Legislative Body to recognize those events which
foster civic pride and highlight the
contributions of the communities which comprise
the noble body of this great Empire State to the
progression and development of our society; and

"WHEREAS, Attendant to such concerns, and in full accord with its long-standing traditions, this Legislative Body is justly proud to commemorate the 2nd Annual Bronx Day in Albany celebration upon the occasion of marking the centennial of the incorporation of Bronx County; this festive affair will take place on Monday, April 28, 2014, at The Egg in Albany, New York; and

"WHEREAS, The purpose of the annual Bronx Day in Albany celebration is to promote Bronx pride, and allow Bronxites to share their vision for the future of their borough, as well as introduce their products and services; 2014 celebration activities include tours of the Capitol; a small business forum for Bronx businesses; a luncheon; and a 'Taste of the

Bronx' evening reception featuring music from 1 local Bronx bands and a showcase of the best food 2 3 of the borough; and 4 "WHEREAS, The Bronx was incorporated 5 in 1914, the last of New York State's 62 counties to be established; however, this diverse 6 7 municipality has played a noteworthy role in the evolution of New York from its early beginnings; 8 9 and 10 "WHEREAS, Forty-two square miles in 11 size, and the only section of New York City on 12 the mainland, The Bronx is named in memory of the area's first European settler, Jonas Bronck; 13 its earliest settlement was in 1639 along the 14 15 Harlem River in what is now Mott Haven; and "WHEREAS, The Bronx was originally 16 17 part of Westchester County and, in 1841, the 18 New York and Harlem Railroad began regular commuter service between The Bronx and Manhattan; 19 20 by 1895, the area had become a part of New York 21 City; and "WHEREAS, At the turn of the 22 century, the quiet suburban streets and farms of 23 The Bronx began to yield to rapidly expanding 24 25 factories and urban neighborhoods; in 1914, its

main thoroughfare, the Grand Concourse, was completed, and by the 1920s, the Fordham Road-Grand Concourse intersection was a great commercial nexus and a center of tree-lined avenues, with luxurious homes and apartment buildings designed in the latest Art Deco and modernist styles; and

"WHEREAS, Over the last decade of the 19th century and the first quarter of the 20th century, many of the great landmarks which continue to draw hundreds of thousands of visitors to The Bronx every year were developed, including the Bronx Zoo, one of the largest zoos in the world; the beautiful park-like New York Botanical Garden; the Hall of Fame for Great Americans at Bronx Community College (the former campus of New York University); and Yankee Stadium; and

"WHEREAS, By the late 2000s,
The Bronx's bridges, highways, and railroads were
more heavily traveled than those of any other
part of the United States, and it is the home of
12 colleges and universities, including Fordham
University, the Maritime College of the State
University of New York, and three branches of the

1 City University of New York: Lehman College, 2 Bronx Community College, and Hostos Community 3 College; almost 24 percent of the land area is 4 parkland, including Pelham Bay Park, which, at 5 2,772 acres, is the largest park in the city; and "WHEREAS, With a population of more 6 7 than 1.4 million people, The Bronx is one of the most racially and ethnically diverse communities 8 in the United States, and its vibrant 9 10 neighborhoods, industrious civic groups and robust small business sector have long provided 11 12 both a haven and a steppingstone for hardworking immigrants from all over the globe; and 13 "WHEREAS, Remaining fruitful over 14 15 the ebb and flow of decades of growth and change, Bronx County continues its commitment to 16 enhancing the quality of life of its residents, 17 18 ensuring a progressive business, institutional 19 and educational climate, providing essential 20 services, and retaining the cultural vitality and environment that make it a positive place in 21 22 which to live, work and visit; now, therefore, be 23 it "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 24 25 Body pause in its deliberations to commemorate

Under the coordination of Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr., who happens to be around here,

State Senator Jeff Klein, and my good friend

Assemblymember Mark Gjonaj, the Bronx has been recognized today here in Albany for the second year in a row.

But, Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen, you should know, my friends, that it was not always like this. You should know that once upon a time the Bronx was the laughingstock of America. Everyone used to show what was wrong in America by singling out the Bronx.

Politicians looking to make a name for themselves, they came to the Bronx: Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan, Ted Kennedy. They all came to tell you and show the rest of the nation that they, if elected, would save the rest of the nation from going through what the South Bronx was going through.

Moviemakers, Mr. President, you should know, ladies and gentlemen, moviemakers from Hollywood came to the Bronx to make their

movies: Fort Apache, The Bronx, with Paul Newman and Rachel Ticotin; Bonfire of the Vanities, with Tom Hanks; Wolfen, a 1981 crime horror movie.

They were filmed in the Bronx in the rubbish and the destruction to show the world how ugly a place the Bronx used to be.

The Bronx, Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen, you should know the Bronx was burnt out to the ground. Every single building in the South Bronx was burnt. The City of New York used to give properties to anyone that wished to for \$1, no questions asked. Taken. Only Riverdale stood up in the Bronx, and that was off-limits for the rest of us.

Business left. Banks redlined our area. The Bronx was painted as a place full of criminals, drug addicts, prostitution, the worst.

But today, today, ladies and gentlemen, today we are here in this chamber recognizing, honoring the Bronx. The Bronx borough president is here. And now, ladies and gentlemen, Mr. President, you should know that everybody wants to come back to the Bronx. The properties in the Bronx are like gold from the Palestine. Everybody wants to come and invest.

Donald Trump, FreshDirect, Mark Messier.

Everybody loves the Bronx, thanks to those people that stood there. Some of us that never moved, some of us that always stood there.

Thanks to good borough presidents Fernando

Ferrer, Adolfo Carrion, and the one that we have
today. Thanks to Senator Jeff Klein, thanks to
people like all the delegation from the Bronx.

Today we are proud. Today we're here in Albany telling the whole world, Come to the Bronx. I don't know if there's any more room, but you could try.

(Laughter.)

SENATOR DIAZ: You could try. The borough president is always -- the door is always open for you to try. Business wants to come back. Banks want to come back. Health industry. Everybody wants to come back to the Bronx, ladies and gentlemen. But it was not always like that.

I said, "How much do you want 3 for this one?" 4 5 And I realized, after I moved there -- which at first I moved because it was 6 7 affordable. But after just a short time I found that this was a place that was a home. 8 9 I've had the privilege of 10 representing the Bronx for the last four years. And although the district has changed a little 11 12 bit, whether we're talking about the world-famous Bronx Zoo, the Wildlife Conservation Society, 13 14 Fordham Road, the third-largest shopping district 15 in the entire city -- whether we're talking about Bronx Community College, one of our very 16 important CUNY institutions, whether we're 17 18 talking about the Kingsbridge Armory, soon to become the Kingsbridge National Ice Center, the 19 largest ice sports facility in the world -- which 20 I will pause for a second and say certainly if it 21 was not for the efforts of our borough president, 22 would not have happened. 23 This is why the Bronx is changing. 24 25 And this is why we are celebrating Bronx Day

today for the second year in a row. We invite all of you to come, meet our business owners, meet our residents, meet elected officials who are very proud to represent this beautiful borough.

As I had the opportunity to tell a couple of years ago, of all people, the vice president of Vietnam actually visited my office. And he did so because there is a sizable population of Cambodian and Vietnamese folks that live in my district.

And as I was telling him about the borough and I was telling him that, I had on the wall -- there is this famous afghan, it is like a quilt, that is made by the Bronx Historical Society that has a lot of historical -- it has the Bronx Zoo on it and Yankee Stadium, et cetera. And I was pointing at it, and I kept referring to different things on the afghan, telling him about the borough that I call home.

At the end of our conversation, he gave me a gift, it was a model of a drum, a historical drum that has the history of Vietnam carved on it. And I said, "Since you are giving me this from your country, I want to give you

     something from my hometown." And I pulled down

     the afghan and I gave it to him, and he took it
     back home to Vietnam.

Not only do we have some of the most beautiful streets, like the Grand Concourse, and some of the most historic and old parks, old growth, historic growth parks, like Van Cortlandt and Pelham Bay Park, but we have some of the finest universities and some of the richest cultural heritage that you'll find anywhere else.

And our diversity is our strength.

Our diversity is what makes us one of the most amazing places to live and raise a family, the way that I'm doing.

And one of the interesting stories that I always keep in my mind, one of my fondest memories of one of my closest friends here in the Senate chamber -- someone who's no longer with us, and that's the late Senator Morahan. When I was first elected here to the Senate, I'm meeting everyone -- this was back in 2005 -- and I meet

this Senator who represents further north of New York City, up in Orange County, I believe.

But I couldn't get over his Bronx accent. I said, Wait a minute, this guy represents upstate, and he's got the heaviest Bronx accent I've ever heard. And sure enough, when I asked him and spoke with him, he was born and raised in the Bronx, went to Cardinal Hayes High School, where I went to school, and eventually moved with his family and became a representative from that area.

Not a day goes by when I don't meet someone who traces their roots back to the Bronx. So many people trace their roots back. But I think it's important for folks to know now that whatever images you may think you have, if you haven't been to the Bronx lately, you need to go see it for yourself. Don't be swayed by the myths that you see sometimes in Hollywood, in some of the older movies like Bonfire of the Vanities. It really does not tell an accurate story. It never did, and it certainly doesn't now.

See the Bronx now for yourself. See what it's become. And see why it is one of the

and in full accord with its long-standing 1 2 traditions, this Legislative Body is justly proud 3 to commend Brian Avery and Robert Cole for their 4 heroism in rescuing a woman from her burning home 5 on Sunday, November 24, 2013, in Yorktown Heights, New York; and 6 7 "WHEREAS, Brian Avery, a 48-year-old National Guardsman, husband and father of two, 8 and Robert Cole, a 49-year-old husband and father 9 10 of two with no firefighting training, saved the life of a 48-year-old wife and mother of three 11 12 who had just had hip surgery and had been asleep when the fire broke out; and 13 14 "WHEREAS, Brian Avery saw flames at 15 the house and ran to help; after unsuccessfully attempting to shimmy up a column onto the roof, 16 he ran back to his home to grab a ladder; and 17 18 "WHEREAS, Robert Cole was driving on his way to a breakfast celebration of his 19 20 14th wedding anniversary when he saw smoke; he quickly unfastened his seat belt and followed the 21 smoke until he reached the house; and 22 "WHEREAS, After being told there was 23 a woman upstairs, Robert Cole looked up and saw 24 25 the victim with her head and shoulders jutting

Well, when that man was shot, once in the head and I believe twice in the side by a guy named Sirhan Sirhan, Bobby Kennedy, his last words were, "Is everybody okay?" I think my last words would have been something else.

These are the testament of a man or of a woman. And the two men that stand behind me today came together, they never knew each other. They met on the roof, literally. And had it not been for their partnership and their willingness to run into that burning building and to go help

this wonderful family, we may have been reading a 1 2 very tragic account. 3 Also the family is here, Maria, who 4 actually that day was just recovering from a 5 surgery. She's joined by her daughter, Marie, her husband, Giulio, her son Giulio, Jr., and his 6 7 girlfriend Melissa Dee. 8 So I think it's extremely fitting 9 that we realize what a beautiful community we 10 live in and give honor to these great men. It's 11 always amazing when you meet people like this, they never want to be called heroes. And Brian 12 13 has been quoted many times talking about how he's not the hero, it's the men and women who serve in 14 15 combat who never return. 16 But the reality is, Brian and 17 Robert, that you could have never returned that 18 day, as well as those that you saved.
