4	Madeline Davis, trailblazing gay and lesbian
5	activist, historian, distinguished citizen and
6	devoted member of her community.
7	ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: Senator
8	Ryan on the resolution.
9	SENATOR RYAN: Thank you,
10	Madam President.
11	It's been a difficult couple of
12	weeks for the LGBTQ community in Buffalo and
13	Western New York. Last week I spoke of the loss
14	of long-time activist Bruce Kogan, and today I
15	rise to honor the life of another leading
16	activist who was born in the City of Buffalo.
17	Her name was Madeline Davis. She
18	was Dr. Madeline Davis, as she was a Ph.D. She
19	was an active and accomplished woman, and saying
20	that is an understatement. She spent her whole
21	adult life fighting as an activist for equality.
22	She was a teacher, an author, an historian, an
23	accomplished actor, on top of being a trailblazer
24	in so many different ways.
25	She founded the first gay liberation

1 organization in Western New York. It was called 2 the Matachine Society of the Niagara Frontier. How far we've come since those days. 3 4 She was also very involved in 5 politics, and she became the first openly gay delegate to any political convention in America. 6 7 She taught at the University of 8 Buffalo. She formed the first all-lesbian theater company in the United States. This is 9 10 one person I'm talking about here, not several 11 people. She was inducted into the Advocate 12 Magazine's Hall of Fame in 2012. 13 But what she really ended up doing, 14 15 as she went decades into advocacy, was realizing that she was part of a historic moment. So she 16 became somebody who started writing down the 17 18 history of the lesbian community, and she 19 collected oral histories of people throughout 20 Buffalo and Western New York. Her whole body of 21 work eventually went to the University of Buffalo, and they have the Dr. Madeline Davis 22 LGBTO Archive of Western New York at the 23 University of Buffalo. 24 25 So she truly made a difference

1 during her lifetime to so many people. Madeline 2 Davis's legacy will continue for countless years to come. And I offer my condolences to her wife, 3 4 Wendy, to all her friends and her family. 5 Thank you, Madam President, for allowing me to speak on this resolution. б 7 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: The 8 question is on the resolution. All in favor signify by saying aye. 9 10 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: 11 Opposed? 12 (No response.) 13 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: The resolution is adopted. 14 15 Senator Gianaris. SENATOR GIANARIS: Thank you, 16 Madam President. 17 18 Now can we move on to Resolution 753, by Senator Gaughran, read the title of that 19 20 resolution, and recognize Senator Gaughran. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: The 22 Secretary will read. 23 THE SECRETARY: Senate Resolution 753, by Senator Gaughran, mourning the tragic and 24 25 untimely death of NYPD Police Officer Anastasios

Tsakos on Tuesday, April 27, 2021. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: Senator Gaughran on the resolution. 3 4 SENATOR GAUGHRAN: Thank you, 5 Madam President. I rise today to mourn the very б 7 tragic loss of NYPD Officer Anastasios Tsakos, who made the ultimate sacrifice on April 27th, 8 2021, bravely protecting the citizens of 9 10 New York. On that day Officer Tsakos was 11 performing duties that he often did, just making 12 sure that all New Yorkers and anybody visiting 13 our state could go about their daily lives 14 15 safely. 16 This resolution and many accounts of the tragedy and the details that happened to this 17 18 brave hero have -- are in the resolution, and 19 there are various accounts of what happened that 20 awful day. And I'm not going to repeat them, because I want to really talk about the life of 21 22 this wonderful human being and brave police 23 officer. He was the proud son of immigrants 24 25 who came to the country from Laconia, from

Greece, came to this country. And he grew up in 1 Astoria, Queens, and actually for a brief time he 2 went to Greece and during this time he actually 3 4 joined, briefly, the Greek military. 5 He served as a member of the NYPD proudly for 14 years. His tenure included б 7 service in the 75th and 93rd Precincts and also 8 Highway 3. 9 He was active in a whole bunch of 10 important fraternal and charitable organizations 11 because he always gave back to his community. 12 But most importantly, he was a loving husband and father, leaving behind his 13 14 wife Irene and two very young children, Jenny and 15 Stavros. And being assigned to work nights, 16 Officer Tsakos enjoyed playing with his children 17 18 during the day and teaching them the values of 19 life. So we mourn this very tragic loss for 20 their family. Recently the Tsakos family bought a 21 home on Long Island, in East Northport. 22 He immediately became involved with his neighbors in 23 his new community. And during this difficult 24 25 COVID period, he actually volunteered countless

1 hours and he delivered food to many of his 2 neighbors who couldn't leave their houses -- some 3 of them had COVID, some of them were older. And 4 he just wanted to do his part on his own time. 5 He even did some home improvements for some 6 neighbors that were in need. 7 So Officer Tsakos's exemplary life makes this tragedy just so much more profound, 8 because we know he would have accomplished so 9 10 much more good for his community and for this 11 state. We will forever honor the heroic 12 service of Police Officer Anastasios Tsakos to 13 14 New York and once again express our deepest 15 condolences to the Tsakos family and to the NYPD. I vote in the affirmative, 16 Madam President. Thank you. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: Thank you, Senator Gaughran. 19 20 Senator Mattera on the resolution. 21 SENATOR MATTERA: Thank you. Thank 22 you, Madam President. Last week the family of Detective 23 Tsakos, the Long Island community, along with his 24 25 fellow police officers and the New York Police

Department, laid to rest Detective Tsakos. 1 Α hero was taken from his family and our state in a 2 3 senseless tragedy. 4 Today, led by Senator Jim Gaughran, 5 we stand together to honor his life and to let his family know that we will never forget his 6 7 life. Detective Tsakos was a 14-year veteran who gave his life protecting our state's residents, 8 9 and we owe him an unpayable debt. 10 Throughout his career he was a member of the New York Police Department who had 11 12 been called the best of the best by his fellow police officers, a mentor to all. He was a 13 14 shining example of how important our police are 15 and how much we owe all of them for their service. Sixty-seven-thousand New York State 16 police officers protect all of us from harm's way 17 18 every day. 19 Most importantly, he was a husband, 20 a son, a brother, and a father, a neighbor and a We hope his entire family knows that 21 friend. their state is with them during this difficult 22 time and that we share in their loss. 23 To his wife, Irene, we stand with 24 25 you in this trying time. We will continue to be

1	there for you as you deal with this tragedy.
2	To his young son, Stavros, and his
3	young daughter, Jenny, we hope you know that your
4	daddy was and is a hero, both in how we serve our
5	residents and who was in his community.
6	We will never forget his selfless
7	service to our residents to serve and to protect.
8	We will never forget the impact he had on our
9	community. And we will never forget his
10	sacrifice. Rest in peace, Detective Tsakos.

15	SPARK Awards. The SPARK Awards identify
16	outstanding individuals and organizations from
17	across Western New York for their dedication,
18	talent and impact on the arts and the cultural
19	sectors of our community.
20	Joan has dedicated her time and her
21	talents to the Western New York community for
22	over six decades, and as a member of the Amherst
23	Symphony Orchestra since 1959. She has committed
24	herself to the arts, and that has been an
25	impressive set of accomplishments in our

1 hometown. 2 She has dedicated her time as the 3 president of both the Women's and the Friends 4 Committees of the Amherst Symphony, as well as 5 the Amherst Symphony Association's board of directors. 6 7 Joan has expanded many programs, 8 brought hundreds of young people to participate in symphony concerts, and has brought symphony 9 10 members into our schools in Amherst for 11 educational presentations. She has been an advocate for the 12 positive impact of music and what it can have on 13 the lives of the children and adults alike in our 14 15 community. 16 So I would like to say thank you and congratulations to Joan Fishburn and thank her 17 18 for all the incredible and outstanding impact she has had in our Amherst community. 19 20 Madam President, thank you for the opportunity to speak on this resolution. 21 22 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: Thank you. 1 Williamsville North High School and a wrestler on 2 the Wrestling Team. And as a wrestler, Cameron recently won the Freshman Division Title at the 3 4 National High School Coaches Association 5 Tournament held on Sunday, April 25th, in Virginia. This marks his sixth victory of the 6 7 tournament, and he conducted all of that without 8 a loss over the three-day tournament. 9 Adding to the impressive feat, this 10 was Cameron's first time at this national tournament. It is also believed that he is the 11 12 first winner from Western New York since 2015 for this esteemed title. 13 His dedication to his sport and 14 15 studies is extremely remarkable. Cameron is actually a neighbor of mine, living one street 16 over, and I've watched him grow up and become the 17 18 remarkable young man that he is. And I wish him all the best in his 19 20 future matches and look forward to following his 21 future success. Thank you, Madam Chair. 22 I appreciate the opportunity to speak on this 23 resolution. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: Thank you.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: 19 The 20 Secretary will read. 21 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 118, Senate Print 1557A, by Senator Parker, an 22 act to amend the Public Service Law and the 23 General Business Law. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: Read the

2 THE SECRETARY: Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: Call the 5 roll. (The Secretary called the roll.) 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: Senator 8 Parker to explain his vote. 9 SENATOR PARKER: Thank you, 10 Madam President. I rise to vote aye on this bill. 11 It's an important issue around domestic violence 12 and how there are issues related to people who 13 are trying to get out of these circumstances and 14 their utility bills. 15 16 In the U.S. there are more than 10 million people who are abused by their 17 18 intimate partners annually. One particular 19 difficult challenge for many survivors of 20 domestic violence is utility debt. A victim of 21 abuse may be held responsible for debt accrued by 22 their abusers, and oftentimes utility companies try to hold survivors responsible for these 23 delinquent utility payments, and this further 24 25 limits their ability to flee their abusive

The utility does not only prevent 1 partners. survivors from leaving their abusers, but it also 2 makes it difficult for survivors to obtain new 3 4 utility service if they do manage to escape. 5 This bill requires the release of those individuals from the utility 6 corporations' telephone, cable TV, wireless 7 contracts in the instances of domestic violence. 8 As written, this bill allows a person who is 9 10 under a shared contract to opt out of such contract without fee, penalty or charge when such 11 a person is a victim of domestic violence or 12 intimate partner violence, and provides an 13 14 attestation in writing to their eligibility as a 15 victim. 16 A service provider may not require such a person to disclose confidential 17 18 information or details in these cases as well. 19 Also, it waives the otherwise 20 applicable charges for non-published telephone 21 listings where a customer requests protection of their identity in connection with consumer 22 purchases by telephone service and a customer 23 provides an attestation in writing for their 24 25 eligibility as a victim, again.

1 The bill also allows a person that 2 is under contract, including but not limited to a multiyear account, or bundled contract, to opt 3 4 out of such a contract without fee, penalty or 5 charge when such a person, again, finds themselves in one of these horrible conditions. 6 7 This legislation, again, provides an 8 escape clause of these contracts. You know, we 9 think that people who are, you know, survivors of 10 this kind of violence should not have to then again go through a whole new battle with their 11 12 utilities. Thank you very much for bringing 13 this bill to the floor, and I vote aye. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: Senator Parker to be recorded in the affirmative. 16 Announce the results. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 63. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT MAYER: The bill 20 is passed. Several public authorities have gotten themselves 16 into trouble due to the lack of oversight and an 17 18 express set of guidelines of their subsidiaries. 19 Accountability and operational 20 soundness must be clearly demonstrated by these entities through public disclosure and access, 21 22 with ultimate oversight resting with the people's representatives in the State Senate and Assembly. 23 I am happy to be the sponsor of this 24 25 bill and will be voting yes on S5137. And certainly I want to commend Assemblywoman Amy Paulin, who originated this 11 12 legislation. 13 You'll recall, Madam President, in 14 2019 we passed the Red Flag Bill, or Extreme Risk 15 Protection Order Bill. And what that bill allowed was that family members, police, 16 17 educators can petition a court to remove firearms 18 from someone who they -- the judge might deem to be at risk to themselves or to others. 19 20 So sadly, in Westchester we had a 21 case where a woman voluntarily committed herself 22 for mental health treatment and, upon her release, purchased firearms and subsequently and 23 tragically committed suicide. 24 25 And after the fact her family was

distraught, wondering why she was allowed to 1 2 purchase firearms, not knowing about ERPO or the 3 Red Flag Bill. 4 So this law would simply provide 5 information in the discharge planning, the discharge information for both patients and 6 7 families about ERPO and where they can access 8 that process should they feel that that is 9 necessary. 10 So this bill will save lives in the long run, and I am voting yes. 11 12 Thank you, Madam President. And when that domestic violence occurs,

the statute of limitations varies on the specific 1 2 The trauma and the impact of domestic crime. 3 violence can take years to overcome. And in addition, it's not uncommon 4 5 for survivors of domestic violence to be reluctant to report their abusers. Studies have 6 shown that 50 percent of domestic violence cases 7 go unreported, and in many cases it is not until 8 years after a violent relationship ends that a 9 10 survivor may feel safe enough to report the 11 crime. The current statute of limitations 12 is restrictive and does not take into account the 13 complicated nature of these circumstances. 14 15 Survivors of domestic violence may not report a crime for myriad reasons, including their age at 16 the time of abuse, ongoing trauma, threats from a 17 18 perpetrator, or the lack of evidence. The Phoenix Act extends the statute 19 20 of limitations for domestic violence offenses. 21 For all offenses with a statute of limitations of less than 10 years, the bill creates a 10-year 22 limit. And for offenses with a statute of 23 limitations of less than five years, the bill 24 25 creates a five-year limit.

1 This legislation will provide 2 domestic violence survivors with time to come forward and ensure that their perpetrators are 3 held accountable. 4 5 In addition, the bill strengthens policy and training requirements for police б 7 officers. Training would include techniques for handling of domestic violence situations and how 8 to spot signs of domestic violence. 9 10 It is time that we stand up and we 11 protect people in our state.
