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Leader Stewart-Cousins, have it read in its 1 2 entirety, and call on Senator Myrie on the resolution. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: The 5 Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: Senate Resolution 6 7 3016, by Senator Stewart-Cousins, commemorating the 55th Anniversary of Bloody Sunday and the 8 9 Selma-to-Montgomery march across the 10 Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama, which 11 served as a catalyst for the passage of the 12 1965 Voting Rights Act. "WHEREAS, The Selma to Montgomery 13 14 march was part of a series of civil rights 15 protests that occurred in 1965 in Alabama, a state with deeply entrenched racist policies; and 16 "WHEREAS, In March of that year, in 17 18 an effort to register black voters in the South, protesters marching the 54-mile route from Selma 19 20 to the state capital of Montgomery were confronted with deadly violence from local 21 22 authorities and white vigilante groups; and "WHEREAS, As the world watched, the 23 protesters, under the protection of federalized 24 25 National Guard troops, finally achieved their

goal, walking around the clock for three days to 1 reach Montgomery, Alabama; the historic march, 2 3 and Martin Luther King, Jr.'s participation in 4 it, raised awareness of the difficulties faced by 5 black voters, and the need for a national Voting Rights Act; and 6 7 "WHEREAS, Even after the Civil Rights Act of 1964 forbade discrimination in 8 voting on the basis of race, efforts by civil 9 10 rights organizations such as the Southern 11 Christian Leadership Council and the Student 12 Nonviolent Coordinating Committee to register black voters were met with fierce resistance in 13 14 southern states such as Alabama; and 15 "WHEREAS, On March 17, 1965, even as the Selma-to-Montgomery marchers fought for the 16 17 right to carry out their protest, 18 President Lyndon Johnson addressed a joint session of Congress, calling for federal voting 19 20 rights legislation to protect African-Americans 21 from barriers that prevented them from voting; 22 and "WHEREAS, That August, Congress 23 24 passed the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which 25 guaranteed the right to vote, first awarded by

1 the 15th Amendment, to all African-Americans; and 2 "WHEREAS, Specifically, the Voting 3 Rights Act of 1965 banned literacy tests as a 4 requirement for voting, mandated federal 5 oversight of voter registration in areas where tests had previously been used, and gave the U.S. 6 7 attorney general the duty of challenging the use of poll taxes for state and local elections; and. 8 9 "WHEREAS, Along with the Civil 10 Rights Act, the Voting Rights Act was one of the most expansive pieces of civil rights legislation 11 12 in American history; it greatly reduced the disparity between black and white voters in the 13 14 United States and allowed greater numbers of 15 African-Americans to participate in politics and government at the local, state and national 16 level; and 17 18 "WHEREAS, On March 7, 2015, marchers walked over the Brooklyn Bridge in solidarity 19 20 with the 50th Anniversary of Bloody Sunday and the Selma-to-Montgomery march across the Edmund 21 22 Pettus Bridge; the Selma is Everywhere march honored those who fought and continue to fight 23 for social injustice and to remind all 24 25 United States citizens to never forget the pain

which was endured in the movement to attain basic 1 2 civil rights; and 3 "WHEREAS, To commemorate the 4 55th anniversary of Bloody Sunday and the 5 historic march, a myriad of events were held from Selma to New York, and across this great nation, 6 7 to remember and recall that pivotal day which forever changed the lives of each and every 8 American citizen; one such event included the 9 10 Manhattan kick-off of the nationwide tour of Turning 15 on the Road to Freedom, a musical 11 12 filled with songs telling the story of Lynday 13 Blacmon Lowery, the youngest child to walk all 14 the way from Selma to Montgomery; now, therefore, 15 be it "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 16 17 Body pause in its deliberations to commemorate 18 the 55th anniversary of Bloody Sunday and the 19 Selma-to-Montgomery march across the 20 Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama, which served as a catalyst for passage of the 1965 21 22 Voting Rights Act; and be it further "RESOLVED, That a copy of this 23 resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted to 24 25 Hazel N. Dukes, president, National Association

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for the Advancement of Colored People, New York

                  That march from Selma to Montgomery
     has left indelible images in our country's
19
20
     history. We remember seeing black men, black
     women, white men and white women marching and
21
     being brutalized in order to protect the
22
     franchise. It is a reminder that the rights that
23
     we enjoy today, the rights that we take for
24
25
     granted, were paid for in blood by brave men and
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1 | women 55 years ago.

And let us also remember that while we are not brutalized at the polls today, that voter suppression still exists and that it requires us to step up to the promise of the men and women that marched from Selma to Montgomery. We remember Dr. King's speeches. We remember the civil rights leaders of our history. But we are now charged with carrying the torch. We must continue to march. We must continue to protect the rights of the franchise.

So I thank you for voting for this resolution, and I hope that all of you will join me in remembering the 55th anniversary of this momentous occasion in this country's history.

1 THE SECRETARY: Resolution 2957, by 2 Senator Montgomery, honoring Esmeralda Simmons, Esq., upon the occasion of her retirement after 3 4 more than 34 years of distinguished service as 5 the Founding Executive Director of the Center for Law and Social Justice. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: 8 Senator Montgomery on the resolution. 9 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Thank you, 10 Mr. President. It is so befitting that we -- I rise 11 12 today to honor Esquire Esmeralda Simmons, especially in light of the fact that we're also 13 14 honoring the Selma, Alabama, event. 15 We're honoring Esmeralda today for her role in founding the Center for Law and 16 Social Justice at Medgar Evers College, that's so 17 18 true, and what she has done there to empower so many parents, especially, and others in her 19 20 community. We also note that she was the first 21 22 deputy commissioner for human rights for New York She was also the civil rights attorney 23 for the U.S. Department of Education, and she was 24 25 also New York State assistant attorney general

and the New York City assistant corporation counsel.

However, I want to point out a role that she has played as it relates to voting rights that is not in this particular resolution, and that is the fact that as a young attorney in the City of New York, Esmeralda Simmons, along with a couple of her colleagues, in concert with PRLDF, the Puerto Rican Legal Defense Fund, the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, was able to go into court and sue in the name of the Voting Rights Act, the 1965 Voting Rights Act, and especially as it related to the drawing of districts which allowed for the representation of the people who actually lived in those districts.

So this Voting Rights Act case was brought on behalf of people living in the County of Kings and the County of Queens especially.

And so it is really based on that lawsuit, brought on behalf of residents of those counties, that some of us have been able to be representative in both the New York City Council as well as the State Legislature.

So I am truly indebted to the work of Esmeralda Simmons, who, as a voting rights

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special attorney, has been able to create a level

I unfortunately misplaced them, 5 but I'm glad that Senator Myrie found them and read them verbatim. 6 7 (Laughter.) 8 SENATOR PARKER: No, I certainly 9 want to associate myself with Senator Myrie's 10 exhaustive remarks about Esmeralda Simmons' background, and certainly want to thank Senator 11 12 Velmanette Montgomery. You know, what she's not telling you is her mentorship of not just members 13 of this body, but of people like Esmeralda, is 14 15 part of what gave birth to the Center for Law and 16 Social Justice. And so let me make two quick points, 17 18 one about the Center for Law and Social Justice and how important it has been for serving the 19 20 Central Brooklyn community. This institution really has been on 21 22 the front lines of making sure that equal rights and civil rights for Brooklynites and for 23 New Yorkers generally have been at the forefront. 24 25 They have been engaged in everything from census

to redistricting to commissions on charter revision, they were engaged both times.

They have taken up individual cases around immigration and helping people in the immigrant community get the rights that they need and are entitled to, and have been really involved in making sure that things like stop and frisk and other illegal practices in our communities have been quashed.

And so I certainly have been a supporter of the center and want to thank

Esmeralda for her stalwartness in that.

And let me just make a comment about Esmeralda Simmons as a person. And she's somebody who I've known quite well, and she's been a mentor to me in the same way that she's been mentored by people like Senator Montgomery. She has tried to bring me along and certainly has come to me with many important issues and helped me on some things that I'm sure that Senator Myrie is working with her and the center still on voting rights issues.

And one of the things I'm hoping we'll take up in this body is expanding the Voting Rights Act. Now that we've lost

preclearance and those things on the federal level, it is an opportunity for us to do those things here on the state level. And certainly I know he's been engaged in that, Senator Leroy Comrie I know is super interested in that as well.

But it is really Esmeralda Simmons who has been the person banging -- you know, been the drum major on making sure that voting rights in the State of New York is something that we protect for every class of persons in this state.

And so I just have a -- owe a world of thanks to her and her pouring into me, both personally, professionally but then also spiritually. She is somebody who has a deep spiritual practice that is rooted in traditional African culture and practice, and an essential reverence, and certainly that has been important not just for her life but to what she's brought to the center and what's brought to our community and to myself.

And so I thank her for all that she does. And I think that this resolution today is just a modicum of the kind of acknowledgment and respect that she deserves, and happy to have an

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getting kids to preregister.

We are saying to the schools, find a way, adopt a policy that furthers this state law, that gives every child 16 and 17 years old the opportunity -- obviously, without any pressure, without any undo influence -- to choose, if they do, to register to vote and have the opportunity, when they are old enough, to be able to cast their ballot.

It's one of the most wonderful things about our democracy that voting is viewed so positively, but frankly we have to do better with our young people, and we need to encourage them. This bill is a step in that direction.

I'm pleased to vote aye, and I thank my colleagues and the leader for allowing this bill to come to the floor.

You know, as many of us remember, you know, years ago before the Do Not Call Law, you'd be sitting at dinner with your family, trying to enjoy it, and then the phone would ring. And you'd think it's a relative or something like that, and you'd pick it up, and it was a telemarketer. And then you'd hang up and you'd sit back down and you're about to, you know, get back to your corned beef -- you know, St. Paddy's Day reference, we're getting there -- (Laughter.)

SENATOR PARKER: -- and, you know, the phone rings again, another telemarketer. And so we created the Do Not Call Law.

There's a loophole in it that now, with the advent of cellphones, telemarketers are using that technology to get around it. And so now all of us are scared to answer a phone call that is not a number that we don't recognize on our phones, because we're getting so many telemarketing calls. This law is going to close that loophole, protect the privacy of the people of the State of New York.

Because we understand that recording of juvenile proceedings creates an objective record and provides an independent basis to resolve credibility disputes about Miranda warnings, waivers or statements. It also helps to identify false confessions and provides an objective and reliable record of what occurred during an interrogation.

I have met with many judges in our state and they have said to me that through their practice, video interrogations is only the best means of preserving credibility and making the justice system actually mean justice, especially for juveniles.

And in addition to the words of the judges, the Justice Task Force in January 2012 issued recommendations regarding electronic recording of custodial interrogations as a means of rectifying the problem of false confessions that has led to wrongful convictions.

So, Mr. President, if this bill becomes law -- when this bill becomes law, we should never experience a situation such as happened with the Central Park Five in the City of New York.
