Nothing is sadder than seeing a 8 child die. But seeing a child die because of 9 10 neglect or abuse by a parent or a guardian, the person in charge of them, is really distressful. 11 This bill addresses a situation we 12 had where a 13-month-old child was being given 13 heroin in her bottle and died of an overdose by 14 15 the parent and her boyfriend. The parents have been convicted and all, but the district attorney 16 in Washington County brought a point to us that a 17 18 child under the age of 3 can't answer, can't tell 19 you what's going on, doesn't speak to you. And 20 so this would help social services. It would actually give social 21 services a tool that they could use when the 22 person in control, supervision, parent, guardian 23 of a child under the age of 3 is arrested, 24 25 charged with serious drug abuse -- heroin, all of

those controlled substances -- that this would

     allow social services to go in and do a hair
     follicle test on that 3-year-old child to see if

1 Last year this bill passed both 2 houses of the Legislature and was vetoed by the 3 Governor. In his 2016 veto message, the Governor 4 stated that OCFS cannot mandate a caseload, a 5 standard, without a proper study and adequate funding. 6 7 The caseload study and funding were 8 discussed by OCFS on May 14th of 2015 in a local commissioner's memorandum. In that memorandum, 9 10 OCFS discussed funds allocated to the 2015-2016 budget to provide additional funding to 11 localities that can hire additional caseworkers 12 in order to achieve the recommended CPS casework 13 14 size of 12 active reports per month. 15 Not all localities have achieved 16 this recommended caseload size. One of the successful counties is Erie County. 17 18 September 12, 2016, the Erie County Department of 19 Social Services announced that two-thirds of 20 their caseworkers had 15 or fewer cases, and 95 percent had a casework load of 25 or less. 21 Oneida County has not been 22

On May 22, 2016, the

Oneida County was averaging 25 cases per month.

department administrator of the Shenendehowa High School for three years, technology instructor at Mohonasen High School for 16 years, and an adjunct professor at the College of St. Rose.

His commitment to academic excellence, his spirit of humanity, decency and community carried over into his charitable and scientific endeavors. He was a board member of the Rensselaer County Chamber of Commerce, served as legislative chairman for Questar III BOCES, and was a member of the Kiwanis Club and the Rotary Club.

Bob Horan is survived by his dedicated, beloved wife of 28 years, Margery -- and his family is in the gallery -- his children, Patricia, Robert and Thomas; Lydia, that he considered a daughter. He has two sisters, Christine Cassidy and Cathleen Schoeppler, and many nieces and nephews. And Peter Mooney and his wife were cousins to Bob Horan.

I'm honored to have all of them here joining as my guests. I want you all to know that your husband, your father, your brother, your uncle, your cousin, our superintendent Bob Horan was admired, respected, and loved and is
