if 1 2 you would get to your specific point, maybe I could be more specific in my answer. 3 4 SENATOR GIANARIS: Well, if the 5 Senator would continue to yield, my point is whether the rules are being followed. 6 So the 7 clarity as to whether we can agree on what the rule says is important to determining that point. 8 9 As I understand it, is it the 10 Senator's contention that the rule does not in fact say that it's a minimum, but that is how 11 12 Senator Libous believes it was adopted four years ago and therefore that's how we're reading it? 13 14 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, 15 it doesn't say "maximum" either, but it -- the rules are being followed, to answer Senator 16 Gianaris's question specifically. 17 18 SENATOR GIANARIS: If the Senator would continue to yield, it neither says 19 20 "maximum" nor "minimum," it says "as nearly as may be." 21 22 And we are now not in a situation where the committee membership matches the 23 coalition membership as nearly as may be. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President,

1 that really has no factor on the committee membership makeup. 2 The Democratic Conference is 3 4 42 percent. That has not changed. That has 5 remained the same. Unless the Democratic Conference membership is going to change, then 6 7 there might be some factor that would need to be 8 addressed, Madam President. 9 SENATOR GIANARIS: Madam President, 10 if Senator Libous would continue to yield, is it his contention that the percentages only count as 11 it relates to one conference and not the others? 12 13 SENATOR LIBOUS: I'm sorry, 14 Madam President, could you ask the good Senator 15 to repeat his question. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 16 Senator, 17 please repeat your question. 18 SENATOR GIANARIS: I'll be happy 19 to. 20 I was asking if it was the Senator's 21 contention that the formula specified very 22 clearly and very specifically in the rules applies only mathematically to one conference and 23 not the others. Because as I understood your 24 25 previous answer, you said if the Democratic

1 Conference membership changed, then we would 2 change committees, but if the Republican or other conference changed, that we would not. 3 4 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, 5 through you, this system was set up to protect the minority conference. So I don't know why 6 7 Senator Gianaris would be, you know, would be arguing the rule at this point in time. 8 9 SENATOR GIANARIS: Madam President, 10 if Senator Libous would continue to yield, the point is that the rule is established to protect 11 all conferences, and the rule is not being 12 followed. Which is why the objection has been 13 14 raised. 15 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, through you, I would disagree with that. 16 I would point Senator Gianaris to 17 18 Rule 3, where the Temporary President makes the 19 decisions in designating officers of the 20 Senate -- the chair, vice chair, members of all committees, subcommittees, and as otherwise 21 That has been the rule of this house in 22 stated. the 25 years that I've been here, and that has 23 24 not changed. 25 SENATOR GIANARIS: If Senator

Libous would continue to yield, Madam President. 1 2 Whether there's another rule --3 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, I will. 4 5 SENATOR GIANARIS: Thank you, sir. Another rule that does not б 7 specifically address the percentage of committee 8 conference members in committees does not preclude a more specific rule that specifically 9 10 discusses how committee memberships will be allotted among the conferences. 11 12 Now, whether something has been there 25 years or a few months is partially the 13 14 point. These rules were adopted to create a 15 unique situation in this body, and now when that unique situation doesn't fit the desires of the 16 Majority, they're ignored. 17 18 So I ask again why Rule 8(c), through its very clear language that "committee 19 20 membership shall be composed as nearly as may be 21 in the same proportion as the number of conference members bears to the total membership 22 of the Senate," is not being followed with 23 respect to the Rules Committee. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President,

maybe I could answer Senator Gianaris's question 1 2 with a question. 3 And, Senator, are you advocating 4 leaving the committee seats, the four committee 5 vacancies, vacant? SENATOR GIANARIS: 6 Madam President, 7 I am advocating that the rules of the Senate, which were drafted by the Majority, are 8 followed. And if those rules are followed, the 9 10 Majority Coalition membership on the Rules Committee should be 14 members, not 15. 11 12 I didn't draft these rules, I only ask that the Majority follows the rules that it 13 drafted itself. 14 15 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, again, in all due respect to my colleague, I 16 would refer him to Rule 3. I won't read it 17 18 again; I read it once already. 19 I think Rule 3 is self-explanatory. 20 It gives the Temporary President that option. As, again, this house has always given the 21 Temporary President that option, sir. 22 SENATOR GIANARIS: Madam President, 23 if the Senator would continue to yield, I'll ask 24 25 a broader question, which is what is the effect,

what is the practical effect of membership within 1 a conference or of ejection from membership 2 within a conference to this body? 3 4 Because it seems to me that a member 5 has been ejected from a conference and yet there is no consequence on the functioning of the 6 7 Senate other than a PR victory for those who 8 ejected him. 9 SENATOR LIBOUS: It also -- Madam 10 President, through you, it protects those members who decide to leave a conference on their own. 11 12 So if any particular member here was not happy, Senator, with their respective conference and 13 they wanted to decide to go off on their own, it 14 15 would protect them also. 16 SENATOR GIANARIS: Madam President, if the Senator would continue to yield, we're 17 18 going a little off-topic, but with --19 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Do you 20 continue to yield, Senator Libous? SENATOR LIBOUS: He gets ahead of 21 22 me, Madam President. I will continue to yield. 23 SENATOR GIANARIS: Thank you. 24 I respectfully disagree, because 25 there's a rule in here that also says that the

memberships of conferences must be approved by 1 2 the leaders. So in fact an individual member does not have the latitude, according to these 3 rules, to leave at will. 4 5 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, I respectfully disagree with Senator Gianaris. б 7 SENATOR GIANARIS: As it relates to 8 which issue? 9 SENATOR LIBOUS: The statement you 10 just made, sir. SENATOR GIANARIS: If Senator 11 Libous will continue to yield on this. 12 SENATOR LIBOUS: 13 I will, Madam President. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The 16 Senator continues to yield. SENATOR GIANARIS: I will try and 17 18 wrap this up, because it's not my intention to delay; I just want to get clarity. 19 20 I'll ask again, because I don't believe my previous question was answered, which 21 22 is: What is the practical consequence of a member being ejected from their conference? 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President, 24 25 through you. And Senator, I think that's pretty

clear. Again, if you read Rule 8 and you read 1 Senate Rule 3, I think it's very clear as to how 2 the makeup of committees are structured and how 3 4 we move forward as a Senate. 5 Those committees have never been structured here on the floor, they have always б 7 been structured through the Temporary President, and decisions have been made by the Temporary 8 President in the makeup of those committees. 9 10 SENATOR GIANARIS: If the Senator would continue to yield. 11 If it's the Senator's contention 12 that the Majority can do what it wishes when it 13 14 wishes, I would prefer you just say that and we 15 could end this debate. 16 But the rules are very clear. The leaders get to choose which members of their 17 18 conference belong to certain committees, but the rules provide a very specific formula for how 19 20 many of their conference members get to be appointed. And right now we are functioning in 21 22 violation of that rule. If it is the Majority's contention 23 that the rules are irrelevant, then please state 24 25 so and we could move on with the business of the

1	Senate.
2	But we adopted these rules that the
3	Majority drafted, we are operating now in
4	violation of these rules. And the best answer I
5	seem to get, if I'm understanding you correctly,
6	is that the leaders can choose to do what they
7	wish when they wish.
8	SENATOR LIBOUS: Madam President,
9	although Senator Gianaris's discussion is not
10	germane to accepting the Rules report, I will
11	still try to refer him to Rule 8 and Rule 3.
12	I think the rules that were drafted
13	and accepted by this house earlier this year and
14	the proportions that were designed back in 2009
15	were set up to protect every individual member in
16	this house. And I'm quite confident and
17	comfortable that if we stand by Rule 8 and stand
18	by Rule 3, that when the leaders decide to make
19	whatever decision the Temporary President
20	decides to make the decision to reassign whomever
21	on those committees, that it would be
22	appropriately made.
23	SENATOR GIANARIS: If the Senator
24	will continue to yield, Madam President.
25	SENATOR LIBOUS: If the question is

germane to accepting the Rules report. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Gianaris, if we could try and bring it back to 3 4 the acceptance of the Rules report. It's 5 apparent that the two of you are never going to agree on Rule 8 or Rule 3. 6 7 SENATOR GIANARIS: Madam President, I would respectfully point out that the adoption 8 of a Rules report from a Rules Committee that was 9 10 illegally composed is relevant and germane to 11 whether or not we accept this Rules report. But I would agree with 12 Senator Libous insofar as the rules are clear and 13 the rules are there to provide protections to all 14 15 the members, and if they're followed, they will 16 do so. The problem is we are very clearly 17 18 and directly ignoring the very straight math 19 required in Rule 8(c), and all I'm getting back 20 is Rule 8 says something different because it's a minimum -- where the word "minimum" never appears 21 22 in that rule. 23 So I understand we're not going to reach agreement here, but I would simply say that 24 25 the Majority shouldn't try and have it both ways.

SENATOR LIBOUS: Are you asking me 1 2 a question? 3 SENATOR GIANARIS: Yes. 4 SENATOR LIBOUS: Through you, 5 Madam President, I believe he's asking me a question. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 8 Gianaris, are you in fact asking a question of 9 Senator Libous? 10 SENATOR GIANARIS: I am. I am stating on 1 2 the floor here that we are following Rule 3 and we are following Rule 8, and I stand by those 3 4 rules. 5 SENATOR GIANARIS: Madam President, б obviously we have a disagreement on that point. 7 But I do object to the acceptance of 8 this Rules report on the grounds that the rules 9 of the Senate are very clearly being violated, 10 the Rules Committee is itself operating 11 illegally. Tomorrow when the Banks, Insurance, 12 and Labor Committees meet, they will also be operating illegally. 13 And I would urge the Majority to 14 15 heed its own rules, because we're going to be having this conversation many more times between 16 now and the end of June if the rules continue to 17 18 be violated. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Thank 20 you, Senator Gianaris. 21 There is a motion to accept the report of the Rules Committee.
