(Whereupon, the assemblage respected 11 a moment of silence.) 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The reading of the Journal. 14 15 THE SECRETARY: In Senate, Sunday, 16 March 7, 2021, the Senate met pursuant to adjournment. The Journal of Saturday, March 6, 17 18 2021, was read and approved. On motion, Senate 19 adjourned. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Without 21 objection, the Journal stands approved as read. Presentation of petitions. 22 23 Messages from the Assembly. Messages from the Governor. 24 25 Reports of standing committees.

1 Reports of select committees. 2 Communications and reports from 3 state officers. Motions and resolutions. 4 5 Senator Gianaris. SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. President, 6 7 on behalf of Senator Kaplan, on page 24 I offer 8 the following amendments to Calendar 451, 9 Senate Print 23, and ask that said bill retain 10 its place on the Third Reading Calendar. ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The 11 amendments are received, and the bill shall 12 retain its place on the Third Reading Calendar. 13 14 SENATOR GIANARIS: Let's take up 15 the reading of the calendar at this time. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The Secretary will read. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 146, Senate Print 591, by Senator Benjamin, an 19 20 act to amend the Public Health Law. 21 SENATOR LANZA: Lay it aside. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Lay the bill aside. 23 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 24 25 149, Senate Print 1578A, by Senator Rivera, an

act to amend the Social Services Law. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Read the 3 last section. THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 4 5 act shall take effect on the 180th day after it shall have become a law. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Call the 8 roll. 9 (The Secretary called the roll.) 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Announce the results. 11 12 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 63. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The bill is passed. 14 15 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 16 169, Senate Print 1269, by Senator Brooks, an act to amend the Penal Law. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Read the last section. 19 20 THE SECRETARY: Section 3. Nays, 19. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The bill is passed. 11 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 12 176, Senate Print 90, by Senator Kaminsky, an act 13 to amend the Agriculture and Markets Law. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Read the 16 last section. THE SECRETARY: Section 7. This 17 act shall take effect on the 90th day after it 18 shall have become a law. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Call the 21 roll. 22 (The Secretary called the roll.) ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: 23 Announce the results. 24 25 THE SECRETARY: In relation to

THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 6 7 221, Senate Print 502, by Senator Breslin, an act 8 to amend the Insurance Law and the Vehicle and 9 Traffic Law. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Read the last section. 11 THE SECRETARY: Section 9. This 12 act shall take effect on the 270th day after it 13 shall have become a law. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Call the 16 roll. 17 (The Secretary called the roll.) 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Announce the results. 19 20 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 63. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The bill 22 is passed. 23 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 257, Senate Print 2204, by Senator May, an act to 24 25 amend the Education Law.

1 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Read the last section. 2 3 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Call the 6 roll. 7 (The Secretary called the roll.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Announce 9 the results. 10 THE SECRETARY: In relation to Calendar 257, those Senators voting in the 11 negative are Senators Lanza and Weik. 12 13 Ayes, 61. Nays, 2. ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The bill 14 15 is passed. 16 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 322, Senate Print 1728, by Senator Hoylman, an 17 18 act to amend the Business Corporation Law. ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Read the 19 20 last section. 21 THE SECRETARY: Section 31. This 22 act shall take effect on the 180th day after it shall have become a law. 23 24 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Call the 25 roll.

1 (The Secretary called the roll.) 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Announce 3 the results. Nays, 11. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The bill is passed. 11 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 12 323, Senate Print 2940, by Senator Comrie, an act 13 to amend the New York State Urban Development 14 15 Corporation Act. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Read the last section. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Section 5. This act shall take effect immediately. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Call the 21 roll. 22 (The Secretary called the roll.) 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Announce the results. 24 25 THE SECRETARY: In relation to

1 Calendar 323, those Senators voting in the 2 negative are Senators Oberacker, O'Mara, Ortt, 3 Palumbo and Stec. 4 Ayes, 58. Nays, 5. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The bill is passed. б 7 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 8 439, Senate Print 2976, by Senator Harckham, an act to amend the Mental Hygiene Law. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: 10 Read the last section. 11 12 THE SECRETARY: Section 4. This act shall take effect on the 180th day after it 13 shall have become a law. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Call the 16 roll. 17 (The Secretary called the roll.) 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Senator Harckham to explain his vote. 19 20 SENATOR HARCKHAM: Thank you very 21 much, Mr. President. 22 As we know, the opioid crisis 23 continues through this country, and New York State is no exception. Overdose death is 24 25 particularly pernicious during this pandemic.

People are particularly vulnerable 1 2 when they leave certain congregate care settings -- for instance, treatment, a 3 4 correctional facility, or when they leave an 5 emergency room for an overdose. We want to save those people's lives. 6 7 This is about meeting people where they are and saving their lives. If someone has 8 been in a correctional setting or they've been in 9 10 treatment for a period of time, they may come out and their craving is still there, but their 11 12 tolerance has weakened. And that's why they're particularly susceptible to overdose and overdose 13 14 death. 15 So this legislation will address that, in that everybody who's discharged from one 16 of those three settings will go home with 17 18 specific information educating them about 19 overdose, the risks associated with overdose, and 20 most importantly with naloxone or Narcan, which is an opioid antagonist which is life-saving, 21 along with a further prescription. 22 23 So this body has responded in a bipartisan way time and time again. I'm proud 24 25 that colleagues will be joining on this bill as

1 we continue to address the opioid crisis and try 2 to save lives. I will voting aye. Thank you, 3 Mr. President. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Senator Harckham to be recorded in the affirmative. б 7 Announce the results. 8 THE SECRETARY: In relation to Calendar 439, those Senators voting in the 9 10 negative are Senators Gallivan, Griffo, O'Mara, 11 Ortt and Ritchie. 12 Ayes, 58. Nays, 5. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The bill 14 is passed. 15 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 16 490, Senate Print 3372, by Senator Bailey, an act to amend the Private Housing Finance Law. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Read the last section. 19 20 THE SECRETARY: Section 5. This 21 act shall take effect on the 240th day after it 22 shall have become a law. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Call the roll. 24 25 (The Secretary called the roll.)

1 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Announce 2 the results. 3 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 63. The bill 4 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: 5 is passed. Senator Gianaris, that completes the 6 7 reading of today's calendar. 8 SENATOR GIANARIS: Can we now move 9 to the controversial calendar, please. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The Secretary will ring the bell. 11 The Secretary will read. 12 13 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 146, Senate Print 591, by Senator Benjamin, an 14 15 act to amend the Public Health Law. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Senator Lanza, why do you rise? 17 18 SENATOR LANZA: Mr. President, I believe there's an amendment at the desk. I 19 20 waive the reading of that amendment and ask that you recognize Senator Borrello to be heard. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: 22 Thank you, Senator Lanza. 23 Upon review of the amendment, in 24 25 accordance with Rule 6, Section 4B, I rule it

nongermane and out of order at this time. 1 2 SENATOR LANZA: Accordingly, Mr. President, I appeal the ruling of the chair 3 4 and ask that you recognize Senator Borrello. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The appeal has been made and recognized, and б 7 Senator Borrello may be heard. SENATOR BORRELLO: 8 Thank you, 9 Mr. President. 10 Today I rise to appeal the ruling of the chair. The proposed amendment is germane to 11 the bill at hand because the bill at hand deals 12 with the Public Health Law, one of many areas of 13 the law that the Governor has issued countless 14 15 executive orders and directives. 16 And I know that my job today is to actually prove that this amendment is germane, 17 18 but after seeing what we saw on Friday as far as 19 a law that was passed that was hailed by the 20 Majority as rescinding the Governor's executive 21 powers when it actually didn't, I would argue 22 that having something have to be germane is certainly out the window at this point. We no 23 longer need to be germane, because that bill 24 25 certainly wasn't.

The title of S5357 states "an act to 1 2 amend the Executive Law in relation to the termination of certain executive powers." But 3 4 clearly that title isn't germane to even the 5 language of the bill, which did nothing of the sort. In fact, it removed the sunset clause and 6 7 it actually codified the Governor's authority 8 indefinitely. 9 So this amendment is far more 10 germane to this bill than S5357 was to removing 11 the Governor's emergency authority, so I ask that this be heard and approved. 12 13 I know that my colleagues on the other side of the aisle went back to their 14 15 districts and hailed that they had removed the Governor's authority. However, all of us in the 16 chamber know that that bill did nothing of the 17 18 sort. A straight repeal wouldn't have required weeks of negotiation --19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Senator 21 Gianaris. 22 SENATOR GIANARIS: Just a quick reminder to Senator Borrello that he's referring 23 to a bill that is neither the one before the 24 25 house nor the amendment -- that is not germane --

I would also add that the amendment they are approaching is technically flawed, since they're amending a law that no longer exists, since the Governor signed the law we passed on Friday.

that they are proposing.

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7 So in addition to the numerous 8 problems with this process we're undertaking, the 9 amendment couldn't even function the way it was 10 suggested.

11 But your point is that it is not 12 germane. I would just ask Senator Borrello to stay on the question before the Senate right now. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: 14 Thank 15 you, Senator Gianaris. 16 Senator Lanza, why do you rise? 17 SENATOR LANZA: Mr. President, I 18 would argue that Senator Borrello is making an 19 argument considering the germaneness of the

20 amendment before the house.

And to make that argument, he's making the argument by contrast and not speaking directly on any bill that is not before the house but rather making a general argument about what is germane and what is not.

ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Thank 1 2 you, Senator Lanza. I'd like to remind everyone in the 3 4 house if we could keep the remarks to the 5 point of the appeal. Senator Borrello, you have the 6 7 floor. 8 SENATOR BORRELLO: Thank you, 9 Mr. President. 10 Well, then, the point of our amendment is to truly actually strip the Governor 11 of his authority by a simple repeal. It's clear 12 that we are still under his thumb. That's really 13 what the point of this amendment is, is to truly 14 15 do a clean repeal of the Governor's authority. 16 Because right now, despite the 17 legislation that did pass, our restaurants are 18 still not able to stay open past 11 p.m. You 19 still have to order food with your drink. You 20 still have to be seated, not standing when you're 21 drinking alcohol. Our students can't go back into the schools because of the six-foot rule. 22 Again, that's part of those executive orders. 23 Had we done this amendment in the 24 25 21 times prior to this that this amendment had

1 been proposed, then we wouldn't have any of those 2 restrictions that are still in place even today. So even though this amendment may or 3 4 may not be germane -- I believe that it is -- I 5 once again point to the fact that we set a precedent on Friday that germaneness is really no 6 7 longer necessary in this house. 8 So I would ask that you please approve this amendment and rule it germane. 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Thank you, Senator Borrello. 11 I want to remind the house that the 12 vote is on the procedures of the house and the 13 ruling of the chair. 14 15 Those in favor of overruling the chair signify by saying aye. 16 17 SENATOR LANZA: Request a show of 18 hands. 19 SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. President, 20 we've agreed to waive the showing of hands and 21 record each member of the Minority in the 22 affirmative. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Without objection, so ordered. 24 25 Announce the results.

1 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 20. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: The 3 ruling of the chair stands, and the bill-in-chief is before the house. 4 5 Are there any other Senators wishing to be heard? 6 7 Seeing and hearing none, debate is 8 now closed. The Secretary will ring the bell. 9 Read the last section. 10 THE SECRETARY: Section 3. This act shall take effect on the 120th day after it 11 shall have become a law. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Call the roll. 14 (The Secretary called the roll.) 15 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: Announce the results. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 63. The bill 19 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: 20 is passed. 21 Senator Gianaris, that completes the 22 reading of the controversial calendar. 23 SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. President, is there any further business at the desk? 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: There is

no further business at the desk. SENATOR GIANARIS: I move that we adjourn until tomorrow, Tuesday, March 9th, at ACTING PRESIDENT BAILEY: On
