the near genocide of Jews in Persia centuries 1 It's an odd nod to today's divisiveness. 2 The Bible teaches that the Prime Minister of 3 4 Persia, Haman, told the King that the Jews were 5 disloyal, invaders, enemies who must be destroyed. Thank God for Esther, the Queen of 6 7 Persia, and a Jew, who stood up to the King, and we were saved. 8 9 Honored members of this body, we too 10 live in a time when diversity and difference are feared, when newcomers to our land are called 11 12 invaders, when anti-Semitism and Islamophobia and white nationalist bigotry and homophobia have 13 14 sparked fear and violence. 15 Members of the Senate, my prayer for you is that you will model and embrace our great 16 diversity, reminding all New Yorkers, those here 17 18 for generations and those brand-new to our state, those who speak perfect English and those 19

struggling to learn, those who wear yarmulkes and

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Number 587, by Senator Kaplan, memorializing 1 2 Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to proclaim March 21, 2019, as Day of Nowruz in the State of New York. 3 4 "WHEREAS, It is the sense of this 5 Legislative Body to recognize official days that are set aside to increase awareness and enhance 6 7 the profile of cultural diversity which strengthens the fabric of the communities of 8 New York State; and 9 10 "WHEREAS, Attendant to such concern, and in full accord with its long-standing 11 12 traditions, this Legislative Body is justly proud to memorialize Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to 13 14 proclaim March 21, 2019, as Day of Nowruz in the 15 State of New York, in conjunction with the observance of International Day of Nowruz; and 16 "WHEREAS, The Persian New Year, 17 18 Nowruz, meaning 'New Day,' begins each year on the first day of spring, marked by vernal 19 20 equinox, or Tahvil; on this day, which may occur on March 20th, 21st, or 22nd, the sun crosses the 21 22 celestial equator; and "WHEREAS, Of all Persian holidays, 23 the New Year celebration is the most important, 24 25 embodying a wealth of ancient rites and customs,

and symbolizing the continuity of the ancient 1 2 Persian culture which has survived many adversities; and 3 4 "WHEREAS, As far back as records go, 5 Nowruz has been a celebration of early spring, when the sun begins to regain strength and 6 7 overcome winter's cold and darkness, and when there is a renewal of growth and vigor in nature; 8 9 and 10 "WHEREAS, A few days prior to the 11 New Year, a special cover is spread onto the 12 carpet or table in every Persian household; this ceremonial table is called cloth of seven dishes, 13 14 each one beginning with the Persian letter Sin; 15 the number seven has been sacred in Persia since the ancient times, and the seven dishes stand for 16 the seven angelic heralds of life -- rebirth, 17 18 health, happiness, prosperity, joy, patience, and beauty; and 19 20 "WHEREAS, The actual Nowruz 21 ceremonies begin on the eve of the last Wednesday 22 of the outgoing year and is known as Chaharshanbe Souri, or Red Wednesday; early in the evening 23 several large bonfires are made, and each member 24

of the family jumps over the fire; and

"WHEREAS, Furthermore, the jumping 1 2 over the fire is followed by a gathering in which nuts and fruits are served and stories are told; 3 4 while the party goes and the fire dies out, the 5 ashes, a symbol of the bad luck imposed by winter, are buried; and 6 7 "WHEREAS, The traditional herald of Nowruz, Haji Firuz, oversees celebrations for the 8 New Year as a remnant of the ancient Zoroastrian 9 10 fire-keeper; his face is covered in soot, and he 11 is clad in bright red clothes and a felt hat; and "WHEREAS, While ushering in Nowruz, 12 Haji Firuz plays a tambourine and sings as people 13 14 gather around him and his troupe of musicians, 15 spreading good cheer and the news of the coming New Year; and 16 "WHEREAS, The 13th day of Nowruz is 17 18 called Sizdah Bedar, celebrated by spending all 19 day outdoors in nature having picnics and 20 parties; and "WHEREAS, Day of Nowruz is a time to 21 22 celebrate the aspirations and values that have been shared with the Persian people for 23 generations, and to recognize the countless 24

contributions of Americans and New Yorkers of

commemorating Nowruz for the very first time in the Senate. Nowruz, or "New Day" in Persian, is an ancient festival dating back to the time of Zoroaster that marks the beginning of spring and celebrates the rebirth of nature.

This secular holiday is celebrated by thousands of New Yorkers each year, as we celebrate it here today, by gathering family around a ceremonial table known as Haft-sin, and counting down the moment of equinox, when everyone cheers {in Farsi}, or "Happy New Year."

Nowruz is the most important celebration of all Persian holidays, embodying a wealth of ancient rites and customs, and symbolizing the continuity of ancient Persian culture, which has survived many adversities over thousands of years.

Nowruz is really a favorite holiday for Persian kids. It is a little bit like Christmas or Hanukkah. Because no matter how rich or how poor your family is, this is the time that you are getting gifts and new clothes. You would always at least get one new outfit to wear for the new year, and then would go to the homes

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of elders in your family, and grandparents and

     aunts and uncles, and each other, they would

     shower you with gifts, usually a token for

And I know you're a very proud mama. 8 So thank you, and have a great day. 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: Senator Tedisco on the resolution. 11 SENATOR TEDISCO: Thank you, 12 Mr. President. 13 14 I too want to congratulate and thank 15 Senator Akshar for carrying the ball on this resolution. And welcome, Juice. And Marianne, 16 her lovely mother, and the fact that she's become 17 18 a wonderful advocate for other parents. 19 I always feel compelled on this day 20 to stand up, not only as an advocate but as a 21 family member who had the opportunity to experience a family -- a brother who was not a 22 burden but was a gift to our family, to speak a 23 little bit about my experience and my family's 24 25 experience.

Everybody in this room today and in the balcony has challenges we deal with.

Everybody that's watching this has challenges we

deal with. Everyone in the world that's ever

5 come into it has challenges we deal with.

I think none of us could deal with it as well as Juice, my brother Joey, or those who face the challenge of Down syndrome in one way or another. They have shown such, as has been mentioned, love, unconditional love. Every day to them, they are a joy. They smile. I don't think I got more kisses or hugs combined from all the people in the world than I did from my brother Joey. He brought such unbelievable power to our family and brought us together in an unbelievable way.

I've told the story before about being 10 years old and having a brother Tom that was 14 years old, and my mother becoming pregnant with our third brother, Joey. And in the midst, in the middle of that pregnancy, we would hear my mom and my dad speaking and we understood something was happening with the baby and our brother that my mother was going to give birth to.

And in our neighborhood -- and I'm so happy we've come such a long way from where we were with Down syndrome -- there were some people that weren't that nice. There were some children that weren't that nice. And the day that my mother was ready to give birth and we all had to get into the vehicle, my brother and I looked at ourselves, and we weren't certain we wanted to go. We were a little bit afraid. We didn't know what we were going to see, what our brother was really like, because of the rumors in our neighborhood from some of the people that weren't that kind at that time.

And we got to the hospital, my mother went into the delivery room, we stayed in the outer area sitting room. And it was a fairly quick birth for my brother. And I'll never forget this, that we were seated there and the doctor came out and walked up to my father and said, "Your child is a mongoloid." I'm so happy they never use that term anymore. It's an extra chromosome.

And he looked at my father and said, "You're not going to want to take this child home. There's a place out West where there's a

home where you can send your child. I'll get you the information on it."

And my father had a perplexed look on his face and he said to the doctor -- and we were listening -- "Is our son sick? Is there something wrong with him? Is it his heart?"

He said, "No, no, he's very healthy. But you're not going to want to take this child home."

And my father again hesitated and said, "Could me and my sons go see their mother and their brother? We'd like to go see them."

"Yeah, sure." He took us into the room.

And my brother and I kind of stayed back a little bit, because we didn't know what we were going to see, from what we were thinking, what we were told, and some of these expectations. And I looked at my mother clinging to this beautiful child. But I looked around the room, because I was looking for my brother. And then I realized that was my brother. And it was the most beautiful baby I have ever seen in my life.

And the love in my mother's arms and the way she was clutching that baby, you weren't

going to get that baby out of her hands. And the doctor made the mistake of walking up to my mother and repeating what he had said to my father. And if she could have got out of that bed and ripped his head off his shoulders, she would have done that on that particular day.

She looked at the doctor and said,
"We're a family. We're an Italian family. We
don't send kids to homes, we take our children
home." And she wanted to get out of that
hospital as quick as she could.

And Joey came home. He spent

15 wonderful years with us. And today I talk to
the family members also, and the love they
provide for these children in return for the love
that they get from Down syndrome children. And
I'm so thankful for my mom and my dad, who for
15 years cared for my brother. We were very
active in school so they had to make sure we got
to the sports events and all the events we would
do.

But for 15 years at that time, because the services weren't there, there weren't people to come in and give you a respite where you could leave. And my mom or dad never went to

a movie in those 15 years, never went out to dinner, never went to a party. My dad worked in the foundry at the General Electric, my mom stayed at home, took care of Joey, made sure when he was able to go to school, he got to school, in the limited area he could get to school.

And there were days at that time in the schools where there was a revolving door in some of the people who were providing services, the aides and things of that nature. And children like consistency when they're challenged in certain ways. And when someone would leave that Joey was used to, or a day went wrong, I remember he'd come home on the bus and he'd get off the bus and his shoes and socks were not on his feet. He threw them out the window. And he would be disturbed and upset and angry, and we'd have to comfort him, my mom would comfort him.

And -- but all through that period, unbelievable love. He was joyous usually every day with us in the house. And at the age of 15, got child leukemia. And at that time there wasn't the technology to cure that. If he was alive today, he probably would still be alive.

But he passed away at the age of 15.

And I'll never forget the fact that because there was not the technology, he suffered quite a bit from that disorder, was in the hospital for a month or five or six weeks. And then my dad took over. And he'd go to work in the foundry in the morning, he'd go to the hospital when he came home. He'd sleep next to Joey in the bed and rub Joey's head and comfort Joey.

In the last two weeks, just there every night, staying with Joey, and tells the story that his breathing got very shallow on the last day he was alive, and he took one last breath and then he was calm. And Joey passed away at the age of 15.

But his legacy and his love lives on and continues to live on and continues to illustrate that sometimes we think our challenges are great and we don't know how to handle them. And we get upset and we get angry. Well, they illustrate for us how to handle our challenges. And it's not only about how they handle their challenges, it's about how their family does, how society does, how our direct care services handle it sometimes. And that's

why that is so important, this year and every year. We think about those men and women who are trained to deal with some of the challenges our kids have, and it's so important that we pay them commensurately.

So today I remember Joey and I'm proud to say that we see children now doing television movies, in series, going to college -- in days when they were telling family members like mine, Send them out to a home. They can achieve such unbelievable successes and be everything they can be if we expedite that in everything we can do as elected officials and as individuals and as parts of their family.

So as Senator Akshar has said, we've come a long way, but we have a ways to go and to continue to support them and understand that they're beautiful individuals, that they give us unconditional love, and they can also provide tremendous parts of our families and parts of our communities.

So thank you, Mr. President. And welcome, Juice. And welcome, Mom. We're so happy to have you here.

I want to thank Senator Helming for her leadership on making this happen, as well as Assemblymembers Cusick and Lifton.

This is a really important bill. I am excited that it is -- I want to thank the leadership of the Majority Leader for bringing this to the floor today, because this is going to make a big difference for tourism, for just the ecological health of the Finger Lakes.

As chair of the Commission on Rural 1 2 Resources, this is a very important step toward 3 protecting our rural areas in this state, and I 4 am very proud to vote aye. 5 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: 6 Senator 7 May to be recorded in the affirmative. 8 Senator Helming to explain her vote. 9 SENATOR HELMING: Thank you, 10 Mr. President. I rise today to explain my vote, and 11 12 I'd like to begin by thanking this body for passing this bill for the second year in a row. 13 14 Last year it was unanimous approval; I hope it's 15 unanimous again today. 16 Also, I'd just like to say that with unanimous support it continues the theme of what 17 18 we're talking about today, pulling together on issues regardless of partisan politics. And our area already takes more trash that's imported from outside of the Finger Lakes than in any other area in the State of New York.

This bill is very important to so many people. And it shows what can be done when people set aside differences and work together.

We had so many people come to the table to make this possible from both sides of the aisle. And I want to thank all of the environmental advocates who met with the independent business owners, with the winery owners. I want to thank Assemblyman Cusick and his staff for their work, their time, their energy they spent on making this bill possible. Senator O'Mara's office and Senator O'Mara himself. Senator Griffo's office;

Also the former staff of the Rural Resources Department, Jillian Kassow and Caitlyn Gilligan, who worked tirelessly on this, and my own staff. I mean, I just can't express how many hours were spent working here in Albany, bringing

groups and individuals together to get this bill 1 2 done, and traveling out to the Finger Lakes to 3 meet with people and to see the area that we're 4 talking about. 5 So to my own staff, Kristin Frank, and also Chris Catt, I also extend a tremendous 6 7 thank you. And to Senator May, for lending your name to support this bill to get it to the floor, 8 I thank you for that too. 9 10 This bill does not stop -- this bill does not do everything that is needed to be done 11 12 to protect the Finger Lakes, but it is a good first measure, and again I thank everyone for 13 14 your support. 15 Thank you. together with the environmental consequences of
that increased truck traffic through the
beautiful Finger Lakes region. We want to be
known for our wine and our tourism, not our
landfills and not our garbage truck traffic.

This is an incinerator project that has tried to have been sold as being very environmentally friendly with the emissions that come out of it. And if that is the case, then I say why not build these incinerators closer to the source of the garbage and avoid the transportation, negative environmental consequences, the extra cost in transporting that garbage through our upstate districts, impacting our tourism?

And for those reasons I urge an aye vote on this legislation today.
