We lost 343 firemen that day and we've lost that twice that since then. The numbers are astounding.

This bill provides that these plates will only be designed, produced and issued after DMV receives a bond for \$6,000. And after two years from the date available for sale or at least 200 sets of plates have been sold, the bond can be discontinued. If less than 200 plates have been sold, the department can use that bond to recover any of its losses.

These "Survivor of the Bravest" license plates will recognize the many contributions that our fire department and many others made during those tough times on 9/11 and those subsequent times since. There isn't a month that goes by that we don't go to a wake or a funeral of a fireman that has died and given his life to this great city and to this great state and nation.

So I ask all of my members to vote for this, and the Assembly to vote for this, and that we never forget their sacrifices and the sacrifices of many that paid the ultimate price

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for the greatest nation in the world.

Lunar New Year is more than a celebration for Asian-American New Yorkers, it's an opportunity for all of us to expand our horizons, learn about other cultures, and celebrate our neighbor's heritage as well as our own.

As the Statute of Liberty reminds us, New York has long been a beacon of hope for individuals from across the globe, and New York welcomes immigrants of all backgrounds with open arms. Our state is proud to be the home to hundreds of thousands of Asian-American

New Yorkers celebrating Lunar New Year, including those with Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, Laotian and Singaporian heritage.

him, Queens is second, and Manhattan is third.

But that's besides the point. It's still the largest Chinese-American community outside of China, and that's what's important -- and outside of Asia -- that gives this great, great, great opportunity for many, many families to live and to raise their families in our community.

In Brooklyn and Sunset Park right along the areas from 42nd Street up to 62nd Street and Eighth Avenue, 90 percent of those stores were empty until about 15 years ago. Those 20 blocks on Eighth Avenue now are full, and the bustling enterprises and economic development in our restaurants and our computer stores and our technology, our fabric stores — those stores are really, really doing exceptionally well. And the Chinese-Americans are doing extremely well living in our great, great city and our surrounding communities.

In this body here that I passed back

And in fact on Saturday, in Flushing, we're going to have one of the largest parades ever where there are not only Chinese

parades ever where there are not only Chinese floats but also Korean-American floats. And we work very closely together as a cohesive unit in the Flushing community.

And Flushing, as Senator Golden said, is really booming because of the contributions of the Asian-American community.

Back in the 1980s, the stores in downtown Flushing were empty, they were boarded up.

People had left; it was like a ghost town. And then people originally from Taiwan and later from the People's Republic of China and the Republic of Korea came, and they totally revitalized the community.

And now, all you see are cranes and construction going on, because this is where the action is. It's a wonderful community, and I'm very, very proud to represent the Flushing area.

Let me mention something else. And that is how the people celebrate the Lunar New Year, because I think it's more than just a parade. It's a chance for families to come together, to make the traditional meals that people are accustomed to having. Dumplings, for example, are a staple of the Lunar New Year eating experience, and each restaurant is really better than the next. They're all really good, and I highly recommend it.

And as far as the Year of the Dog goes, as Senator Kavanagh mentioned -- and we thank you for introducing this resolution -- the dog is man's best friend and woman's best friend. Dogs are devoted, they're loyal, they are companion animals for people in need. And they're also used by law enforcement, the armed services or the police, for jobs that are very dangerous.

And the dog has been traditionally one of the signs of the zodiac. There are 12, and each year they celebrate a different sign of the zodiac. Last year I think it was the rooster; this year is the Year of the Dog.

And let us hope that everybody comes

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to Flushing on Saturday and just watches a

We are very fortunate to have with us today representatives from all over the state, from 16 counties, who represent the people who make the Joseph Dwyer Peer-to-Peer Program work in the State of New York.

This was a program born of this body. And all of my colleagues, all of us together, have made this program work. It has expanded to 16 counties. I'd like to just mention the counties that are here today. And all the professionals I believe are behind me. If they could please rise just to be recognized when I mention your county. Representatives from the counties of Suffolk, Nassau, Rockland, Putnam, Dutchess, Saratoga, Jefferson, Broome, Monroe and Rensselaer are all here today.

If you don't know what the Dwyer

Peer-to-Peer Program is, it's a way for veterans
who are coming home with the wounds of war -sometimes the silent wounds of war, posttraumatic
stress disorder and traumatic brain injury -- to
be able to work across their barriers and across
their troubles with other veterans to get the
help that they need.

1 In very many instances it's very 2 difficult for individuals who have been trained to quote, unquote, fix themselves to reach out 3 4 for help. And reaching out to somebody who's 5 shared those experiences, a veteran themself who is also going through hard times, has been a very 6 7 effective way. It's a model for the country. It's something that's being considered to go 8 nationally across the 50 states. 9 10 And it started right here in New York, and it started with my predecessor, 11 12 Senator now-Congressman Lee Zeldin, and it started in the New York State Senate. All of the 13 14 members of the Senate participated. 15 I want to thank you all for what you do for our veterans, and I want to thank this 16 body for their continued support. And let's help 17 18 this program grow in the State of New York, because it's helping the individuals who have 19 20 served us so bravely in combat. 21 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT AKSHAR: 22 Mr. Floor Leader. 23 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, we have 24 25 funding from this program that Lee Zeldin started

1 in Syracuse, New York, as well. And the place 2 that does all the great work is Clear Path for Veterans in Syracuse, a real model for how to 3 4 deal with veterans with traumatic problems when 5 they get out of the military. It's something that should be increased in the budget, not just 6 7 maintained. 8 And thank you for all the work that 9 you do for this important segment of our 10 community. 11 Thank you. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT AKSHAR: Senator Marchione. 13 14 SENATOR MARCHIONE: Yeah, I also 15 want to add my thanks, certainly to Senator Croci, but also to all of the men and women who 16 17 have been working on this, on these programs. 18 I represent Rensselaer and Saratoga, so I'm blessed to have two of my counties 19 20 represented. And the work that these people are doing is just phenomenal -- the help that they're 21 22 providing, the programs that they've instituted. I'm very grateful for the program 23 and certainly very grateful that our veterans 24 25 have someone to turn to, peers to turn to who can
