     us is named after a young girl named Dream
15
     Shepherd, who unfortunately was born with sickle
     cell disease, and at the age of five years old
16
     she experienced a stroke. And in an effort to
17

     save her life, she underwent experimental
19
     treatment of a stem cell transplant.
     Miraculously, that ultimately has changed her
20
     life, and she's in remission. But it was a long
21
     journey since that operation and since she was
22
     discharged from the hospital.
23
                  In the hospital she was hooked up to
24
25
     a central venous line, which in New York State
```

only a registered nurse can touch the central venous line. Once she's discharged from the hospital, the doctor is saying you need that central venous line, but, however, you're on your own.

The legislation that we passed and we're now amending this year said that when you're discharged from the hospital and a doctor prescribes a remedy, that that has to be covered by insurance. What was happening in Dream's case was her mother was responsible for monitoring and cleaning and maintaining the central venous line.

United States over 80,000 Americans develop a blood infection, a bloodstream infection because their central venous line is not well maintained. Out of those 80,000 people, approximately 28,000 pass away, they die from that serious infection.

We know that a chain is only as strong as its weakest link, and that's how we have to think about healthcare -- that we could provide this state-of-the-art procedure, have the best doctors in the world in the hospital, but once you're discharged, if we don't follow the plan that the doctor has put in place, then we're

failing our part.

And we know that by mandating that the insurance companies and not the bureaucrat -- or that the insurance companies have to follow the doctor's orders, we will save lives, improve our healthcare system, and make it stronger.

So the legislation before us today expands Dream's Law and says that not only central venous lines will have to be maintained by a professional, but any of the procedures that a doctor requires in that discharge will have to be covered under insurance. This is a step in the right direction in lowering the cost of healthcare and making sure that we have better outcomes overall.

I want to thank Dream Shepherd and her mother for fighting and pushing forward and saying what was wrong, and fixing the system for everyone that will come after them.

Thank you so much to all my colleagues for supporting this legislation.

Let's continue to work together to lower the price of healthcare here in New York State, and let's be a model for the rest of the nation to follow.

The resolution language said that there are 73,000 students with disabilities across the state. That actually -- the number, I recently learned, is a little bit outdated.

Actually, it's 77,000. It's the fastest-growing population of college students in the state, and we need to be doing a lot more to make sure that we are providing the services that those students need in order to achieve a college education just like anybody else.

I want to thank and recognize that we have a few student leaders who have joined us in the chamber today who are sitting here, and I want to recognize them by name and thank them for their fierce advocacy. Because without you being here to advocate and push us to do the right thing, this would not happen. So I want to thank Timothy Hunter, from the CUNY University Student Senate; Austin Ostro, from the SUNY Student Assembly; Brad Hershenson, Melanie Hecker, Luis Gutierrez, and Shelby Burns for being here, for your dedication and your devotion to this issue,

and for forcing us to do the right thing. 1 2 So thank you for joining us, and I thank you, Mr. President. 3 4 (Standing ovation.) 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: Senator Carlucci on the resolution. 6 7 SENATOR CARLUCCI: Thank you, 8 Mr. President. 9 I want to thank the sponsor of this 10 important resolution and thank the students that are here today, because it's so important that we 11 12 do everything to make education as accessible as possible for children of all abilities. 13 I know I have a deep belief, and I'm 14 15 sure my colleagues share this, that our children do not lack capacity, they only lack opportunity. 16 And when a child has a disability we have to make 17 18 sure we meet them where they are and give them 19 the tools so that they can live independent, 20 productive lives. Thank you, Mr. President. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: 8 Senator Metzger on the resolution. 9 SENATOR METZGER: Thank you, 10 Mr. President. I'm proud to stand with Senator 11 12 Gounardes and my colleagues in cosponsoring this resolution today. Every student deserves the 13 14 opportunity to realize his, her or their full 15 potential. 16 I wanted to point out in my district we have a really wonderful program at SUNY 17 18 Orange, the SUNY Orange Bridges Program, which 19 provides postsecondary educational opportunities 20 for people with developmental and intellectual 21 disabilities. I got to visit the program and see 22 firsthand just how incredible it was and how important it was to the students in realizing 23 their career goals, their independence, their 24

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1 Like you, I have often got up on the 2 floor of the New York State Senate and showed a lot of pride about my Senate district. It's got 3 4 quite a bit of diversity -- rural, suburban, 5 city, urban, a lot of great towns, a lot of great municipalities, counties, hamlets, villages. 6 7 fact, what you may not know about my district, being one of the largest Senate districts --8 maybe in the top five, 4,000 square miles -- is 9 10 that I actually represent Russia, Ohio and Poland. Russia and Ohio are towns in the 11 12 49th Senatorial District, and Poland is a 13 village. And Poland is exceptionally well 14 15 represented here today up in the balcony above my shoulder. They are the Tornadoes from Poland 16 Central School. They're the Girls Statewide 17 18 Varsity Soccer Champions, Class D, for New York 19 State. 20 And I told them earlier today that I guess I can define them not as a good team, not 21 as a great team, but they are the perfect 22 Tornadoes. And I'll tell you why as I say a few 23 things about their record from last year. 24 25 The Poland High School Girls Soccer

1 Team ended a very successful season with a 6-1 2 victory over Section 6 Champion Avoca. And I'm sorry that -- and this is quite a coincidence --3 4 Senator O'Mara isn't here today, but they beat 5 Avoca, which is in his district. And I just happen to be sitting right next to him. So maybe 6 7 he couldn't stand the heat. 8 (Laughter.) 9 SENATOR TEDISCO: Nah, he's very 10 proud of his school because they did win the Section 6 championship. 11 But our team secured the Class D 12 New York State Girls Soccer Championship against 13 14 them on Sunday, November 17, at SUNY Cortland. 15 The Poland Tornadoes finished the campaign with a perfect -- and this is why I call them perfect 16 tornadoes -- 23-0 season. Twenty-three wins, no 17 18 losses. They ran the table. You can't get much better than that. 19 20 This group of young women has also 21 gained recognition beyond New York State, 22 garnering a Top 50 ranking nationally by 23 MaxPreps. The Poland High School Girls Soccer 24 25 Team are not only champions on the pitch, but off

it as well. Just before the team's final match, its members helped clean up their community, which was hit by a devastating number of floods and heavy winds, leaving more than 241,000 homes without power. It was fairly devastating.

As I congratulate them, being involved in athletics for a long period of time as a player and as a coach, I also want to congratulate their coach, Tom Basel. You don't have an outstanding group of individuals like this who achieve so much only by their talent and skills, but you have to have great coaching to do that.

And as I spoke to them, I told them
I think he taught them a lesson that is a great
lesson for all of us: If the individual doesn't
care who gets the credit, the group and the team
can achieve unbelievable successes. And that's a
great message for us individually, us as
Republicans and Democrats, but us as -- who want
to work, for the most part, in a bipartisan way
for the best interests of the constituents we
represent in New York State.

So Mr. President and my colleagues,
I would hope that you would welcome them,

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congratulate them, and offer all the courtesies

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     was weird. Like I generally don't come up here
     on Sundays, but we had a really early meeting on

     Monday so I was getting ready to come up. And my

     phone just started lighting up. I feel like I

     got more calls and text messages than when I got
     elected or when either one of my kids were born.

     And they were saying that Kobe Bryant had passed
24

     away.
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And at first I didn't believe it. I didn't want to believe it, to be honest with you. It was in like my cousin's group chat -- I talk about group chats a lot -- and there was something from TMZ. And like, I'm not -- I'm not dealing with that. I got call after call and call after call, and it just -- it seemed to be real.

And that affected me, not only because it was just -- it wasn't just a celebrity passing away, it was somebody that people in my age range, Mr. President, believed that we kind of knew him. You know, he was on NBA Inside Stuff with Ahmad Rashad, and he used to rap with Tyra Banks and Brian McKnight. He actually had a few rap songs. Kobe can flow a little bit. If you're really interested, you should go back and listen to him. He wasn't bad. He actually was pretty good, Mr. President.

But what really got me was when I was driving up and I'm listening to sports radio on the way up. And there had been rumors that his daughter was on the helicopter as well. And when that was confirmed, that really, for me, crystallized it as a where-were-you moment in my

life.

You know, I mentioned that he was somebody who -- we saw he took Brandy to the prom, right. He was on more episodes of Moesha than we care to remember. He was somebody that was kind of a part of our generation in terms of pop culture.

Yes, 18-time All-Star, MVP -- I don't know how he won more than -- he only won one MVP. They gave the other MVP to Steve Nash. Nothing against Steve Nash, but Kobe should have got that other MVP. Two-time Gold Medalist. His first points that he ever scored were in the Garden, Madison Square Garden. And obviously, as a Knicks fan, you hope that it would have been for us as opposed to against us, but it wasn't. And that was a lifelong appreciation of Kobe as an incredible athlete.

February 2nd of 2009 was his -- some of us in New York called it his "Roger Maris game," because he had 61 points, and at that time that was the most points that had ever been scored in Madison Square Garden by an opponent.

And I remember watching that game like it was yesterday. The fadeaways -- and he modeled his

game after Jordan. And Kobe perfected his fadeaway. Mike Jordan became Fadeaway Mike after he was Air Jordan. Kobe was doing fadeaways in his prime.

And I just remember the show that he put on in the Garden. And if you look on social media, he signed the scorecard for that game and gave it to Spike Lee, noted Knicks fan, and said: Spike, this {expletive} is your fault. Because Spike used to talk to him at half court, but -- or court side, I should say. And it's one of those things where you just remember where you were at.

Fourth overall in NBA scoring. And I guess the cruel irony is that the night before he passed away was when LeBron James overtook him as the fourth leading scorer in NBA history in Kobe's hometown of Philadelphia. And one of his hometowns, you should say, because he grew up in Italy. And that shows the -- what intelligence is. Kobe Bryant didn't go to college, as many of us know, but he spoke three languages fluently: English, Spanish and Italian. And he dabbled in Chinese and German, I believe, as well. He was a worldly individual without ever attending

college, which shows us what truly intelligence is.

Some other things that I will note about Kobe, about sneaker culture. I'm a big sneakerhead, as they say. And the Flightposit, the Nike Flightposits came out, they came out in metallic gold and metallic purple, because primarily they were trying to woo Kobe Bryant into signing with Nike. And there's like a special edition of a Flightposit that had like a Kobe tag on it.

But he ultimately went to Adidas and had his first sneakers, called the Crazy 8s.

They were nice sneakers.

But what happened around 2006, 2007 when he went back to Nike, he started wearing low-tops again. And that was really -- you know, it was revolutionary. Because those of us who play basketball, or try to play basketball, we were always told that don't wear low-top sneakers, you're going to hurt your ankles.

Okay, and they use to play in the Pumas back in the day, when Clyde Frazier -- but nobody in the modern NBA had attempted to wear low-tops. Kobe brought those back. And now you

see the KDs, Giannis Antetokounmpos, the Paul Georges. A lot of NBA players are wearing low-top shoes, and Kobe kind of brought those back into style.

You know, I had two pairs of -- I still have, actually, two pairs of Kobe 5s. And really I have so many sneakers that I don't wear them out, but I've worn out the bottoms of those sneakers so much because -- big Kobe fan, and they were really light and responsive, and they were perfect for playing basketball. So it shows that he was on to something.

He was really on to something in his post-NBA career. He won an Oscar for "Dear Basketball." He was somebody who many of us know as a pop culture reference. And I don't know, I don't care where you're at, what you were doing, if you're balling up a piece of paper, at one point in your life you balled up a piece of paper (gesturing throw) and said "Kobe!" I know you did.

And we -- because actually the week before he passed away, at the State Police gym where we play basketball on Tuesdays, on a couple of fadeaways that I -- one that I made, one that

I missed, I definitely uttered a couple of "Kobes!" It's not going to go away, and shouldn't go away.

But the thing that got me the most about his post-basketball career was that he was a father. And even on LeBron James's remarks at the first Laker game that they had since he passed away, he mentioned that, Yeah, he was a great player, but in the last three years you saw that he was the best dad that we've ever got to see.

You know, being the father of daughters is special. Mr. President, you know full well how special it is. There's a special bond between father and daughter. And there seemed to be an even more special bond between Kobe and Gianna, his daughter that unfortunately was with him when -- when -- you know, when the helicopter went down.

And maybe that's why I'm just so still taken aback by this. Maybe it's the fatherhood aspect. Maybe it's because I saw him grow up, or I grew up while Kobe was growing up. But that fatherhood piece, seeing clips of his daughter emulating him in so many ways on the

court. And to me, you know, there -- I can't imagine anything, as a father, not being -- being powerless when your child is facing something as tragic as death.

And that's what I really want to stress to everybody. It's bigger than basketball and bigger than his career, his legacy, his name, anything like that. He was a father. He was a person who understood family and cared for his family.

And this should just remind you to give people their flowers while they can smell them, man. Like you just don't know what time you have left. If you love somebody, tell them you love them. If you appreciate somebody, tell them that you appreciate them. Because the next time might not be the next time. That may not happen.

He was supposed to help Dwight
Howard in the dunk contest that's coming up this
All-Star Weekend coming up. He mentored so many
young players in the NBA. Shaquille O'Neal's son
got a tattoo about him. He did so many things
that you can read that I'm not going to take the
time and belabor the point any further.

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But just, you know, love the people

     that you love, and tell them that you love them.
