And I especially want to thank all the groups and individuals who have come forward and told their tragic stories in order to keep the tragedy from happening to people in the future.

This is our moment to rethink long term care in New York State. The crisis in the workforce and in the quality of life for our seniors long predates the pandemic, but now we have a moment when people are paying attention and maybe we can actually make real change.

One thing the pandemic has done is shown us what works and what doesn't. There was an article in Newsday just this weekend about the shape of nursing homes in the future, which may be very different from what we have seen in the past. And this task force that this bill puts together will bring together experts from many different perspectives to really chart a better

1 for residents and families in nursing homes to 2 have a way to report issues and get answers. 3 Long Term Care Ombudsman Program is mandated by 4 the federal government; every state has it. 5 In New York, we have implemented it in a kind of less than ideal way, and it is 6 7 primarily staffed by volunteers who are mostly retirees. They have not been able to get into 8 nursing homes. They are vastly understaffed, and 9 10 they don't really have a clear way to report the issues that they find. 11 So this bill addresses a number of 12 13 those issues. I hope in the longer term we'll be 14 able to really overhaul it and perhaps have it 15 staffed by paid staff in the future. But for now, this bill makes a big difference in raising 16 17 the profile, giving them a hotline to the 18 Department of Health so that they can report issues, and I hope making the whole program work 19 20 better for the residents and their families. 21 Thank you. home for rehab after surgery, and a few weeks later her mother died of three separate infections that had set in after the surgery.

It wasn't a death from COVID-19, and she didn't blame the staff, who were totally overwhelmed and had not picked up on the infections. She blamed her mother's isolation, she blamed the fact that she herself had not been able to get into the nursing home to see her mother and recognize that there was a problem.

Since then, I and all my colleagues have been hearing almost daily from people in our districts and across the state who have tragic stories about isolation in nursing homes. People are dying of isolation. They're dying because they are depressed, because they're refusing to eat. They're dying because they have some underlying condition that isn't being picked up by the staff because they are so overworked. They're dying because they have cognitive decline that is rapidly accelerating as a result of their isolation.

This bill would create a system where they can designate one or two people to come in and be personal care visitors on a

regular basis to see them, to pay attention to what's going on with them, and to raise their quality of life.

And I want to thank Statewide Senior Action and AARP and all of the advocates who have told just heartbreaking stories about this issue. I also want to thank my staff and particularly Carol Boll, who worked incredibly hard on this bill to make it a reality.

I want to thank the Governor, too, who in the last couple of days has changed the regulations about nursing homes to make it easier for people to get in -- which is a great step, and I welcome it.

But this bill will make it a permanent thing that there will be a system for people to have visitors. It will recognize how important it is that people have the kind of personal attention that they get from family members and loved ones but that the staff can't necessarily give them.

So I welcome the Governor's changes, but this bill will make a big difference for people in New York for a long time to come.

In her remarks she touched upon a 1 2 story about a patient whose family member was not 3 there to be part of the care team. And so often 4 with people in nursing homes, a vital cog in that 5 care team is a family member, someone who is there on a regular basis, who knows that patient 6 7 and can understand how they're doing, understand how they're doing physically and how they're 8 doing with their emotional and social well-being. 9 10 We talk a lot about our students and their social/emotional well-being and how that's 11 12 been impacted during COVID and why we need to get them back to school. It's also so vital in our 13 14 long-term-care settings, and particularly with 15 people with cognitive disabilities. And we've heard the stories of 16 folks, whether it be in the state nursing home in 17 18 Montrose or private nursing homes in the 19 district, they have seen their family member 20 deteriorate throughout this isolation. that's why this bill is so important. 21 And I thank the sponsor, I thank the 22 leadership. 23 I vote aye. My colleagues, I rise to explain my support for this bill, which is Bill Number S614B, by Senator May. It provides for the authorization and regulation of compassionate caregiving visitation at nursing homes and residential healthcare facilities.

This bill moves us forward towards setting guidelines for compassionate caregiving visitation at nursing homes and residential healthcare facilities. Every resident in a nursing home or a long-term facility has the right to benefit from family support -- who are an integral part of their care plan -- so they can live their best lives.

And as we have come to terms with during this COVID-19 pandemic, this level of family care from loved ones outside can only happen if they can physically get in to visit their family relatives. But since the pandemic began, family members and even legal guardians of residents of nursing homes and other residents of healthcare facilities have not been allowed

1 visitation, even if they were an essential part 2 of their loved one's caregiving team 3 pre-pandemic. 4 The lack of physical presence of 5 these caregivers in residents' lives has taken its toll. Advocates from across the state, 6 7 including a robust family council at a facility in my district, have begun urging us to pass 8 legislation that allows these so-called 9 10 compassionate care visits. 11 Sadly, at least one of my 12 constituents has passed away in the meantime, due to what they call, quote, failure to thrive, and 13 others remain at risk. And I memorialize him 14 15 today and hope this bill brings his family some sort of peace. 16 The residents of these facilities 17 18 are our grandparents, our mothers, our fathers, our family, and they deserve better. And I thank 19 20 Senator May and others sponsoring legislation in this package for their tireless efforts on this 21 22 matter. And as a government, we can and must 23 do better by our elders in long-term-care 24 25 facilities to ensure they can all lead a

The proposed amendment could not be any 15 more germane to the bill at hand because the sponsor notes that the bill at hand is designed 16 to bring transparency to information gathered 17 18 during public health emergencies, including 19 communicable disease outbreaks like COVID-19, and to require that facility-specific information 20 21 regarding such cases and fatalities are made 22 public. 23 It is ironic because in the last 24 week the lack of transparency is how we got to 25 where we are today in the first place. It has

taken months to receive any type of transparent information from the Department of Health or the Governor's office. And when we finally did get the information, we know it was incomplete and that it was willfully incomplete.

The Governor must have his emergency powers rescinded immediately, and that is what this amendment does. Since May of last year, the Republican Conference has been calling for the Governor's emergency powers to be rescinded. Our conference brought an amendment to the floor 14 times this year to rescind those powers, and each and every time the Majority has voted it down.

The conference brought the amendment to the floor in May after it was reported approximately 4500 COVID patients were sent from hospitals to nursing homes. Again, the Majority unanimously voted it down.

The conference brought the amendment to the floor in July after our conference demanded the Majority use subpoena power to compel the Governor and Commissioner Zucker to answer questions about the controversial March 25th order. Again, the Majority voted that down.

Again, this amendment has been brought to the floor 14 times this year. Today marks the 15th. But there's one difference.

Today this amendment is a bill sponsored by a member of the Majority, Senator Biaggi, who has had the courage to actually call out the Governor and call for the ending of his emergency powers.

She, along with 13 other members of the Majority, signed on to a letter stating that it was time to rescind the Governor's emergency powers. Today they have the opportunity to do just that.

Yes, it is agreed, we need to review nursing home policies and do our job. But all these things we're passing today don't mean anything as long as the Governor retains his emergency powers, because he can simply override those by executive order. And therein lies the problem.

It is high time this body gets back to a coequal branch of government. And I want to be clear. The latest scandal really has nothing to do with rescinding the Governor's powers. Our conference has called for that for months.

25 | What's needed in the current moment is a federal

investigation, which is ongoing.

But this is about restoring the Legislature to a coequal branch of government. It's about being able to provide oversight and accountability of an Executive who has shown gross disrespect for every member of this body, Democrat and Republican -- and, more importantly, has shown disrespect for the people that we represent and the families who have lost loved ones in nursing homes by willfully not reporting the data, by also doing so for political reasons and potentially to thwart a federal investigation.

It is critical that we move and act on this bill immediately to restore the Legislature again as a coequal branch of government. For these reasons, Madam President, I strongly urge you to reconsider your ruling. We know that there are 20 members of the Republican Conference and 14 of the Majority who will support this today, and that's two more than is needed to pass something through this house.

I urge you to reconsider the ruling, and I urge my colleagues across the aisle to support their colleague's bill and rescind the

some folks in this building feel it's necessary to stall sharing such information. And we have fought, both publicly and privately, to make sure that this information comes to us.

Some of it -- I would certainly thank the Attorney General on the record for doing her job to make sure that some of this information was released. Also folks from the Empire Center, for example, as folks who we might not agree on much, Madam President, but they certainly know how to look at data and analyze it.

Would mandate the State of New York to make sure that that data is made available to the public. It would make sure that the deaths of individuals that occur in hospitals but are from patients or, shall I say, residents of nursing homes are accurately recorded. Such a thing is essential.

We owe it to all the individuals who lost loved ones during the last year. I'm glad that we are doing this today. We have much more to do, we have more pieces of legislation to pass, but ultimately we know that it is our responsibility to make sure that we protect

It's an honor to be here today. And my first question for the sponsor is if you could briefly explain what this bill does and also the reasoning for the percentages within the bill.

SENATOR RIVERA: Absolutely. Thank you so much. Through you, Madam President.

As I stated just a minute ago, there are a few pieces of legislation which we are sponsoring and moving today which all correspond to the issues that we saw over the last year in nursing homes around the State of New York.

This bill in particular relates to a concern that is a sincere concern that exists about how much money facilities actually spend on patient care. It was a concern that made it clear to us that even though for the most part most of the nursing homes around the state, whether they be for-profit or nonprofit, obey -- or I should say abide by a standard of spending a certain amount of money on actual patient care.

We know that there are bad actors who use the opportunity and the nonclarity in the law to be able to make some money on the backs of individuals who they should be taking care of.

So other states have done similar things --

New Jersey, Massachusetts. 1 2 But ultimately, working along with stakeholders and family members, we came up with 3 4 the idea that 70 percent of the total revenue on 5 a yearly basis for nursing homes should be utilized for direct patient care. 6 7 We came up with that number after, again, conversations with stakeholders. And we 8 believe that not only is it the right thing to 9 10 do, but it is the right approach. And I will last point out, 11 Madam President, that our dear Governor has 12 obviously thought that there are some good ideas 13 14 here, because he took some of these ideas -- not 15 this bill, though -- and actually put it into his budget proposal. 16 So I thank him for recognizing that 17 18 we have a good idea, but I would say that we need to go farther than what the Governor does in the 19 20 budget, which is why we present this bill here, and hopefully we will be able to vote on it. 21 Thank you, Madam President. 22 23 you. 24 SENATOR RATH: Through you, 25 Madam President. Madam chair -- Madam President. First, it is -it would be important to point out where this
particularly came from. The Senator is correct
that it does not currently include capital
expenses in that 70 percent.

The reason for that is that it was pointed out to us that -- see, because remember, ultimately what we're trying to do here is we're trying to identify bad actors and take away from them the ability to take advantage of the most vulnerable.

So we've seen some bad actors in other states, and maybe even some in this state, who in this type of situation would actually set up shell companies for real estate companies or cleaning companies that would then actually have the money go through the -- the money that would ultimately go supposedly to patient care would actually go to companies that are owned, are subsidiaries of the same owners of the facilities.

To be able to avert that, we want to make sure that we eliminate that possibility.

Now, I should tell you, though, that this is not a concern that is inconsequential. I

will point out actually my colleague -- not only Senator May, but I will point out particularly to Senator Gounardes.

Senator Gounardes came to us with a very important distinction. He talked about a particular nursing home in his district which was struck by Sandy and, because of where it is, was flooded after the storm. And they made some changes that then made this facility operational above sea level. Maybe that's not the correct terminology, but, you know, so that it does not get flooded in whatever storm happens next.

And now they're concerned about the costs that are associated with paying back for those changes which they made which ultimately made the facility usable.

we're certainly considering that, that it is something that we are looking into. We are going to move this bill today. However, that is something that we are looking very closely at, because it is a concern that is a real one. And we ultimately do not want to create a situation in which institutions that are doing everything that they need to do to take care of their

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patients -- for example, making sure that they do

Throughout the year we have seen upstate facilities that have been facing major staffing shortages when it comes to nursing homes. This has been exacerbated, incredibly, during the pandemic. How does this proposal account for the differing circumstances between urban and rural nursing facilities?

Madam President. The concern about staffing is an absolute real one in all parts of the state, but particularly in rural parts of the state -- not only in your district, Senator, but also I would point out Senator May, who has been consistent on this issue not only through this discussion, but going back for as long as she has been here, talking about the need to make sure that we put resources to identify staffing, to be able to train new staffers for places that are difficult to get to, that do not have the sufficient staff at this moment.

So I would say that that is a concern that is ongoing. This bill would consider that the facility -- because ultimately it has to do with what the facility spends. I cannot force -- you know, if a facility doesn't

have access to individuals because they cannot find people to employ, right, if they have to -- let's say if they need 10 individuals to -- I'm complete making this number up.

But let's say that the facility needs 10 individuals that are caretakers, that need to be trained caretakers, and they can only find eight, we will not penalize them for only finding eight of the 10 that they should.

Ultimately this refers to how much revenue they're making for that particular year. So if there's a revenue -- I kind of -- to be able to understand this better for me, I actually just did a quick -- I said if there's a nursing home, let's say a nursing home spends a million dollars a year -- has a revenue -- I'm sorry, has revenue of a million dollars, right. If this bill passes, they would be required to have \$700,000 of that million dollars be spent toward direct patient care. Which could be PPE, food, housekeeping, medical care, et cetera.

Then of that total million, 400,000, which would correspond to 40 percent of the total, would need to be used for staffing.

Now, the fact is that they might not

even spend that much if they do not have -- if 1 they can't find the staff. In that sort of 2 situation, there is flexibility for the 3 4 commissioner to make certain -- to make certain 5 dispensations, if you will. I'll read from the bill. It is -- I'm reading from the bill. 6 7 commissioner may adjust the components of the direct patient care ratio as appropriate based on 8 current financial information reported by nursing 9 10 homes and overall performance by the nursing home related to patient safety, direct patient care 11 12 staff ratios, and quality of care." So it allows for flexibility so that 13 14 the commissioner may make the determination that 15 this particular entity is not -- it might not have met exactly the ratio but is obviously doing 16 everything that they need to to be able to 17 18 fulfill the requirements. 19 So it is not a very strict -- there 20 is something that is built into the bill so it allows for flexibility for the commissioner to 21 22 make a determination in the case of a particular facility. 23 24 SENATOR RATH: Through you, 25 Madam Chair, will the sponsor continue to yield?

Which means that as opposed to saying if you hire somebody, it's actually obviously going to cost you more on a day-to-day basis as a full-time staffer, as opposed to, say, hiring a staffing agency to fulfill the requirements of the 10 people that I referred to earlier. So we talked about that being 85 percent of the purchased amount would accrue towards that 40 percent that we're talking about.

And last but not least, we talked about the -- excluding real estate and capital expenses. And that was based on the information that we got from other states in which shell companies are created by entities to actually be able to kind of sidestep the main purpose of the bill.

     this bill. The circumstances surrounding how we
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came to be voting on this bill today in its current form to me looks like another Albany insider deal. How does that old saying go? If it looks like a duck, if it walks like a duck, it's a duck.

We are in the middle of a global health crisis that has taken the lives of thousands of New Yorkers. Politics as usual is totally unacceptable, it is sickening, and frankly it's just wrong.

The Governor has failed our seniors throughout this pandemic, and the Majority has done nothing to intervene or to help those in our nursing homes across New York State. First it was silence and inaction for months until hearings were scheduled for early August, with our conference continually calling for an investigation into the administration's handling of these nursing home issues.

Then one party held a questionable hearing allowing both houses of the Legislature to question the DOH commissioner for two hours for one day. Then they issued follow-up questions from the hearing with a three-week deadline -- which came and went, of course, with

no response. Next, they complied with the secret agreement to accept the lack of this very set of responses.

Now they have the supermajority and still have repeatedly refused to launch an investigation. Further, they have failed to issue subpoenas to hold this Governor and the Department of Health accountable, coupled with continually voting against repealing the Governor's emergency powers and taking back our duly constituted legislative authority.

And now, today, February 22nd, nearly one year since the Governor was granted his emergency powers, now this Majority has decided to pass legislation which fails to address the issues that have come to light with regards to our struggling nursing homes across our great state.

In general, the bills we are voting on today do nothing to address the Medicaid cuts implemented on facilities over the years or the staffing shortages they have been confronted with. Also, they do nothing to address the fact that the administration has ignored our nursing homes since the onset of this pandemic and has
