He has become a therapy dog for many. He visits schools, they visit hospices, just to make sure that people have that comfort level.

But unfortunately, one of his siblings did not make it, and that's Carina. And unfortunately, even with the medical treatment given, she did not survive. Though Pearl, his other sibling, did make it, and they are a dynamic duo working to make sure that animals are taken care of.

And today in the State of New York we are trying to express the importance of animal welfare. And the reason being is because when you look at several cases of animal abuse and that abuser, the one who is committing the crime, you can see that there is a direct link between that animal abuse and crime not only on other humans but other crimes across our state.

And it's time that we take this serious. It's time that we start protecting our animals. Because when we protect our animals, we're also protecting our people.

And I am so happy to be here as the sponsor of this event, along with Assemblyperson Linda Rosenthal and my colleague here -- where is he -- Senator Tedisco. But him -- all three of us made this day a special day for our furry friends.

And I also want to thank Senator
Boyle for also being a champion of our animals
here, and Senator LaValle. We definitely have
something in common that has nothing to do with
politics. Because when we're taking care of our
animals, we're taking care of the entire State of
New York.

So thank you for giving me this opportunity. And, Mr. President, if you do not mind recognizing Hudson to the rest of my colleagues here today.

     attention to one of the most serious health
22
     challenges facing older Americans today, the
     scourge of Alzheimer's disease. It is an illness
23
     that has very likely touched or will in some way
24
25
     touch each one of us here at some point in our
```

lives.

Today nearly 6 million Americans, including an estimated 400,000 New Yorkers, live with Alzheimer's. Anybody who has been touched directly or indirectly by Alzheimer's or dementia can speak to the devastating toll this cruel disease takes on the lives of those who live with it and all who care for them.

And we have with us several visitors from the Alzheimer's Association. I spoke with a young woman who is caring for her father as he slowly and agonizingly slips away; a woman whose husband had early onset Alzheimer's and she had to care for him and their three children, and the children had to watch their father disappear from their lives little by little.

My own mother cared for her parents into their 90s, and she only survived them for a few years. And I have always thought that that was partly because of the stress of caring for her parents. And what I just learned is that 30 percent of caregivers for Alzheimer's patients actually do not survive the person they are caring for because the stress is so great.

While there is no cure as yet, an

     early diagnosis can provide access to

     medications that may lessen the effect of the
     disease and give them more time to locate

     critical resources and support networks for those

     living with the disease and for their caregivers.
     Most importantly, an early diagnosis means more

I thank my colleagues for continuing to recognize June as Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month here in the State of New York.

Alzheimer's disease and dementia are issues that unfortunately probably almost all of us in this chamber are familiar with, because almost everyone knows someone whose lives have been impacted by these devastating diseases, whether it's someone with the diagnosis or a caretaker or a loved one.

However, it wasn't till I became involved with the Aging Committee that I really began to understand the full scale of the problem here in New York. According to the Alzheimer's Association, worldwide 50 million people are living with Alzheimer's and other dementias. While many of us think of Alzheimer's as a memory disorder, the terrible reality is that it is actually a disease that kills more patients than breast cancer and prostate cancer combined. One in three seniors dies with Alzheimer's or another dementia.

Currently there is no robust treatment or cure for Alzheimer's or dementia, and the burden of caring for someone struggling

Included within this legislation are requirements for maintaining sanitation standards, exercise and nutrition standards, provision of regular diurnal light cycles, access to veterinary care, and provisions for nursing and pregnant animals.

Pet dealers must be held to standards that will promote the safety, good health and overall well-being of animals in their care.

This bill is hugely important 1 2 because we know that there's a link between animal abuse and human violence. As I mentioned yesterday, I 6 7 carry a bill, S1257, that would also expand the 8 mandated reporting requirement. It passed unanimously here in the Senate but failed to move 9 10 in the Assembly, so I wish Senator Martinez the 11 best of luck on that front. 12 My bill would also close a dangerous loophole. Current law only requires mandated 13 14 reporters to report cases where abuse happens at 15 the hands of a parent or guardian, not anyone else. So you can leave your child with a coach 16 or a volunteer, it doesn't matter -- something 17 18 most parents would be shocked to learn. In fact, 19 I didn't even learn it until my constituents 20 brought the bill to me. 21

My bill would require anyone working with children to report abuse, which would also bolster this bill. I urge this body to pass this bill.

And what this does is that it allows for individuals to understand that you cannot hurt an animal. And we have to understand, again -- I said it before -- is that there is a direct link. If we start using animals as a way to protect our people, I think this state would be safer. It would be healthier for our communities, it will be healthier for our kids.

I was going to talk about 13 14 Mark Schroeder, but there's nothing left to say. 15 (Laughter.) Nearly twenty SENATOR GALLIVAN: 16 years ago -- Senator Kennedy did a very good job 17 18 of recounting Mark's career in public service, 19 and he mentioned his career in public service as 20 it spanned nearly 20 years. Well, nearly twenty years ago, I remember a day when we were much 21 younger and much more nimble, along with another 22 friend or two of ours, we were out jogging one 23 24 day. I must also say the other members of 1 2 the executive staff form a team. Keith worked with former State Police Superintendent George 3 4 Beach, a good friend of mine. And I think the 5 stage is set for you to continue to lead an agency that's professional and enhance its 6 7 professionalism if you're able to do so. 8 But I'll be proudly voting in the 9 affirmative for this appointment as well as all 10 of them. Thank you very much, Mr. President. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: Senator Seward on the nominations. 13 14 SENATOR SEWARD: Thank you very 15 much, Mr. President. 16 I too rise to congratulate our four nominees this afternoon.
