    before you is a piece of legislation known as the
24

     Protect Our Children Act. And basically it
```

addresses the problems of serious forms of child abuse that are not adequately covered under existing law. This legislation actually fills and takes care of some of those gaps.

Many existing statutes are so overly complicated as to be practically useless or carry such disproportionately low punishments that it actually permits serious child abuse cases to go essentially having no meaningful consequences whatsoever.

Current misdemeanors and nonviolent felonies with probationary sentences do not do enough to save or protect our children from the cruel or repeated maltreatment of individuals. This bill fixes these problems in a measured, concise way. It creates new felonies, increases penalties for existing crimes that include aggravated manslaughter of a child, aggravated abuse of a child, aggravated murder of a child, obstructing the location of a child who is missing, concealment of the death of a child, and aggravated endangerment of a child.

These are all, believe it or not, throughout many, many decades, laws that have been lacking to protect our children or that have

What we allow during the general 1 2 elections is a process where people have the 3 ability to get an absentee ballot if they're 4 going to be out of the county. Unfortunately, 5 with the village elections, there's a list of criteria that need to be followed in order for 6 7 someone to be eligible to receive an absentee ballot. One of the examples would be that 8 9 they're a patient in a VA hospital. So in that 10 case, they could receive an absentee ballot. 11 However, if they're a patient in a non-VA 12 hospital, they would be ineligible to vote absentee in a village election. 13 And that's one of many examples of 14 15 where we're really inhibiting the democratic process in village elections. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT AVELLA: 17 Senator 18 Krueger. 19 SENATOR KRUEGER: Thank you. 20 Through you, Mr. President, if the sponsor would continue to yield. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT AVELLA: 22 Senator Carlucci, will you continue to yield? 23 SENATOR CARLUCCI: 24 Yes. 25 SENATOR KRUEGER: So I agree that

So you could actually be applying January 1st for an absentee ballot for a March election, but technically you're applying at the same time for an absentee ballot for the following September primary and general in November.

So the concept that this bill would allow just for people who live in villages the right to an absentee ballot approval up to 11 months before a general election, when in fact that same right wouldn't be offered to anyone not living in a village, is a bit of a conflict for me.

And I do understand that the primary purpose of the bill was to address improving access to vote in village elections, and I support that. But I'm worried about the

unintended consequence from passing this bill where if you live in a village, you have the right to be approved for absentee voting up to 11 months before the general elections in larger elections, while those of us who don't live in a village would never have this opportunity or right.

And I think it sets up a new conflict of inequity in voting rights between people who happen to live in villages and people who don't live in villages. And the majority of people in the State of New York don't live in these 500 villages.

And so while I am actually empathetic with the purpose of the bill and appreciate the sponsor's efforts to address concerns for village elections, I'm in honesty not comfortable setting up a dual system where, if you live in a village, you can basically apply for absentee ballots for all elections up to as many as 11 months in advance -- and if you don't live in one of the 500 villages, you don't have equal rights under the law.

So I'm going to vote no,

This legislation does not increase expenses on any village. What it does is exactly what the previous speaker was talking about, is to say, look, if we live in a village, we shouldn't have a different set of standards in terms of how we can be eligible to vote in an election.

And that's the problem with the current law, is that right now if you live in a village, you're basically being disenfranchised in voting in an absentee election. And that's the problem.

And I think in New York we need to be working together to erase the dubious distinction of having one of the lowest voting turnouts in the nation. And to say that we're going to not support legislation like this is a real problem in that regard. So I think we need to be working to increase voter turnout and not do the opposite of sticking with the status quo.

So yeah, there's no additional expense on the villages.

I also find this bill problematic, despite the fact that I appreciate the sponsor's answers. I think there's probably a way to get this bill to the place where I could support it. But right now what we know is it will cost the city something, but we don't know how much it will cost the city.

We do know that when there is some reduction in property taxes by somebody or bodies, that the City of New York, in their need to make up for that lost revenue, increases somebody else's property taxes instead.

I am concerned that the regulation is not parallel to the Green Roofs abatement and could open itself up to exploitation by those who actually aren't providing the kind of greening that is useful for environmental and open-land-use purposes.

There are some concerns that have also been raised about the possibility that

City DEP would have issues with runoff and

potential flooding without planning for some of this.

It's just not workable, in my opinion, at this point. I will hope that before it passes the other house, the sponsor might want to work with the City of New York to see how the bill could be amended such that it could receive the support of the City and City Council.

And again, I generally stand by the position that if I'm going to be passing a bill or voting for a bill that reduces a locality's tax revenue, I want to know that that locality would like their tax revenue reduced. And as we know, property tax is the only kind of tax that localities get to control themselves. So I'm particularly sensitive to not making a change or a reduction in revenue for property tax for the City of New York without hearing that the City of New York is asking for it.

I recommend a no vote, and I'll be voting no. Thank you, Mr. President.
