Young, of Mother Teresa 11 12 Community in Albany. 13 REVEREND YOUNG: Thank you, 14 Senator. 15 Let us pray. 16 Dear God, by Your love You have made a world where we have to become then 17 18 neighbors to each other and we are enabled to 19 love one another. And grant that we too may use 20 then the Senate to strive toward a way of life 21 in keeping with Your plan. 22 God, You have given us a marvelous 23 of charity in the call to us to love one another. ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 13 So 14 ordered. 15 SENATOR HANNON: On behalf of Senator Flanagan, page 38, Calendar Number 440, 16 Senate Print Number 6854, I offer the following 17 18 amendments and ask that the bill retain its place on the Third Reading Calendar. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: So ordered. 21 22 SENATOR HANNON: And finally, on behalf of Senator Farley, on page 52, Calendar 23 595, Senate Print Number 2932, I offer the 24 25 following amendments and ask that the bill retain

1 its place on the Third Reading Calendar. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: So 3 ordered. 4 Senator Hannon. 5 SENATOR HANNON: Mr. President, I'd like to ask if we could now take up a previously 6 7 adopted resolution, Number 3569, by Senator Griffo, read it in its entirety, and ask 8 Senator Griffo to speak on it. 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: The Secretary will read. 11 12 THE SECRETARY: Legislative Resolution Number 3569, by Senator Griffo, 13 14 honoring Olympian Erin Hamlin of Remsen, 15 New York, upon the occasion of capturing the 16 Bronze Medal in Women's Singles Luge at the 2014 Winter Olympic Games in Sochi. 17 18 "WHEREAS, It is the sense of this 19 Legislative Body to extend its full recognition 20 and grateful tribute to the outstanding athletes 21 of New York state who have dedicated their 22 purposeful lives to athletic achievement and proudly represented their great state and nation 23 in Olympic competition; and 24 25 "WHEREAS, Attendant to such concern,

1	and in full accord with its long-standing
2	traditions, this Legislative Body is justly proud
3	to join the community of Remsen, New York, in
4	honoring Olympian Erin Hamlin upon the occasion
5	of capturing the Bronze Medal in Women's Singles
6	Luge at the 2014 Winter Olympic Games in Sochi;
7	and
8	"WHEREAS, On February 11, 2014, Erin
9	Hamlin, a native of Remsen, New York, set a
10	blistering pace during the Women's Singles Luge
11	competition at the Sanki Sliding Center in
12	Krasnaya Polyana, Russia, opening the race with
13	the second fastest heat, and then turning in the
14	third fastest times in each of the remaining legs
15	to complete the race with a four-run total time
16	of 3 minutes, 21.145 seconds fast enough to
17	claim a long-coveted spot on the Olympic podium;
18	and
19	"WHEREAS, Erin Hamlin's Bronze Medal
20	victory has made United States and Olympic Games
21	history; it marks the first time any American
22	singles luge athlete has earned a medal in the
23	50 years since luge became part of the games; and
24	"WHEREAS, A woman of great skill,
25	personal courage and unparalleled dedication,

1 27-year-old Erin Hamlin has an extraordinary 2 record of accomplishment in the luge; her character and athletic achievements are 3 4 world-renowned; and 5 "WHEREAS, The most successful singles racer in United States Olympic history, 6 7 Erin Hamlin is a three-time Olympian; she finished 12th in the women's singles event at the 8 2006 Winter Olympics in Turin, Italy, and she was 9 10 selected in December 2009 to compete at the 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver, Canada, where she 11 12 placed 16th in the luge competition, coming in as the highest-placed American in the event; and 13 "WHEREAS, In February 2009 she 14 15 became the first American to win the Women's Luge World Championships in Lake Placid, 16 New York, and the second American to ever win a 17 18 medal in luging; and "WHEREAS, Erin Hamlin is a two-time 19 20 Verizon United States Junior Women's Singles 21 National Champion, and the 2008 Verizon Women's 22 United States National Champion; she has also won three World Cup bronze medals, as well as gold, 23 silver and bronze World Cup medals in team relay; 24 25 and

"WHEREAS, The daughter of Eileen and 1 2 Ronald Hamlin, Erin Hamlin began her luge career 3 at the age of 12 in Lake Placid, New York, on the 4 same track where she earned her world title; and 5 "WHEREAS, In winning the Bronze Medal at the 2014 Winter Olympics, Erin Hamlin б 7 has not only brought honor to her family, her coaches, and her community of friends, she has 8 inspired the next generation of athletes to break 9 10 barriers and push beyond their perceived limits to reach for excellence; and 11 12 "WHEREAS, Many will only dream of 13 competing in the Olympic Games; this gifted 14 athlete from this great Empire State, through 15 hard work and a tenacious spirit, has made that dream a reality; she has proudly represented her 16 17 country in competition among the world's finest 18 athletes, an honor that gives just cause for her family, community and state to be exceedingly 19 20 proud of her athletic achievements; now, therefore, be it 21 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 22 Body pause in its deliberations to honor Olympian 23 Erin Hamlin upon the occasion of capturing a 24 25 Bronze Medal in Women's Singles Luge at the 2014

Winter Olympic Games in Sochi, to extend its 1 2 heartfelt congratulations on her outstanding accomplishment, and to wish her continued 3 4 success; and be it further 5 "RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted to б 7 Erin Hamlin." ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 8 Senator Griffo on the resolution. 9 10 SENATOR GRIFFO: Thank you, Mr. President. 11 12 I am very honored to have with us in this chamber today Erin Hamlin and her dad, Ron. 13 She is truly an extraordinary 14 15 person. You heard throughout the resolution of the many things that she has been able to 16 accomplish in her very young life. We are 17 18 extremely proud of her in her home community in 19 Oneida County in the town and village of Remsen. 20 She is just an individual who has proven 21 throughout her career that when you believe in 22 something and you are truly determined and make that commitment to excellence, that you can 23 24 succeed. 25 I think you heard the many

accomplishments, the several gold, silver and
bronze medals that she has been able to get
through World Cup competition from 2006 to 2011,
a three-time Olympian across this globe. But
I'll tell you, one of the and the greatest
accomplishment this year to have her win the
Bronze Medal to become the first American to win
an Olympic medal in singles luge. That is
extraordinary.
But because of this achievement, I
think something else that shows you the caliber
of this young lady. Erin also won the honor of
being named this year's Best Female Olympian by
the United States Olympic Committee. So of all
the great athletes who participated in this
year's Olympics that represented our great
country, we are so proud that Erin, by the
committee and her fellow Olympians, they chose
her as the Best Female Olympian. And we're so
proud of that.
It's a sport that's dominated by
Australians and Germans, but Erin proved that an
American is not only able to compete in this
sport but also to achieve the results and the
great recognition that she did because of her

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1 talents in winning a medal.

-	carenes in winning a medal.
2	And those feats have not ended with
3	this Olympic medal that she's received. Again,
4	to show you the type of individual she is and
5	she's been raised by a great family, with her
6	parents again, Ron, who is with us, and her
7	mom, Eileen, who could not be here today
8	grandparents on both sides.
9	I know grandfather Les is a member
10	of the county legislature, Oneida County. And
11	she also kept the memory of her other grandmother
12	who passed away this year, just before, in a
13	tragic accident in our area. And she made a
14	commitment and kept her in her memory as she
15	competed throughout this Olympic cycle.
16	So Erin continues to give back to
17	the community. And that's what's so important.
18	Not only is she in demand right now, and it's so
19	difficult to try to arrange to get her to appear
20	here but we're so pleased that she was able to
21	come here, because we wanted to bestow this type
22	of honor and recognition on her. But she is
23	giving commencement addresses and speaking to
24	chamber organizations.
25	But the most important thing is she

1 is continuing to interact with children and continuing to serve as a role model to young 2 people across not only this state but across the 3 4 nation. And she she's very involved in an effort 5 called City Kids, which provides educational and motivational support to middle and high school 6 7 students living in New York City. So she has really given of herself 8 9 in so many ways, not unseen or unheard of from 10 people in our community, because we know she comes from good stock. But she has been a great 11 example of a person who, when blessed with talent 12 and when making that commitment to excel, also 13 14 then gives back and contributes to her community. 15 So today it's a pleasure to be with you, Erin, to have you come here to this chamber 16 for us to bestow this honor upon you. We thank 17 18 you for your hard work. We thank you for your continued contributions and service to our 19 20 community. We wish you continued success in life because you've got it all ahead of you. 21 22 And we wish you God's blessing and Godspeed. 23 I give you Erin Hamlin. 24 25 (Standing ovation.)

Thank ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 1 2 you, Senator Griffo. 3 Senator Farley. 4 SENATOR FARLEY: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. I had the good fortune of meeting 6 7 Erin at the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Old Forge, where she was the star, and was so 8 impressed with this young woman and the 9 10 remarkable accomplishment that she did in winning the Bronze Medal in the Olympics. 11 12 You know, she goes headfirst in a million miles an hour luge, and as she won that 13 event I was thrilled because I was sure she was 14 15 my constituent, because she only lives a few hundred yards, actually, over in Oneida County. 16 And her uncle I believe lives in the town of 17 18 Russia right across the way. And I thought that she may have been my constituent for a few hours; 19 20 then I find out she's with Senator Griffo. 21 But anyway, what a remarkable 22 accomplishment you did for the United States, and the courage that this young woman has done, 23 particularly the training that goes into this and 24 25 the practice and so forth. And to come from the

small town of Remsen in upstate New York, where 1 2 you must go down that hill into Utica, that's how 3 you get your training. 4 But anyway, Erin is a remarkable 5 young woman who really did proud for our area. And we welcome you here, and congratulations to 6 7 you and your family. ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 8 Senator Little. 9 10 SENATOR LITTLE: Thank you, Mr. President. 11 12 I would like to join Senator Griffo and Senator Farley in congratulating Erin and 13 taking a little bit of credit, as she has a 14 15 second home, kind of, in Lake Placid. Certainly 16 she has been able to train in Lake Placid. 17 And very, very proud of her 18 achievements, but also proud of the person that 19 she is. As Senator Griffo said, she's not only 20 an excellent athlete with tremendous perseverance and dedication to her sport, but she is a role 21 model for other athletes, particularly young 22 23 women. And I also want to acknowledge the 24 25 fact that through the New York State Olympic

Regional Development Authority, New York State --1 2 and we should all be proud of this -- has 3 invested a great deal of money in the bobsled, 4 luge and skeleton runs, and the venues in 5 Lake Placid. Many of them were built -- a couple for the 1932 Olympics, but obviously upgraded --6 7 for the 1980 Olympics. But because the state has continued 8 to invest in those venues, we have athletes like 9 10 Erin who will come up, practice, compete. We 11 have many World Cup races that take place there. 12 And we can all be proud of New York's investment, and also very proud of New York State's athlete. 13 14 Congratulations, Erin. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Thank you, Senator Little. 16 Senator DeFrancisco. 17 18 SENATOR DEFRANCISCO: Yes, it is an incredible list of accomplishments that have been 19 20 outlined by previous speakers. The only thing that surprises me is 21 22 that you're not from Syracuse. Because we bring so many great athletes here from Syracuse that 23 there must have been something that went wrong on 24 25 the way to this particular area of the state.

But in any event, I want to pick up 1 2 on something that Senator Little just said. You know, if there's anything we all need nowadays, 3 it's role models. And we can't pick up the paper 4 5 or turn on the TV or do anything without hearing about somebody doing some incredibly foolish 6 7 thing or criminal thing or something that embarrasses everybody. But those seem to get 8 that kind of publicity and that kind of attention 9 10 by the media. 11 This is truly what young people 12 need -- old people need as well -- people that we can look up to as doing the right thing, working 13 14 as hard as you have to work, and even more than 15 that, to accomplish a goal. So thank you very much for what 16 you've done for all of us in New York State and 17 18 actually throughout the country. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Thank 20 you, Senator DeFrancisco. This resolution was previously 21 22 adopted on February 27th of this year. Thank you, Erin. 23 Senator Hannon. 24 25 SENATOR HANNON: Mr. President, I'd

1 ask if we could call on Senator Tkaczyk in regard 2 to some previously adopted resolutions: 3405, 3804, 4872. If you'd just read the title of 3 4 those and then call on Senator Tkaczyk. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: The Secretary will read. 6 THE SECRETARY: Legislative 7 8 Resolution Number 3405, by Senator Tkaczyk, honoring Coach Ken Benton upon the occasion of 9 10 his retirement as wrestling coach at Amsterdam High School after all 21 years of distinguished 11 service. 12 13 Legislative Resolution Number 3804, 14 by Senator Tkaczyk, congratulating Amsterdam High 15 School wrestler Brandon Lapi upon the occasion of capturing the New York State Public High School 16 Athletic Association Division I Wrestling 17 18 Championship on Saturday, March 1, 2014. 19 And Legislative Resolution Number 20 4872, by Senator Tkaczyk, honoring Coach Todd 21 Jones upon the occasion of his retirement after 22 37 years of distinguished service as the wrestling coach and athletic director at 23 Canajoharie High School. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator

1 Tkaczyk. 2 SENATOR TKACZYK: Thank you, 3 Mr. President. 4 Many people may know that in my 5 district this year we had three outstanding coaches who taught wrestling retire. These men 6 7 had very long and distinguished careers, and they focused not only on teaching the wrestlers how to 8 be great athletes but also how to be great 9 10 individuals and citizens. All of the students 11 these gentlemen came in contact with are winners. 12 We're also joined by an outstanding young athlete, Brandon Lapi, who wrestled for 13 Amsterdam High School and finished his amazing 14 15 high school career with more than 260 victories 16 and five Section II titles. And in the final match of his high school career, he won the 17 18 Division I 138-pound title match to become State 19 Wrestling Champ. He was also selected the 20 Division I Most Outstanding Wrestler. 21 His coach is Amsterdam High School Coach Ken Benton, who announced at the end of the 22 season that this would be his last. 23 Unfortunately, Ken could not be with us today, 24 25 but his achievements are noted in the resolution

we passed previously. Ken began teaching at 1 Amsterdam High School in 1993 and saw his team 2 win 334 matches and nine consecutive Big 10 3 4 titles. 5 Also with us today is Coach Todd I know he's up there. If you could б Jones. 7 stand, that would be great. He served as wrestling coach and 8 9 athletic director at Canajoharie for 37 years. 10 Under Coach Jones' leadership, the Canajoharie High School Wrestling Team had dozens of Section 11 12 II finalists, more than 300 varsity wins, three trips to the State Tournament. He was honored a 13 14 few years back when the school's wrestling room 15 was named the Todd Jones Wrestling Facility. In addition to his and his team's 16 many athletic achievements, this year his 17 18 wrestling team was honored by the New York State 19 Public High School Athletic Association as Scholar-Athlete Team Award winners. Their team 20 21 grade average is 92. Also with us today, I am very proud 22 to announce, is someone who's teaching wrestling 23 at Duanesburg, my home school. Joe Benna is 24 25 retiring after 48 years as coach. Not only did

he coach at Duanesburg, he also coached at 1 2 Newburgh Free Academy and Niskayuna. He compiled 673 victories, the most 3 4 of any coach in the entire state. He's mentored 5 Olympic medal winners, College All-Americans, and New York State champions. I want to tell you 6 7 about two of them. 8 One of Coach Benna's wrestlers is 9 Nick Gwiazdowski. He was a two-time New York 10 State titlist who graduated from Duanesburg in 11 2011. This year, wrestling for North Carolina, 12 Nick became Section II's first NCAA champion with an upset victory over the two-time defending 13 14 champion. 15 Another one of Coach Benna's wrestlers at Duanesburg was Amy Whitbeck. 16 She made New York State history when she became the 17 18 first female wrestler to win a sectional 19 championship. And she wrestled in a New York 20 State high school championship. 21 Amy was also a member of the 2006 22 United States Female Junior Olympic Wrestling Team and was rated 5th in the world during the 23 Beijing Junior Olympics in 2006. 24 25 Brandon Lapi is a winner. But these

1 coaches taught so many winners. All of the 2 students they taught learned so much more about 3 life. Coach Benna even taught my son. He 4 believed he could be an Olympic champion. That 5 was the start, getting these kids to believe in themselves and work on being productive citizens. 6 7 Please join me in welcoming these 8 great athletes and extraordinary coaches who are such a wonderful example to our young people. 9 10 And join me in thanking them for all the work that they've done and the lives that they've 11 12 touched. 13 Please stand. 14 (Standing ovation.) 15 SENATOR TKACZYK: I would add that they're joined by some family, friends, and sons 16 and a grandson. And I know their families are 17 18 all very, very proud of them and look forward to 19 the time that they now will have off. But I'm 20 sure they will continue to be busy. Thank you all so much for what 21 22 you've done. ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 23 Thank you, Senator Tkaczyk. 24 25 Senator Farley on the resolutions.

1 Yes, thank you, SENATOR FARLEY: 2 Mr. President. I rise to salute the honorees, but I 3 4 particularly want to mention one in Joe Benna, 5 who's an absolute icon as a wrestling coach. He was a neighbor of mine, just 6 7 lived just a few yards away on the same street 8 for many years until he moved to the high-rent district in Duanesburg. 9 10 And Coach Benna coached so many champions in Niskayuna, it was unbelievable the 11 job that he did for wrestling. He's absolutely 12 been beloved by his students and everybody that 13 ever served under him. 14 15 Coach Benna is a remarkable man in 16 that he's a fighter and has had some health issues which he won't surrender on. He certainly 17 18 is beloved in this whole Capital Area with all 19 the champions that he has coached. 20 And I rise to salute him and of 21 course the other honorees also for what they've 22 We have become a wrestling area for the done. 23 entire State of New York. My best wishes, Joe, and to your 24 25 family.

ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 1 Thank 2 you, Senator Farley. 3 These resolutions were previously 4 adopted earlier this year. 5 Senator Hannon. SENATOR HANNON: Mr. President, I б 7 was going to call upon Senator Ball and ask if he could make comments on a resolution, but he's 8 again left the chamber. So we're going to have 9 10 to move on. Mr. President, if you would ask 11 12 Senator Ball or recognize him to comment on the previously adopted Resolution 2719, after the 13 title is read. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: The 16 Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Legislative 17 18 Resolution Number 2719, by Senator Ball, paying 19 tribute to Firefighter Ryan Blackwell, in 20 recognition of his prompt and heroic actions on September 14, 2013. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 22 Senator Ball on the resolution. 23 SENATOR BALL: It's an extreme 24 25 honor to be here today and have behind me Ryan

Blackwell, with FDNY, his mother, Jane, and his 1 2 girlfriend Elana Molina. I want to read a little bit from a 3 4 local newspaper article about what happened in 5 September of last year. "One person has died after a fire 6 7 broke out Saturday morning inside an apartment in the Bronxwood section of the Bronx. However, the 8 fire could have much worse if it were not for a 9 10 rookie firefighter" -- Ryan, and his valiant efforts -- "who had just four months on the job." 11 "A mother and her wheelchair-bound 12 son became trapped by flames and thick smoke from 13 the fire that started in the kitchen of their 14 15 fifth-floor apartment on Colden Avenue. The heavy smoke also trapped neighbors." 16 "Firefighters from Engine Company 62 17 18 rushed into the deadly apartment fire to try and rescue the disabled son and his mother." 19 20 "Rookie firefighter Ryan Blackwell, who had only four months on the job, found the 21 mother on a hallway floor and pulled her to 22 safety." 23 Ryan says that he just did what he 24 25 was trained to do. And of course we would expect

1 Ryan to say no less, because that's the same 2 thing that special forces troops do and combat 3 troops, FDNY, and the bravest amongst us that 4 fight for us every single day. You know, it's so 5 easy to forget those men and women in public service until we really need them. 6 7 Ryan's father, Christopher Blackwell 8 died on 9/11 undergoing similar heroic efforts. 9 So from me and I know this entire 10 chamber, Ryan, and to a very proud family, thank you for fulfilling a lifetime of public service. 11 12 Thank God you made it out alive. And we hope that you continue to do great things and stay 13 14 safe. 15 God bless you, and thank you for being here. 16 (Standing ovation.) 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator Hassell-Thompson on the resolution. 19 20 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank That means you'll all have to stand again. 21 you. 22 I rise, Mr. President, to applaud Senator Ball for his recognition, but more to 23 congratulate you, on behalf of the residents of 24 25 the Bronxwood section of the Bronx, for your

1 courageous efforts.

2	And as the representative for that
3	district, I did not have the opportunity to know
4	who you were, but I am very proud to stand with
5	Senator Ball today to congratulate you and to
6	thank you on behalf of my residents for your act
7	of bravery.

In 13 the absence of the sponsor, I am going to explain the bill. 14 15 This bill would allow two additional 16 years for the City of Yonkers to keep the bond anticipation notes issued during calendar years 17 18 2010 and 2011. 19 Originally this was passed 20 unanimously by both the Senate on 5/30/12 and 21 also by the Assembly on 5/30/12. And this would 22 allow the municipality to keep its BANs for an additional two years where, because of the cost 23 of the bond market, they are only paying a .30 24 25 interest rate on the BANs now. And if they were

to go to the bond market, it would cost them two 1 2 and a half to three times in interest what they 3 are currently paying. 4 SENATOR VALESKY: Mr. President. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator Valesky. б 7 SENATOR VALESKY: Would Senator 8 Krueger yield for questions? 9 SENATOR KRUEGER: Certainly. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: The Senator yields. 11 SENATOR VALESKY: Mr. President, 12 does this bill apply only to the City of Yonkers? 13 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 14 Senator 15 Krueger. 16 SENATOR KRUEGER: Excuse me, my mistake. I spoke incorrectly on the sponsor's 17 18 bill. 19 No, it is a statewide option. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator 21 Valesky. 22 SENATOR VALESKY: Mr. President, 23 would Senator Krueger continue to yield? ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 24 The 25 Senator yields.

1 SENATOR VALESKY: The original law 2 in 2010, I believe you had indicated in your 3 explanation, was the original law a request of a 4 specific municipality? 5 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator б Krueger. 7 SENATOR KRUEGER: One second. 8 In 2010, originally, it was asked 9 for by NYCOM, the New York Conference of Mayors. 10 And this year it has further been asked for and supported for an extension by the Westchester 11 Municipal Officers Association. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator 14 Valesky. 15 SENATOR VALESKY: So if Senator Krueger would continue to yield, please. 16 SENATOR KRUEGER: 17 Certainly. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: The Senator yields. 19 20 SENATOR VALESKY: So just so I'm 21 So this extension, it is requested only clear. 22 by Westchester County and municipalities within 23 the jurisdiction of Westchester County, or is it requested by all municipalities across the state? 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator

1 Krueger. 2 SENATOR KRUEGER: My understanding 3 is that the Town of Ulster is particularly interested in the continuation and extension of 4 5 this bill. And there's also been a survey of some other towns that could be interested in 6 7 taking advantage of this, including, in my notes, 8 the Town of Amherst. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator 10 Valesky. SENATOR VALESKY: Mr. President, 11 12 would Senator Krueger continue to yield. 13 SENATOR KRUEGER: Certainly. ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 14 The 15 Senator yields. 16 SENATOR VALESKY: So this would be the second extension that we are being asked to 17 18 vote on since the original law was approved in 19 2010. Was there any consideration of making the 20 statute permanent, or is there a particular 21 reason why we continue to do short-term 22 extensions? 23 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator 24 Krueger. 25 SENATOR KRUEGER: Excellent

1 question. Let me speak to counsel. 2 Through you, Mr. President. My understanding is that there might be an argument 3 4 for a permanency, but that there's a concern by 5 the Comptroller's office that they would actually like to see these towns get out of this system 6 7 over time, and therefore we wouldn't want to necessarily make it a permanent system. 8 9 But I haven't asked the Comptroller 10 personally today. ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 11 Senator 12 Valesky. 13 SENATOR VALESKY: Mr. President, 14 would Senator Krueger continue to yield. 15 SENATOR KRUEGER: Certainly. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: The Senator yields. 17 18 SENATOR VALESKY: Senator Krueger, I'm curious as to if we were not to pass this 19 20 bill this session and not to do this extension, 21 and this law were to expire, I'm just curious as 22 to what the impact would be on the localities 23 that requested this bill and, for that matter, all localities in the state, since this is a 24 25 statewide bill.

ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 1 Senator 2 Krueger. 3 SENATOR KRUEGER: Through you, 4 Mr. President, it's my understanding if we do not 5 offer them this extension option, they would have to pay back these BANs. So they would have to 6 7 find the money to pay back this money, and likely go to the bond market to borrow what they just 8 paid back. 9 10 The problem is, as the example I gave before, if you're paying .30 percent on 11 12 current BANs, then you would have to retire them and go to the bond market to borrow to repay the 13 money you'd be paying two and a half to three 14 15 times the interest rate on the bonds that you need to retire the BAN debt, therefore costing 16 the municipalities more money. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator Valesky. 19 20 SENATOR VALESKY Mr. President, 21 would Senator Krueger continue to yield. 22 SENATOR KRUEGER: Certainly. ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: The 23 Senator yields. 24 25 SENATOR VALESKY: So is it Senator

1 Krueger's contention that costs for local 2 governments, if we were not to pass this legislation, would increase? Is that a fair 3 4 statement? 5 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator б Krueger. 7 SENATOR KRUEGER: Yes. Through you, Mr. President, it is my understanding that 8 the costs for these governments would increase if 9 10 we didn't pass this. ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: 11 Senator 12 Valesky. 13 SENATOR VALESKY: Mr. President, 14 would Senator Krueger continue to yield. 15 SENATOR KRUEGER: Certainly. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: The Senator yields. 17 18 SENATOR VALESKY: My understanding, Senator Krueger, is that in the original law 19 20 there was a five-year rollover period and that 21 this bill before us, I believe -- correct me if 22 I'm wrong -- extends the rollover period from 23 five to seven years. Is that correct? And if so, what's the reason for the 24 25 extension in that period of time?

1 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator 2 Krueger. 3 SENATOR KRUEGER: I believe that the Senator is correct, this would extend for two 4 5 more years a bill that originally was only for five years. 6 7 And the reason they're asking for 8 the extension is because the economics of the 9 bond market for these localities being so much 10 more expensive than the current rate of the BANs they have out. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator Valesky. 13 14 SENATOR VALESKY: Thank you, 15 Mr. President. 16 Thank you, Senator Krueger, for your 17 responses. 18 SENATOR KRUEGER: Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Are 19 20 there any other members wishing to be heard? 21 Senator Stavisky. 22 SENATOR STAVISKY: Yes. Would 23 Senator Krueger yield for a question? SENATOR KRUEGER: 24 Through you, 25 Mr. President, certainly.

SENATOR KRUEGER: Yes, I do, 6 7 Mr. President. 8 SENATOR STAVISKY: And does the 9 Senator recall that there was already some 10 indebtedness and we authorized another round of 11 indebtedness to help the city? 12 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator 13 Krueger. 14 SENATOR KRUEGER: Through you, I 15 believe that was correct, Mr. President. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT CARLUCCI: Senator Stavisky. 17 18 SENATOR STAVISKY: And in fact so there is a precedent for doing this kind of 19 20 legislation. 21 SENATOR KRUEGER: Through you, Mr. President, I think, without having done any 22 23 research today, that there have been any number of precedents where we have allowed localities to 24 extend out the timeline of both bonds, BANs and 25

1 repayments owed to the state. 2 So I do not think this concept is 3 unprecedented, but I didn't do homework about any 4 specific exact examples. 5 SENATOR STAVISKY: Thank you, б Senator Krueger. 7 And in fact, the sponsor of that 8 bill ironically was Senator Skelos, and 9 Senator Libous had to get up and defend that 10 bill. So I do see another similarity here.
