     across the nation. And we're also seeing

     religious freedoms being trampled on, not only in
     Jewish communities but in Muslim communities as

                  You know, last week in my district,
     I actually was able to bring together members of
16
     the Jewish community and the Muslim community,

     shoulder to shoulder, to stand up against hate

     crimes.
                  This specific piece of legislation
20
     is something that I introduced back in 2006,
21
     where at the time we saw many, many houses of
22
     worship, including churches in my district, and
23
     these were churches, that were being
24
25
     desecrated -- statues being knocked down,
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religious artifacts being stolen.

As a matter of fact, at the time,
Senator Kaminsky, when he was an Assemblymember,
carried this bill in the Assembly.

The problem was bad back then in 2006, but I think it's even worse now. And I think we have to send a very, very clear message that any of us who believe in religious freedom, any of us who believe in the fact that we're either going to sink or swim together, and we have to stick together as one -- when one community is threatened, all of us have to feel that same threat.

So this bill expands the existing crime of criminal mischief in the third degree to include damage made to a house of worship.

Criminal mischief in the second degree would be expanded to include ruining a priceless religious object, like a scroll.

And then finally, cemetery desecration in the first degree is created, which would be a Class D felony.

I urge my colleagues, each and every one of us, to vote yes on this important legislation, Mr. President.

And today, with this bill and its companion bill, which we will take up, we have the opportunity to take action of our own, to make it clear that in this Senate, as New Yorkers, we stand against hatred and bigotry.

We cherish our rights to free speech. But when speech becomes hate-filled action that intimidates, frightens, and turns us against our neighbors, friends, and allies, we have an obligation to respond.

I want to thank my colleagues on both sides of the aisle for joining me to strongly denounce bigoted and hateful words and actions. I also want to thank the Governor for

That's what the Governor did last week, and that's what we're doing, Republicans and Democrats, different branches of government here in New York.

And we do that by taking a stand against the BDS movement, by saying that this is not right, that we don't stand with it. And you're entitled to do whatever you want, but New York doesn't have to stand with you. And it's very simple. You don't want to invest in Israel, great, that's your right. New York won't invest in you.

And so I really appreciate that we're taking this stand here today. Israel, now more than ever, needs our help. And society is

affiliation. As in Mr. Carlucci's bill, which looks at an existing situation and sees a loophole, and this bill fills that loophole, my bill does the same, so that community centers -- that may not be a place where religious services are held, but is religious affiliated -- is given

Unfortunately, it took on a tremendous amount of momentum. Even colleges here in New York, like NYU, were members of the American Studies Association. And we actually took up the cause then, and it died down a little, but I'm afraid again, with the antisemitism which is upon us, and the anti-Israel feeling that seems to be sprouting all over college campuses, that this will happen again.

So this legislation would actually prohibit any college or university in New York from using state aid to support an organization that is actively boycotting Israel, Lebanon, the Czech Republic, Hungary, or any college or university located in these countries.

The reason why these countries were
