But as I read the bill, I do realize that potentially it means that companies who are doing business on the Internet and encourage you, through their marketing, to violate laws because it will be a -- generate income for them from you, could also be considered terrorism under this law.

And so I am a little torn. If the language was cleared up -- for example, I have a company, quite a few companies who advertise that you should all participate in an Airbnb-type model in violation of law, because they'll make money even if they are doing harm to your own community, your own building, and to you yourself, who might end up being fined and evicted.

So on the theory that this bill might somehow be used to challenge the activities of these companies who continue, day in, day out, to violate New York State law, I am hoping that the Senator will clarify and clear up the language, even though I'm voting no today, so that I can join him in supporting this bill and

Despite these high numbers of sufferers, research into potential treatment and a cure lags far behind other similar physical and emotionally debilitating diseases.

It is with great pride and pleasure that we recognize the advocates who devote so much of their time and effort to this condition. At the top of this list is William Repicci, executive director of the National Lymphatic Education and Research Foundation; Colleen McGuire, outreach director; and Steve Palmer, media director. And thank you, thank you for what you do.

This year we're also honoring two individuals, Steve Guttenberg and Nicole Faccio, for their outstanding efforts.

Steve Guttenberg, a resident of the Upper West Side of Manhattan, has used his celebrity status to promote lymphedema awareness throughout New York State and the country. As an honorary board member of the Lymphatic Education and Research Network, he has devoted himself to

fundraising, supporting patients, and outreaching to corporate supporters.

Nicole Faccio, who is here today with us, and her parents, knows firsthand how debilitating this condition can be, but refuses to let it slow her down. With the support of her family and her friends, she formed a fundraising team called In Pizza We Crust, and exceeded their fundraising goal by a whopping 150 percent. Their team has become one of New York's top fundraising teams for the New York Walk to Fight Lymphedema and Lymphatic Diseases.

Nicole, keep up the good work.

I also believe we have -- and we do have -- in our presence today last year's honoree, our past honoree, with her parents, Emma Detlefsen.

And of course, Emma, welcome back, Emma. You're an inspiring individual. And you come from Senator Amedore's community. And you are definitely -- when you come down here and this audience sees you, they will be impressed by your greatness and by what you're fighting and what your fight has done to bring these lymphatic diseases to the public forum.

And I commend all the advocates for 1 2 their tireless and ongoing efforts to bring more 3 attention to lymphatic research, and I applaud 4 them for their unwavering advocacy. And thank you, Senator Golden, for 17 18 bringing this to our attention and honoring it. 19 And today in the chamber we have, as 20 has been mentioned, some special guests. And you know, just about three short years ago I 21 22 showcased a very special constituent of mine, and that's Emma, who stood on my chair over there, in 23 the end of the desk there, with her purple cape. 24 25 And Emma, who has been battling,

     The UniverSoul Circus is a single-ring circus

     established in 1994 by Cedric Walker, an

     African-American man who had a vision of creating
     a circus with the majority of performers being

     people of color.
                  He has traveled all over the world
23
     to find people with incredible talents. He was
24
25
     able to find entertainers from approximately
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24 different countries.

I wanted to pay homage to Mr. Walker, who is in the chamber today, along with his great assistant, Ben Johnson, who is the director of operations.

Mr. Walker was born in Maryland. He always had an entrepreneurial spirit, starting from the age of 6. Determined to make extra money, he was inventive right from the start. He sold Christmas cards, Kool Aid popsicles, fruits and vegetables from a horse-drawn cart. He even collected for UNICEF, because he understood back then that he wanted to try to help people from all over the world.

He was first bitten by the entertainment bug in the early '70s when he moved to Tuskegee to live with his uncle, a nightclub owner. That's where he met and later teamed up with a promising young musical group called the Commodores -- where's Robach? He's not here today.

(Laughter.)

SENATOR COMRIE: He became their production and stage manager and toured with them around the world. He later worked as a promoter

for the Jackson 5.

Cedric Walker struck out on his own in the '80s, when he organized the Fresh Fest, the world's first rap music tour, featuring the likes of Queens' own Rock & Roll Hall of Fame inductees, Run DMC, Salt-n-Pepa, and many other artists.

In the early days, when no one believed rap music was viable, Mr. Walker turned that around by putting on safe, successful and profitable shows around the country.

In the early 1990s, he branched out further, turning his attention to bringing community together through the church. He underwrote and coproduced the highly successful gospel plays "Wicked Ways" and "A Good Man is Hard to Find," among many others.

By the mid-1990s, Mr. Walker and his associates began to look for new forms of family entertainment, with a vision to explore the various talents of African-Americans, Caribbeans, and Latinos other than singing and dancing, and the Universal Big Top Circus was born.

The UniverSoul Circus employs hundreds of workers that are rigorously trained

in Olympic-style fashion at various schools around the world financed Mr. Walker and his conglomerate.

I would also like to acknowledge that the circus employs many local community youth and military veterans, like Purple Heart recipient Sergeant Lester Muse, who is also here today -- please stand up, Lester -- who is in the chamber with us.

UniverSoul Circus is highly regarded as the top-rated circus in the country in regards to safety and compliance, even with all the pressures that they've been put upon lately by folks with small minds.

UniverSoul Circus has successfully turned the traditional circus world upside down. By 1997, the tour had grown to 10 cities; two years later, 19 cities. They've been asked to go to South Africa more than once. They have an Emmy-nominated HBO special. And now they're playing to packed audiences around the world.

If you haven't had an opportunity to go to a UniverSoul Circus performance, I would invite you to go. It is a totally different experience. It's very interactive, and you go

1 there and you wind up having a lot of fun. 2 Again, I want to congratulate Cedric 3 Walker, who has been a true pioneer and a 4 trailblazer, making sure that the UniverSoul 5 Circus is a family-friendly circus, is a circus that embraces the arts in all forms, and is a 6 7 circus that we can celebrate all of the positive things that happen in every culture, not just 8 9 one. 10 So thank you, Mr. President, for having them here today. And I would ask that 11 12 everyone give Mr. Cedric Walker and the UniverSoul Circus a round of applause. 13 14 (Applause.) 15 ACTING PRESIDENT AKSHAR: Thank you, Senator Comrie. 16 Senator Sanders. 17 18 SENATOR SANDERS: I too have to congratulate the UniverSoul Circus. 19 20 Well, where do you start? One of my 21 favorite, favorite R&B groups was the Commodores. 22 And I'm finally meeting the stage producer, and we were talking about trying to get them to do a 23 reunion. I think that this great Senate should 24 25 go on record in saying that we want a reunion of

the Commodores. And they should play here first. 1 2 Okay, well, maybe we won't go on record to do that. But I would like to see it done. 3 4 It seems that my life and his were 5 chasing each other. We were always in a entertainment facility -- you can't call it a 6 7 club -- Maverick's Flat, and other places that he was in and I was in. But maybe that's what led 8 9 him to gospel. Maybe those type of places after 10 a while would lead you to understand the beauty of gospel, and the gospel plays at that. 11 12 I want to of course thank Sergeant 13 Lester Muse, who brings everything together, 14 including us. 15 But I want to draw your attention, sir, that politics is very much like the circus 16 17 that you speak of. However, we do it rougher. 18 We do trapeze acts without nets. And I'd like your performers to try that one. 19 20 And every two years -- you have a 21 great training facility, but we have a great 22 place that we -- it's called the election. Every two years, we also get to see how close we can 23 walk across things without nets. And if you 24 25 believe that you have lions and tigers, well, we

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have sharks. We have sharks out here.

I remember seeing you at Randall's Island, in Newark, New Jersey. I mean, you guys were all over in the tri-state area. Even on Randall's Island, you were there also. And you kind of infused the African-American culture, hip-hop culture, into the circus, so it was always entertaining.
