Carol Pingelski Hotaling, who's sitting up front, is a tireless, passionate and powerful advocate of Yellow Ribbon Day. She is a true patriot who always puts our country and our men and women who defend it first. She shared with me that former Senate Republican Majority Leader and my good friend Senator Joe Bruno advanced the first Senate resolution on this issue back on March 21, 2006.

Carol Pingelski Hotaling also mentioned that March 21, 2008, is the anniversary of the finding of the remains of Matt Maupin, a POW in Iraq, and the first since the Vietnam War.

She is advocating for Yellow Ribbon
Day to become a national day, and she has been
urging members of Congress to support this
important nonpartisan effort.

Many in this chamber will recall that during the Iranian hostage crisis, when 52 of our fellow Americans were held captive for 444 days, yellow ribbons were tied around trees as a symbol of national unity and remembrance for our fellow Americans. And during the first

Persian Gulf War, Americans again tied yellow ribbons around trees and wore yellow ribbons on their lapels also to showcase our solidarity and support for our troops serving in harm's way.

We must never forget the servicemen and -women who heroically, faithfully and courageously serve our country. No greater debt is owed than that owed to those who gave their lives for their beloved nation and to those who continue to be missing in action. American former prisoners of war are heroes whose service to our country will never be forgotten. These brave men and women fought for their country and endured cruelties and deprivation as they helped protect our nation, liberating millions from tyranny and terror, advancing the cause of freedom worldwide.

We are the land of the free because of our brave, the courageous men and women who defend our nation and preserve the liberties enshrined in our Constitution. These are the true heroes that dedicated patriots like Carol Pingelski Hotaling and Yellow Ribbon Day seek to honor. I thank her for her dedication, devotion and leadership on this important cause.
