He was a 10 dear friend. We extend our condolences to his family and friends as they mourn this tremendous 11 12 loss. And we fondly remember the contributions that he made to our community in Western 13 14 New York, in New York State, and to our nation 15 throughout his life. 16 We are joined here today by many members of Ed's extended family -- his extensive 17 18 family. As we all heard in the reading of this resolution, the Wagner family is very large. And 19 20 they are wonderful people and have carried on his sense of nobility and his spirit in our community 21 22 in Western New York. Ed was a strong, courageous and 23 incredibly humble individual who made his family 24 25 life first and took great pride in the Western

New York community. I met Ed through his work through the Patriotic Commission in Cheektowaga. And like anyone who met Ed, we not only became good colleagues, but we became good friends.

And in putting this resolution together, we were doing some digging on history of Ed Wagner and what he really meant to our community in Western New York, to our state and to our nation.

And you know, Ed wasn't an individual who liked to brag about himself, so it gives me great pride to be able to honor his life and his memory, through speaking about some of the sacrifices that he made for our country and our community, on the floor of the Senate today.

In 1923, he was born, the oldest of five children in his family. And he always put his family, his brothers and his sisters, first. In the height of the Great Depression, he joined the Civilian Conservation Corps. And at only 15 years old, Ed sent his paycheck home each week in order to support his family.

And when the Second World War broke out, Ed volunteered to join the United States

Marine Corps to serve the country. And as the

war waged on in the Pacific, he fought valiantly on behalf of our great country, earning a Purple Heart in service to our country.

After the war ended, he came home, he met his wife and married his wife Adele, started a family in Cheektowaga. And for nearly five decades, he worked and labored to raise his family, working at Westinghouse Corporation, demonstrating the resilient blue-collar spirit that makes Western New York famous.

His family and friends are here with us today. His wife Peggy, Margaret Mary Wagner, who's here with Bob, Ed's son; Lisa, Barb, and Eric, his stepchildren; his daughter Patty.

He's remembered also by his two grandchildren and 10 step-grandchildren, including Jordan, who is here with us today, studying nursing at D'Youville College, the greatest college on earth -- it happens to be my alma mater. She's going to be a nurse in the near future, she's going into her junior year.

Ed's two brothers, James and John, his sister Margaret, and his friends John and Ginny Fasser are also here with us today.

Known for his hard work, his great

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sense of humor, and his generosity, Ed Wagner was
