in September. The Hawks went into the state championship with an undefeated record. Corning won the Large School 3 Division, which was held at the Carrier Dome in Syracuse, edging Sachem and Rome Free Academy by slight margins.

Rounding out the division was Hilton, Greece, Auburn and East Ramapo.

I want to congratulate the band members that are with us today, and I'll move on to the Cross Country Team that on November 11th of 2017 captured the State Championship Class A for the second straight year. They were the first Section 14 to qualify for the Nike Cross Country Nationals in Portland, Oregon, where they finished in 12th place in the Nationals.

With us today are runners Quinn
Nicholson, Dan Gahagan, Torrey Jacobson-Evans,
Nathan Lawson, Bryce Derick, Camden Zaidel,
volunteer coach and parent Jim Derick, and
Coach Ray Lawson.

We'll also note that Coach Lawson,
who also coaches the Girls Cross Country Team,
was recently named for the second consecutive
year New York State Boys High School Coach of the
Year by U.S. Track and Field and Cross Country

Coaches Association. 1 2 We're very proud today to have these members of these two fine teams from the school 3 4 of Corning-Painted Post with us. Let's get people help instead of sending them to jail or to prison. This model works. Let's make sure you can access it no matter where you live in the State of New York.

This will go a long way to making sure we're helping people to be productive members of society and adding to improving the quality of life for everyone here in New York.

So again, I want to thank my colleagues for supporting this legislation.

Let's see it become law and make sure we're diverting people from our criminal justice system.

And the result of that is we are mandating our localities to do something they're actually not doing, and then we're going to find everyone out of compliance, and we may find ourselves putting even more mentally ill people into a treatment program coercively simply because we didn't have the outpatient services they actually needed and were trying to get.

So to set up a system where our mental health providers fail, our mentally ill constituents -- who are looking for the help and need the help -- fail because we don't provide them the services, but then to say, Well, at least we locked them all up for some period of time doesn't get us to the answer I think the Senator who sponsors the bill wants us to get to and doesn't get to the answer I hope we'll get to.

So I do believe that this system can be fixed, but it requires a commitment by the state -- not just to say we're making certain

Making Kendra's Law permanent not only helps prevent those with mental illness from harming others, but we provide essential treatment to those who are most in need.

The proposals in this bill expand upon the original measure and provide even greater protection to both the public and those suffering from mental illness. Because family and household members often witness dangerous behavior first, or know when a loved one is facing a serious personal crisis, this measure will provide a new avenue of support and care.

And by adding attempted suicide as a qualifying condition, we will provide recourse for those who believe they have run out of options.
