It allowed people that were unable to know whether or not they would have food on the table for their family, to have that security.

And now, with this bill, Nourish NY will become a permanent recurring fixture for New York State. That's critically important because now our farmers can count on that income, on being able to get rid of their surplus food and bring nutritious, locally grown food to the people that need it most and our food banks across New York State.

This amendment aims to restore oversight to the Legislature by removing these extraordinary emergency powers that, among many negative consequences, harmed our seniors and led to the tragic loss of 15,000 lives.

Earlier this week was the one-year anniversary of the Legislature granting these emergency powers to the Governor. At that time we were faced with many unknowns and needed the ability to quickly adapt to help move the state through the worst of this pandemic.

However, here we are, a whole year later, and we still have one man running the show -- one-man rule in this state -- and making all of the decisions, every single one.

And many of the mandates and orders he has passed down are causing great harm to our nonprofits, our municipalities, our schoolchildren, and our businesses in every industry across the state.

My office is flooded with calls from constituents asking for help or relief, yet our hands are tied. We know a majority of the members of this house want to repeal these powers

from the Governor and get back to doing the work that we were sent here to do.

My colleagues in the Republican conference have been trying to do this since last May. But in recent weeks, with mounting scandals continuing to plague our embattled Governor, many of our colleagues across the aisle have finally, finally echoed that call.

We've seen press releases and reports in the media, yet every day not one member of the Majority has stood up to do the right thing -- not one. And this is the 21st time that we have advanced this amendment.

The deal that was announced a few days ago by Democrats in both houses to supposedly remove the Governor's powers just doesn't cut it. That bill allows the Governor to keep and extend his powers. It's insulting to the intelligence of New Yorkers. It's a sham rescission decision.

But you'll hear more about that in the next 24 hours and on this Senate floor tomorrow. We need a straight repeal that will finally bring back oversight, accountability, and restore the Legislature as coequal branch of

1 government. 2 I know there are many colleagues across the aisle that agree and know we need a 3 4 straight repeal. And I implore you to do the 5 right thing. I implore all of my Senate colleagues to do the right thing. Just do it. 6 7 Do it now. 8 Our constituents are counting on us 9 to get back to work. I ask that we don't 10 continue to use procedural maneuvering to stifle a vote on this important amendment, which I'm 11 confident would pass overwhelmingly because it's 12 the right thing to do for all New Yorkers. 13 For these reasons, Mr. President, I 14 15 strongly urge you to reconsider your ruling. 16 Thank you. 17 ACTING PRESIDENT BENJAMIN: Thank 18 you, Senator Jordan. I want to remind the house that the 19 20 vote is on the procedures of the house and the 21 ruling of the chair. 22 Those in favor of overruling the chair signify by saying aye. 23 SENATOR LANZA: Request a show of 24 25 hands.
