Canada share deep economic, historic and cultural ties, in addition to the largest bilateral tourism industry in the United States.

Billions and billions of dollars are exchanged between our two great countries and uniquely between New York State and Canada every single year. In vacation spending alone, there's over \$1.6 billion in money that's spent by over 5 million Canadians that visit the State of New York each and every year.

This partnership has led to more than 700 Canadian-owned companies putting down roots and growing our economy right here in New York State. These very companies are responsible for creating hundreds and hundreds of thousands of jobs here in New York. And with a shared border measuring 444 miles in length and 17 international border crossings, our economies are tightly linked.

Canada serves as New York's primary export market, to the tune of \$13.8 billion in annual exports -- and that list is only expected to grow in the years to come.

On top of that, Canada has a very unique history with us, not only here in the

State of New York but in the United States of 1 2 The millions and millions of immigrants that came over hundreds of years ago to our 3 4 hemisphere from across the pond, many of them 5 could not get into our great country, were turned away at the border for various reasons, including 6 7 disease. The country of Canada welcomed them. Many of our ancestors made their way through 8 Canada, still live there today, and many came 9 down and ended up settling right here in the 10 United States and here in the great State of 11 12 New York. So our histories are very much 13 14 linked, our cultures are very much linked, 15 whether we're talking about the great American pastime of baseball, where people cross over the 16 border to see the Toronto Blue Jays or they come 17 18 over and visit the Buffalo Bills, the only New York State football team --19 20 (Laughter.) 21 SENATOR KENNEDY: -- or we are sharing our rivalries, be it the Rangers or the 22 Islanders or of course the great Buffalo Sabres 23 organization, the Toronto Maple Leafs, the 24 25 Montreal Canadiens, and the list goes on and on.

Our communities respect each other, 1 2 we love each other, and we share our economies and our mutual histories and futures together. 3 4 So we welcome you with open arms. 5 Thank you so much for visiting us here today. Thank you for celebrating Canada Day today here 6 7 in the State of New York. Please offer all privileges of the house to our guests, and we 8 look forward to our relationship growing even 9 10 stronger in the years ahead. Welcome, and thank you. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: Senator Little on the resolution. 13 14 SENATOR LITTLE: Thank you, 15 Mr. President. It's my honor to stand and to 16 welcome our neighbors but, more importantly, our 17 18 friends to the north. My district borders Canada with Clinton County, Franklin County; the 19 20 Akwesasne Reservation is partly in Canada, partly in the U.S.; and we are so intertwined. 21 The City of Plattsburgh has a huge 22 number of Canadian companies which are operating 23 in Plattsburgh, to the point that 15 percent of 24 25 the workforce in Plattsburgh goes to work every

morning to a Canadian company who is operating in Plattsburgh.

And we have companies throughout the district: Kruger has two hydro plants, we have Irving Tissue in Washington County, as well as Bombardier, Nova Bus, and so many others.

So we have also, in athletics, one of the most popular economic engines in the Lake Placid area is CAN/AM Hockey, which is operating every week. And you see youngsters playing hockey, and a real international event and tournament that goes on.

And just Friday night at our local hockey team, the Adirondack Thunder, in Glens Falls, the Queensbury Middle School sang the Canadian National Anthem because we were playing a Canadian team.

So it's a pleasure to have you here. And I look forward to seeing you tonight at our Canada reception, which they are having at 5:30, and everyone is invited. So thank you very much for being here, and thanks for being such a great partner. Thank you.

I want to say I appreciate the friendship.

And we talk about another country. When you live so close to the border, we don't see Canada as another country, we just see it as an extension of our family and friends.

So welcome, glad to have you back, and look forward to making my next trip over.

As we've seen from recent reports, the senior population in the United States within the next 30 years is expected to double. This legislation that we have before us today will help to break down the silos that exist between the Department of Health, between Mental Health and the home care services that exist.

We have to make sure that as our seniors are aging, as all of us are aging, that we're able to meet the challenges of our time.

We have to make sure that we are working together between agencies, between Mental Health and home care providers, to provide the most comprehensive, patient-centered service possible. This will lead to better outcomes, as we all know.

And this is an effort to be proactive instead of reactive, to really show an example of what's possible in treating people living with mental illness, treating them at home and making sure they can live as productive and independent lives as possible.

So, Mr. President, I'll be supporting this legislation, and I want to thank

Harckham on the resolution. 1 2 SENATOR HARCKHAM: Thank you, Mr. President. 3 4 It's fitting that today we are 5 passing this resolution for Regent Judith Johnson, as tonight at 5:00 the Board of Regents 6 7 will be holding a tribute in her honor at the State Museum, to which many of you have been 8 invited and will be attending. 9 10 Although she resided technically in Rockland County, we like to claim her in 11 12 Westchester County because much of her storied career happened in Westchester. 13 But whether she lived in Rockland or 14 15 served in Westchester, her legacy of helping children and putting children first really 16 impacted every child in this state. And Judith 17 18 Johnson believed that every child had a right to

funding for every child to get a sound education, and yet she also believed that the community which that child came from needed to surround all of the children, to help support them as they strove for that education.

an equal education regardless of the zip code

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Now, she had a varied career. 1 2 she started as a teacher, as an administrator, and she served prominent positions in White 3 4 Plains, in Mount Vernon, and in my home city, the 5 Peekskill School District, where she was a superintendent for 10 years. And in 2008, she 6 7 was named the New York State Superintendent of the Year, the first African-American in the 8 history of that award to win that award. 9 10 So upon her passing, you know, we 11 need to remember her legacy. Her son was on his 12 way here, which is why I thank everyone for holding this. He's not quite here, but we'll 13 14 give him this resolution this evening. 15 But her legacy is a lasting one and a powerful one. She leaves big shoes to be 16 I know there are interviews underway, 17 filled. 18 and thanks to Chairwoman Mayer for taking up 19 those efforts. But she left a great legacy, and 20 we are all better off and our children are better 21 off for her service to the State of New York. 22 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: 23 Senator Carlucci on the resolution. 24 25 SENATOR CARLUCCI: Thank you,

Mr. President.

I want to thank Senator Harckham for putting forward this important resolution.

And I was just so honored and privileged to get to know Regent Judith Johnson. Before she became our Regent, she helped us on a consistent basis in finding a way forward in the East Ramapo School District. Judith Johnson lived in the East Ramapo School District and was a constituent of mine, and we were just so blessed and fortunate to have her as part of our team.

Before, she had the resume that anyone would dream of in education, and her experience in the White House, working under President Clinton, and her time as superintendent in Mount Vernon, as the previous speaker had mentioned. But what was most fitting was she spent the time. She listened. And she used her expertise for such great good things.

We have a long road ahead of us when it comes to fixing education policy in this state, and particularly for the districts that I represent like East Ramapo, like Ossining, that we've been left so far behind with the changing

dynamic in our community. And Judith Johnson got that and understood that and said, Hey, we're in the 21st century. We're dealing with situations that we haven't before, and our education policy has to keep up. And she fought and pushed and pulled to really drag our education policy into the 21st century.

And I'm just so grateful to her legacy, to the work that she did, the work that is not mentioned in the resolutions -- the tireless -- the lengthy hours that she spent, the going to the board meetings and on the side to work with us to craft legislation, whether it was the monitor in the East Ramapo School District or spin-up legislation for the East Ramapo School District, thinking of creative ways, things that hadn't been done before, but ways that we could move forward and make sure that all of our children got the best education possible.

So it's just humbling to be here and speak on the resolution to honor and commemorate the life of Judith Johnson. It's a legacy that won't be forgotten in Rockland County. And I'm hopeful it's a legacy that inspires so many throughout the State of New York.

                  All of us could learn a lesson from
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her leadership in that regard. She viewed us as on the path to justice, but it wasn't going to happen right away. And really she was a role model in that respect.

Also she was -- her commitment to equity and justice was the most dominant theme of her life, whether in East Ramapo, coming to Yonkers, Ossining, the City of New York -- every place she went, she cared about every child and she exhibited it in the most personal way. She got joy out of every child. And you could see that when she went to schools.

She loved going to schools and seeing children. It was the experience of children that motivated her. She cared less about the adults and more about the children.

Finally, something that she did is that she talked about arts and music everywhere she went in school, she talked about the changing of her own life through exposure as a young girl in New York City to art and music. And it just carried her through the day.

It's a tremendous loss. And as we interviewed Regent candidates last week, it was clear, her shoes will not be filled. She was

1 really larger than life in the most human and 2 loving way, a way that showed that she cared about children. 3 4 So it's fitting that we honor her, 5 but also we should not forget her, because she had a lesson to teach us and we need to carry it 6 7 on. May her memory be a blessing. 8 Thank you, Mr. President. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: 10 Senator Bailey on the resolution. 11 SENATOR BAILEY: Thank you, Mr. President. 12 13 I thank Senator Harckham as well for 14 introducing this very important resolution about 15 somebody who was a giant in the educational community, and her name resonated far beyond the 16 district that she represented. 17 18 On the Sunday of her services that were up in Rockland, I happened to be attending a 19 20 church service a few blocks from where I grew up 21 on 227th Street in the Bronx. And it was 22 mentioned that somebody was going to go to -- we were going to go to her services, and the room 23 quieted down. Many of these folks from the 24

Bronx, many of these folks from Lower Westchester

County all knew about Judith Johnson and the indelible impact that she had on education.

As a Bronx boy, I didn't really fully understand her greatness until I sat down with her one day, sat down with her and Dr. Hamilton, the Mount Vernon superintendent, one day. She had an incredible recall, an incredible ability to talk about educational policy -- not just in terms of theoretical, but she could really break it down. She understood where Mount Vernon was in the direction that she wanted it to go. And she was incredibly passionate about the students, everything that Senator Mayer said.

She spoke about the transformation of Thornton High School to have a more profound effort on music and the arts in the City of Mount Vernon, and she was very proud about that.

And she had so many things that she wanted to do.

And every time I saw her, it was when I was visiting a school and she was visiting the school too. She wasn't just a Regent in name, she was a Regent in action. And not inaction, she was in action. Mr. President, she was in every possible school. And I felt that at

some times she was kind of checking up on me,
because we'd always be at the same school at the
same time.

But I am grateful for what she did and the legacy that she will leave, in that she makes sure that we understand that education is first, second and last for our children.

And I am very fortunate to have counted her as a friend and a colleague on behalf of education and the children in this state.
