1 PROCEEDINGS 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 3 Senate will come to order. 4 I ask all present to please rise 5 and join with me as we recite the Pledge of Allegiance to our Flag. 6 7 (Whereupon, the assemblage recited 8 the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.) 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: In the 10 absence of clergy, I ask all to please bow your head in a moment of silent reflection and/or 11 12 prayer. 13 (Whereupon, the assemblage respected a moment of silence.) 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 16 reading of the Journal. 17 THE SECRETARY: In Senate, Monday, 18 February 12th, the Senate met pursuant to 19 adjournment. The Journal of Sunday, 20 February 11th, was read and approved. On 21 motion, Senate adjourned. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Without 23 objection, the Journal will stand approved as read. 24 25 Presentation of petitions.

1 Messages from the Assembly. 2 The Secretary will read. 3 THE SECRETARY: On page 17, 4 Senator Hamilton moves to discharge, from the Committee on Rules, Assembly Bill Number 8938 5 and substitute it for the identical Senate Bill 6 7 7294, Third Reading Calendar 22. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 9 substitution is so ordered. 10 Messages from the Governor. Reports of standing committees. 11 Reports of select committees. 12 13 Communications and reports of state officers. 14 15 Motions and resolutions. 16 Senator DeFrancisco. 17 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, I move 18 to adopt the Resolution Calendar, with the 19 exception of Resolutions 3748 and 3803. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: All in 21 favor of accepting the Resolution Calendar, with 22 the exception of Resolutions 3748 and 3803, 23 signify by saying aye. (Response of "Aye.") 24 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 25 Opposed?

1 (No response.) 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 3 Resolution Calendar is adopted as indicated. 4 Senator DeFrancisco. 5 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Could we now take up Resolution 3169 and read it in its б 7 entirety. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The 9 Secretary will read. 10 And I ask for some order in the house. 11 12 THE SECRETARY: Legislative 13 Resolution Number 3169, by Senator Hannon, 14 memorializing Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to 15 proclaim February 14, 2018, as Donor Day in the 16 State of New York, in conjunction with the observance of National Donor Day. 17 18 "WHEREAS, It is the custom of this 19 Legislative Body to recognize official days that 20 are set aside to increase awareness of serious 21 issues that affect the lives of citizens of 22 New York State and across the nation; and "WHEREAS, Attendant to such 23 concern, and in full accord with its 24 25 long-standing traditions, this Legislative Body

1	is justly proud to memorialize Governor Andrew M.
2	Cuomo to proclaim February 14, 2018, as Donor Day
3	in the State of New York, in conjunction with the
4	observance of National Donor Day; and
5	"WHEREAS, National Donor Day was
б	started in 1998 by the U.S. Department of Health
7	and Human Services and many nonprofit health
8	organizations to raise awareness for organ, eye,
9	tissue, marrow, platelet, and blood donation; and
10	"WHEREAS, National Donor Day is a
11	time to focus on five points of life organs,
12	tissues, marrow, platelets, and blood by
13	participating in blood/marrow drives or donor
14	registration events; and
15	"WHEREAS, It is also a day to
16	recognize our loved ones who have given the gift
17	of donation, have received a donation, are
18	currently waiting, or did not receive an organ in
19	time; and
20	"WHEREAS, There is a tremendous need
21	for organ donations in New York State, with more
22	than 10,000 New Yorkers on waiting lists as the
23	need for organ, tissue and blood donations far
24	exceed the supply; and
25	"WHEREAS, More than 500 New Yorkers

died last year because an organ did not become 1 2 available in time to save their lives; and 3 "WHEREAS, One person who donates 4 their organs (heart, lungs, liver, kidneys, 5 pancreas and intestines) can save up to eight lives; and 6 7 "WHEREAS, A tissue donor (corneas, bone, skin, heart valves, tendons, veins, etc.) 8 can improve 12 or more lives by restoring 9 10 eyesight, helping fight infections in burn 11 patients, and preventing the loss of mobility and disability; and 12 13 "WHEREAS, It is possible to donate a 14 kidney, partial liver, lung or pancreas as a 15 living donor, and in fact, approximately 40 percent of organ and tissue donations are from 16 living donors; and 17 18 "WHEREAS, It is imperative that there be greater public awareness and educational 19 20 initiatives offered regarding the decision to 21 donate one's organs, eyes, tissues, marrow, platelet, and/or blood, and more must be done to 22 increase activity at the local, state and 23 national levels; now, therefore, be it 24 25 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative

1 Body pause in its deliberations to memorialize 2 Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to proclaim February 14, 3 2018, as Donor Day in the State of New York, in 4 conjunction with the observance of National Donor 5 Day; and be it further "RESOLVED, That a copy of this 6 7 resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted to the Honorable Andrew M. Cuomo, Governor of the 8 State of New York." 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Flanagan on the resolution. 11 12 SENATOR FLANAGAN: Thank you, Mr. President. 13 14 You know, I have this -- as many of 15 you know, I'm being redundant, and I'm being 16 redundant for a valuable purpose. I have this organ donation bracelet on, and it's in English 17 18 and Spanish. "Donate," and "dona-vida" en 19 Español. 20 And I wear this in memory of my dear 21 friend and colleague, who many of you knew quite 22 well, and that's former Assemblyman Jim Conte. And it's hard to believe that it's over five 23 24 years since Assemblyman Conte passed away. 25 And at the time I remember telling

his wife, you know, "I'll wear this for a year." 1 2 And a year came, and then I thought, What am I, an idiot? Like I should keep wearing this. 3 4 So I want to extend particular 5 thanks to Senator Hannon for his expertise, his stick-to-itiveness, and his leadership in dealing 6 7 with the Department of Health. I can't think of any more important subject in terms of how do you 8 9 help someone. By becoming an organ donor. 10 And I've spoken to many people who are donors or who are recipients. And even 11 things like bone marrow, it's just -- it's a 12 cotton swab now. They can test you that easily 13 to see if there's a match. 14 15 Chris read the resolution; think about it. Five hundred people died, 500 people 16 died because there were not enough organs 17 18 available. We have 10,000 people in the State of New York, just the State of New York, who are 19 waiting for kidney and liver transplants, which 20 are the most common, kidney being number one, 21 liver being number two. 22 We have a golden opportunity to save 23 I really mean to save lives. So what I 24 lives. 25 respectfully ask my colleagues -- because

everybody has Facebook, a lot of people have 1 2 Twitter. I don't, but I do have Facebook, and we 3 go to public events. Any time I'm in a room with 4 150, 200, 250, 300 people, I always bring this 5 up. Always bring this up. And I always say, "If you forget everything else that I've said, please 6 7 remember this." And I'm telling you, invariably at 8 the end of whatever that event may be, somebody 9 10 comes up to me and they say, I'm a kidney recipient. Or I'm a donor. And to me, there's 11 12 no simpler and yet more profound way to change the world, really. It was also mentioned that 13 14 one person, by donating their organs, can save up 15 to eight lives. That's pretty darn cool. So, ladies and gentlemen, today is a 16 17 special day. The more we can do to get 18 information out, the better off everyone will be. I don't want to hear 500 people died because they 19 20 had to wait. I want to keep that number going 21 down. I want it going down exponentially. With 22 your help, because we're all good at marketing, we can all save people's lives. So please help 23 24 in any, way shape or form that you can. 25 Thank you, Mr. President.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank 1 2 you, Senator Flanagan. 3 Senator Hannon on the resolution. 4 SENATOR HANNON: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Flanagan for 6 7 outlining that so cogently. I want to change people's thoughts 8 about Valentine's Day. The symbol of Valentine's 9 10 Day is a heart. And yet why did we pick Donor 11 Day to be the 14th? Because in a sense we can give life, we can give love, by virtue of being 12 an organ donor. 13 14 Last year, in 2017, the Organ Donor 15 Registry in New York grew by about 12 percent, and it's the most it's ever grown. And partially 16 it's due to the different legislative and policy 17 18 aspects that people in this chamber have 19 championed and you all have voted for and passed, 20 such things as the health plan marketplace, voter 21 registration, online registry, motor vehicle 22 licenses. So now that we have the registry at 23 4.91 million -- but that's only 31 percent of 24 25 New Yorkers who are 16 and older. And you can do

1 live organ donation as well as when someone has 2 passed away. So as we celebrate Valentine's Day 3 4 for our loved ones, think also how you can love 5 society by participating in and promoting and being an organ donor. 6 7 Thank you, Mr. President. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank you, Senator Hannon. 9 10 Senator Carlucci. SENATOR CARLUCCI: 11 Thank you, Mr. President. 12 13 I want to just add my voice to 14 Senator Flanagan and Senator Hannon on this 15 resolution. 16 Like was said, over 10,000 men, women and children are currently waiting for a 17 18 life-saving organ transplant. And in New York 19 we've lagged behind almost every state in the 20 nation for years when it comes to eligible people 21 participating in the Organ Donor Program. But 22 thanks to leaders like Senator Hannon and Senator 23 Flanagan and other colleagues in this house who have put forth legislation, we've started to chip 24 25 away at that.

Like Senator Hannon had said, we've 1 made an improvement of 12 percent. That means 2 3 we're saving people's lives. 4 On this floor we passed, a few years 5 back, Lauren's Law, named after Lauren Shields, a young girl from Stony Point, New York, who 6 7 received a heart transplant when she was 9 years old. And instead of sitting back, she used every 8 opportunity she has to talk about her experience. 9 10 And like was said, that's what we can do in addition. We've got to continue to 11 12 pass important policies. We've made Lauren's Law 13 permanent, which now says when you go to the DMV, when you're getting your driver's license, you're 14 15 asked the question, "Would you like to be an organ donor? Yes or skip the question." 16 17 We're putting that question in front 18 of people. And we know when they're met with that decision, the majority of people are going 19 20 to decide to be an organ donor. Great legislation that was passed 21 22 last year to allow 16- and 17-year-olds to preregister, to allow them to register when 23 they're going to get their driver's license for 24 25 the first time. It's a huge opportunity for us.

So we've got to continue the 1 2 momentum we have. Let's turn it around. Let's 3 go from being last in the nation, let's go to 4 being first in the nation. And in doing that, we 5 will save the lives of so many people. To have Donor Day on Valentine's Day 6 7 is so fitting. Lauren Shields, she received a heart. My good friend Roxanne Watson in Rockland 8 County, she received a heart. And she carries 9 10 around with her a picture of the person that donated that heart. And she shares her story. 11 12 If you get within 10 feet of her, she will share with you her story and she'll make sure that she 13 asks you to become an organ donor. 14 She has 15 personally signed up about 10,000 people to be an organ donor. She's broken records. 16 But it's that example of how we can 17 18 pass policy and we've got to continue to do that, 19 but we've also got to use every opportunity we 20 have to share the story about what being an organ 21 donor, what does that mean. And I think that's our biggest potential, to share that story, break 22 down myths, and make sure people are 23 participating and entering the Organ Donor 24 25 Program.

1 So I enthusiastically support this 2 I want to thank my colleagues for resolution. 3 doing the same. Thank you, Mr. President. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 5 Marcellino. SENATOR MARCELLINO: 6 Thank you, 7 Mr. President. 8 Let me add my voice to Senator 9 Flanagan, Senator Hannon, and Senator Carlucci. 10 All you've got to do, take your driver's license, go down to the Department of Motor Vehicles, they 11 12 will stamp it. There's a question, you check off the box, they put a little heart on your driver's 13 14 license. So it's very easy to see and very easy 15 to find and you can be part of the Organ Donor 16 Program. This is a most important thing we 17 18 can do. I agree with Senator Carlucci's 19 statement, we shouldn't be last. New York State 20 shouldn't be last in anything. We are the 21 Excelsior State. We are first in the nation. We 22 are first amongst all of our states. And we 23 should be first in organ donations and saving lives. 24 25 This saves lives. Check the right

1	box. If you look at your driver's license and
2	you don't have the little heart, go back to the
3	Department of Motor Vehicles and get it done
4	again and check that box and make sure you have a
5	license with the heart so you are part of the
6	Organ Donor Program. It is a very important
7	thing. And you can't do anything better than
8	help save a fellow human being's life.
9	Thank you, Mr. President.
10	ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: As noted,
11	the resolution was previously adopted on
12	January 9th of 2018.
13	Senator Flanagan.
14	SENATOR FLANAGAN: Yes,
15	Mr. President, I appreciate the opportunity.
16	I wanted to raise a subject that is
17	a little different. Last week I don't know how
18	many of you had meetings like I did, but I had a
19	visit from the corrections officers from the City
20	of New York. Met with their lobbyist, met with
21	their president, Elias Husamudeen a fine
22	gentleman, has a very long, distinguished record
23	as a leader of that organization.
24	And we talked about issues, we
25	talked about dangers in the workplace, we talked

about pension issues and things of that nature.
And lo and behold, after his visit I pick up the
paper and see on the news, like many of you, that
there was a corrections officer in Rikers who was
beaten to a pulp. I mean beaten to a pulp. He
was sucker-punched and beaten up by five members
of the Bloods.

This picture that I have makes me 8 Here's a 39-year-old Haitian man named 9 sick. 10 Jean Souffrant, who has served with distinction, and unfortunately he's gaining notoriety and his 11 12 name is out there because of a terrific and horrific tragedy. He has a bleed on the brain, 13 14 he has to wear a neck brace, and he has a broken 15 neck with multiple fractures to go along with it. Here's a guy who was doing his job -- really, 16 even though the inmates are on the inside, he was 17 18 protecting us for a variety of reasons. 19 So I harken back to the discussion 20 that I just had with their union. And these folks, men and women, are in harm's way every 21 22 single day. So when they come up and they talk about disability and when they come up and talk 23

about their pension and they come and talk about

workplace environment and safety, we need to

listen. Not only do we need to listen, but we 1 2 need to act. 3 Now, I saw some amendments that came 4 out from the Governor, and I think the 5 orientation certainly of our conference is if I'm going to choose between the bad guys and the good 6 7 guys, I'm going with the good guys. Inmates should be treated humanely, but when people do 8 something like this, there's got to be very, very 9 10 serious repercussions. Now, I rise to talk about this 11 12 because I think it's important. I rise because I want to highlight this issue and underscore the 13 14 fact that these people put themselves in harm's 15 way every day. And everyone should take this the right way and thank God that they do, and thank 16 God they're as professional as they are. 17 18 So I would ask that people, to the extent that you can, keep this fine gentleman in 19 20 your thoughts and prayers. 21 And every now and then, we need a 22 dose of reality and keeping life in perspective. I was getting aggravated this morning because I 23 24 was not tying my tie properly. Then I thought 25 about this and I'm thinking to myself, I'm like

an idiot, this -- it means nothing. This poor 1 2 gentleman is lying in a bed immobile, and who knows for how long. 3 4 So it's unusual for me to do this, 5 but I don't think it's inappropriate. I think people should know things like this and we should 6 7 honor all of our men and women who serve in law enforcement because they make our lives safer, 8 better, and happier. 9 10 Mr. President, thank you. 2	Can we have some order, please.
3	SENATOR JACOBS: Mr. President, I
4	rise in support of this legislation that has the
5	potential for saving countless lives.
6	This piece of legislation would make
7	it possible for those enrolling in a SUNY or CUNY
8	institution, or just simply getting a library
9	card, to at that time sign up to become an organ
10	donor.
11	This is modeled after the very
12	successful program at local auto bureaus and DMVs
13	throughout the State of New York, where drivers
14	can easily sign up while getting or renewing
15	their driver's licenses. Currently the majority
16	of New Yorkers that sign up to the Organ Donor
17	Registry do so at a local auto bureau because of
18	this easy process.
19	The challenge is that there are
20	many people in our state who do not drive and
21	thus are not presented with the opportunity to
22	sign up at an auto bureau, especially in our
23	largest population center of New York City. This
24	legislation will just provide more venues for New
25	Yorkers who do not drive to easily sign up to the

1 donor registry.

_	
2	Currently New York State has one of
3	the lowest percentages of residents in the nation
4	signed up as organ donors just 31 percent,
5	compared to the national average of 56 percent.
6	We can and must do better, and I believe this
7	legislation will be a major advancement in this
8	effort.
9	And again, what was mentioned
10	earlier, just one organ donor can save eight
11	lives.
12	Mr. President, we unfortunately have
13	many life-threatening diseases in our society for
14	which we still are in search for a cure. That is
15	not the case here. We have the cure if we have
16	the organs. Currently 10,000 New Yorkers are
17	currently on a waiting list for life-saving
18	organs. And it is my belief that this
19	legislation, if implemented, will save lives.

Section 2. 3 THE SECRETARY: This 4 act shall take effect immediately. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Call the roll. б 7 (The Secretary called the roll.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 9 Kaminsky to explain his vote. 10 SENATOR KAMINSKY: Thank you. 11 This year the primary voting date 12 turns out to be on a sacrosanct day for New Yorkers and some Americans for two reasons. 13 One is it falls on September 11th. And certainly 14 15 in many of our districts there are very sacred ceremonies remembering that awful day and 16 commemorating the lives of the victims of that 17 18 attack that we feel compelled to attend and that would certainly get in the way of voting. 19 20 And it's also the second day of Rosh 21 Hashanah, which for many Jewish New Yorkers is one of the holiest days of the year and must be 22 observed as well. 23 So it is fitting and proper that we 24 25 pass this bill today, like the Assembly has

1 already done, and move the primary to a different 2 date so we could have the most participation on that day while allowing New Yorkers to observe 3 4 that sacred day in the ways that they wish. 5 So I commend the sponsor for doing this, and I'm glad that we're making this б 7 important change. I vote in the affirmative. 8 Thank you, Mr. President. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 10 Kaminsky to be recorded in the affirmative. 11 Senator Kavanagh to explain his 12 vote. 13 SENATOR KAVANAGH: Thank you, 14 Mr. President. I mostly rise to echo the 15 sentiments of my colleague. 16 I represent the district that was the site of the 9/11 attacks, and it is still, 17 18 for many people in our community, a day of 19 mourning and remembrance. SENATOR CROCI: If we could please 24 25 take up previously adopted Resolution Number

3413, by Senator Golden, please read it in its 1 2 entirety, and then recognize Senator Golden. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 3 The 4 Secretary will read. Legislative 5 THE SECRETARY: Resolution Number 3413, by Senator Golden, 6 7 memorializing Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to proclaim September 2018 as Kinship Care Month in 8 the State of New York. 9 10 "WHEREAS, It is the custom of this Legislative Body to recognize official months 11 that are set aside to increase awareness of 12 issues that affect the lives of residents of 13 New York State; and 14 15 "WHEREAS, Attendant to such concern, 16 and in full accord with its long-standing traditions, this Legislative Body is moved to 17 18 memorialize Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to proclaim 19 September 2018, as Kinship Care Month in the 20 State of New York; and 21 "WHEREAS, Kinship Care Month is 22 observed in September to recognize children in kinship families, and the grandparents and other 23 relatives who raise them, ensuring their safety, 24 25 promoting their well-being, and establishing a

stable household for these young people to 1 2 thrive; and "WHEREAS, In kinship families, a 3 4 caregiver cares for a child or children who were 5 biologically born to another family member or close friend because the biological parents are 6 7 unable to raise them; and "WHEREAS, Nationally, approximately 8 9 2.7 million children are living with grandparents 10 and other relatives in kinship care; more than 150,000 of these young people reside in the State 11 of New York; and 12 "WHEREAS, One in 11 of all children, 13 and one in five African-American children, will 14 15 live within a kinship family sometime during their childhood; and 16 "WHEREAS, Kinship caregivers reside 17 18 in urban, rural and suburban households in every 19 county of this great Empire State, stepping 20 forward out of love and loyalty to care for their young relatives, offering much needed continuity 21 22 and security, and providing the best opportunity to retain a child's cultural heritage and 23 community ties; and 24 25 "WHEREAS, Kinship Care Month honors

the priceless role these grandparents and other 1 relatives play in the lives of the children they 2 3 love; famous kinship caregivers include President 4 George Washington; and 5 "WHEREAS, Kinship Care Month also recognizes the accomplishment of countless youth б 7 throughout this great Empire State, and across the nation, who, with the unconditional support 8 9 of grandparents and other relatives, have 10 successfully navigated the emotional trauma of losing their parents; famous youth who were 11 12 raised in kinship care include Maya Angelou, Sandra Day O'Connor, and former President Barack 13 14 Obama; and 15 "WHEREAS, It is vitally important that the public grow in awareness of the 16 challenges faced by children, grandparents and 17 18 other relatives in kinship families; partnerships among the education, legal, social services, 19 20 mental health, justice, and other systems are necessary to ensure access to the services that 21 22 can enable kinship youth to flourish in all facets of their life; and 23 "WHEREAS, Kinship Care Month is 24 25 reflective of the values of family, community,

and the welfare of children shared by citizens 1 2 across New York State; now, therefore, be it "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 3 4 Body pause in its deliberations to memorialize 5 Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to proclaim September 2018 as Kinship Care Month in the State of 6 7 New York; and be it further 8 "RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted to 9 10 the Honorable Andrew M. Cuomo, Governor of the State of New York." 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Golden. 13 14 SENATOR GOLDEN: Thank you, 15 Mr. President. 16 I rise in support of this 17 resolution. And there are some people that are 18 upstairs in the audience in the gallery that 19 deserve some real thanks for the work that they 20 have done. That's Jerry Wallace and Ryan 21 Johnson, from the New York State Kinship 22 Navigators, who are players in this key organization. And we should thank them for their 23 efforts, talents and dedication that you both 24 25 have done for this great, great state.

1	The resolution before the Senate
2	proclaims September 2018 as Kinship Care Month.
3	You'll ask, Well, why now? Why are we doing this
4	today? With so much going on in our lives, we're
5	in the process of negotiating a state budget.
6	However, it's because there's so
7	much going on that it's even more important that
8	we pause and we reflect on what kinship care is
9	all about. Why? Because kinship care is the
10	unsung heroes of our families and us. Kinship
