Butman, of the Lubavitch Youth Organization in Brooklyn, will deliver today's 11 invocation. 12 13 Rabbi Butman. {In Hebrew} 14 RABBI BUTMAN: 15 heavenly Father, please bestow Your blessings on 16 all the members of the New York State Senate, who are going to dedicate 117 days in memory and in 17 18 honor of the Lubavitcher Rebbe, Rabbi Menachem M. 19 Schneerson. 20 The entire world is now worried 21 about safety and security in synagogues and in 22 churches all over the world, and so are we here in the State of New York. And we are happy for 23 the Police Department in the State of New York 24 25 and in Brooklyn who have taken special

precautions and special measures to ensure the safety and security of all synagogues and churches in Brooklyn.

When I went to Washington in 1999 to open the United States Senate, I went to see the Rebbe before, and the Rebbe said to me, "Take with you a pushkeh" -- a pushkeh is a tzedakah box -- "and while you do the invocation, you should put in a dollar in the pushkeh and let them know what money should be used for."

And therefore I am going to do
exactly what the Rebbe asked me, and I'm going to
put in a dollar -- and the Rebbe even said "On
which it said 'in God we trust'" -- in the
pushkeh, and I'm going to ask all of you
honorable members later to join us in
contributing a dollar to the pushkeh.

But I don't want to get you scared.

This is not a fundraising effort. If it would

be, we would ask you for much more than a dollar.

(Laughter.)

RABBI BUTMAN: This is an effort to do more goodness and kindness. Each time we put in a dollar into a charity box, we do an act of goodness and kindness.

The Rebbe also always spoke about education. And when he spoke about education, he meant every child in the world. And he wanted -- the Rebbe said many times that every child should know that there is an Eye that sees, an Ear that hears, and that the world is not a jungle.

The Rebbe also asked to institute in schools a moment of silence for all children in the United States, a moment of silence in which we can reflect that there is a God in this world, as evident on every dollar, who sees everything and records everything, and that the world is not a jungle.

Let us together take just a few moments as a moment of silence in thinking exactly about that. And we will start the moment of silence right now together.

(Whereupon, the assemblage respected a moment of silence.)

RABBI BUTMAN: I want you to know, dear friends, that every Saturday, every Shabbos, in our liturgy we say a special prayer for you.

We say {in Hebrew}, which means all those who serve the public faithfully, as you are, we are asking the blessing of Almighty God

Cuomo to proclaim May 13, 2019, as Blue 1 Star Families Day. 2 "WHEREAS, Blue Star Mothers of 3 4 America, Inc. dates back to World War II and is a 5 support organization for mothers of children serving or who have served in the United States 6 7 military; and 8 "WHEREAS, The blue star flag was 9 created in 1917 by an Army captain from Ohio; it 10 quickly became the unofficial symbol of a child in service; the organization itself was conceived 11 12 during World War II in 1942; and 13 "WHEREAS, The symbol of the blue 14 star surrounded by a red rectangle represents 15 hope and pride; Blue Star mothers perform volunteer duties on the home front and work in 16 hospitals and on civil defense; and 17 18 "WHEREAS, The Blue Star Mothers organization is named after the signature blue 19 20 stars, which mothers hang in their windows when 21 their children are called to service, either 22 stateside or overseas; and "WHEREAS, During World War II, there 23 were approximately 30,000 Blue Star mothers, and 24 25 several thousand during the Korean and Vietnam

wars; national membership, however, dropped to an 1 2 all-time low of 1,200 during the 1990s; and 3 "WHEREAS, In recent years, Blue Star 4 Mothers has gained 217 chapters, with troops 5 deployed in Iraq, Afghanistan and elsewhere; anxious mothers of servicemen and servicewomen 6 7 are forming chapters nationwide, including the first Capital Region Blue Star Mothers group; and 8 9 "WHEREAS, Darlene Ward and Kay Moody 10 established New York State's second Blue Star chapter in Delmar, the first having been in 11 12 Rochester, to encourage their children and to 13 meet other military parents with whom they have 14 much in common; and 15 "WHEREAS, In December 2006, the small group of mothers met and discussed issues 16 families face when their sons and daughters go 17 18 off to war; in addition to supporting the needs of parents in the area, the members support the 19 20 troops, sending Freedom Boxes, cards and good wishes; they also participate in veterans' 21 22 projects on a regular basis; and "WHEREAS, The charter for the 23 24 Capital Region No. 2 Chapter was approved on 25 February 6, 2007; since December 2006, its

And I remember thinking even then, 16 children -- this woman is a saint. She's an absolute saint, especially after Nick, she kept going. She had 15 more after that.

SENATOR FLANAGAN: Anyway, I remember him saying that his mother and father always stuck together. No matter what one said with relation to the children, the other one always backed it up.

And I remember asking, "What's it like for your family to get together?" And I just said this to Michael before, because I wanted to refresh my own memory. Just think about that. You've got 16 kids, their significant others. You're talking 30, 35 people right there. Then you throw in 42 grandchildren.

Then you throw in 18 great-grandchildren. 1 you throw in brothers and nieces and nephews. 2 You're talking at least a hundred people before 3 4 you even invite a neighbor. 5 And I remember -- so I'm thinking of that, and I remember Michael telling me that 6 7 their living room was 24 by 55. Most people's houses aren't 24 by 55. But the Spano living 8 room -- and I know it was a former house -- that 9 10 was where everyone got together. 11 And I do have to say I did not know 12 Mr. Spano as well as others, but his reputation preceded him. And it was kind of interesting to 13 14 listen about what he, quote, unquote, did in 15 retirement. People like that don't retire. felt uncomfortable doing it, and so he wanted to
bring it to everyone's attention.

When we brought this legislation to light last year, students from across the country started calling our office, doctors were calling, hospitals. Hospitals wanted us to know they were not in the practice of doing this. But there are many people who are still doing it, and we want to make sure it is not being done.

Women -- if you ask them, for the advancement of medicine, can you do a pelvic examination, most women will say okay, because we're advancing health. But when you're not getting the consent from the woman, it is

Today, Monday, we kick off

Prevention Week, and on the calendar we have

three bills pertaining to substance use disorder

treatment. This one is called Stephen's Law.

And I first would like to thank Senator Ortt, who

carried this bill and worked so hard to get us to

this point, and today hopefully we'll get this

over the finish line.

Stephen's mother, Angela Robertson, and advocate Avi Israel from Save the Michaels, were here today to push for passage of this law. It's a simple law. It simply allows for somebody in treatment to designate either a group or a loved one to be a contact in case they begin decompensating and stop treatment or have a positive toxicology report.

In the case of Stephen, both his mother and Save the Michaels were actively involved in his treatment. The day before he died, he went to his treatment program, where they revealed he had failed a drug test -- and they were not notified. Had they been notified, he could have been persuaded to go back to inpatient treatment. And instead, the next morning he was found lifeless in his bed.

1 There are too many Stephens all 2 across the state, too many Michaels all across the state, all across our districts. And we 3 4 can't wave a magic wand and make it end, but this 5 body has been very proactive in a bipartisan way, one bill at a time. We patch the safety net and 6 7 make it stronger and stronger, and hopefully save one life at a time. And that's what this bill 8 does. I urge colleagues to support it. 9 10 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: 11 Senator Harckham to be recorded in the affirmative. 12 Senator Akshar to explain his vote. 13 14 SENATOR AKSHAR: Thank you, 15 Mr. President. I have a great deal of respect for 16 17 Avi and Angela. And you're correct, Senator, 18 that this house, on this issue and many others, but specifically on this issue, we have found a 19 20 way to work in a bipartisan way. And New Yorkers deserve that, they truly do. 21 The only thing I would ask is that 22 as we move forward, I know that this is currently 23 a one-house bill. I think the Coalition for 24 25 Behavioral Health has offered many good

suggestions to make this bill even better as it's currently authored. So my hope is that we can find some common ground with that the stakeholder group, because it's one thing that I would note that we did with a great deal of certainty, was to involve the stakeholders at every level of the conversation.

So I'm going to support the bill today. I think it's a very good bill. I just think that we should, in fact, listen to the coalition, to the suggestions that they've made.

things have a financial cost. And we're willing to pay them because we're trying to save lives.

But every once in a while you get a suggestion that doesn't cost anything. And I had the privilege to meet with Stephen's mother, Angela, in my office and through a lot of tears, and along with Save the Michaels, she told me her tragic story of the loss of her son.

And we've all heard these stories from parents across our districts. And no matter how many times you hear it, and from how many different parents, it's just as heartbreaking as the first one you hear.

But what struck me is there was a simple fix that maybe her son could be alive if this had been in place then. And certainly we can save lives going forward.

And so everyone understands, this information, this is affirmative consent, so that the patient signs off and says, you know, if I miss an appointment, if I fail a test, this information can be released to my next of kin, my mother or whomever. And in Stephen's case, he had that.

Unfortunately, nobody in those

I'm honored to introduce this legislation, which would rename a portion of Highway Route 208, a road I travel often, the Gary Pietropaolo Highway, in honor of Officer Gary Pietropaolo, whose family joins us today.

Office Pietropaolo was the beloved son to Liz and Gary, Sr., and was engaged to be married to his fiancee, Jaci, when he died tragically in an off-duty crash last year, just days before his wedding.

A graduate of Marist College, he began his law enforcement career at SUNY

New Paltz, where for seven years he excelled.

While at New Paltz, he went to Instructional

Development School to advance his career and train to be on bike patrol, where he designed the bike patrol uniform and patrolled the campus, engaging with students and putting them at ease.

He later transferred to the Carmel Police Department, where he stood out and was recognized for his efforts to keep impaired drivers off the road. By focusing his efforts on preventing people from driving under the influence, Officer Pietropaolo saved countless lives.

He also stood out for his 1 2 temperament. He was well-regarded by those he 3 worked with and who knew him, treating everyone with kindness. 4 5 The renaming of this stretch of highway in New Paltz in Officer Pietropaolo's 6 7 name will ensure that he is recognized and 8 remembered for his contributions to our community and to keeping us all safe. 9 10 Thank you very much. I vote aye. And I just want to read one statistic that should give pause to all of us. Between the years of 2003 and 2013, 60,000 New Yorkers were arrested for the possession of these knives, which are essentially work tools. Sixty-thousand New Yorkers were arrested and prosecuted for either felony or misdemeanor possession of something that was perfectly legal to buy in a store, but the minute they walked out the store, it was illegal.

It's insane. It is deliberately vague, it is unconstitutional. And finally, once

The ban on gravity knives catches many non-criminal individuals. Senator Savino indicated the stats. Between 2002 and 2013, 60,000 residents of the City of New York were arrested. But surprisingly enough, the majority of these arrests occurred where? In communities of color. Eighty-eight percent of the people arrested for gravity knife possession were either African-American or Latino. Many of these people arrested are blue-collar workers who have legally bought their knives at stores.

The ban on gravity knives should be overturned. In this case, possession is a crime and intent, intent is never a defense. It is unjust that people can be arrested for merely carrying a tool that they use for work every day.

The knives for which people are being arrested, they're not switchblades, not street weapons that were initially targeted by the law.

But more importantly, the Legal Aid Society did an analysis of 1,800 violent felony cases where weapons were used. The findings show that when it came to gravity knives, less than 1 percent were used in the offense. Less than 1 percent, yet 88 percent of the individuals arrested were Latinos and African-Americans.

They have been a situation where gravity knives have not passed the wrist-flick test. And under today's court ruling, if a police officer failed to flick open a knife on the first try, the knife would not be illegal.

I vote affirmatively. Thank you.

tighter reporting requirements on death
certificates when an individual tragically dies
from an opioid overdose.

The underlying legislation proposes disclosure of the specific opioid in the hope that public health researchers could track data on fatalities to avoid them. Statistics like these help public health professionals and lawmakers shape policy and protect New York State residents.

Much the same, my amendment which is before this body, the Born Alive Survivors

Protection Act, would protect infants who are born alive during abortion.

Sadly, when my colleagues across the aisle passed the Reproductive Health Act, they nixed a key part of the Public Health Law, Section 4164, which required doctors to report all life-sustaining efforts, their failure or success, for infants born as a result of an abortion procedure.

Currently, as a result of this, there are no reporting or care requirements for infants born alive as a result of an abortion

procedure known as induced termination. But
these records arguably hold the same public
health value as the bill before us. And the goal
with both bills is to sustain life.

The Centers for Disease Control
has even issued guidelines in these instances
recommending the issuance of a birth certificate
for infants born under these horrific
circumstances, and a death certificate in the
event of a death. While they say it's not likely
to happen, the CDC reports the induced abortion
procedure may result in a live birth.

Opponents of this amendment contend that infants are not born alive as a result of an abortion procedure, so collecting this data is unnecessary. To that, I say the facts matter.

One hundred forty-three. That's the number of infants that have been born alive as a result of an abortion procedure and who subsequently died in the United States between 2003 and 2014.

Seventy-two. That's the number of infants born alive who subsequently died as a result of an abortion procedure in New York State between 1997 and 2017.

While some of those deaths resulted from spontaneous termination of a pregnancy, the fact remains that this occurred in New York before the Reproductive Health Act and will certainly continue now that the law allows abortions up until the moment of birth.

Yet because the RHA removed all reporting requirements, now the CDC will not be able to accurately report on how many infants are born alive as a result of an abortion. Very, very convenient for those who say this horrific loss of life does not occur.

The CDC has made it very clear just how important it is to continue this reporting in order to examine trends in public health and to make informed decisions. The reported data has been used to identify characteristics of women who are at high risk of unintended pregnancy, evaluate the effectiveness of programs for reducing teen pregnancies, and monitor changes in the clinical practice patterns related to abortion such as changes in the types of procedures used and the weeks of gestation at the time of abortion. This information is needed to calculate the mortality rate of specific abortion

procedures.

This amendment will reestablish these vital reporting requirements that hold as much significance as those regarding deaths from opioids. This proposal in no way hinders a woman's access to abortion, but rather helps protect the life of an innocent baby born in this horrific situation. In a situation where a child is born alive during an abortion procedure, what person in their right mind would believe a doctor or medical practitioner should not provide medical treatment to save or keep the child alive?

Mr. President, I offer that this amendment is not a partisan issue. When a very similar bill was brought to the floor of the United States Senate, the bill received bipartisan support. A very similar version of this bill passed the North Carolina State Senate, with five Democratic senators voting in favor of the legislation. One Democratic senator summarized his vote by saying "How could I vote against my conscience?"

It is for these reasons that I urge my colleagues, all of my colleagues here, to
