(Whereupon, the assemblage respected 11 a moment of silence.) 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: The reading of the Journal. 14 15 THE SECRETARY: In Senate, Monday, 16 March 9, 2020, the Senate met pursuant to adjournment. The Journal of Sunday, March 8, 17 18 2020, was read and approved. On motion, Senate 19 adjourned. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: Without 21 objection, the Journal stands approved as read. 22 Presentation of petitions. 23 Messages from the Assembly. SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. President, б 7 on behalf of Senator Savino, on page 15 I offer the following amendments to Calendar Number 193, 8 Senate Print 2834, and ask that said bill retain 9 10 its place on Third Reading Calendar. ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: The 11 amendments are received, and the bill shall 12 retain its place on the Third Reading Calendar. 13 SENATOR GIANARIS: On behalf of 14 15 Senator Ramos, on page 24 I offer the following amendments to Calendar Number 359, Senate Print 16 3292A, and ask that said bill retain its place on 17 18 Third Reading Calendar. ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: 19 The 20 amendments are received, and the bill shall 21 retain its place on the Third Reading Calendar. 22 Senator Gianaris. 23 SENATOR GIANARIS: I now move to adopt the Resolution Calendar, with the exception 24 25 of Resolutions 2953 and 3014.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: All in 2 favor of adopting the Resolution Calendar, with the exception of Resolutions 2953 and 3014, 3 4 please signify by saying aye. 5 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: 6 7 Opposed, nay. 8 (No response.) 9 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: The 10 Resolution Calendar is adopted. Senator Gianaris. 11 SENATOR GIANARIS: At this time let 12 us take up Resolution 2953, by Senator May, read 13 14 its title only, and recognize Senator May. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: The 16 Secretary will read. 17 THE SECRETARY: Senate Resolution 18 2953, by Senator May, commemorating the 150th Anniversary of Syracuse University. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: Senator May on the resolution. 21 22 SENATOR MAY: Thank you, Mr. President. 23 For many people in this room, 24 Syracuse University is Orange basketball and 25

football, but Syracuse University is much more 1 than that. And at the 150th anniversary of its 2 3 founding, I want to brag about some of its other 4 claims to fame beyond being New York's college 5 team. Since its founding in 1870, Syracuse 6 7 University has opened its doors to all, regardless of race or gender. Today it has an 8 enrollment of almost 23,000, with students from 9 10 across all 50 states and more than 120 countries. 11 Syracuse University is recognized as 12 a global student-centered research university, with 13 academic schools and colleges, including 13 14 several that are ranked among the best in the 15 nation, such as the Newhouse School of Public Communications and the Maxwell School of 16 Citizenship and Public Affairs. 17 18 Several other distinguished institutions began as part of Syracuse 19 20 University, including the SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry, SUNY Upstate 21 Medical University, and Utica College. 22 Syracuse University is a leader in a 23 number of areas, and I'm going to pick out two in 24 25 particular. One is disability education.

1 My daughter went to Ed Smith 2 Elementary School, which is famous around the country for its use of inclusive education from 3 4 kindergarten up. This was pioneered by 5 professors from Syracuse University, and the school remains decades later as a model for 6 7 schools cross the country. 8 Syracuse University is also home to 9 Inclusive U, which offers a full-immersion campus 10 experience for students with intellectual and mental disabilities. 11 12 Another important area for Syracuse University is as a national leader in supporting 13 our veterans as they transition back to civilian 14 15 life, through the Institute for Veterans and Military Families and a brand-new and incredibly 16 beautiful National Veterans Resource Center that 17 18 everyone should come and visit. 19 And of course there's sports too. 20 Syracuse football made history in the 21 mid-20th century as a national championship team 22 that included legends like Jim Brown, Floyd Little, and the first African-American Heisman 23 Trophy winner, Ernie Davis. 24 25 Syracuse Men's Basketball won the

NCAA national championship in 2003 with Carmelo 1 2 Anthony, and S.U. now has one of the top women's 3 basketball programs in the country as well. 4 It also has a ten-time national 5 championship Men's Lacrosse Team. That's the 6 most national championships of any school in the 7 country. The lacrosse success is closely 8 9 linked to the important fact that Syracuse 10 University sits on the ancestral lands of the Haudenosaunee and maintains deep ties with its 11 12 indigenous neighbors. Among its alumni is Oren Lyons, Faithkeeper of the Turtle Clan of the 13 14 Onondaga Nation and an international activist for 15 indigenous rights, as well as an All-American lacrosse player for Syracuse University in his 16 17 day. 18 Among other distinguished alumni are Sarah Loguen, one of the nation's first 19 20 African-American women to become a physician; writers Joyce Carol Oates and George Saunders; 21 astronaut Eileen Collins; screenwriter Aaron 22 Sorkin, journalists Ted Koppel and Bob Costas, 23 and I'll add New York State Senators Tom O'Mara 24 25 and Toby Stavisky, and Lieutenant Governor Kathy

Hochul. 1 2 The university stands as a treasured asset to our city and region and to all of 3 4 New York State. We are joined here today by Bea 5 González, vice president for community engagement; Sue Ballard, vice president for 6 7 alumni affairs; and Cydney Johnson, executive 8 director for state and local relations. 9 I ask that we pause now to 10 congratulate Syracuse University on the occasion of its 150th anniversary, and join the university 11 in celebrating its continued commitment to 12 educate and transform lives for future 13 14 generations of students. 15 Go, Orange! 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: Senator Stavisky on the resolution. 17 18 SENATOR STAVISKY: Thank you, Mr. President. 19 20 And thank you, Senator May, for so 21 many things in your representation of Syracuse, 22 both the city and the surrounding counties as 23 well. And in fact when I had a hearing in 24 25 Syracuse in October, a Higher Education Committee

1 hearing, Senator May arranged for me to take --2 we took a tour together of the campus and some of the construction sites, particularly the building 3 4 that's being dedicated to serving our veterans. 5 And even when I was a student there, a lot of attention was paid to both the disabled but also 6 7 to the veteran community. 8 No, I did not play sports there --9 this was before Title IX -- but I did write for 10 the campus newspaper, among other activities. And I must say I spent four wonderful years at 11 12 Syracuse, and I'm very grateful for the education that I received. 13 14 And I'm delighted to honor, as chair 15 of the Committee on Higher Education, the 16 contributions over the past 150 years from the university itself. So I congratulate Syracuse 17 18 and thank Senator May. 19 Thank you, Mr. President. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: The 21 question is on the resolution. We extend to you all of the privileges and courtesies of 6 7 this house. 8 Please rise and be recognized. 9 (Standing ovation.) 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: Senator Gianaris. 11 12 SENATOR GIANARIS: Can we now take 13 up previously adopted Resolution 2929, by Senator Metzger, read its title only and 14 15 recognize Senator Metzger. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: The Secretary will read. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Senate Resolution 19 2929, by Senator Metzger, memorializing Governor 20 Andrew M. Cuomo to proclaim March 10, 2020, as 21 Maple Day in the State of New York. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: 23 Senator Metzger on the resolution. SENATOR METZGER: Thank you, 24 25 Mr. President.

As chair of the Senate Agriculture 1 2 Committee and the proud representative of many 3 maple syrup producers in the Hudson Valley and 4 Catskills regions, it is with great pleasure that 5 I rise today to present a resolution in support of Governor Andrew M. Cuomo proclaiming March 10, 6 7 2020, as Maple Day in the State of New York. The height of maple season is upon 8 9 us, one of the sweetest indications of spring. There are two Maple Weekends this year, March 10 21st and 22nd and March 28th and 29th, across the 11 12 state, with 187 participating producers welcoming 13 visitors to see how maple syrup is made, enjoying 14 tastings, taking home farm-fresh pure and natural 15 maple syrup products from maple syrup, maple sugar and maple butter to maple candies, maple 16 sausage -- that's a good one -- maple milk and 17 18 more. 19 My personal favorite is the maple 20 cotton candy, which I hope you all tried today. 21 The FFA does a great job. 22 Maple syruping has been a seasonal tradition in New York State for centuries, dating 23 back to the earliest native peoples. Maple farms 24 25 are often a multigenerational family affair, with

some of our maple farms in New York State 1 2 producing continually for over 200 years. New York State is second in the 3 4 nation in maple syrup production, with farmers 5 tapping 2.7 million trees to produce over 860,000 gallons of syrup a year. 6 7 According to the New York State Maple Syrup Producers Association, our state is 8 9 home to the largest resource of tappable maple 10 trees in the United States, and over 2,000 maple 11 sugarers. With new products, new technology, 12 and a growing public appetite for all things 13 14 maple, New York maple producers have a bright 15 future to lead the nation in this special, healthful, high-value crop. 16 17 And just on a personal note, I want 18 to just mention that whenever I bake for my 19 family, I often substitute refined white sugar 20 with maple syrup -- much healthier, and it's 21 really delicious. 22 So thank you very much. ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: 23 The resolution was previously adopted on March 3rd. 24 25 Senator Gianaris.

Cuomo to declare March 11, 9 10 2020, to April 12, 2020, as Garifuna-American 11 Heritage Month in the State of New York. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: Senator Sepúlveda on the resolution. 13 SENATOR SEPÚLVEDA: 14 Thank you for 15 allowing me to speak on this resolution. 16 Even though the resolution is called the Garifuna, the actual name of the group is the 17 18 Garinagu group. Garinagu is their culture, their 19 history; Garifuna is their language. But here in 20 this state we usually refer to the group of 21 individuals that come from a certain part of 22 Central America as the Garifunas. 23 Now, they were West Africans that were being brought to this part of the world as 24 25 enslaved people, and the ship that they were on

washed ashore at Saint Vincent. And there they 1 married with the local population of Arawaks and 2 Carib Indians that lived on the island of 3 4 Saint Vincent. 5 They remained there until 1796, when the British decided to exile them. And with the 6 7 assistance of the Spaniards, they were able to resettle in Roatan, which is an island off 8 Honduras. It's part of the Honduras Bay Islands. 9 10 And from there they have migrated to places like primarily Guatemala, Nicaragua, and Belize. 11 12 The Garifuna people, the Garinagu people, represent a story, a history of survival. 13 14 Everywhere where they've gone, they've had to 15 survive. But during that period of survival, they have maintained their culture, their 16 language, and their history. Most Garifunas 17 18 speak both the Garifuna language, but they speak 19 Spanish. And those that come from Belize speak 20 English. 21 They have migrated to the United States and other parts of the world, but in this 22 country and especially in New York -- and even 23 24 more especially in the Bronx -- we have a large 25 emerging population.

1 They have become part of the 2 political process in the State of New York. They have brought their culture, their history, their 3 4 music, their dance -- a particular dance called 5 Punta, which I would encourage all of you to take classes and learn how to dance. 6 7 But they are now a part of the 8 melting pot of this country and of the City of 9 New York. They have contributed mightily to the 10 development of this country and this state. They have entered all professions, and they have 11 12 served in our military with honor and 13 distinction. 14 And so I'm very proud to pass this 15 resolution in honor of the Garinagu or, as you know them, the Garifuna people. 16 17 Thank you. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: The 19 question is on the resolution.
